



A Message From Town Supervisor JOHN VENDITTO

Clean water is important to all of us. One of the ways we can help protect our water is through responsible waste disposal.

Initiated in 1986, the S.T.O.P. (Stop Throwing Out Pollutants) program provides residents with an environmentally safe disposal means for household hazardous substances. Since the program's inception, 16,113 55-gallon drums of hazardous chemicals have been collected and more than 126,960 households have participated. In addition, in 2013 alone, 132.4 tons of electronic waste was collected.

Every day, hundreds of computers, cell phones, pagers and other types of electronic, or e-waste, become obsolete. Once just a small segment of total waste, e-waste, has quickly assumed major proportions. Not only do e-waste items have a low level of biodegradability, but they contain materials that are highly toxic when released into the environment. That's why it's so important to discard electronics properly through programs such as the Town's e-waste recycling collection.

Managing unused medications, both prescription and over-the-counter is an environmental and safety concern. Traditionally, we had been told to flush unwanted medications down the drain or toilet. We now know that flushing creates a new and growing problem in the environment. Wastewater treatment plants are not designed to remove or process many compounds found in medications, so they end up being discharged into our surface and ground water.

Along with the hazardous household waste disposal program, the Town sponsors the popular Homeowners Cleanup program. If you are a resident of the Town's Solid Waste Disposal District and would like to dispose of non-hazardous waste, please look for the dates and locations in this brochure. NEW for 2014 will be a safe and secure paper shredding program. Please check for dates and locations specifically for the paper shredding program. This program is open to Town of Oyster Bay Residents only and limited to three banker-size boxes per resident.

I hope you will take advantage of these programs. Remember, the Town of Oyster Bay's clean water is up to us all.



STOP THROWING OUT POLLUTANTS

Improperly disposing of products such as waste oil, oven cleaner, paint thinner, spot remover or photo chemicals may contaminate your own water supply.

Long Island depends upon an underground aquifer system for its water supply. Anything poured on the ground or put into cesspools, storm drains or recharge systems can work its way down into the aquifer or our harbors and bays.

The S.T.O.P. Program provides a safe method for disposal of household hazardous waste

Residents are urged to bring all household hazardous waste to a S.T.O.P. collection. A schedule of collection dates and locations is included in this brochure.

Please remember to:

- Store waste safely and securely until the next S.T.O.P. collection in your area.
- Take care not to spill waste when transporting them to the collection site. Wear rubber gloves when handling waste.

What you may bring to S.T.O.P. Collections (partial listing)*

- Oil-based & latex paints
- Brake & transmission fluids
- Drain & oven cleaners
- Spot removers
- Automobile tires (with or without rims)
- Small aerosol cans
- Outdoor gas grill propane tanks
- Fluorescent bulbs
- Thermostats
- Waste motor oil & antifreeze
- Solvents
- Most pesticides & insecticides
- Photo chemicals
- Wood preservatives
- Automobile batteries
- Rechargeable and button batteries

*Town reserves right to limit quantities

In addition, latex paint and electronic waste can be brought to Old Bethpage Solid Waste Disposal Complex weekdays from 7:00 a.m. to 2:30 p.m.

Commonly used household substances can contaminate your water supply

What you may not bring to S.T.O.P. Collections

- Radioactive materials
- Unlabeled materials (unless identifiable by our contractor)
- Asbestos material
- Explosives, fireworks
- Infectious materials (medical waste)
- Smoke detectors

YOU DON'T HAVE TO STORE USED MOTOR OIL BETWEEN S.T.O.P. COLLECTIONS

New York State Law requires all service stations that perform oil changes and major retailers that sell motor oil to accept up to five gallons per person per day of waste oil at no charge. Also, residents may bring up to 1-1/2 gallons of used motor oil every 30 days to the Town of Oyster Bay waste oil collection sites listed below. This site is open dawn to dusk, seven days a week.

Electronic Waste Recycling Program

Improperly disposing of unwanted electronic items can introduce highly toxic materials such as lead, mercury and cadmium into the environment. Residents are urged to bring all electronic waste to our e-waste recycling program.

What you may bring to Electronic Waste Recycling Collections

- Computers & computer monitors
- Small scale servers
- Cathode ray tubes
- Hard drives
- Laptops
- Electronic or video game consoles
- Digital cameras
- Electronic keyboards
- VCR's & DVD's
- Computer peripherals & small electronic equipment (including any cable, cord, or wiring permanently affixed to or incorporated into the computer peripheral or small electronic equipment.)
- Copiers, fax machines, printers and scanners (only those intended for use with a computer and weighing less than 100 lbs.)
- Portable digital music players
- Telephones
- Cell phones
- Televisions & cable/satellite receivers
- Digital video recorders
- Digital converter boxes
- Stereos, speakers & radio equipment
- Electronic mice or similar pointing devices
- Microwave ovens

YOU DON'T HAVE TO STORE ELECTRONIC WASTE BETWEEN ELECTRONIC WASTE COLLECTION DAYS IF YOU ARE IN THE SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL DISTRICT. Residents may bring electronic waste to the T.O.B. Solid Waste Disposal Complex, 101 Bethpage-Sweet Hollow Road, Old Bethpage, EVERY WEEKDAY, FROM 7:00 a.m. TO 2:30 p.m. E-waste may also be brought to Homeowners Cleanup Programs - or - placed at the curb next to trash pails for sanitation pickup on regular sanitation days (not S.O.R.T. days)



Dispose of Unwanted or Expired Prescription & Over-The-Counter Medications at all S.T.O.P. Collection Dates

(Liquid medications will not be accepted • No SHARPS/Needles)

Town of Oyster Bay 2014 Cleanup Program For Homeowners

Homeowners located within the Town's Solid Waste Disposal District may dispose of accumulated non-hazardous debris on the dates listed below. Proof of district residency is required.

Passenger cars, vans, pickup trucks and small trailers are admitted to the program. Six-wheel or larger vehicles are not permitted.

Residents are encouraged to include large metal items, yard waste and clean broken concrete, all of which will be recycled. Please pre-separate these items for disposal in separate locations at the site.

Campers, boats and boat trailers are also accepted. Proof of ownership of any campers, boats or boat trailers must be provided and signed over to the Town. The campers and boats must be drained of all oil, gas and other fluids, and all batteries must be removed.

NOTE: E-waste may also be brought to the Homeowners Cleanup Program.

SAFE & SECURE ON-SITE PAPER SHREDDING PROGRAM on Selected Homeowners cleanup dates

Homeowners may bring any unwanted documents such as old tax-returns, bills, bank statements, etc. Documents are shredded on site.

* Town of Oyster Bay residents only, no businesses, limit three banker size boxes per resident.
