Do You Have A Dog or Cat?

Is your pet a female? She could have lots of puppies or kittens during her lifetime. Each puppy or kitten will need a good home.

If your dog's puppies will not have good homes, your dog should not have puppies.



If your cat's kittens will not have good homes, your cat should not have kittens.

Did you know that each year thousands of puppies and kittens are born and can't get good homes because no one wants them? Your veterinarian can spay your female pet so she won't give birth to unwanted puppies or kittens.



WHAT TO DO IF YOUR DOG OR CAT IS LOST

How to look for your lost dog or cat . . .



1. Sign your name and address in our Guest Book.
 2. Check our kennels.
 3. If you find your dog or cat, tell the office clerk the cage number.
 4. If you do not find your dog or cat, write your name in the Lost Dog/Cat Book on the countertop. Also, check the Found Book on the countertop. (This is for people who have found dogs or cats and do not wish to turn them in to the shelter, but are looking for the owners.) Please remember, we do not call for you.
 5. Look in your local newspapers, as well as bulletin boards in local stores. If you live in an incorporated village, check with your village clerk and local police department. Place ads in local papers.
 6. If you advertise a lost pet, be sure to include the following information:
 - Date and area lost
 - Breed, sex, color and markings of pet
 - If the pet was wearing a collar, state color and list any I.D. or license on it.
 - Check with local pet finder groups. Ask Animal Shelter personnel for the phone numbers of these groups. Check with your mail carrier and neighborhood children.
 7. If you lost your dog or cat in the Town of Oyster Bay close to the border of other towns (Hempstead, North Hempstead, Babylon, Huntington), make sure to check the animal shelters in these towns:
 - Hempstead - 785-5220
 - North Hempstead - 944-8220
 - Babylon - 631-643-9270
 - Huntington - 631-754-8722
- *No matter what area of the Town of Oyster Bay you live in, you should check all nearby shelters.
8. You should also check with the highway departments of these neighboring towns, since they are responsible for picking up roadway animal fatalities. State and county highway departments pick up deceased animals on state and county roads. Town and village highway departments pick up deceased animals on town and village roads.
 9. When you find your animal, we advise responsible dog owners to have their pets licensed. I.D. tags are an additional help and can be purchased for a small fee. You may also want to check with your veterinarian or an Animal Shelter attendant about using a microchip identification system. Please let us know when you find your dog or cat so we can remove it from the Lost Book.



Good Dog, Safe Dog

- Train your dog in a quiet place.
- Keep lessons short.
- Be patient.
- Be kind.
- Use your dog's name to get his attention before each command.
- Teach one command at a time. Keep commands simple.
- Use a pleasant tone of voice.
- Don't hit your dog because he does not follow commands. Explain again.
- When your dog follows your commands, pet him and say, "Good dog!"
- Sometimes giving praise with a dog biscuit or treat also works well.
- Play with your dog after each lesson.

What to do if you meet a strange dog

A. WHAT SHOULD YOU DO IF A NASTY DOG STANDS IN YOUR WAY OR COMES TOWARDS YOU?

1. Do not run. Stand still. You cannot run faster than a dog.
2. Always face the dog. Do not turn your back to the dog.
3. If the dog is in your path, walk slowly around the dog in a big circle.

B. SHOULD YOU TOUCH A DOG YOU DO NOT KNOW?


1. No. Never touch a dog you do not know, unless his owner is with you and he or she says it is O.K.
2. Even though a dog looks friendly that does not mean it won't bite. The dog may have a sore spot under his hair. If you touch it, the dog might bite.
3. You may like dogs, but a dog may not like you.

C. SHOULD YOU CHASE DOGS OR THROW THINGS AT THEM?

1. Chasing dogs excites them and they may bite.
2. Loud noises, screaming and yelling may cause a dog to attack.
3. Never throw stones, snowballs or any objects at dogs. If you hit them, they could be injured and even could attack you.

DOG LICENSING

According to New York State law, all dogs must be licensed. A license on a dog will expedite its return to its owner. License applications are available at the Animal Shelter or the Town Clerk's Office in Town Hall, Oyster Bay or Town Hall South in Massapequa. To have an application mailed to you call (516) 677-5784, (516) 624-6324 or (516) 797-7960.

WHAT IS AN ANIMAL SHELTER?

The Town of Oyster Bay Animal Shelter is a place where dogs and cats that are lost or have no homes are cared for. If a lost dog is brought to the Shelter and it has a license on its collar, the owner is called and the pet can be brought home. That's why it is very important to make sure your dog has a license.

Dogs with no licenses, and cats, that are brought to the Shelter, and whose owners are unable to pick them up, can be adopted.



There are many dogs and cats and puppies and kittens at the Shelter, waiting to be adopted by families who will love and take care of them. While they're at the Shelter, the animals live in very nice cages.




There are skylights overhead to let in the sunshine and the cages are kept very clean. All of the dogs can go outside everyday to exercise.

There is a special area in the Shelter, called an infirmary, where sick animals are taken care of until they are well. All cats and dogs that come to the Shelter are given vaccinations to protect them against animal diseases like rabies.


The people who take care of the animals at the Shelter work for the Town's Department of Environmental Resources. Some of these people are called Animal Wardens, and you may see them driving around your neighborhood in special trucks. It is their job to look for lost or stray dogs and cats and to bring them to the Shelter.

If your family would like to give a loving home to one of the many wonderful animals at the Animal Shelter, you can come to the Shelter Monday through Friday, from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00



This special Animal Shelter truck picks up lost and stray cats and dogs so they don't hurt themselves or people in your neighborhood.

How to avoid dog bites



HOW TO TELL IF A DOG IS UPSET

The picture to the right shows Bowser when he is angry. If Bowser is barking, growling or snarling with his teeth showing, he is getting ready to bite. If his ears are laid back or his legs are stiff and his tail is up, he is giving you a warning. The hair on his back will also stand up. If you continue to do what you're doing, he will probably get more angry and bite you.

DO'S AND DONT'S

If Bowser is acting like he may bite, follow these rules:

- Do not stare Bowser in the eyes.
- Do not turn your back and run away. You can't run faster than the dog.
- Do slowly walk away sideways.
- Be firm, say "NO!" to Bowser and act like you're the boss.
- If Bowser is angry and jumps on you, curl up into a ball on the ground and protect your face with your arms and hands.

WHAT TO DO IF YOU ARE BITTEN

Tell an adult you know right away.

If you are bitten by a strange animal remember:

- If it had a collar, license tag or name tag.
- The type, size and color of the animal.
- The direction the animal went.

Wash the wound with soap and water and cover to try to stop the bleeding. Get medical help at once. If wounds are severe, go to the emergency room at your hospital.

IMPORTANT THINGS TO REMEMBER

Just as there are good ways and bad ways to behave with people, there are good and bad ways to behave with animals. Always be kind and gentle with animals. They have feelings too.

WHY YOUR DOG NEEDS A LICENSE

It is very important that your dog have a license tag and that he wear it all the time.

If your dog gets lost and has a license tag on his collar, anyone who finds him will know that he is someone's pet. If he's brought to the Animal Shelter, the people who work there can look at his license and get in touch with your family. You can then go to the Animal Shelter and pick up your dog and bring him home.



But if your dog gets lost, and is not wearing a license, there is no way anyone can tell who he belongs to.

If your dog does not have a current license, your mom or dad can get one at the Oyster Bay Town Clerk's Office at Town Hall, 54 Audrey Avenue, Oyster Bay, or Town Hall South at 977 Hicksville Road, Massapequa. Or they can call the Town Clerk at 624-6320 and ask that a license application be mailed to your home. You can also download a copy from our Town's web site at: www.oysterbaytown.com.

Remember, if you ♥ your dog, make sure you license it!

Teaching Safety Around Dogs

Dangers posed by dogs running loose, such as dog bites, the possibility of contracting rabies, and the serious emotional trauma that frequently accompanies even a small dog bite, are serious reasons for instructing all children on safety around dogs.

Outlined below are some important areas to be stressed in any dog safety training program:

PRECAUTIONS TO MINIMIZE BEING BITTEN

- Never approach a strange dog.
- Don't try to pet or talk to a strange dog.
- Don't pet a dog on a leash unless you have the owners permission.
- Never tease any dog, particularly not a dog in a fenced yard or a dog that is tied up. Chains or ropes can be broken and fences can be jumped over.

WHAT TO DO IF A STRANGE DOG IS LOOSE

- Ignore the dog if it isn't running up to you or if you don't have to go past it.
- Don't run or yell or do anything that might excite the dog.
- Keep calm and continue walking away slowly.

WHAT TO DO IF A STRANGE DOG APPROACHES

- Be calm. It may bark and growl and you may see its teeth.
- Don't move. Is its ears back and hair on its back raised?
- Speak quietly to the dog, such as "good dog" and watch for signs of unfriendliness.
- Don't stare at the dog.
- If it isn't showing signs of attack, let it sniff the back of your hand.
- If you can tell the dog won't bother you, walk slowly and quietly away.

WHAT TO DO IF IT ATTACKS

- Your face and neck are the first parts of your body you should protect. Fold your arms and put them in front of your face.
- If the dog leaps at you or knocks you down, lie on your stomach immediately and protect your head and neck with your arms.
- It is usually best to remain in this position until help comes. The dog probably won't attack any more but may be standing guard over you.

WHAT TO DO FOR BITE CASES

- Flush the wound immediately. Warm, soapy water is preferable, but if clean water isn't immediately available use any liquid close at hand as the important thing is to wash away the dog's saliva AS SOON AS POSSIBLE.
- Get medical attention promptly.
- Try to get a description of the dog, including as many of the following points as possible, so it can be located and held for observation: breed, color markings, size, tail (*short? long? bushy?*), ears (*short? floppy? pointed?*), if it had a collar, or tag.
- Report all bites to the local police, or health department, unless the attending physician makes a report.

How can I tell if an animal is dangerous?




In Most cases, there are warning signs.

With a dog, for example, be especially alert for:


AN AGGRESSIVE POSTURE

The ears are erect, the body is stiff or tense, and the tail is either still or moving rapidly.



A FEARFUL POSTURE

The ears are back, the body is crouched with the head down, and the tail hangs down or is tucked between the legs.



ALSO WATCH FOR:

- Growling, snarling or snapping
- Staring straight ahead
- Bared teeth or curled lips
- Hair standing on end.

Be aware of any unusual or strange behavior. With any unfamiliar animal, pay special attention to:

- BEHAVIOR
- HAIR
- NOISES
- BODY POSTURE
- MOUTH AND TEETH





Don't Chase dogs

Don't Run from a dog


Remember, if a strange dog comes up to you, stand still. You cannot run faster than a dog. Be sure to face the dog at all times. The dog might chase you if you

Dogs do have feelings and they can feel pain. Do not hit an animal or throw anything at an animal. The dog may get mad and chase you or try to bite you. Can you blame him? Would you like a person to hit or throw something at you? Good rule... Don't tease any animal.

One key to good health...

Good pet health begins with a constant supply of fresh water.



Remember: Your pet needs fresh water at all times; once or twice a day is not enough. Animals must be able to drink whenever they get thirsty.

Fresh water is also vital in helping your pet's kidneys and other organs function properly. Without water for a long period, the animal could become dehydrated and die.

Here are some tips on how to keep your pet safely supplied with water:

1. Shop for large, sturdy plastic spillproof water containers now available.
2. Clean your pet's dish or bucket daily and always keep it filled with fresh cool water.
3. When traveling with your pet, bring along a thermos of cool water and your pet's own dish with you. Offer the animal a cool drink whenever you stop for one yourself.
4. Remember that water is the only drink an adult animal ever needs. Cats and dogs do not need milk after they are fully grown.

If you keep your pet outdoors for any length of time, never leave the animal unattended. (left alone outside, the animal may suffer from the heat, cold, rain or snow or be stolen by pet thieves.) And follow these tips regarding your pet's water.

1. Always use a sturdy, stainless steel or galvanized pan or rubber or plastic bucket as your pet's dish.
2. Attach your pet's dish or bucket securely to a tree or fence with an S-hook or bicycle strap so that it can't be knocked over.
3. Anchor the dish or bucket in the center of a rubber tire so that it won't spill or tip over.

If your pet does not have a daily supply of clean, fresh water, you'll expose the animal to several dangers.

1. Dirty water breeds bacterial diseases, which can harm your pet and be transmitted to you.
2. Dirty water attracts flies and mosquitoes, which will lay their eggs in your pet's water. Mosquitoes can transmit larvae, which will cause heartworm in the dog.
3. Stagnant water can rust a non-galvanized metal container and rusty water can make your animal sick.

So, remember: One key to good health for your pet is a constant supply of fresh cool water.

Why is this dog crying?


