Paul, I have you for 3, 25, 27, 28; am I 25 right?

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13 1 MR. MOLINARI: Yes, 3, 25, 27 at this 2 time. SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: I have 28 also. 3 4 MR. MOLINARI: Yes, I'm sorry. Three 5 are related, 3, 27, 28. 13 is on a different issue. 6 7 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: Okay. You're on, 8 Paul. 9 I don't mean to be difficult, but for 10 350 years that podium has been dead center. You're 11 out in left field. There we go. 12 MR. MOLINARI: Wherever you want it. 13 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: I feel better. 14 What do you have? 15 MR. MOLINARI: Good morning, Supervisor 16 and Board Members. Happy New Year to everybody. 17 ALL: Happy New Year. 18 MR. MOLINARI: We have three 19 resolutions before the Board right now concerning 20 Information Technology Support. 21 Resolution 3 which is one increasing 22 professional service contract from 3 million to 23 6 million dollars, 3 million dollar increase. 24 The second one is the award of a 25 software contract for \$600,000 allowing three-year

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1	renewal. The third resolution is on the issuance
2	of 350,000 bond for the upgrade of network and
3	security features here.
4	After reviewing this and looking at the
5	approved budget, I had several questions.
6	First of all, the Comptroller's office
7	budget has only 1.5 million dollars for
8	professional services for Information Technology.
9	This resolution before you is for 3 million
10	dollars.
11	One question is, why, when we have an
12	approved budget that only has 1.5 million, that
13	there is a Resolution for a 3 million dollar
14	increase?
15	My second question is, that you had the
16	bond also in the Comptroller's approved budget,
17	there is contracting for Information Technology
18	Maintenance of \$855,000, you have two resolutions.
19	One for \$600,000 be awarded and one for a bond of
20	\$350,000. The sum goes up, it's exceeded the total
21	amount of the approved budget.
22	I would think one question, why are
23	we exceeding the budget?
24	The second question, why are we issuing
25	a bond for \$350,000 when we already have in your

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1	budget \$855,000? So my concern is that you
2	recently approved the budget and here we are
3	already busting the budget in the first meeting of
4	the physical year. My recommendation would be that
5	the bond come out of the \$855,000.
6	Resolution 3 be modified that you only
7	approve professional service contract in the 1.5
8	million associated with what is in the approved
9	budget. I would also recommend that if that can't
10	be done today, that the Board table these three
11	motions until it's done.
12	SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: I've already
13	spoken to the Comptroller about this at great
14	length. I think you should hear what I heard.
15	Bob, would you tell him what we
16	discussed?
17	MR. McEVOY: The budget for the
18	computer support in the operating budget is just
19	that, for operating expenses.
20	Resolution 3 includes both projects,
21	work which can be charged to the Capital Projects
22	Fund and the amount can be charged to operating for
23	day-to-day consultant work in the Comptroller's
24	office.
25	What was the question on the second

16 1 one, 26 or 27? 2 MR. MOLINARI: 27. 3 The software award contract \$600,000 combined with the \$350,000 bond. 4 5 MR. McEVOY: Well, they are not really combined. 6 7 MR. MOLINARI: When I looked at it --8 MR. McEVOY: Software is purchased out 9 of the Capital Projects Fund. 10 MR. MOLINARI: All right. 11 MR. McEVOY: On 28 -- on State 12 contract, they were you can pay them or you can do 13 a lease purchase through them. 14 For 28, we got a favorable rate through 15 the State contract and in order to do a lease 16 purchase, you can't just go out and sign an 17 agreement. You have to pass a bond resolution as 18 if you sold a regular bond. 19 So in order to authorize that lease 20 purchase of the equipment, the network and data 21 security for our system, we have -- we look to 22 enter into an agreement with the company, and by 23 doing so, we have to pass a resolution as if it's a 24 bond resolution. 25 MR. MOLINARI: Thank you.

17 1 Let me go back to Resolution 3 then. 2 You're saying you have in the budget 3 between the Capital and your -- Capital approved 4 budget and your operating budget for 3 million 5 dollars. MR. McEVOY: In excess of that, yes. 6 7 Again, it's not to exceed amount 1.5 in 8 the operating and at least in 2 million in Capital. 9 So it's covered. All right. 10 MR. MOLINARI: Thank you. 11 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: Thank you, Paul. 12 Happy New Year. 13 On 13 and 30, Bob Freier? 14 MR. FREIER: Good morning. 15 Happy New Year to everyone. SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: Happy New Year. 16 17 MR. FREIER: For number 30, can you, 18 first of all, just explain what this lawsuit is all 19 about regarding a designation of Long Island Sound? 20 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: I wish I could. 21 I'm not trying to be funny. 22 Who is in a good position to give a 23 concise version? Bob -- whoever is more comfortable with that. Starting with the 24 25 background. I think everybody here.

18 1 MR. HAL MEYER: 13? 2 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: 30 --3 MR. FREIER: Yes, 13. SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: I thought you 4 5 meant the garbage case. 6 MR. FREIER: No. Next. 7 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: The boundary 8 dispute. Quickly, I'll tell you the Town of Oyster 9 Bay ticketed I think a Huntington -- someone from 10 Huntington and the defense was set up that we 11 ticketed him in waters that are not within the 12 Town's jurisdiction. So there's apparently a 13 boundary dispute as to where the Town's waters 14 begin and where the Town's waters end and so on and 15 so forth. 16 I think we're awaiting decision now 17 from a court to set the boundary line. I think basically that's what's happening. 18 19 Am I oversimplifying it? MR. HAL MAYER: Not to me. We can go 20 21 into a lot of detail. But as the Supervisor said, 22 where does Cold Spring Harbor stop and the 23 Long Island Sound start and vice versa depending on 24 whether you come from a local standpoint? 25 We've been in business since 1653 and

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19 there are charters and patents that seem to our 1 2 eyes to say that the waters in question were given 3 to the Town of Oyster Bay back in colonial times, I believe. Some people, including some people who 4 5 are in the employ of New York State, have a different interpretation. It goes back to how 6 7 boundaries were used obviously several hundred 8 years ago. The technology that surveyors use today 9 didn't exist. So you have the waterfront 10 equivalent of the big oak tree on Mr. O'Leary's 11 farm, and one hundred years later, the oak tree is 12 not there. Where is the boundary? That's not 13 literally -- I mean, that's a big debate among 14 experts of where open waters are and that's why we 15 had to get a local law firm and experts in the 16 particular field to testify and make a case to try 17 to support our historic claim to jurisdiction of 18 what we think the local waters are. 19 COUNCILMAN COSCHIGNANO: Apparently, 20 it's very confusing because we run very close to 21 Cold Spring Harbor and you would think it's not our 22 water and apparently it is. 23 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: I think the money 24 we're spending on today's calendar has to do with 25 procuring expert testimony as opposed to legal

20 1 fees. 2 MR. HAL MAYER: Yes, correct, and it's 3 listed this way because -- I know the Board's aware 4 of this. It's treated -- what attorneys call 5 disbursement for the case when they hire experts 6 and that's done, so it's covered under the blanket 7 of their authority and confidentiality as the 8 experts and the attorneys work together to build a 9 case. 10 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: Does that help, 11 Rob? 12 MR. FREIER: Yes, it does. 13 So this Brian is the person that was 14 ticketed originally? 15 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: He was ticketed, 16 yes. 17 MR. FREIER: So we're employing outside 18 counsel on this. 19 How big was this ticket to begin with? 20 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: I don't think the 21 ticket was the issue. The issue is where the 22 boundary is set. And you do get involved with 23 elements of Maritime Law and certain expertise that 24 we need outside counsel for. 25 MR. HAL MAYER: There are a number of

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issues.

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2	One of the issues is certainly, this
3	particular ticket is not the driving issue. This
4	gentleman's name attaches to the case because
5	that's the event that triggered this dispute. But
6	there is a great concern and this Board has
7	addressed it several times about the potential
8	depletion of shellfish and related resources in our
9	local waters. And the Board has tried to regulate
10	this and there is a balance between opening it up
11	so people can make a living and have recreation,
12	but also that we don't overharvest. The fear is
13	that if what we think are the local waters'
14	boundaries are diminished and the State opens it up
15	to people that don't have local permits from us,
16	it's very hard then for the Town to continue to
17	regulate the degree to which the resources are
18	harvested.
19	MR. FREIER: That's a totally separate
20	issue because I mean we see on social media almost
21	every day Flowers boats dredging in the harbor
22	where they shouldn't be so.
23	MR. HAL MEYER: Well, that snide
24	comment aside, the legality that we are the
25	jurisdictional dispute that we are trying to

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      maintain -- when I say we, the Town, is trying to
2
      maintain what it views as its historic role and
3
      right to excerpt jurisdiction over what the Town
4
      perceives as local waters. The reason why I called
5
      that a snide comment is because that's attacking
      how the Town exercises that jurisdiction.
6

FREIER: Can you explain the 3 litigation with a company named SPRC Realty Corp.? 4 What is that for and does this involve additional 5 outside legal counsel and if so how much? SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: We're back on 30? 6 7 MR. FREIER: Now 30. 8 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: This was the 9 original question I have. I'd really like you to 10 go back as far as you can. It will help me too and 11 discuss this. 12 MR. HAL MEYER: This, I believe, is 13 known corporately as the garbage tax case. 14 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: The Comptroller 15 can join in at any point, if he so wishes. I want 16 to give Rob and the audience a --17 MR. FREIER: SPRC Realty Corp. 18 MR. McEVOY: There are two different 19 kinds of garbage cases out there. One is where 20 LIPA and the other utilities were taxed for the 21 telephone poles -- the utility poles and then they 22 were taken off of the tax rolls and then they were 23 put back on and they were taken off and it was determined finally, this last assessment, that none 24 25 of the poles are being assessed garbage or disposal

1 district tax. 2 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: Under the theory 3 that poles don't generate --4 MR. McEVOY: Don't generate any 5 They're not attuned to any quality of garbage. life issues. So they're just there and they 6 7 shouldn't pay taxes for garbage or solid waste, but 8 they pay the other taxes. 9 MR. HAL MEYER: Notwithstanding, they 10 pay school tax and don't generate any school 11 children, but, apparently, it applies to garbage 12 and not children. 13 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: You don't know 14 where it's going after this, right? 15 MR. McEVOY: Right. 16 The other type of garbage tax, I 17 believe, is when a development is put in, and they 18 agree not to have Town pickup, and then all of a 19 sudden, they say either -- the developer says go 20 ahead, don't worry about it. We'll pick up our own 21 garbage and then they turn it over to a homeowner's 22 association and the homeowner's association says, 23 "Wait a minute. If we're paying garbage tax and 24 you come in and pick up our garbage or you take us 25 out of the garbage district and don't charge us the

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25 1 tax." 2 So I'm not 100 percent sure which this 3 case is right now or what this resolution actually 4 pertains to, but those are the two types of garbage 5 taxes. MR. FREIER: Who is SPRC Realty? 6 7 That's who the litigation is with. 8 MR. HAL MEYER: They represent the 9 utility company. I'm not sure what the initials 10 speak of. 11 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: It's the utility 12 company. 13 MR. FREIER: The realty corp. is the 14 utility company. 15 MR. HAL MEYER: Maybe the real estate 16 owning arm of the utility company. A lot of 17 companies have more than one name or entity for 18 different purposes. 19 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: All of the --20 MR. HAL MEYER: Real estate companies, 21 but Bob did an excellent job explaining several of 22 the issues. This, I believe, is legal fees for the 23 -- we'll call tax on the poles case and the boards have ruled that the utilities are entitled to a 24 25 refund, but they have also ruled that the County

26 1 has to reimburse the Town for most, if not all of 2 the refund. 3 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: After we pay it. 4 MR. HAL MEYER: After we pay. This is 5 involved with paying the legal fees to get us to that point. 6 7 MR. FREIER: So this had been going on 8 for a while. 9 MR. HAL MEYER: Years. 10 MR. FREIER: Do we have a number on how 11 much we spent on outside counsel for that? SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: We have to look 12 13 it up. We can get it for you. 14 MR. FREIER: Just a question that 15 relates to that. So if there is a -- I live in a 16 condo community. We don't get garbage pickup from 17 the Town. We pay a private company, so it's not on 18 our tax roles. I know a long time ago for some 19 reason it was. 20 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: It was. 21 MR. FREIER: That's normally the case 22 with anyone, right? 23 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: I believe that's 24 the second situation the Comptroller described. 25 COUNCILMAN COSCHIGNANO: You shouldn't

27 1 pay taxes and private, no. 2 MR. FREIER: Thank you. SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: It's nice after 3 all the years that it has been done a certain way 4 5 to suddenly have the rug pulled out from you and now we have to --6 7 MR. FREIER: Pony up. 8 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: Yes. 9 It's a countywide problem, by the way, 10 that all the towns are experiencing. What we don't 11 understand is why we're paying first and then have 12 to seek reimbursement. That makes no sense to me 13 at all. I understand holding the case --14 MR. McEVOY: I wasn't happy about that 15 either. 16 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: I just don't 17 understand -- all right. Obviously, we're not 18 going to prevail on that. We're going to have to 19 pay it and get reimbursed from the County. 20 Robert Ripp on 4 and 5. Happy New 21 Year, Rob. 22 MR. RIPP: Happy New Year. I'm Robert 23 Ripp from Massapequa, New York. We spoke at the 24 last couple of meetings. 25 My question is not really so much in

1 relation to the individual -- once again, the 2 individual resolution, but the property cleanup in 3 general. 4 I just want to verify, when we do 5 cleanups, what exactly are we doing? We're just cleaning the exterior? We're not going into the 6 7 properties; are we? 8 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: Talking about 9 invading the building structure, no. Cleaning up 10 the exterior of the home. 11 MR. RIPP: Can you tell me -- I notice 12 the charges are different for each property. How 13 do you calculate like landscaper -- I think maybe 14 they do it by square footage. I don't really know. 15 How do you calculate -- like I notice like you 16 charge one property \$650, but another 1,500. 17 How do they come up with that number? 18 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: I think common 19 sense is appraisal. It depends on the effort put 20 forward. I would say space. Some properties are 21 dirtier than others. 22 MR. RIPP: That makes sense. We had 23 spoken about a particular property located at 24 75 Thurman, I think, Avenue in Hicksville where I 25 had spoken to a realtor and he mentioned a bank had

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30 1 me if I'm wrong, but each property should have like 2 a code of compliance file on it, if -- I believe, 3 I'm hoping, where the request for information that came in -- or request for investigation, the code 4 5 officer's compliance report when he goes to the property, the Notice of Violation that's served, I 6 7 mean there should be a file for each property. 8 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: I think something 9 generally in that nature, yes. 10 MR. RIPP: Can you tell me, when we 11 clean those up, I noticed -- because I visit some 12 of the properties. 13 Do some get classified a dangerous 14 building and some don't? 15 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: You know what? 16 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: I believe so. 17 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: It may be, but 18 we're quessing --MR. SABELLICO: The cleanup does not 19 20 necessarily have anything to do with the danger of 21 the building. It could just be the growth, 22 shrubbery or grass -- there is Property Maintenance 23 135, 182 details as to what requires cleanup and 24 Notice of Violation. This building is really in a 25 whole separate chapter of code.

31 1 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: Let's go slow 2 here. 3 In my experience, I've seen quite a Typically, what happens is it looks like an 4 few. 5 abandoned property. There is overgrowth and shrubbery. It looks like the lawn hasn't been cut 6 7 in ten years, that kind of thing. That's what 8 typically draws a resident's attention or the 9 Town's attention to a property. Once they enter 10 upon the property, the sky's the limit. I don't 11 know what they might find. I'm not aware that too 12 many of them are found to be structurally unsound, 13 ultimately, but, yes, it could happen that they 14 are. 15 MR. RIPP: Can you tell me -- I asked 16 this a couple of meetings back, these abandoned 17 properties, is the Town following the State 18 quidelines and reporting them to the State registry 19 for zombie homes? 20 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: I don't know. 21 Tim Zike, I don't want to put you on 22 the spot, but can you help us? What's the process? 23 Typically, what happens is a MR. ZIKE: 24 resident will make a complaint to Code Enforcement 25 Bureau --

32 1 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: But that's not 2 always what happens, typically. 3 MR. ZIKE: Correct, yes. A case file is opened. An inspector does go out and makes an 4 5 assessment of the property. They will put the property owner on notice for a number days -- if 6 7 they don't clean up the property or don't coincide 8 with the notice, the Town orders a cleanup, and as 9 the Supervisor was saying, the majority are 10 cosmetic. Many are clip the lawn, clip the hedges, 11 any trash on the lawn. Things like that. Okay? 12 MR. RIPP: Thank you. 13 One last question on the statement you 14 just made. 15 How else is the Town being made aware 16 of these properties besides a resident complaining? 17 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: I don't know if I 18 can identify all of them for you, but I can tell 19 you that I've called in many over the years. I can 20 just be driving around and you just see it. 21 MR. RIPP: I actually called the Code 22 Enforcement division, and I explained similarly I 23 wanted the same thing and they told me I had to 24 fill out a request for investigation to send it in. 25 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: I think typically

33 1 it starts with that. That's appropriate. 2 MR. RIPP: So if it starts with a 3 request for investigation, then -- I mean, you just mentioned that's not the only way the Town is 4 5 alerted to those properties. How else are we being alerted to them? 6 7 Let me just ask you to straight out, this real 8 estate guy told me the bank ordered it. 9 Is it true the banks are ordering 10 cleanups. 11 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: I don't know what 12 the real estate quy told you, and I'm not aware 13 that banks are ordering cleanups. I have nothing 14 against the real estate industry, but I'd be 15 cautious taking anything they say at face value. 16 The only thing I can tell you, Rob --17 I'm not trying to be difficult, one very obvious 18 way -- I think Tim Zike was right in characterizing 19 as typical is a resident calling. 20 I mean, who knows better than a 21 resident of what's going on, on the street? 22 Also, as it happens -- I'm just 23 remembering a Summer or two ago, I was driving 24 along Forest Avenue in Massapequa and there once 25 was a house there and all I could see was overgrown

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1	grass, shrubbery and trees. I couldn't even tell
2	if the house was there any more. I don't know if I
3	contacted Highway or DOT and told them to get over
4	there and give it a haircut. It was unsightly. I
5	was actually surprised I didn't hear from a
6	resident.
7	So one way it comes in is through
8	residents contact which is probably the most
9	prevalent. I can tell you, in my case, that I've
10	done it on personal observations. I don't know,
11	Tim.
12	Is there any other way
13	MR. ZIKE: I'd say ten times out of ten
14	everything come in, in a request form.
15	MR. RIPP: Thank you very much. Thank
16	you.
17	SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: Thank you.
18	We'll continue, Mr. Altadonna, with the
19	call.
20	MR. ALTADONNA: Motion made by
21	Councilman Muscarella.
22	Seconded by Councilman Macagnone.
23	On the vote, Supervisor Venditto?
24	SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: Aye.
25	MR. ALTADONNA: Councilman Muscarella?

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1	COUNCILMAN MUSCARELLA: Aye.

3	COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Aye.
4	MR. ALTADONNA: Councilman Coschignano?
5	COUNCILMAN COSCHIGNANO: I'll abstain
6	on 29 and 30. Aye on all the rest.
7	MR. ALTADONNA: Councilman Pinto?
8	COUNCILMAN PINTO: Aye.
9	MR. ALTADONNA: Councilwoman Alesia?
10	COUNCILWOMAN ALESIA: Aye.
11	MR. ALTADONNA: Councilwoman Johnson?
12	COUNCILWOMAN JOHNSON: Aye.
13	MR. ALTADONNA: Motion to adopt
14	Resolution Nos. 1-2016 through 28-2016 passes with
15	seven ayes.
16	Motion to adopt Resolution Nos. 29-2016
17	and 30-2016 passes six ayes and one abstention.
18	Motion to adopt Resolution Nos. 31-2016
19	through 33-2016 passes with seven ayes.
20	Calendar is complete.
21	SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: This completes
22	the Regular Action Calendar.
23	Mr. Muscarella, I'll take a motion.
24	COUNCILMAN MUSCARELLA: Supervisor, I
