SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: Before we get to our calendar, we have some really good stuff this morning. I think many of you, over the course of time, have heard myself and other members of the Town Board, and I think it's true, virtually every municipality across the length and breadth of our great nation talk about the contributions that the Veterans had made during their lifetime directly —directly to the freedom and opportunities that we enjoy as citizens of the United States and also the quality of life that we enjoy right here at home in the Town of Oyster Bay.

It's interesting, people have a tendency to think of Veterans in the past tense; one time, a long time ago they did great things and they took the hill and they did this and did that and that's all true.

By the way, in the instance of

Veterans, regardless of what you did in your

service, whether or not you took the hill or

whether or not you cooked or cleaned or -- the

bottom line is, if you did what you were told, then

you are, in part and parcel, the reason why we do

live in a great nation and we do live in such a

wonderful place like the Town of Oyster Bay.

You would think that as time goes by
the Veterans did their part and they can relax, sit
back and kind of enjoy the show. But that's not
the case, not here in the Town of Oyster Bay.
Whenever we called upon our Veterans, no matter
what the issue is, whether we need a Color Guard or
whether there is a more pressing community issue,
there they are, as they are right now, front and
center, always doing the right thing.

During the course of this
administration, this Town Board developed a
Division of Veterans' Affairs headed by Matt
Rufrano, who you might hear from in a few minutes.

I'll leave it up to the gentlemen who want to
speak. And we are doing our part to help the
Veterans. I think, sadly, not enough is being
done. I think that's fairly common knowledge, but
at least in the Town of Oyster Bay we are doing our
part.

Today we have two areas and Councilman

Macagnone along with the other members of the Board

all are very, very instrumental in making this

happen.

Let me begin with -- I think this is

6 1 the ninth year -- am I right, Brian? 2 MR. PARKER: Yes. 3 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: -- Of our Soldier Collection Drive program which is aimed at 4 5 gathering much needed supplies to be delivered to the men and women, you know, around the globe. 6 7 This is the ninth year and we always --8 this year is no exception -- receive an 9 overwhelming, outpouring support for this program. 10 We have dropoff points across the length and the 11 breadth of the Town; obviously Town Hall North, 12 DPW, Town Hall South, I think the ice rink has been 13 utilized. 14 We have with us today from 15 Adopt-a-Battalion from Massapequa Park, Brian 16 Parker. 17 Brian, will you come forward and I'm going to turn it over to you. You obviously helped 18 19 coordinate the donations efforts. Let's hear from you on how we did this year. Let's get a report 2.0 21 card. 22 MR. PARKER: Thank you very much, 23 Supervisor and Town Board. 24 Collection has been overwhelming. 2.5 told Councilman Macagnone, we are probably looking

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at anywhere between 150 to 175 boxes being sent out this year. It's going everywhere from Iraq to Kuwait to Afghanistan. Everything from toiletries to soap, Beef Jerky. I do love the amount of dog biscuits. Believe it or not, there are dogs over there and they will use them. We do appreciate that.

This actually started back in 2004 from my father, Jack Parker, who you remember, who unfortunately passed away this past September.

That kept us going. My mother is still alive and well, so she comes down every once in a while.

This actually started through my brother when he was stationed over in Iraq.

In 2004, we sent him his first care package and my parents actually got a letter back that my brother wrote. He said, I love it, but the bad thing is, so does the guy next to me on the left and so does the guy next to me on the right. So my parents kind of looked at each other and said, there's enough stuff left over in the pantry that we could send to this guy and that guy.

Last year our goal was to send 1,000 care packages and we actually got closer to 1,300 which is very nice. So what do you do when --

8 1 (Applause.) 2 MR. PARKER: What do you do when you 3 break a goal? You set a new one. 4 So this year, we are looking at 1,500 5 As long as we have the goods to ship and the money to ship it, there's no reason to stop. 6 7 They're still over there and they still need a 8 little keepsake from home and we're just going to 9 keep doing what we've doing. 10 I can't thank you guys enough. 11 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: Great job. 12 Councilman Macagnone, I know you are 13 kind of like the point person on this. 14 Is there anything else you want to add? 15 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: It's just an 16 honor and a pleasure to work with Brian's group 17 this year. We had Brownie troops bring stuff down 18 and Cub Scouts. The residents of the Town of 19 Oyster Bay really opened up their hearts and their closets and helped out. 20 21 Brian, it's been a pleasure working 22 with you on this one. 23 MR. PARKER: Thank you, Tony. 24 (Applause.) 25 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: Are we doing a

The signs will prominently feature a depiction of the, I guess, iconic Purple Heart medal in the center. It will ensure that whenever a Combat Wounded Warrior comes to a Town park, they will have a specially designated place to park their vehicle.

This is yet another way of -- that the Town has chosen to recognize its Veterans; particularly, those who have been wounded in combat, to honor those Veterans who have been wounded or have made the supreme sacrifice providing service to their country.

In addition, we continue to carry the

10 1 designation of a Purple Heart Town. The gentlemen who I'm about to introduce are the reasons why --2 3 again, I've said it a million times. I hate to be 4 repetitious, but what makes the Town of Oyster Bay 5 such a special place is less about government. 6 Although, we do our part or we do our best to do 7 our part, it's less about government and more about 8 the people who live here and certainly know more 9 than the gentlemen I'm about to introduce to you 10 who are our Veterans. 11 Let me recognize them one at a time and 12 then I'll ask them to introduce any others --13 whoever wants to be the spokesperson or all of you 14 want to speak. Whatever. 15 Connie Steers, a good friend of the 16 long-standing Vietnam Veterans of America, Chapter 82. Connie, stand up. 17 18 (Applause.) 19 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: Robert, or as I 20 call him, Bob Chiappone, Commander of Chapter 417. 21 (Applause.) 22 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: Our own Town 23 Veterans Service Officer Matt Rufrano. 24 Matt? 25 (Applause.)

11 1 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: I know Connie is 2 never at a loss for words, but Bob, are you going 3 to be the spokesperson? MR. CHIAPPONE: I'm going to give him 4 5 half of it. SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: Why don't you 6 7 both come up and introduce the remaining Veterans? 8 MR. CHIAPPONE: These are my trustees 9 here (indicating) and this is my Junior Vice, Tony 10 Spiracco (phonetic). 11 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: Tony. 12 (Applause.) 13 MR. CHIAPPONE: This is Don Simmons. 14 (Applause.) 15 MR. CHIAPPONE: Supervisor, the 16 officers and members of Chapter 417 honor this. 17 This is very good for us and it's an honor to do 18 this. Thank you, Tony and all the council that's 19 helping us. 2.0 I just had a meeting with the City of 21 Long Beach two days ago and I brought up what the 22 Town of Oyster Bay is doing. They want to go all 23 out for us, but it has been two years since I sent 24 them a paper to get it proclamated [sic]. 25 asked me what I wanted, that was the worst thing

12 1 they could do. We told them what the Town of 2 Oyster Bay is doing with the signs. We want signs 3 put up on the entrance of -- coming into the City 4 of Long Beach. This is a great step in our way. 5 And Memorial Day, the city -- the Town of New Hyde Park is dedicating a statue for the Purple Heart. 6 7 That's a steppingstone which we are going to work 8 with. 9 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: That's the 10 Village government of New Hyde Park? 11 MR. CHIAPPONE: Yes. And Mike Dolan is 12 on the Board. He's been working on that very much 1.3 and this is all put together for us. This is a 14 real big honor and a steppingstone. 15 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: Well done. 16 MR. STEERS: Good morning, Supervisor, 17 Board. I know most of the Board except 18 Ms. Johnson. SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: She's been 19 20 avoiding you, Connie. 21 MR. Again, thank you. 10 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: Connie, thank 11 you. 12 I think we are going to grab a 1.3 photograph with -- before we do, we can all stay in 14 place, but all the Veterans, if you would please 15 stand and be acknowledged, any Veteran in the 16 United States. 17 (Applause.) 18 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: Gentlemen, thank 19 you very much. 2.0 I will say one thing before we close it 21 out, those who are our Veterans, the uniform may 22 not fit quite as well as when we put it on for the 23 very first time. ALTADONNA: Hearing - Taxation; to consider the proposed exemption of taxation, 4 5 special ad valorem levies and special assessment for All Veterans Organizations in the Town of 6 7 Oyster Bay. 8 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: Counselor, before you address the Board, Councilwoman, did you want 9 10 to comment before? 11 COUNCILWOMAN JOHNSON: Just keeping in 12 with our earlier presentations, we honor our 13 Veterans and we try to do what we can. 14 I was approached by American Legion 962 15 in Locust Valley who does rent a portion of their 16 property to a nonexempt entity. This will help them with their real taxes and all other -- there's 17 18 several others besides Locust Valley. 19 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: Mr. Altadonna, 20 you called the hearing already? 21 MR. ALTADONNA: Yes, I did. 22 SUPERVISOR VENDITTO: Obviously, with 23 Councilwoman's comments as a backdrop, Counselor, 24 do you want to introduce yourself and tell us 25 what's happening?

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MR. CURCIO: Anthony Curcio, Assistant Town Attorney.

Currently, there are sixteen Veteran organizations that will be effective in the Town of Oyster Bay. Fifteen of those have not rented out a portion of their building. Therefore, they have, currently, full exemptions already.

As Councilwoman Johnson has stated,

American Legion 962 in Locust Valley rents a

portion of their property to a veterinary clinic.

By renting to a veterinary clinic, they also have a

45 percent exemption. Therefore, 55 percent of the

assessed value is still being taxed. This includes

Town real estate taxes, special ad valorem levies

and special assessments.

By passing this Resolution, the Town's portion of the 55 percent is taxable to be exempt. This 55 percent that will be exempt will result in uncollected tax revenue of \$3,196.48 per year.

Such legislative enactments include statutes, rules and regulations of the State of New York, and the Town Code of the Town of Oyster Bay.

SECTION 2. Nothing in these procedures shall be construed as expanding, reducing or limiting the powers or rights specifically granted by law to any Member nor shall these procedures be construed as altering the number of votes specifically required by law for the taking of official action.

PART B: TOWN ATTORNEY AS PARLIAMENTARIAN

SECTION 1. Questions regarding the interpretation of these procedures which arise during a meeting of the Board shall be decided by the Town Attorney who shall act as Parliamentarian.

SECTION 2. Decisions of the Town

Attorney made pursuant to Part B Section 1 hereof

may be appealed to the full Board by motion of any

Member.

SECTION 3. Robert's Rules of Order

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shall control the procedure of all meetings of the Board to the extent that Robert's Rules of Order are not inconsistent with these procedures.

PART C: MEETINGS

SECTION 1 - Regular Meetings. The Town Board generally will hold regular, meetings on two Tuesdays each month, with the exception of the months of August, October and December, when only one regular meeting will be scheduled. Such regular meetings shall commence at 10:00 a.m., except for the second meeting of the month of March and the second meeting of the month of June, which meetings shall commence at 8:00 p.m., and all meetings shall be conducted in the Boardroom at the Town Hall. The regular meeting scheduled for the month of October shall commence at 10:00 a.m. and that meeting shall be continued until 7:00 p.m. that evening to allow for maximum public participation. At the discretion of the Town Board, the location of regular meetings may be changed to accommodate anticipated larger audiences than the Boardroom can accommodate. Any deviation from this schedule shall be determined by the Town Board.

SECTION 2 - Special Meetings. Special Meetings of the Town Board are all those Board

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meetings other than regular meetings. A special meeting may be called by the Supervisor or by the written request of two (2) members of the Town Board, by giving at least two days' notice in writing to members of the Town Board of the time when and the place where the meeting is to be held in accordance with New York State Town Law §62.

SECTION 3 - Executive Sessions.

Executive Sessions shall be held in accordance with the New York State Public Officers Law §105. All executive sessions shall be commenced during a public meeting.

PART D: POLICIES

SECTION 1 - Quorum. A quorum of the

Town Board shall be required to conduct business. A

quorum of the seven (7) member Board shall be four

(4).

SECTION 2 - Agendas. The agenda shall be prepared by the Office of the Town Attorney, Division of Legislative Affairs, in cooperation with the Town Clerk, by Friday preceding the Tuesday meeting. An item may be placed on the agenda at any time, including during the meeting, by consent of a majority of the Town Board.

SECTION 3 - Voting. Pursuant to

Minutes of an open meeting shall consist of a record or summary of all motions, proposals, resolutions and any other matter formally voted upon and the vote thereon. Minutes of an executive session shall be taken of any action that is taken by formal vote and shall consist of a record or summary of the final determination of such action and the vote thereon; provided; however, that such summary need not include any matter which is not required to be made public by the New York State Freedom of Information Law. Minutes need not contain a summary of the discussion leading to action taken or include verbatim comments unless a majority of the Board resolves to have the Clerk do so.

PART E: RULES AND PROCEDURES

SECTION 1 - General Rules of Procedure.

The Supervisor shall preside at meetings of the Town Board. In the Supervisor's absence the Senior Councilperson shall preside. There is no limit to the number of times a Town Board member may speak on a question. Motion to close or limit debate may be entertained but shall require the affirmative vote of four (4) members of the Board.

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SECTION 2 - Guidelines for Public

Comment. The public shall be allowed to speak only during Public Hearings and Public Comment periods.

General Requirements. Each speaker will submit his/her name and address upon a form to be provided by the Town Clerk or his/her designee. On such form, the speaker shall also provide the resolution(s) he/she wishes to comment on, or a brief description of what he/she will comment upon prior to speaking. Speakers must be recognized by the presiding officer, and shall be called to speak in the order determined by the presiding officer. Speakers must step to the front of the room and speak into the microphone at the lectern. Speakers are not to approach the dais without invitation and are directed to make their remarks from the lectern. No items or documents may be placed on the dais or presented to the Board unless either authorization is requested and granted by the presiding officer or a Board member specifically requests to see an item. All items for presentation that are granted authorization or requested by a Board member shall be presented to the Town Clerk who shall pass it the Board. Speakers' remarks shall be addressed to the Board as a body and not

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to any specific member thereof. Speakers shall observe the commonly accepted rules of courtesy, decorum, dignity and good taste and shall not use foul language, display unacceptable behavior, or be disruptive of the proceedings. Members of the public and Board members shall be allowed to state their positions in an atmosphere free of slander, threats of violence or the use of the Board meeting as a forum for politics. Sufficient warnings may be given by the Board at any time during a speaker's remarks and, in the event that any individual shall violate the rules of decorum heretofore set forth, the presiding officer may then cut off comment or debate. Any person making offensive, insulting, threatening, insolent, slanderous or obscene remarks, or who becomes boisterous, or who makes threats against any person or against public order, and security while in the Board Room shall be forthwith removed at the direction of the presiding officer, unless permission to continue is granted by the majority vote of the Board members present. Public Hearings. Speakers, other than

Public Hearings. Speakers, other than the applicant or its attorneys or experts, shall have five (5) minutes to address the Board on the specific matter that is the subject of the Public

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Hearing.

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Hearing before yielding to the next speaker.

Speakers may once again address the Board during the Public Hearing period for one additional five (5) minute period, but only to rebut statements made by the Board or other speakers in regards to the matter that is the subject of the Public

Resolutions. During the period identified as "Opportunity for the public to address the board on agenda items only," speakers shall identify all resolutions they wish to speak on. Speakers shall have three (3) minutes to address the Board on a given resolution, a total of six (6) minutes if the speaker is addressing two resolutions; and a total of ten (10) minutes if the speaker is addressing three or more resolutions. A timer shall be utilized that will beep or produce another sound to indicate that a speaker's time limit for addressing agenda items has been reached. Upon being notified that his or her time limit has been reached, a speaker shall cease speaking, leave the lectern, and return to his or her seat. The presiding officer may modify these guidelines if warranted.

Public Comment. During the period

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identified as "Opportunity for the public to address the board, " speakers shall have five (5) minutes to address the Board before yielding to the next speaker. Board members may interrupt a speaker during the speaker's remarks, but only for the purpose of asking questions of the speaker for purposes of clarification, information or to ask follow-up questions. All remarks shall be addressed to the Supervisor and Town Board. Board members may respond to questions or comments at their discretion. A timer shall be utilized that will beep or produce another sound to indicate that a speaker's five (5) minute time limit for Public Comment has been reached. Upon being notified that his or her time limit has been reached, a speaker shall cease speaking, leave the lectern, and return to his or her seat. The presiding officer may modify these guidelines if warranted.

SECTION 3 - Use of Recording Equipment.

All members of the public and all public officials are allowed to photograph and tape or video record public meetings so long as the photography or recording is done in a manner which does not interfere with the meeting. The presiding officer may make the determination that the photography or

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recording is being done in a manner that interferes with the meeting after taking into consideration attendant movement and activity, distance from the deliberations of the Board, noise, size of equipment, ability of the public to participate in the meeting notwithstanding the photography or recording, and any other pertinent factor. If the presiding officer makes the determination that the photography or recording is interfering with the meeting, the presiding officer may request an accommodation to avoid the interference and if not sufficient or complied with, order the photography or recording to be stopped.

SECTION 4 - Executive Session Policy.

It is the policy of the Town Board to conduct Town business in an open fashion and to make available as much information as may legally and practically be disseminated. The New York Open Meetings Law authorizes the Board to conduct business in executive session in a number of areas.

These include: 1. Matters which will imperil the public safety if disclosed; 2. Matters which may disclose the identity of a law enforcement agent or informer; 3. Information relating to criminal investigations which would

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imperil effective law enforcement if disclosed;

4. Discussions relating to proposed, pending or current litigation; 5. Collective bargaining negotiations; 6. Personnel matters relating to particular individuals; and 7. The proposed acquisition, sale, or lease of real property or securities when disclosure would substantially affect the value.

The Board recognizes that it is authorized to use executive sessions in these and other situations, but will do so with restraint. To maintain confidentiality and to encourage the uninhibited discussion of the subject matter in executive session, all statements made and positions taken by all participants must remain confidential and may not be disclosed by any participant unless and until disclosure of such information as may be legally disseminated is authorized by affirmative vote of four (4) members of the Board. It has been and continues to be the practice of the Board that all members of the Board, acting together, come to agreement by consensus on the specific information which is to be released to the public in accordance with the New York Open Meetings Law, the suitable vehicle

MR. MOLINARI: The reason I ask is because I live three houses down from the storm water basin. I know we have raccoons living there.

On 182, I just wanted to say I applaud the Town in taking quick action to address the public's attention to a public health issue. This is a perfect example when to use an on-call
