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SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Good morning, and welcome to our Town of Oyster Bay Town Board Meeting for Tuesday, October 29, 2024. Welcome to Oyster Bay to Town Hall.

If you'd like to be heard on either an issue before us on the Regular Action Calendar, or would like to be heard during public comment, please make sure you fill out one of these slips in the front of the room.

As always, our meeting is being live streamed on social media and on the Town's website, oysterbaytown.com.

These proceedings are recorded and later transcribed. And of course, your voices are important to us. Statements, comments and input from the public relative to our meetings and our agenda,

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are always welcomed and respected. And once again, I will reiterate that we're always respectful to whoever is at the microphone speaking.

Folks, our attention once again turns to Israel as the strike and all of what's going on, the terror and all of the attacks, continue. And it's a very difficult time for us. Our favorite son, Omer Neutra, is still missing. It has been 388 days since the terror attack on October 7th. So with that in mind, we pray together as one town, one family. And to lead us in prayer today is Rabbi Shmueli of Plainview Synagogue. Rabbi, we are thankful that you are here with us today, and we are so sensitive to all that these wonderful families are going

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through. So if everyone would please
rise.

Rabbi, good morning.

(Whereupon, all rise.)

RABBI SHMUELI: Good morning.

There was once a bus driver and a
rabbi that came to heaven. The bus driver
went first. They rolled out a red carpet.
Five piece band came to welcome him. And
the limo takes them to his place. They
tell him he's going to be having a
beautiful home in heaven.

Then comes the Rabbi. No red carpet,
no five piece band, no limo; an old
jalopy comes to pick him up. And he says
to the angel, with all due respect,
what's happening here? He says, Rabbi,
when you gave your sermons, everybody
went to sleep. When the bus driver
started to drive. Oh, boy. They started
to pray (laughter).

When one prays, we are connecting to
God and recognizing that everything comes
from him. Once we reach that

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understanding, we open ourselves up to receive his blessings. So, friends, let us all be that bus driver in the story and join together in heartfelt prayer. May our supplication be a channel for blessings and success in all that we aim to achieve here today.

Almighty God, as we have assembled here today for the purpose of communal service, on behalf of the residents of the beautiful Town of Oyster Bay, bless our work here today. Bless the work of the honorable Town Supervisor and elected officials, along with all our fellow citizens. Lead us on the straight path before you. Grant us and open our hearts to serve you. Grant us knowledge to understand right from wrong. Grant us strength to fulfill our duties, and grant us the great honor to be a vessel for good in this world.

The great Hasidic Master of Israel, born in the 18th century, taught us that a soul is sent down in this world for 70

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or 80 years just to do a favor for another. And all of us here today are dedicating our lives in doing just that to helping one another and making positive changes around us.

Almighty God, grant us the merit of always being one in a position of service and to provide goodness to all.

Almighty God, through our great work here today, may we be blessed to make your garden, our world a safe, moral, constructive place, a beautiful place filled with goodness, kindness that expresses the beauty of divine intends.

In the merits of our sincere effort may God Almighty bless us all with great health success in our incredible work for the Town of Oyster Bay. May we always merit to see the fruits of our labor in a revealed manner.

Please, God, bring our very own Omer Neutra and all the other hostages home safely. May our actions of solidarity and goodness bring about peace and love for

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all mankind. And let us all say, Amen.

(Whereupon, all, "Amen".)

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you very much, Rabbi Shmueli. The people of Plainview Synagogue are so blessed and lucky to have you in leadership there as we are in this town. So thank you for all you do, and we join you and your congregation in prayer every day for the safe return of all the hostages. God bless.

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SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Leading us to the Pledge of Allegiance this morning are some very important veterans. These are veterans from AMVets Post 88, in Massapequa, including the Commander Loretta Dibrino, Sergeant Frank Marcinek, and color guard Sergeant Major Ray Easley. And they are exceptional individuals who are very proud of all of our veterans. Would you please lead us?

(Whereupon, the Pledge of Allegiance is said.)

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you very much for your leadership today and always. Your partnership over the last month, as we collaborated on collecting donated food for our veterans in need is much appreciated. It's important to announce that that drive ends this Thursday and has been very successful thus far.

At this time, I'm going to ask for a moment of silence as we think about all of those who protect us in our military,

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in our emergency services, our
firefighters, our healthcare heroes, and
especially those in law enforcement.
We're very blessed to be in a very safe
town and live in the safest county in
America, Nassau County. God bless all of
those who protect us here in the homeland
and throughout the world.

RECEIVER OF TAXES: Supervisor, may
I add, Omri Talmy, another Plainview boy
fighting in the IDF. He just got called
up for a second time in the reserves.
He's in Northern Israel on the Lebanese
border.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And may God
grant him safety through his tours. And
may God bring back our favorite son, Omer
Neutra, back to us and his family safely
as soon as possible. God bless all of
them. Amen.

Please be seated.

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SUPERVISOR SALADINO: It's very apropos and something to mention that the commander of AMVets Post 88 is a woman Loretta Dibrino. And the reason I point this out is because she is a fantastic role model. She is strong and comforting and someone who does a great, great job. But she has another job in addition to leadership for the veterans in the community with Post 88, she's also a role model for young people, including young women. And we have some exceptional young ladies with us today who appreciate role models, because it's very clear, because they've done so much in the community, and now are making everyone in the Jericho School district shine because of their leadership, the way Loretta has done with the AMVets.

Today, we have this distinguished group of high school students who belong to Hope for Triumph New York Chapter. We're welcoming them as well as the

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incredible people from the school district, Jericho, one of the finest top of the top school districts, and they've received so many national awards. One of the top producing school districts in the nation, not just on Long Island, not just in New York State, but in the nation. And I have so much pleasure saying that. Why? Because the parents, the administrators, the staff, the teachers of the Jericho School District, led by a rock star of a superintendent, as I like to say, Superintendent Hank Grisham, as well as Denise Nash, the director for Community Relations for Jericho Schools. We appreciate all of you being with us here today.

Hank, it's always wonderful to see you and you do such an incredible job. And what an impressive legacy you have led and continue to lead in the Jericho School District. And now when I find out not only are you very focused on the young people of Jericho, you have your

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own group of young people in your granddaughters. And we had a moment of commonality as Hank prepares me for being a grandpa next year. So thank you for all you do.

So what did these young ladies do to show such a high level of leadership, especially at this young age? They hosted a Breast Cancer Pink Fashion Show and Award Ceremony, which raised funds and awareness for Breast Cancer Awareness Month. It is October. It's something we should be thinking about every day throughout the year. But October is deemed Breast Cancer Month. I'm wearing my pink ribbon. We should be motivating our loved ones and reminding them to get check ups, because that is the leading method of protecting people from breast cancer.

So thank you young ladies for all you've done. You've demonstrated love, support, and willingness to help those in need. These traits serve as a role model

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to other students, to other young people throughout our town, which puts you at a very high level of leadership, especially when you think of your age. To be doing this at your age shows wonderful, wonderful traits.

So Hope for Triumph New York Chapter was founded by Ananya Kavi, an eighth grader at Jericho Middle School. Her student-led organization now boasts volunteers from 18 different schools across Long Island. Ananya is joined this morning by other Hope for Triumph New York Chapter members, including Angel Shah -- Why don't you all stand up as we announce your name -- Angel Shah, an eighth grader from the Jericho Middle School; Saanvi Mehta, a seventh grade Jericho Middle School student; and Namisha Devjani, a ninth grader from Jericho High School. Let's all acknowledge.

(Whereupon, applause.)

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: This program

2 is initiated by children of a Stage IV
3 breast cancer survivor. Hope for Triumph
4 is dedicated to impacting the lives of
5 those touched by cancer with compassion,
6 unity, action. So many aspects of this
7 are absolutely wonderful. It operates in
8 three chapters in the United States, one
9 in San Antonio, another in Seattle, and
10 thanks to Ananya and her fellow students,
11 won here in New York. And at the pinnacle
12 of New York is Jericho in the Town of
13 Oyster Bay. So thank you.

14 We are going to recognize all of you
15 and are going to ask our Superintendent
16 Hank Grishman to come up and join us, if
17 you'd like to say a few words. Ladies,
18 you are truly leaders. And you reflect
19 wonderfully on your parents, on your
20 families, and help to show America why
21 the Jericho School District is doing so
22 well and setting this standard around the
23 nation. Ladies and gentlemen, let's give
24 them a hand.

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SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Superintendent Grishman, would you like to say anything?

SUPERINTENDENT GRISHMAN: Sure. The Jericho School District so appreciates the support that we get from the Town of Oyster Bay, the leadership in the Town of Oyster Bay. We're always so thankful for the recognition and relationship we have with the Town.

We are so proud of the work of our wonderful students. Our reputation has been built historically on our academic successes, but such an important part of the Jericho School District is the work that our students do in so many ways to support the community, to support the organization's volunteerism. It's such a key to our school district that, again, I'm so happy that we're recognizing that today, because it really is one of the key strengths of our school community, support volunteerism and doing the right thing and spending time doing the right thing. And we're so proud of our students

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today and every day for all of the work they do in the area of volunteerism.

Thank you for taking the time.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: I couldn't have said that as well as you. And that's why he has the monicker of the rock star of education.

SUPERINTENDENT GRISHMAN: Only from my mother and the Town of Oyster Bay.

COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: And from me. Hank was my superintendent growing up. This is the result of a Grishman education.

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SUPERVISOR SALADINO: For our next presentation this morning, we welcome back some true friends who are promoting such an important cause. We have with us Jenny Riegler of Plainview and Richard Haunss of Syosset, who are here today to continue their efforts to build awareness to a debilitating condition known as Complex Regional Pain Syndrome, or Reflex Sympathetic Dystrophy. Jenny's sister suffers from the condition and extremely painful nerve disorder. And and advocating on behalf of his daughter, Kristen, is Richard Haunss. The Town of Oyster Bay is proud to support this crucial initiative by proclaiming Monday, November 4th, 2024, as Color the World Orange Day to help spread awareness.

Today, we ask everyone to wear orange, so I'm going to put on this orange bracelet. I see a lot of my colleagues have theirs already. And this orange ribbon, which is so important in getting the message out. So that everyone

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sees our support for this very important cause. We're going to color the world orange. Today we ask everyone, please wear orange on Monday, November 4th and post a picture of yourself wearing some orange on social media. We support the cause by illuminating Town Hall in Orange for the month of November. And Richard and Jenny, please come forward, we have Town of Oyster Bay proclamations, among our highest award, to thank you for all the service you have done and continue to do in honoring your loved ones and helping so many people around the world who suffer from this disease. The more we bring attention to these issues in life, the more we push for a cure, and the more we normalize the situation. Because we're one family in the Town of Oyster Bay, and this is another example of that. So I'm going to ask my colleagues, including Richard LaMarca, who has been a a long time friend of yours and supporter of this important cause, and Councilwoman

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Laura Meyer, who has brought so much attention to medical issues and to the support of medical issues on a wide spectrum and we appreciate her work as well.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Would you like to say something on the quest to use this as a platform?

MR. HAUNSS: I would like to thank the Board that allow us to come back here every year and to give proclamations.

Essentially, Color the World Orange, it's just as Supervisor said, it's to raise awareness. And as part of this, he said the panel will be lit orange on Monday and some of the other places are the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame, Niagara Falls and throughout the world.

So we thank you for today, for having us here. God bless you. Thank you.

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SUPERVISOR SALADINO: All right, folks, we have just a few quick announcements to make. You heard the light will be shining. We still have our peanut butter drive going on through November 15 to Help Spread the Love and stock local food pantries for those in need. Drop off locations are Town Hall North in Oyster Bay, Town Hall South in Massapequa in Bethpage.

The Town's Annual DVD drive will be going on for the entire month of November. It's a unique program that supports our servicemen and women and brightens the lives of children affected by illness. Following the DVD drive, the donations will be shipped to our troops overseas and delivered to local children's hospitals. This year's collection sites are Town Hall North and Town Hall South in Massapequa. It's requested that residents donate new and gently used DVDs that include exciting,

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suspenseful, or comedy or classics and even children's film. I thank everyone in advance for supporting this great program.

Finally, each and every one of us the Town board members, the Town Clerk and the Receiver want to say thank you from the bottom of our hearts to thank all of our employees for doing such an amazing job and thank the Oyster Bay East Norwich Chamber of Commerce for the success for the best Oyster fest that has ever taken place in 41 years, right up here in Oyster Bay. Thousands of people visited the downtown. That number actually undercuts what it was. We'll be getting the actual numbers soon, but we believe we're in excess of 150,000 people and perhaps close to 200,000 people came up here to Oyster Bay to enjoy the festivities, not only in the park, but along the street. We're just so proud of the outcome. So a tremendous thank you to the Oyster Bay East Norwich Chamber of

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Commerce and all of the many, many town employees who participated to make this a terrific event.

Before we call roll, I'm going to take executive privilege and call a dear friend out of order so that he may briefly speak to us about the model train show, and then take care of all his important business.

So, Joel Burse, would you come on up here and take a quick moment, brief moment to talk about the model trade show on November 23rd and 24.

MR. BURSE: Thank you, Joe. Good morning, everybody. It's good to see you all again.

The season is starting. The Model Train shows run from November through April. Last season, we had five shows and they were very successful. Realize a show day is only five hours open to the public. And those five shows netted the charities a combined \$18,500 in change. And we're hoping to do even better this

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year. The first one is, like you said, November 23rd and 24th at the Hicksville Community Center. And of the five shows we have this year, four of them are within the Town of Oyster Bay. Two of them are with the cooperation of the Town, giving us the Hicksville Community Center. Two of them are Nassau County shows, one of them at the Nassau County's Bethpage Senior Community Center over on Grumman Road West, and the other one with the cooperation of the Town of Hempstead, with the Joint District with Oyster Bay. We use Levittown Hall for the show in April. That show supports the Nassau County Police Explorers program. The show that we start first in November is for the Oyster Bay Railroad Museum, and they've done very well over the years. And the other shows, we've got the new Hyde Park Fire Department for the first time this year; we have the Nassau County Games to the physically challenged; and we have the Hicksville Boys and Girls

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Club as our benefactors. So we hope all of you can join us as you usually do at one or more of the shows. We love collecting the photo ops because it helps us publicize these things and hope the public joins us also so that we can raise money for all these good causes.

I thank you for your time. I thank you for your for your help and support. And I also will ask Rich to pass this envelope to Laura. I have a meeting with Brian Nevin about getting everything on Oyster Bay today. So thank you muchly.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Wonderful. Thank you, Joel. So that's the model train show November 23rd and 24th is the first one from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. on both days at the Hicksville Community Center, located at 28 West Coral Street in Hicksville. If you like trains, it's wonderful. If you have children or grandchildren, they're always excited about the displays and all the hard work that goes into it. It's really a magical

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moment and we thank them very, very much.
