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SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Good morning, ladies and gentlemen, and welcome to our Town of Oyster Bay Town Board meeting for Tuesday, May 23, 2023.

For those joining us this morning, you have the opportunity to be heard on matters that the Town Board is considering today as well as during the public comment period at the end of the event. We ask everyone to recognize and follow the Rules of Decorum.

As always, this meeting is being live streamed on social media and the Town's website which is OysterBaytown.com. These proceedings are recorded and later transcribed.

Your voice is important to us. Statements, comment and input from the public relative to our meetings are always welcome and respected as part of the record. Please respect whoever is speaking at the podium, and as per the Rules of Decorum, we ask you not to speak while someone is speaking at the podium.

Leading us in prayer this morning is
Pastor John Yenchko, and he is of the
North Shore Community Church here in
Oyster Bay.

Pastor John, the floor is yours.
Would everyone please rise?

(Whereupon, all rise.)

PASTOR YENCHKO: Good morning to the
Council and good morning to all of you
here.

I've been doing this for almost 20
years on a rotating basis, and I always
consider it a privilege to join with you.

You know, my Bible says that we're
supposed to pray for those in authority.
I don't know if you knew that. So
religious people do well to respect
authority. That's actually grounded in
the Ten Commandments, under honor your

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father and mother and all other authorities. We should respect authority.

And of course, it says in the story of Solomon, when he became king, the first thing he requested was wisdom. So why don't we take a moment and pray for wisdom for those who lead and serve and rule over us, shall we?

God, our Father, We do humble ourselves under your mighty hand, and we pray that you would grant the gift of wisdom to those who are invested to rule, to govern, and to serve those in authority. They have a lot of hard issues before them. And we live in a polarized nation. So we pray, our Father, that you would grant wisdom and grace to those who serve us, that people might enjoy the exercise of their unalienable rights of life and liberty and the pursuit of happiness.

Bless those who are first responders. Bless those who serve in the military. Bless all who swear an oath to

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the Constitution to care for the people of this republic.

We look forward to you answering this prayer, even in this meeting. And I make this prayer according to my tradition in Jesus' name. Amen.

(Whereupon, all, "Amen".)

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you very much, Pastor. You're a good friend. We appreciate your joining us today.

Leading us in the Pledge of Allegiance, we have the United States Air Force E4 Sergeant Frank Marcinek, as well as other members, fellow veterans of AMVETS Post 88 in Massapequa. With us this morning, long time friend of mine and our community, Commander Doug Dervin from the US Navy; also from the US Army, we have Loretta DiBrino; and Pete Silvestri from the US Marines.

We greatly appreciate all that you do for our nation and for assisting us here in the Town each and every day, as well as during board meetings. So the

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floor is yours and we appreciate it.

(Whereupon, the Pledge of
Allegiance is said by all.)

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And now let us
recognize and observe a moment of silence
for all of the service men and women in
this nation and throughout the world
defending America's freedom. Let's keep
our United States Armed forces in mind,
our veterans in mind, and current active
duty. Let's keep in mind all of our dear
and respected members of law enforcement,
all of our first responders.

And we have dear friends who have
lost a loved one this week, including
dear friend Commissioner Frank
Sammartano, Monsignor Lisante, who lost
his mom and Frank, his wife. And to all
those who are dealing with loss, God
bless you and give you strength.

(Whereupon, a brief moment
of silence is observed.)

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you.
Would you all kindly be seated.

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(Whereupon, all are seated.)

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: For our presentation this morning, We're honored to proclaim May as Jewish American Heritage Month. The month of May provides a great opportunity to celebrate the important contributions that Jewish Americans have made to America since the first group arrived in New Amsterdam in 1654.

Jewish American Heritage Month originated in 1980, when Congress passed the resolution, which authorized and requested the President to issue a proclamation designating Jewish Heritage Week.

In 2006, President George Bush modified this designation to be known as Jewish American Heritage Month, which celebrates Jewish Americans and encourages all Americans to learn more about Jewish heritage and their contributions to the United States.

Today, we are joined by some very

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outstanding Jewish residents who are very active and who we greatly appreciate, including Eric Post, Long Island, director of the American Jewish Committee; Adam Novak, Advisory Board, chair of the Jewish Community Relations Council on Long Island; Andrew Bader Advisory Board member, the Jewish Community Relations Council on Long Island; Steve Kantorowitz, Board member of the Jewish Historical Society of Long Island, who will speak on the important resolution here in our town.

Eric, Adam, Andrew and Steve are all Town of Oyster Bay residents. We're proud to have you in our town. We're very appreciative of your leadership and all you do, including what you're here to do today.

Now, I welcome Steve to speak a little more about Jewish American heritage in our town. Steve?

MR. KANTOROWITZ: Thank you.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you.

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SUPERVISOR SALADINO: My name is Steve Kantorowitz and I am one of the founding members of the Jewish Historical Society and Museum of Long Island. We are currently located at the Glen Cove Holocaust and Tolerance Center, and we'll be moving to a great space at the JCC in Roslyn in September. It's going to be an amazing exhibit, about 101 famous Long Island Jewish people.

Jewish Historical Society of Long Island is proud to celebrate Jewish American Heritage Month, particularly within the Town of Oyster Bay, where Jews have had a presence for nearly 300 years.

The first Jew in Oyster Bay was a merchant who lived in lower Manhattan named Joseph Simpson. He made multiple land purchases with his wife, Rebecca Isaacs, in the Village of Oyster Bay as early as 1726.

Solomon Simpson, son of Joseph and Rebecca, owned two houses in Oyster Bay in 1775, but left during the

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Revolutionary War, taking refuge in Connecticut. As a colonist who supported independence, Solomon contributed to the war effort by supplying a cannon to the New York militia and lead for making bullets.

The first Jewish congregation established in the Town of Oyster Bay was in Hicksville and was incorporated on February 28th, 1919. They built the first synagogue in 1926, located at 80 East Barclay Street, and the building still stands and is used as the Asamai Hindu temple. Today there are 25 synagogues located in the Town of Oyster Bay.

I'm a proud Jew and I grew up in Plainview and I now live in Jericho. One of my favorite memories of Plainview was that out of all my friends, the only friend of mine who spoke Yiddish was my Italian Catholic friend, Frank Renzi (phonetic). He learned it while he was working at Dairy Del in Plainview.

This is also another fabulous, true

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story of somebody you might not have heard about; Haym Solomon. Haym Solomon was born in 1740 in Poland to a Sephardic Jewish family descended from Spanish and Portuguese Jews who gradually migrated to Poland following Ferdinand and Isabella expulsion of the Jews from Spain in 1492.

Although most Jews in Central and Eastern Europe spoke Yiddish, it is alleged that because Solomon left Poland with his family while still young, he could not read and write Yiddish. Sympathizing with the Patriot cause, Solomon joined the New York branch of the Sons of Liberty.

In September 1776, he was arrested as a spy. The British pardoned him but detained him for 18 months on a British boat as an interpreter for Hessian soldiers German troops employed by the British. Solomon used his position to help prisoners of war from the Continental Army escape, encouraged the Hessians to desert the war effort, and

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collaborated with Hercules Mulligan -- anybody heard that name? Have anybody seen Hamilton? If you seen Hamilton, Hercules Mulligan is featured very prominently in Hamilton -- and Cato, to carry out other espionage activities.

In 1778, Solomon was arrested again, convicted of espionage and sentenced to death. Again, he escaped making his way with his family to the revolutionary capital in Philadelphia.

From the period of 1781 to 1784, records show Solomon's fund raising and personal lending helped provide over \$650,000 (approximately about 16 million today) in financing to General George Washington and his war effort. His most meaningful financial contribution, however, came immediately prior to the siege of Yorktown. But Washington's war chest was completely empty as was that of Congress. Does that sound a little familiar today? Without food, uniforms and supplies, Washington's troops were

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close to mutiny. Washington determined that he needed at least \$20,000 to finance the campaign. When Morris told him there were no funds and no credit available. Washington said, send for Hyam Solomon. Solomon raised \$20,000.

Now, there's a story that Hyam Solomon was in synagogue during Yom Kippur when he was being requested, that he actually left the synagogue service and wrote a check and handed it to them to get the war effort going. This is a story; not 100% certain, so that's why I'm saying story.

With that contribution, Washington conducted the Yorktown campaign, which proved to be the final battle of the Revolution. Solomon was involved in the Jewish community affairs, being a member of Congregation Mikveh Israel in Philadelphia. Solomon was one of the most prominent Jews in the successful effort to have the Pennsylvania Council of Censors remove the religious test oath

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required for office holding under, the State Constitution. These test laws were originally written to disenfranchise the Quaker majority. Quakers objected to taking oaths at all, but many were caught up in the anti-Democratic ploy. It was Solomon's old friend, Robert Morris who actually introduced legislation to end the test laws in Pennsylvania.

In 1784, Solomon answered anti-Semitic slander in the press by stating, I am a Jew. It is my own nation. I do not despair that we shall obtain every other privilege that we aspire to enjoy along with our other fellow citizens.

The financier died suddenly in poverty on January 8th, 1785. Due to the failure of the government and private lenders to pay the debts incurred by the war, his family was left penniless at the age of 44.

The Town of Oyster Bay has been and is a great place to grow up Jewish. There

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was no fear, unlike somewhat today, where there are armed guards posted at most synagogues. Although I still feel relatively safe living in the Town of Oyster Bay, the ugly scourge of anti-Semitism disguised as anti-Zionism keeps popping up.

I teach a Hebrew school class, and many students tell me about the stereotypical comments they hear about Jews, which keeps coming up. The lack of education about the Holocaust and about the legitimacy of Israel is extremely lacking. We need to do better. We need to educate our students. TikTok and Instagram are not education. It is important that students understand what is right and wrong through a balanced education of facts instead of fictions perpetrated on social media and by gossip.

Thank you very much; appreciate it.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you very much. Let's give Steven a hand.

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(Whereupon, applause.)

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Greatly appreciate that education. We appreciate all that you all represent and stand for. And we thank Eric Post, Adam Novak, Andrew Bader and Steve Kantorowitz for joining us today and for assisting with an extremely important cause.

TAX RECEIVER PRAVATO: Supervisor, may I say something?

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Please. Jeff Pravato.

TAX RECEIVER PRAVATO: So I've known Steve for 20 years, probably. I met Eric most recently, a couple of years ago. And the history that Steve just explained is amazing. The history of the Jews on Long Island.

AJC is a spectacular group about anti-Semitism, fighting it, taking our young children -- my daughter was in the Leaders Program.

The teachings need to be done. Back in Massapequa Park when I was mayor, we

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had a young man who spray painted swastikas on the benches. You remember the story. They caught the kid. They wanted him to do community service. Picking up papers is not going to learn anything. He didn't know what the swastikas were. So I said, what do you want to do with him? I said, Why don't we go visit the Holocaust Museum up in Great Neck? Went up there, visited, met a Holocaust survivor. The kid was in tears when he came out. Actually, I was told after he left, he ran back in to give the gentleman a hug, saying how sorry he was.

And so lack of education -- listen, when I was younger, my father, we sat on Saturdays or Sundays, we watched the world at war. We watched the Pacific. We watched all these shows to learn about history. We watched the History Channel. It's not just learning in school. It's the stuff you learn watching these shows, going to these seminars. And AJC is doing a spectacular job in educating our

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children, getting the word out so we never forget. Because we cannot have what happened ever happen again. And let me tell you, getting all involved with the government, AJC, what we have the meetings, Jews and government, getting everybody involved, getting both sides of the aisle together. And we agree on one thing that anti-Semitism has no place in New York State, Nassau County or the Town of Oyster Bay. So thank you, guys, for everything you do.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you, Jeff. Thank you very much. We're very proud of working with all of you. We're proud of the policies that we have initiated. Our Anti-BDS legislation is one of the first when we began our new administration in 2017. You recall we met with you, we talked about this, and we quickly put it in place. If a business won't do business with Israel, they're not going to do business with the Town of Oyster Bay, and that's Town Code.

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So we are proud of the many different pieces that we put in place and how we fight discrimination against anyone in this town. And we certainly recognize all of the enormous accomplishments that Jewish people have brought to America and that Jewish people who live in the Town of Oyster Bay have made to society and to our community.

So to celebrate Jewish American Heritage Month, we have prepared this proclamation that we'd all like to present to you. But I'm going to ask our very proud Jewish member of our town family, Jeff Pravato, if you would lead in this presentation and we'll all gather at the rail.

(Whereupon, Citation is presented.)

TAX RECEIVER PRAVATO: Eric, Steve, everybody, Andrew, all of you guys, on behalf of the 300,000 residents of the Town of Oyster Bay, it is my honor to give you guys this proclamation. Thank

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you very much.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Let's have a big hand for our friends.

(Whereupon, applause.)

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Folks, just a few quick announcements, some business before we begin our day.

I do want to again thank all the teams involved two weekends ago with both the Special Olympics, where the Town of Oyster Bay partnered with the Farmingdale School District to put on the Special Olympics. It was an incredible event. And what amazing athletes and what true courage took place that day. It was very, very special.

And then the next day was our car show. Certainly one of the largest in the northeast, if not one of the largest car shows on the east coast of America; 1700 car show cars, almost 9000 people. Tremendously successful. And again, we thank the Parks Department, Public Safety, everyone who played a role in

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those very successful events.

Now recognizing that our hospitals are facing a nationwide emergency blood shortage, my colleagues and I invite residents to donate blood at our next blood drive, which is Tuesday, June 27th, from 1 p.m. to 7 p.m. at the Hicksville Athletic Center, located at 167 South Broadway in Hicksville. I'd like to thank everyone on our Town Board, including Councilman Labriola, for their efforts in coordinating the blood drive. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: I have a slip for, I believe, the speaker is Arthur Adelman. Would you like to speak on the on the resolutions?

(Whereupon, off the record clarification.)

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MR. ADLEMAN: Thank you very much.
Arthur Adleman, 110 Dubois Avenue, Sea
Cliff, New York.

Good morning, Town Board. It was an
enlightening education I got this
morning. I thank you for that.

Very quickly today as the Calendar
was non-controversial as far as I'm
concerned, today. However, I do have one
question regarding the draft resolutions
as put forth on the transfer of funds. We
have one resolution with two IDs on it,
but it's the same transfer of funds, and
that's the IGA, Inter Government Affairs,
\$116,000. It's marked as 2A and 2C, and
we only have hopefully only one transfer
of funds of only \$116,000. So I think
that needs to be corrected in the
resolution package.

Secondly, I understand we just
walked on a Resolution 363 regarding the
revitalization in Hicksville. That's been
something that's been under review by the
Town for as long as I've been attending

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the meetings most recently. I'm sorry that the Board saw fit not to give us advance paperwork on this resolution, so I don't even know what this resolution entails. Does it entail the actual movement ahead of starting to dig and make construction or is it just design phases? I have no idea what 363 is all about. And I think the -- is it Parks or whatever department is in charge of this, the Commission should come forth and give us an explanation of what's being spent and on what we're spending it on.

Other than that, I wish you all well and I'll see you at public comment.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: We have Colin Bell here, Deputy Commissioner Colin Bell. Are you the right one to make this information or is it Jim McCaffrey?

DEPUTY COMMISSIONER BELL: To address the speaker's comments --

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Would you begin with identifying yourself?

DEPUTY COMMISSIONER BELL: It's

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Colin Bell, Deputy Commissioner of Town of Oyster Bay.

The Resolution the speaker referenced is a grant funded service through the Downtown Revitalization Initiative; entirely, state funds awarded to the Town. This particular resolution authorizes an agreement that engages on a design services for this project.

So no, it is not shovels in the ground at this point, but it is to complete the design documents that will be used eventually to bid to put shovels in the ground. So grant funded for design services in downtown Hicksville.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you, Colin.
