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SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Good morning, ladies and gentlemen.

If everyone would please take a seat, we'd greatly appreciate it. We'll get started.

Thank you for being here for our Town of Oyster Bay Town Board meeting of Tuesday, November 14, 2017.

This morning's prayer will be led by Reverend Dr. Jeffrey Prey of Oyster Bay's First Presbyterian Church.

The First Presbyterian Church's ministry began in Oyster Bay in here -- right here in 1842 with the first church being located on East Main Street at the location that is now Nobman's Hardware.

The church's mission is to grow as a family of believers and seekers where all are invited to celebrate God's grace. The congregation is also noted for its association with Theodore Roosevelt, Sr., his wife, Martha Bulloch Roosevelt, and their children, including their son, Theodore Roosevelt, Jr., the future President of the United States.

We are very pleased to welcome Dr. Prey here this morning to lead us in prayer.

3 Dr. Prey, if you would. 1 2 Please rise. (Whereupon, a prayer was recited by 3 4 Reverend Dr. Jeffrey Prey.) 5 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you, Reverend. 6 7 Please stay standing, remain standing 8 while we are led in the Pledge of Allegiance by an 9 extraordinary veteran and resident of the Town of 10 Oyster Bay. 11 Elijah McKellen served in the United States Navy from 1944 to 1946 and we are 12 13 tremendously honored with your presence. 14 (Whereupon, the Pledge of Allegiance 15 was recited and led by Elijah McKellen.) SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you again 16 to Elijah McKellen. 17 18 Thank you. 19 Since our last meeting on October 24th, 20 much has occurred, and I'd like to take a few 2.1 minutes to update our residents. 22 First, I'm proud to report that the 23 Empire Center, an independent nonprofit think tank 24 based in Albany, recently awarded Oyster Bay Town 25 with a Grade A for online transparency and

accessibility.

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Under an audit conducted two weeks ago, the Town nearly tripled the points earned when compared with the audit the Town received in 2014.

This -- at that time, it had resulted in a grade of F, and now once again, as I just mentioned, we have a grade of A.

The most notable gains were made in categories such as public information, financial reports, revenue sources and ease of navigation of our website. This ranking from the Empire Center further solidifies this administration's reputation as a leader in online transparency and accessibility.

It also clearly reinforces the recognition placed on the Town by Reclaim New York, who declared the Town the standard bearer throughout New York State for online transparency.

We will continue at the direction of this Board, continue to look to move the bar even higher, and get even better grades in the future as we continue to make transparency and ethics reform among our highest priorities.

Ladies and gentlemen, transparency is what we seek to bring to all aspects of our

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government. For instance, last week, we hosted a public workshop to obtain resident and community import into the use of a \$10 million Downtown Revitalization Grant we won from the State for the redevelopment in Hicksville.

The public workshop was the first in a series of three planned meetings. It's an important step toward identifying projects and initiatives which the community feels are appropriate for Downtown Hicksville. And as we've said from the beginning, listening to the communities wants and putting them into action is why we're here.

The Town was thrilled to be the recipient of this \$10 million award from Governor Cuomo and the Long Island Regional Economic Development Council. We will make our residents proud when establishing and approving a new and vital community-based vision for our community, especially in Hicksville, and then we know that will be the template for the rest of Long Island and the rest of the State of New York.

You know, growing our economy for redeveloping our downtowns is important. It's just as important to preserve our suburban quality of

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life. For that reason, Councilman Imbroto,

Councilman Hand, and our Town Clerk James Altadonna
join me in launching a new Quality of Life Task

Force. This code enforcement initiative will focus
on the quality of life concerns such as illegal
housing, zombie homes, noise, landscaping, parking,
among other issues.

Our Town has consistently recognized as one of the best places to live in the nation and we've been recognized by numerous publications, including national publications, and we've seen a steady increase in the value of homes, properties and businesses. This task force will help protect our greatest asset, our quality of life, while also protecting and preserving the safety and general wellbeing of our residents.

Residents who would like to report an issue of concern to the Quality of Life Task Force are urged to call code enforcement at 516-624-6200. Again, that number is area code 516-624-6200.

In preserving our quality of life, we must also be mindful of our resident's wallets.

For that reason, the 2018 adopted budget cuts taxes. We're very proud of our budget. This will help us continue reducing government expenses and

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we will -- we will today be considering a retirement and separation of service initiatives for Town employees with the motivation of reducing the Town's workforce and reducing the cost to our residents.

At our last meeting, the Town Board adopted that budget and that budget cuts taxes \$1.3 million and significantly reduces our Town's debt.

At the time, my administration was exploring a new Shared Service Initiative to save taxpayers money through the merger of the Town and County Departments of Public Safety.

While the Town of Oyster Bay would achieve immediate savings through such an initiative, we have since learned that the County, after analyzing all of the data, has told us that they would not realize the overtime savings they had hoped for, and for this reason, the County will not sign on to the merger agreement.

I would like to thank Nassau County and the police department for exploring this opportunity. As I had explained previously, the 2018 adopted budget included a contingency fund for that department. As such, we will move forward

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today with executing that contingency fund.

That said, myself and this entire Town
Board will continue to seek savings in every corner
of government. I will continue to advocate for
shared services initiatives and not back down from
analyzing all options, even when special interests
exist.

The Department of Public Safety, for instance, has 40 employees and that is down from a high of 65 employees. That Department, just like every other Town Department, will be asked to achieve savings through efficiencies and attrition while maintaining the services and safety that they provide to our residents.

I'd like to thank the brave men and women of the Department of Public Safety for their patience throughout this process and I also want to point out that through the exploration of shared services that was initiated by the Governor and the State Legislature as part of the State Budget, we the Town of Oyster Bay, were the leaders in dollars saved through this program, the leaders in all of Long Island. So we saved more than any other municipality our size, and we're very, very proud of partnering on so many initiatives with the

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villages, with other municipalities, to do what the program was intended to do; to consolidate these services and find savings for our residents.

Even without the Public Safety issue, we still came out Number One of any municipality our size and we are very, very proud of that.

Before I conclude, I want to remind residents that Councilwoman Alesia and Councilman Macagnone recently kicked off our Toys For Tots holiday collection drive, and we thank you very, very much for this important initiative.

insurance for their lifetime.

The employees who are already eligible and have not retired previously, would get \$500 for every year of service, plus the insurances.

The voluntary separation incentive is something new. It's something that Nassau County has done and it's just for anybody who feels that

39 they want to leave the Town, we'll give them a 1 2 \$1,000 for every year that they worked for us, and 3 that is all. 4 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: To clarify that 5 for the public, so the incentive that we're offering, the second incentive, is exactly the same 6 7 language that Nassau County utilizes? 8 MS. SPINELLI: I'm not sure exactly. 9 didn't write it, but I think it's pretty much --10 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Virtually, the 11 same language. 12 MS. Maximum. We are making this available to all employees and we're going to be counseling the employees so they can learn more, get their questions answered, see if it works for them and the idea is to have as many employees as would like to take advantage of this to make it available to them and to explain the process so they're very, very comfortable with their decision.

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SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Okay. Let's talk about -- first, let's start off with the State Law as it exists. It's a tier process that is the tier for everyone in the New York State Retirement System.

And, Vickie, why don't we start off with that information?

MS. SPINELLI: The retirement incentive that we have is for anybody who is eligible to retire within the New York State and local retirement system. So as long as they deem that you are eligible to retire, we will allow you to retire with this incentive if you fall within the time guidelines.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And what she's asking for those parameters.

MS. SPINELLI: Different tiers have different age restrictions, different time restrictions.

Typically, generically, in a Tier 4, which is most of the employees we have right now, minimum age is 55 years of age with a minimum of five years of service, but with the 55 and five, there is a huge age penalty that you would get.

Typically, they don't want you to

retire --

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SUPERVISOR SALADINO: By a penalty, so the public understands that, you would receive far less --

Than you would receive MS. SPINELLI: if you waited until you were 62 or if you had 30 years of service, so the number will change and vary between the age and the time, but at the very least, to get anything out of the retirement system, you need to be at least 55 years of age with five years of service.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Does that answer your question?

UNKNOWN 2: Somewhat.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: So we have people. So we have people who are eligible to retire and because of the way that State Law mandates our operation, we have one incentive for those who are eligible to retire and then we went for more proactively and we're bringing out a second initiative for those who are not eligible to retire, but are interested in breaking service in this Town.

So this way we can save more money and give these options to a wider spectrum of

48 employees. Today in this day -- in this day, at 1 2 this point in our tier system, what is the number 3 of years that an employee may vest? 4 MS. SPINELLI: They will vest after 5 five years. Then there is also from 20 -- from this year, for 2017 to 2018 in October, is supposed to be \$5 million put aside for road restoration because many a time we've come up here and residents have been complaining about their roads, so we're trying to do -- be proactive now and start working on it.

And then the second year, which would be October 19th to October -- excuse me, of 2019 to October 2020 is another \$5 million, so that's where the \$10 million comes from.

Now what had happened, the docket -- or the backup information is right the way it was originally written. When that information got translated into a Town Board Resolution, they -- the Resolution only took the \$2 million. It didn't

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take the \$5 million so that's what this correction is. So the 2 -- what this means is that the kind -- we are allowed to -- if approved, we're allowed to spend up to \$5 million for the first year to get our road restoration, and then for the next term, we have another \$5 million.

\$2 million, that just is for a contract -- the contractor to do the work and there's, as I say, many different items so as he's doing the work, we estimate, before he starts, what the work is going to be, and then when he does the actual work, then those numbers are then catalogued and then John Bishop then takes that information and makes an authorization for payment purposes.

MR. BISHOP: So the \$2 million the -\$2 million and change is the weighted amount for
the contractor to be selected, so when the contract
went out to bid by Engineering, Engineering opens
up the bids, all of the contractors put in a value
next to each one of the items that are in that
contract. That is totaled up. We get a weighted
amount, which is the \$2,800,000, not specific, but
that and change. That gives you the lowest
responsible bidder for that project and the scope

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of work that's going to be performed under those items.

Knowing that we have an outpour from the residents that we've been dealing with, and I've been personally talking to everybody, that number, we felt, let's start off with \$5 million for the first year and the second year would be another \$5 million because the contract -- the Reso was written as a two-year contract with three one-year extensions, it's not \$10 million for one year. It's \$5 million for each year.

everybody understands too, that does not mean that the contractor gets \$5 million. It's just an authorization. It means that if we have a road that we need work to be done, we estimate the whole road and that could be, you know, a couple of -- a million or less and then we just keep doing more and more roads, and we take off the bank -- so it's like a bank account. You have the \$5 million in the bank account and then we keep deducting from it until we get to -- in this particular case, it's going to be Winter coming up soon so we're not going to be able to do much more asphalt in the next couple of weeks. Then we start again in

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March, April, and start again and taking it down from that bank account.

Does that make sense to everybody?

COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: Commissioner, I

think where the disconnect is that some people

don't understand this is a requirements contract.

COMMISSIONER LENZ: Thank you.

COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: This isn't a specific job that's being bid.

COMMISSIONER LENZ: Very good, thank you.

COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: So that's why the number, the weighted average, is not the final amount.

MR. BISHOP: It's not a direct bid of \$2.9 million would say that that's what the contractor is getting, why we authorizing them more -- to \$5 million. It's work orders that will be generated throughout the year from the resident outpour that we are addressing with these road surfaces that need to be, you know, handled.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Just a few questions for the purposes of clarity for our residents.

First and foremost, these monies were

55 1 all voted on in the previous year's budget, 2 correct? 3 MR. BISHOP: Correct. They're from '14 4 and '15 calendar year budgets. 5 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: From the '14 and '15 calendar year budgets, so this has all been 6 7 approved, and now we are going through the proper 8 steps to ensure that we are carrying out everything 9 legally and ethically? COMMISSIONER LENZ: Correct. 10 11 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Does this process 12 meet all metes and bounds of the law? 13 MR. BISHOP: Yes. 14 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Commissioner? 15 COMMISSIONER LENZ: Yes, it does. 16 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you. And finally, we've had conversations 17 18 about the priorities of getting to get the road 19 work done. 20 Can you just describe the conversations 2.1 that I've had with you in terms of our Town Board's 22 priority to ensure that we get our roads repaved 23 and repaired and updated? 24 MR. BISHOP: At many meetings, we've 25 addressed many residents and communities and have

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captured those area streets and have made a priority list. In addition to that, the Engineering Department has gone through the exercise of creating a new rating system so that all roads will be then assessed.

We're going to try to wrap our arms around the worst case scenarios and then build off of that with the new system that the Engineering Department has done a display here of how they're prioritizing and making a determination what would be a road reconstruction contract and what work would be a bid, a total bid job, which would be, as Councilman Imbroto indicated, would be something that Engineering would put out to bid and that final number is your final number.

And those jobs mainly deal with the curbs, gutters, drainage systems, and we've discussed some of those at Town Board as well with the areas in Glen Head on William Street and Linden Place and those areas are being currently designed through Engineering.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: We've had numerous discussions about getting this work done as quickly as possible.

COMMISSIONER LENZ: Yes.

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SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And this new system, that is a priority system, this is one in the same system that we displayed publicly at a public meeting to show the public how we're creating this priority and what the system entails?

MR. BISHOP: Correct.

important to let people here, as well as those perhaps watching online, to know that if you would like our experts to come to your civic association meeting, your government, or your community association, we'd be happy to bring this program there so everyone can see so we can have full transparency and we are getting the information out on how we are creating this priority system to determine who gets their roads done in what order.

MR. BISHOP: Absolutely.

COMMISSIONER LENZ: Right.

I just want to explain one other thing, too. This project is just road restoration, meaning just the roadway. There will be another contract that will be coming out in the next couple of weeks that is for road reconstruction, meaning sidewalk, curb, if it's damaged.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Drainage.

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COMMISSIONER LENZ: And also drainage and taking care of the road, also. So there's two different contracts that are -- we're doing this type of work. These are just repaving the road. That's it.

MR. BISHOP: And the other contract that will come out through Engineering is the drainage general requirements contract and currently, Highway does have a list that we've build -- building up to where there are basin failures and there's a few in that page here and there, we've done what we can do in-house, but it's gotten to the point where the road needs to be excavated, pipes need to be replaced, and then new pipes installed and then a road surface and curb and gutter would be installed.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Okay. And again, for clarity for the public's purposes, we didn't arrive at this through a mistake; isn't it correct that this is part of the procedure to ensure that we are both ethically and legally following all of the laws in terms of procurement?

MR. BISHOP: Yes.

COMMISSIONER LENZ: Well put, yes.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Okay. Thank you.

This firm was -- sent us the bill in our office. Joe Nocella, myself, I kept him in the loop, this is obviously a bill that was and services that we utilized before Town Attorney Joe Nocella joined us. That's why he asked me to come up and speak about it.

The bill was approximately \$845,000, but I was able to negotiate it about 20 percent off that bill.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: At my request?

MR. SCALERA: Of course. Of course,

for the efficiencies and some of the cost savings

and I was a bit -- I was able to approximate -
about a 20 percent reduction which is about

\$169,000 and change.

So, basically, they were retained back at that period of time to assist the Town of Oyster Bay in responding to any and all requests and cooperating with any and all authorities regarding the former Town concessionaire matter.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Just for the

61 purposes of clarity, these hours of work that 1 2 are -- we're being billed for took place well 3 before most of us came to this Town Board? MR. That having been said, the RFP that was prepared has that appraised value, plus the cost of the appraisal as the minimum upset price.

If an RFP is issued, it's not binding upon the Town Board to accept any offer, but that would determine the real market value is because there are four or five interested parties already who have indicated their interest in it.

So an RFP is published, the prices that come in, as long as they meet the minimum, we know what the appraised value is, would determine the true market value.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And are we allow --

 $$\operatorname{MR.}$ SABELLICO: Then the Town Board can make the decision whether to accept it or not.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And are we

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: So to answer, more specifically answer your question, we're looking at all of our options, and we'd be happy to meet with you in the very near future, with staff members, so that we can get some of your input as to some of the ideas you have. We're negotiating and we're looking at all options as to what is the best option and the best cost effective way to provide the services that are now -- that now stem from the Mill Street property.

COUNCILWOMAN ALESIA: Is it possible that we can --

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MR. SABELLICO: Councilwoman, for argument's sake, if you issue the RFP and the proposals that come back aren't what the Town Board deems to be of value to the Town, you can refuse them and not declare it surplus, but if someone should come back and say they want to offer \$5 million for that property, that might change your opinion.

COUNCILWOMAN ALESIA: Sure. I get that, but again, as far as I can recall, to put over until today and, obviously, it's a very busy time for the last month, I'm just wondering if we might not adjourn it one more time so that we can have those conversations.

mean we have to sell the property and, quite frankly, to see what the market will bear because there's a financial component to a move, part of the information we need in making these decisions together as a Board should be to see what kind of revenue that property would generate.

As we have discussed before, there are financial considerations in the move, in construction of new facilities that accomplish the services, as was pointed out earlier, that we have

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to continue to provide these services, we have to continue to have easily accessible points for sand and salt, the storage of vehicles, the maintenance of those vehicles, which is something that so few people realize. To keep those trucks going on the roads, we maintain our vehicles and having worked with our staff during multiple snowstorms in 2017, I saw just how valuable those facilities are.

So, by determining what value that property could bring, it helps in the overall decision-making process, and I agree with you, it's not about rushing to sell the property; it's about collecting up as much data, sharing it with the public, sharing it with the Town Board, so that we can have all of the tools at our disposal in terms of making the best decisions for our taxpayers and our residents.

COUNCILWOMAN ALESIA: But just so I'm clear, this is a Resolution authorizing putting it for sale? It's like putting your house on the market when you're not sure if you want to sell it or not.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: To see what it will bear, yes, to see what monies it will bring in which will help us.

74 Civic Association President brought up the issue 1 2 about -- the people were promised a park there. 3 dog park and possible relocation of some of the Town facilities. 4 5 Me, myself, I'm not totally in favor of that, but the commitment was made to the Hicksville 6 7 residents for a park, so I was wondering if the 8 property is sold, where do those monies go; do they 9 go into the General Fund or is there some way of 10 designating them that they can be used for a park 11 in Downtown Hicksville as part of the 12 revitalization program? 13 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Okay. I'm going 14 to bring up our Director of Finance to answer that 15 question and would you please start off, sir, by 16 stating your presence? 17 MR. DARIENZO: Good morning, 18 Supervisor, Town Board. I'm Rob Darienzo. I'm the Director of 19 20 Finance. 2.1 The Engel Street property was purchased 22 with what we call SEA Fund money, Save Environmental Assets, those are capital funds so 23 24 the entirety of the purchase price would need to go 25 back into the SEA Fund. Any amount in excess of

7.5 what the original purchase price was would go into 1 2 the general fund and could be used however is 3 deemed necessary. 4 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: However the Board 5 deems necessary. Do we know how much was spent on the 6 7 property with the SEA Fund money? MR. DARIENZO: It's my understanding it 8 9 was \$2.5 million. 10 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Okay. Thank you 11 very much. 12 Paul, does that answer all your 13 questions? 14 MR. MOLINARI: What does a SEA Fund do? 15 I'm not familiar with that at all. 16 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Okay. Let's talk 17 about a little bit of the history, there were three 18 SEA Fund bonds that the voters of the Town of 19 Oyster Bay approved. Talk to us about those, 20 please, what years, how much. 2.1 MR. DARIENZO: All right. 22 This is off the top of my head. 23 There were three SEA Fund 24 authorizations, I believe. They were 2001, 2004, 25 and 2008. They totaled \$120 million, 60, 30, and

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30, respectively, and part of that money was to be used for the acquisition of open space to preserve open space and part of it was meant to be used for the improvement of existing park facilities and open space.

So, all three of those authorizations were subject to a public vote, election days of those three calendar years and it's my recollection that they passed roughly three to one each year, 75/25.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Can you give us approximately the dates or the month and year or just the years if that's all you recall. So it can put in perspective so the public can understand when they -- they voted to borrow this money?

MR. DARIENZO: It is my memory that it was 2001, 2004, and 2008 were the years of the three referendums.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: The three referendums, and we believe, to the best of recollection, that the public overwhelmingly, as much as 3 to 1, voted in favor directing the Town to borrow this money?

MR. DARIENZO: Absolutely. I would be shocked if it was less than 70 percent. I think it

was closer to 75.

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SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And as per law, we went out and bought the property and when we sell any of these properties, that money has to be paid off; is that correct?

MR. DARIENZO: Well, those funds would go back into the existing SEA Fund. So let's say, for example, the SEA Fund money was all spent. In this case, if we sold the property for \$2.7 or \$3 million, \$2.5 million would go back into the SEA Fund. The excess would go into our General Fund, and then you would have \$2.5 million available in the SEA Fund to purchase an additional piece of open property, only for that purpose.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Or to pay off that debt.

MR. DARIENZO: Or you can pay down debt, existing debt, correct.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Is another option. Okay. Thank you very much.

And in terms of the open space, I know
I'm an environmentalist, and I know my colleagues
on the Town Board share a tremendous love of our
environment, can we just speak to the fact that all
of these properties that were purchased to preserve

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our precious environment, to allow for percolation of rain water to our aquifer system to ensure drinking water, do we still own all of them?

MR. DARIENZO: Yes. As far as I know, every piece of property that we purchased through the three SEA Funds are still under our ownership.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: So, in fact, we are not asking this question of you as an environmental expert, the bottom line is, the public asked us to borrow the money. The Town borrowed the money in -- as early -- as recently as 2008 was the last time that was purchased.

The Town purchased the open space to preserve the environment and the environment is still being preserved because this Town still own that precious land?

MR. DARIENZO: That's all correct.

And just so we're clear, the authorizations were in 2001, 2004, and 2008, but the other authorizations have a period of probable usefulness for 15 to 30 years. So because we had authorizations as recently as 2008 doesn't mean we only acquired lands in 2008. That money is available from, say, 2008 to, say, 2023, so the money that was spent on Engel Street in particular

79 was in 2008, I think Mr. Sabellico said it was 1 2 three or four years ago when we purchased this 3 piece of property. 4 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Okay. Thank you. 5 Does anyone have any questions? 80 1 parking spaces over 100. I mean, they're going 2 take away 10 needed parking for residents, but we 3 forget about the handicapped people. 4 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Well, I believe 5 we have some more. Let's get an answer on that from Mr. Bishop. 6 7 MR. SKLAR: We spoke to Mr. Bishop 8 about it back three months ago. 9 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Mr. Bishop, would 10 you please come forward? 11 Thank you, Mr. Sklar. 12 You can please take a seat. We'll get 13 your question answered right now. 14 Thank you, sir. 15 MR. BISHOP: In this lot in particular, 16 because we're dealing with the M-11 lot, we had 17 made five handicap parking spaces. 18 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Five additional? MR. BISHOP: Five additional 19 20 handicapped parking spaces when we removed four 2.1 hour parking restrictions. Once this goes through, 22 then the signs will then change and we'll be able 23 to see it. 24 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And how did we

come about determining that number?

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MR. BISHOP: There's -- we have a traffic -- we have a traffic survey department that will go through the process. Our sign bureau will look at the whole lot on the schematic, see where we can put the spaces because you want the handicap spaces to be either closer to the train stations or closer to any business districts, depending on where the lots are situated.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And are we guided by State Guidelines or mandates, State Law on this?

MR. BISHOP: Yes. That law dictates

where they can and cannot place a handicap space.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Well, John, I'm instructing you to please speak with our team, our engineering team, and to lean toward additional handicapped lots above and beyond what the State calls for.

And Mr. Sklar brings up a very good point. For our veterans, for people of all ages, for people of different ability levels, we certainly have to target their needs as well.

MR. BISHOP: If there is a specific lot that is used more, then I would like to know that lot number because all the lots --

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I wish the whole Building Department, we can go through what the Town's requirements are because, believe it or not, you go into a lot of shopping centers and everything and you have ten people walking with canes and one person walking in and we really need more handicapped parking today.

I wouldn't have said this fifteen years ago but the -- it is needed, it really is. The codes, you know, we just keep going on with what we are doing and we really don't pick it up.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: I'm glad you brought that up because I have been having conversations with our Commissioner of Planning and Development and she is here with us today.

MR. SKLAR: Lovely person.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Very capable, very capable, a consummate professional.

And in our conversations, we have been talking about changing our Town Codes and that's one of our priorities, to work with our Town Board members to change our codes, to update them, to change things of the past that we've realized can be done better, and to make improvements that make sense for all of our residents.

So that's something we're looking at
