2 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Ladies and 1 2 gentlemen, welcome to the Town of Oyster Bay Town 3 Board meeting of Tuesday, November 28, 2017. 4 To begin this evening's Town Board 5 meeting and to lead us in the prayer, will be led by Father Valentine Rebello of the St. Pius Roman 6 7 Catholic Church in Plainview. 8 The St. Pius Roman Catholic community 9 extends a warm welcome to all. They're known for 10 their strong congregation and for their tireless 11 commitment to the community. 12 Father Valentine, would you please lead 13 us in prayer? 14 (Whereupon, a prayer was recited by 15 Father Valentine Rebello.) SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you, 16 17 Father. 18 And to lead us in the Pledge of 19 Allegiance, Eagle Scout candidate, Peter Rowan. 20 Peter, would you please step forward? 2.1 (Whereupon, the Pledge of Allegiance 22 was recited and led by Peter Rowan.) 23 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Please be seated. 24 Thank you, Peter. 25 And, Peter, I ask you to stay with us

because we will be -- you can have a seat in front, but we'll be including you in a very special presentation and we really appreciate you being with us this evening.

Since our last Town Board meeting on November 14th, much has occurred in our Town as we continue to work diligently to cut costs in our Town and move forward with the sweeping ethics reforms that have been promised.

As pledged several months ago, the Town of Oyster Bay will move forward with its implementation of an Inspector General's Office.

While the funding was included in our 2018 adopted budget, we must now move forward with a Local Law to officially create the position. The Town Attorney's Office and the Department of Human Resources continue to discuss and review the requested technical charges to the proposed law so that we develop the position in the right way, and quite frankly, the best way to get the job done.

We expect an amended law will be proposed in the very near future. I look forward to becoming with -- along with my colleagues on the Town Board -- to becoming the very first municipality on Long Island to create the Office of

Inspector General.

This new Town Board and I are also proud to continue to clean up government. We are working diligently to clean up not only our government here in Oyster Bay, but our local communities and neighborhoods.

Earlier today, on this very day,

Councilman Imbroto, Councilman Tom Hand,

Councilwoman Johnson, and our Town Clerk, James

Altadonna Jr., joined me as we move forward with

the demolition of two zombie homes in Locust

Valley.

And I will tell you, it was quite a thrill to get behind the controls of that heavy equipment and knock those houses down. Certainly, ended a blight in the neighborhood, in one particular neighborhood, this time Locust Valley.

The Department of Planning and

Development had declared both houses an imminent

danger to the safety and welfare of our residents

in the surrounding neighborhood, and therefore,

gave us the right by code to do so.

While Locust Valley neighbors referred to these actions as the Miracle on 13th Street, this new level enforcement will no longer be a

surprise as we bring it to each and every community in the Town of Oyster Bay.

(Applause.)

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: We are very serious about that and that's why we created the new Quality of Life Task Force as efforts have been made and will continue to be made in other communities, including the very historic and beloved East Massapequa.

There are numbers of homes for a variety of reasons, including the two hurricanes, that mandate that we must clean up, and these sites are next in our cross hairs to ensure that we make the living experience and the quality of life much better.

I know we have residents of this beloved community here today again with us and we are here to assure you that we're dropping the throttles and moving forward on getting these sites cleaned up and using -- a little more complicated with these particular sites in terms of ownership and our rights based on the code, but we are putting all of our efforts and we have the support of all of our Town Board members and our Town Clerk, James Altadonna, who has also been working

diligently with us.

And I want to thank our Building

Department. I see we have our Commissioner, Leslie

Maccarone, here. I want to thank the Town

Attorney's Office and all of the resources of this

Town because we will clean up these sites and we know it's what the residents want and we know it's the right thing to do.

Our task force members have been continuing to work diligently to address so many of these sites and while I didn't name it by name, but sites on Clark Boulevard, for instance, as a high priority.

Through the use of a \$350,000 State grant that we obtained earlier this year, the task force is working toward strengthening the Town Code to address and cure the problem of zombie houses and to get a better hold on the lending institutions who are responsible for maintenance and repair of these vacant eyesores.

Recommendations from the task force will be made to this Board and then we will be adopting changes to the Town Code to strengthen our ability to rectify this problem.

Today, the Board will continue two

workforce reduction measures. We will be presenting an early retirement incentive and a voluntary separation incentive. Both programs will increase efficiency in the Town while returning long-term savings to our taxpayers.

I'm very proud of this program, as well as the many programs that we all are and will be putting in place in an effort to improve the overall quality of services, improve the quality of life for our Town residents, and to lower costs to our taxpayers. This continues to be among our very highest priorities.

Before moving to today's calendar, we have some presentations, and then after those presentations, we do have to break for an Executive Session where our counsel has to inform us on a particular issue, so I apologize for the wait for our hearings, but that's the most efficient way to handle that matter.

I want to remind residents we're continuing to reach out for the use of our \$10 million New York State Downtown Revitalization Initiative Grant awarded to the Town for the revitalization in Downtown Hicksville.

Again, this is extremely exciting and

this will bring beautiful new life to Downtown Hicksville and be the model for the rest of the State of New York.

In other news, I remind residents that Councilwoman Alesia and Councilman Macagnone are co-chairing our "Toys for Tots" holiday collection drive. Residents can donate an unwrapped toy for a girl or a boy, and please don't forget teenagers, that's an area of high demand as well. They can donate them at Town facilities, including Town Hall North, Town Hall South, and at the Ice Skating Center in Bethpage. And residents here or watching our Livestream can get more information by calling 516-624-6619.

I want to, again, thank Councilman Tony Macagnone and thank Councilwoman Rebecca Alesia who understands the joy of a little one at holiday time, and while he doesn't know it, the person who runs the "Toys for Tots" asked me to make a presentation. They had their kickoff just a couple of weeks ago and I attended and they asked me to make a presentation to Councilman Anthony Macagnone.

Tony has been a great force with "Toys for Tots," as well as an organization that is very

Thanks to the efforts of Peter Rowan and his other troop members, this newly restored memorial in the community where Officer Farley served for many years will forever stand as a reminder to the residents of his sacrifice and his extraordinary life.

Nassau County Police Detective Christopher Rowan.

May God bless the Rowan family, the Farley family, and every member of law enforcement, as well as our emergency responders. You put your lives and safety on the line each and every day for the rest of us and we owe you a tremendous debt of

The Council will also communicate closely with the Town's Department of Planning and Development with respect to unsafe buildings and also to the design of new structures that may require a certain design or fire service equipment.

2 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Will the Town 1 2 Clerk please call the first hearing? 3 I thank everyone for their patience 4 while we adhered to the open meetings law and all 5 that had to be -- all the business of the day that had to be conducted. 6 7 I thank you. 8 MR. ALTADONNA: A hearing, which is the 9 first Local Law, to consider a Local Law Retirement 10 Incentive Program for eligible employees of the 11 Town of Oyster Bay. 12 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Please state your 13 presence. 14 MR. ROZEA: Yes, of course, good 15 morn -- good afternoon -- or good evening, rather, Supervisor, Members of the Board. We've been here 16 17 all day. 18 The hearing today is to present a proposed Local Law which would authorize a 19 20 Retirement Incentive Program for those employees 2.1 who are otherwise, or are, in fact, eligible to 22 retire under New York State Retirement System 23 Guidelines, which effectively means the employees 24 55 years or older.

We've run this program in the past.

2.1

This is in large part a continuation of the Town's prior efforts to reduce its workforce by encouraging retirement where appropriate with one additional feature that I'll discuss in a moment.

The general contours, however, of the local retirement incentive would be for anyone who is becoming eligible -- first eligible to retire, under New York State Guidelines, can take the incentive and would be entitled to a payout of \$1,000 per completed year of service; in addition to which they would receive health benefits for their life and their family members would receive as well, health benefits during the retiree's lifetime.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Only those eligible under the State Health Benefits Program?

MR. ROZEA: If you are eligible to

retire and you take this retirement incentive, you would receive your health benefits.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: I meant in terms of family members. It is not to everyone. It is those who fall under the criteria.

MR. ROZEA: Well, the Local Law provides that the family would receive the benefit as well, regardless of whether you're falling into

2.1

the new -- the first qualified, or first eligible, or were previously eligible to retire. The difference being that if you were previously eligible to retire, could have taken one of the Town's incentives over the last few years, you'll be receiving a retirement incentive payout of \$500 per year of completed service, plus the health benefits.

That was how the program worked over the last few years. We've now written into the proposed ordinance, a waiver feature that would allow any employee who is also going to become first eligible to retire in calendar year 2018, to take this incentive provided that they provide to the Town, an irrevocable letter of separation from the Town which states a date certain by which they will actually come off the payroll which is, in fact, one month after they become first eligible.

So let me give you an example. Let's say -- let's say you have an employee who is not going to be eligible within the close of this calendar year, but will become first eligible to retire, say, in August of 2018, the time restrictions in this Local Law can be waived so that that employee can provide the Town an

irrevocable letter of term -- of separation and they would then be able to take the benefits of this Local Law, which would mean \$1,000 per year plus health benefits for the retiree's life.

And that is effectively the nature of this retirement incentive. As I mentioned, it's consistent with what the Town has done in the past in its attempts to reduce the workforce with the added layer of the waiver that would capture those employees who become first eligible throughout calendar year 2018.

I should note that there is -- there are some timeframes and employees who are interested in this should pay close attention because you'll need to state your intentions close to the end of this calendar year, I believe it is by December 27th or so.

If the Board has any questions, I'll be happy to answer them; otherwise, that will conclude me presentation respect to the retirement incentive.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Are there any questions?

COUNCILWOMAN JOHNSON: No.

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: No.

6 1 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: One question. 2 MR. ROZEA: Sure. Go ahead. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Obviously, this 3 4 is similar or identical, can you speak to how this 5 legislation is similar or identical to what the Town has proposed in the past, what other 6 7 municipalities proposed and what other 8 municipalities have passed? 9 MR. ROZEA: Yeah, and, Supervisor, 10 is certainly consistent with what the Town has done 11 in the past several years; namely, that first 12 eligible employees are -- would be entitled to the 13 \$1,000 per year of completed service plus your 14 health benefits. 15 I do believe that other municipalities, 16 other local governments, including, perhaps, the 17 County of Nassau have employed a similar structure 18 in their efforts to reduce the workforce as well. 19 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Matt, excuse me. 20 MR. ROZEA: Yes. 2.1 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Only caveat we'd 22 put on is that we're not going to address this 23 again in another six months like we did last year. 24 MR. ROZEA: In fact, this year, about 25 six months ago, I was before the Board and we were

talking about an incentive, but we had realized 1 2 that there might be a better way to do this. 3 not aware of any effort to talk about this again. 4 I mean, this is what's on the table right now. 5 COUNCILMAN MUSCARELLA: We're going to end it, finally. 6 7 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: This is good for the whole year of 2018, that's what I'm saying? 8 9 MR. ROZEA: Well, it covers the period, 10 anyone becoming first eligible -- let's see, 11 between August 1st of 2017 through the close of 12 this year, plus anyone who would become first 13 eligible in 2018. 14 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Okay. Good. 15 Thank you. 16 MR. ROZEA: Of course. 17 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: No other 18 questions? 19 Thank you. 20 Are there any speakers on this? 2.1 Yes, Mr. McKenna, come forward, please. 22 MR. McKENNA: Good evening. 23 Newly elected Town Board, I 24 congratulate you all. 25 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you.

MR. McKENNA: A thought just came, the current budget.

Does the current budget take into account an anticipated reduction based upon this program?

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: We can bring up our Budget Director, but for hearings, it is a little different than the public comment.

For the hearings, it's a time period by which the public addresses us and we listen to the public's comments.

MR. McKENNA: All right.

So, that's fine, and the other comment
I want to make is, is that, I don't even know
whether this is possible, but let's just say that
you have somebody who works for the Town that is
currently being questioned by law enforcement,
whoever that might be, or they know that they're a
target of an investigation, is there any way to
put -- I'm not asking a question.

I would -- I would ask if there's a way to make it so that if somebody is -- I realize you're innocent until proven guilty, but if, say, six months down the road, they become convicted of some type of corruption that they did within the

MR. ALTADONNA: Hearing Local Law No.

2, to consider the proposed Local Law for voluntary separation incentive program for eligible employees of the Town of Oyster Bay.

MR. ROZEA: Good evening, Supervisor.

From the Office of the Town Attorney,
Deputy Town Attorney, Matthew Rozea.

Okay. This program that's in front of the Board is new to the Town. This is a voluntary separation program that would allow a full-time employee who was employed by the Town prior to January 1st of 2016, if they so choose to separate from their service with the Town, the incentive being a \$1,000 per year of completed service separation payout.

Under this program, the employee would not receive the benefits of health insurance for the duration of their life and, of course, for the family during the duration of the retiree's life, as was the case in the first program that was just presented.

But similar to -- similar to the first program, anyone intending to take benefits of the voluntary separation program would need to provide an irrevocable letter of resignation from the Town,

2.1

and under that case, they would need to separate from service with the Town close of business

January 31, 2018.

So it's more short term but, again, similar to that -- the first program, there is a deferral provision within the Local Law that an employee can affirmatively state to the Town that they intend to seek the benefits of the separation, that they're going to submit a letter of resignation, but that for governmental reasons, namely, the continuity of service which would be at the Supervisor's discretion as written in this Law, it would be in the best interest of the Town that that employee be permitted to continue in the service and in the employ of the Town through a date that would be specified in the letter of resignation.

Let's give an example just so that it clears up the picture for everyone. Let's say that there is an employee with a particular skill set and a particular task that they provide or that they carry out for the Town. There may be a case that it can't -- there may be a case in which we cannot have a replacement employee, perhaps at a lower pay rate, in place to carry out the same

2.1

function prior to January 31, 2018, so it would not be in the Town's best interest to see that employee separate from the Town because we could, in fact, because can, in fact, see a reduction in service.

And so what the Local Law allows is for the Supervisor to defer the participation in the separation for the governmental reason that we don't want to hinder government services so that a replacement, if necessary, can be found or a replacement from the existing ranks can be trained, brought up to speed, and then rotated into the service so that there is no lapse in service as provided to the residents.

That's effectively the contours of this program.

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: It's open ended time period?

MR. ROZEA: No.

Again, an employee will have to state their intentions by December 31st of this year. They would need to separate from service by January 31st of 2018 unless that deferral was granted.

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: But how long would the deferral be? It has to be time set on

6 1 It just can't be in perpetuity. 2 MR. ROZEA: That's correct. 3 twelve months. I'm sorry. Yeah. Up to twelve 4 months. 5 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Okay. Thank you. 6 7 MR. give us some scenarios of an employee who might want to take advantage of this second incentive.

MR. ROZEA: Let's say there's a middle aged employee who's not 55 or near 55 who perhaps, for his own personal -- his or her own personal reasons, decides they're no longer interested in working for the Town, maybe they found a different opportunity, maybe their interests have changed, they can take this opportunity so long as they were employed prior to January 1, 2016 in a full-time capacity and receive the separation incentive of \$1,000 and part ways with the Town.

Again, the first program was directed at those employees who are 55 or will be turning 55 in the -- in the near term. This program is directed at those who are not of retirement age, but who otherwise, for their own reasons, decide that Town service is no longer of interest to them.

MR. ROZEA: Of course.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Someone might want to move on to another responsibility.

So once we have paid them that incentive amount, they no longer cost the taxpayers

8 1 any money? 2 MR. ROZEA: Well, not only do they -that's correct, yes, in short, but there's no 3 4 salary, there's no pension contribution, there's no 5 health care benefit contribution. So, yes, effectively, it comes off the 6 7 balance sheet for the Town. 8 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: They're saving 9 all of those costs as you stated. 10 MR. ROZEA: Yes. 11 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: We're not paying 12 them a salary any longer. We're not paying their 13 pension costs. We're not paying anything toward 14 their health insurance. 15 MR. MR. DARIENZO: Yeah, absolutely.

As Matt mentioned, anyone who turns 55 is technically eligible to retire under New York State Law, but a better group to look at would be those who are 55 years of age with 30 years of service or 62 years of age with 20 years of service.

In those two scenarios, you're talking about employees who would not receive any penalty under the retirement system. So those are those —those who tend to leave and we earmarked 68 employees who would be eligible to retire with the 55 and 30 or 62 and 20 between now and the end of next year.

Those 68 employees total salaries is roughly \$6.8 million, or \$100,000 per person.

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Plus health

25 benefits.

11 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: No, that's 1 2 including. 3 MR. DARIENZO: Their estimated payout, 4 incentive payout, plus their sick and vacation is 5 an amount of less than \$6 million. So in 2018 alone, we would save roughly 6 7 \$900,000 if every one of the 60 employees left. 8 In 2019 and beyond, we'd save \$6.8 9 million plus the FICA, plus the retirement system, 10 and not plus the medical because the medical they 11 would still get. 12 So the immediate savings in 2018, 13 including the payouts, would be roughly a million 14 dollars and we'd save untold millions the years 15 after assuming we don't hire back the same number 16 of employees. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And in the second 17 18 scenario where we're not providing them health 19 benefits, of course, that savings is even greater 20 because we're saving money on the cost of the 2.1 health benefits. 22 MR. DARIENZO: That's correct. I have no -- I wouldn't even hazard a 23 24 quess as to how many employees will take the 25 voluntary separation, but that's a home run,

12 1 everyone -- anyone that does is a home run in terms 2 of savings for the Town. 3 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you very 4 much. 5 MR. ROZEA: No problem. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Anyone have any 6 7 questions before Mr. Darienzo takes a seat? 8 Okay. Come on up. 9 MR. It seems questionable to me that we would be spending money on a site that maybe is still under litigation. That's why I'm bringing it up.

That being said, I have two young sons I'd love if that park was together, that would be fabulous.

Is this for the roadway restoration?

Just for clarity's purpose, I did not negotiate the arrangement, but I'm generally familiar with where we are and where we're hoping to go.

We know that there is a tremendous priority of this administration and this Town Board to get these roads paved. Let's speak about our negotiations with the County so that we may answer the resident's question.

MR. ROZEA: To dovetail off of what Councilman Macagnone said, the entire intent of this arrangement in this shared service agreement is to result in a savings to the taxpayer.

There are ways that government can work together, surprising as that might sound, that actually result in efficiencies and a better delivery of service to the taxpayer.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: While that's satire, I want to point out that in terms of the shared services law that Governor Cuomo enacted that we have been following, no municipality on Long Island has saved more -- no Town or other

level municipality, outside the Counties, 1 2 obviously, the programs have to go through the 3 County, but the Town of Oyster Bay has the Number 4 One highest amount of savings through the 5 Governor's Shared Service Program. So, it was our motivation to not only 6 7 take advantage of this program as intended by 8 Governor Cuomo, but then to go full throttle to 9 make sure that we were saving more than any other 10 Town or smaller municipality in all of Long Island. 11 We're very proud of that fact. 12 MS. PEARSON: I'm not questioning your 13 motivation, Supervisor. 14 I just curious if the County is 15 realistically able to enter into this agreement. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Well, while we 16 17 can't -- let's talk about the negotiations. 18 So we've reached out to the County Attorney's Office. 19 20 MR. ROZEA: Sure. As one who tries to cut through red tape and baloney, I'm just hoping that it really speeds up, knowing that I've fallen on the street. I've witnessed other people fall on the street and get more injured than I did and I'd just like to see it really start going. We do pay our taxes to the Town of Oyster Bay and those streets have not been repaved since 1983 and I'm not going to ask where those monies have gone over those years, but it really needs to get done now.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Please take tonight's motion and our vote on it as proof positive of this administration's commitment and this Town Board's commitment to deal with one of the biggest problems that we see and that's the upkeep and maintenance of our roads.

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Actually, a survey was done by the Long Island Contractor's Association maybe two years ago, that 63 percent of

our residents felt that was the biggest problem in Oyster Bay were our roads.

MR. O'CONNOR: Sure. That wouldn't surprise me.

And if the County does not move forward, what is the Plan B?

as we're doing right now, we're continuing to do road work, as we speak, this time of year and, obviously, as far into the season as possible. So we have been doing paving. We will continue to do paving work. We passed a budget knowing that we will be going forward and continuing.

We had a presentation at a Board meeting talking about a brand-new program that we've put in place with Highway to address what the priority of roads will be, so it's not somebody calls, oh, do my road first.

MR. O'CONNOR: Oh, of course.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: It's a very scientific process and we have presented it, not only here at a Board meeting for the public, but in other locations so that people understand how the roads get done, what the assessment process is, and to ensure that it's fully transparent.

But all of this is in an effort to make a very high priority of getting the roads paved and we are currently paving our roads.

MR. O'CONNOR: Okay. Thank you.

There was one other question if someone could look into it.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And the unions are fine with it.

And those are basic 18 questions that we have right now. 19 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Okay. Thank you. 20 Commissioner Maccarone, would you 2.1 please come forward? 22 While it doesn't relate directly to one 23 of these Resolutions, I'd like you to please inform 24 us, if you could, in terms of how we are spending

the grant, what our program is, and certainly feel

free to talk about today's program as well. I hope everyone, if not tomorrow and future days, will be able to open the daily newspaper and read about what we're doing on zombie homes, including what we did today in knocking down two of the many that we have planned.

COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: Yes. That's correct, Supervisor.

As you know, this grant was acquired by the Department of Intergovernmental Affairs, Colin Bell. He is not here tonight, but he has the specific guidelines as to how we're spending the money, but I do know enough about it to speak tonight.

Of the \$350,000, there is a portion -the first portion that was set aside was for the
Town Attorney's Office to hire an outside counsel
to look at our current zoning ordinance, or
building code, to make recommendations on how we
can strengthen it and to provide procedures to the
Department of Planning and Development as we go
forward with these homes.

So that process has been initiated.

There's a hearing on a Resolution tonight calling

for a hearing on December 12th and that will be the

2.1

subject of some zoning changes to our Code to assist us in dealing with these zombie homes and vacant properties.

Once that is in place, the component of it is for Intergovernmental Affairs to go out for an outside consultant to inventory zombie homes throughout the Town of Oyster Bay.

We do have a list of those that we know of that people submit complaints to.

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: I'm troubled.

Why are we looking for an outside consultant when we have so many people on staff that are capable of doing it.

COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: Well, it's an interesting concept. We don't have that many code enforcers.

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Okay. But we do have Sanitation that goes up and down every street in the Town. We have Highway that's up and down the streets in the Town that can look and report back.

COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: Well, I believe it is a part of the grant that when it was applied for this consultant and the money was allocated, of the 350, there's specific guidelines.

\$25,000 for this, \$50,000 for this, and one of the line items is for the outside consultant to be hired by the Town to inventory, work with Planning and Development to inventory these homes.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: I have a

6 suggestion.

Why don't we hold a meeting? We can do it up in my office. Councilman Macagnone can come to do that.

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: I would love to do that.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: We'll bring in Colin Bell. Either you and a representative from your office, and we'll go line by line because I know the grant process and I know it can be very complex, and let's show, not only the Councilman, but anyone else who would like to be there, can't all be there at the same time, but we can make accommodations to inform or meet separately with Board members so we can walk them through the process and they can better understand how the allegations -- how these monies have to be allocated --

54 us to satisfy the mandates of the grant process. 1 2 COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: That's fine. 3 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: All right. 4 COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: Okav. 5 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Now, can we speak to the motivation of the Town in terms of getting 6 7 these properties cleaned up? 8 Today, for instance, we took down two 9 homes because we -- under our current code, we had 10 the right to do that. In the homes in East 11 Massapequa that we are certainly very motivated to 12 clean up those properties, it's a little different 13 scenario that's taking a little longer. 55 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: That's 47 13th 1 2 Avenue? 3 COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: 47 13th 4 Street. 5 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: 13th Street. COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: 51 was 6 7 overgrown a lot in the front, not so much in the 8 back, but again, you couldn't see the structural 9 damage that was in the rear of the properties. 10 So, we did our normal procedure. We 11 tried notifying the property owners. After a 12 five-day notice when they did not respond, we then 13 sent the Order to the Highway Department to do the 14 cleanup of just the vegetation. 15 When that took place, the inspectors 16 came back, Highway notified our code enforcement 17 inspectors and said, you better send someone to see 18 these homes because the -- now that we've uncovered 19 all the vegetation, you can see the homes. 20 And the case of 47, the roof was 2.1 collapsing. I mean, there was windows all open, 22 water completely filled the basement of 47. 23 Similar structural deficiencies were 24 present in 51. Code -- building inspectors went 25 out, did their inspections, came back and provided

me with a -- written reports indicating the structural damages and if -- for those of you who do not know 13th Street, a lot of these homes were built in the early 1900s, not pursuant to zoning codes, so the homes are literally two feet, a foot away from property lines.

So if one home goes down and collapses, it's going to affect the neighboring properties.

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Over a shadow --

COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: So under

Chapter 93-20, I was able to deem these immediately
to come down to be demolished. There's no hearing
response required. We needed to coordinate with

National Grid, PSE&G, the Water District to shut
off all the utilities. Once that was completed, we
were able to schedule the demolition through

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And we also -- didn't we also take a look at it environmentally? We tested the water?

COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: Yes. Right.

We removed all the -- the oil tank. We also laid

down traps for the rodent control and so forth. So

that, we all did. We secured the property to

prevent people from going in.

57 1 So, that was a very specific type of 2 situation that could be done immediately because of 3 the structural integrity of these two homes and the 4 close proximity in the event they were to collapse 5 on their own, what type of other damage they can do to adjoining properties. 6 7 In the case of other properties 8 throughout the Town of Oyster Bay --9 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Including those 10 in East Massapequa. 11 COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: -- in East 12 Massapequa, a home just boarded up is not It's an 13 structurally unsound. It's a nuisance. 14 eyesore. 15 So, in the case of 550 -- is it 5 --16 510? There's so many different numbers -- 510, the 17 inspectors went out to see what they can see from 18 the outside. They looked to see if roofs were 19 sagging, so forth. From the outside of the 20 property, it does not deem it structurally unsound. 2.1 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: So under our law, 22 we don't have the right to take the house down 23 without the permission of the owner? 2.4 COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: Emergency,

Well, there's a different procedure that can happen, so we have asked the Town Attorney's Office to go into court to get -- allow our inspectors to gain entry into this house and when we go into the house, depending on what we find inside, because it's been vacant for so many years, we may uncover things that would require us to -- allow me to issue an order immediately.

But from viewing it from the outside, I cannot sign that order. Now, if we go in and it still is not structurally unsound, there's provisions in our current code, which we are going to strengthen in two weeks, that will require a series of steps that have to take place and it's a survey, not a physical survey of a surveyor, but it's a report, again, from the Building inspectors.

They will go and look at all the different items in the house, windows being open.

Again, not structurally unsound items, but things that are a nuisance to the public and things of that nature. That will be served to the property owner. If the property owner does not respond within a certain timeframe, then we can move forward to demolish the building.

If the property does respond -- if the

2.1

property owner does respond within a certain timeframe, there is two ways he can respond. He can say, yes, I'm okay with it, you can do what you want with it. He can say, I'm okay with it, I want to -- please give me 72 hours to rectify the situation, demolish it, whatever we deem needs to be done, or he can say, you're not touching my house. I want a hearing.

At that point, a hearing will take place before the Town Board.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: A public hearing that the neighbors would attend?

COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: The property owner will make his statements, property owners will come -- neighboring property owners, Building Department, Town Attorney's Office, and there will be a hearing on that.

So, this is what we're working towards for the hearing in two weeks. There will be new language put in. We're talking about other different definitions and so forth and, you know, that's how we will proceed.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Please make sure that our residents -- and I'm going to ask Public Information to help out with that too, we want to

It's very, very obvious.

But we want to ensure that the residents have their say and that they're here so let's please get their information, utilize point

61 1 people, including the Civic Association, so all of 2 the residents can be here who are interested in 3 being heard at that hearing. 4 COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: Okay. 5 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: All right. Are there any other questions. 6 7 MR. CLARKE: I have a further question to add to this. 8 9 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Commissioner, I 10 would like to thank your Department and I would 11 like to thank Highway for all of their assistance, 12 not only today, but in the days and weeks leading 13 up to today. 14 It certainly proved to us, and it 15 should prove to the public, of our resolve to make 16 sure that we are putting every resource behind 17 curing the problem of these buildings. 18 They are eyesores, they are zombie 19 homes, and they are terrible, and one could only 20 hope that you open tomorrow's paper to read about 2.1 what we did and understand the importance of this. 22 One could only hope that the public is 23 included in this process by way of the media 24 reporting on today's very, very important news.

Now, I don't know if the Commissioner misspoke, but she said that there was a firm hired to determine if houses were vacant or not, but this already exists under New York State Law and that banks have to actually register homes in New York State database.

So I am perplexed as to why a \$350,000 grant was given and then a patronage or an award of a contract was given to a firm to find out whether houses were vacant when this is already been established under New York State Law. This is duplicative.
