2 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Good morning, 1 2 ladies and gentlemen, and welcome to the Oyster Bay 3 Town Board meeting. 4 Good morning, staff. 5 Good morning, ladies and gentlemen. MR. KILBRIDE: Quiet. 6 7 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you, General. 8 9 Good morning ladies and gentlemen and 10 welcome to the Oyster Bay Town Board meeting of 11 Tuesday, December 12, 2017. 12 I'd like to start off by wishing 13 everyone a very healthy and happy and blessed 14 Hanukkah, Christmas season, and, of course, a very 15 healthy prosperous and happy 2018. 16 This morning's prayer will be led by 17 Reverend Dr. Marjorie Elaine Nunes of the United 18 Methodist Church in Hicksville. 19 Hicksville United Methodist Church is 20 an inviting community of Christians supporting 2.1 people and families on their spiritual journey. 22 Reverend Dr. Nunes has been the senior pastor of 23 the Hicksville United Methodist Church in 24 Hicksville since July of 2013. 25 And now to recognize Hanukkah and

3 Christmas and the season where we embrace each 1 2 other, work together for a better world and a 3 peaceful world, I invite Reverend Dr. Nunes to lead 4 us in prayer. 5 (Whereupon, a prayer was recited by Reverend Dr. Marjorie Elaine Nunes.) 6 7 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you, 8 Reverend Dr. Nunes, your words were exceptionally 9 inspiring. 10 And now to lead us in the Pledge of 11 Allegiance to the greatest nation the world has 12 ever known, I invite a dear friend, someone I look 13 up to, our -- Major Chuck Kilbride of the United 14 States Marine Corps to please step forward and lead 15 us in the pledge. 16 (Whereupon, the Pledge of Allegiance 17 was recited and led by Major Chuck Kilbride.) SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you. 18 Please be seated. 19 20 Again, thank you, Reverend Dr. Marjorie 2.1 Nunes of United Methodist Church in Hicksville. 22 If I may take a moment of personal 23 privilege to editorialize for just a second. 24 There's been a lot of discussion in the 25 media and in the public about prayer at government

meetings.

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I believe it's a wonderful opportunity to be in tune with our spirituality as well as to recognize, to learn about, and respect the religions of the diversity of all the peoples in our Town, so I believe it is important, and quite frankly, if it's good enough for the State Capital, it should be good enough for us here in the Town of Oyster Bay, so I thank you at this very special holy time for People of so many different religions to join us and to lead us spiritually and give everyone an opportunity to learn about each other's culture, religion, and, quite frankly, ourselves, and thank you for the blessing for all of the members of this -- of this very special body, the Town of Oyster Bay.

5 1 done with you yet. 2 MAJOR KILBRIDE: Wait a minute. Wait a 3 minute. 4 I want you to hear Lou Savinetti and 5 Don Steiner singing this song. (Whereupon, Major Kilbride plays an 6 7 audio.) MAJOR KILBRIDE: That's Lou Savinetti 8 9 and Don Steiner. You can continue. 10 11 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you, Major, 12 for once again, bringing a smile to all of us. 13 Toys for Tots is run by the United 14 States Marine Corps Reserve and the program's 15 ongoing mission is to help ensure the children in 16 need within our area do not go without something 17 special, to bring them happiness on the holiday 18 season. 19 This year, the town-wide effort to 20 collect toys concludes on Monday, December 18th, so 2.1 it's not too late to donate a new unwrapped toy to 22 this very, very worthwhile cause. 23 We also will be collecting at the Town 24 of Oyster Bay's Annual Holiday Ice Show on 25 Saturday, December 16th at the Town of Oyster Bay

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Ice Skating Center in Bethpage.

I'd like to turn the floor over to a man who works so hard for our community, cares so much for children and for those in need, my good friend and our good friend, someone we continue to look up to, Councilman Anthony Macagnone.

(Applause.)

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Thank you, Supervisor.

MAJOR KILBRIDE: That was my bio.

COUNCILMAN MUSCARELLA: That was your

intro.

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COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: It's been a great relationship we've had with the Marine Corp, Major Kilbride and his staff.

Guys, if you saw my office these last couple of weeks, it looked like Santa's workshop with bags of toys in there. I want to thank our employees, our residents for being so generous and giving to those in need.

I want to thank my assistant, Mary,

Councilwoman Alesia's assistant and Councilwoman

Alesia for all the help they give us with this

because we don't really do the work; the assistants

do the work. Let's be honest with each other.

MAJOR KILBRIDE: That's true.

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COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: And they do a wonderful job and, Major, thank you again for coming down and helping us with this, it really is great what you guys do.

Sergeant, God bless you for your task and your service, and especially being with him all the time, God bless you.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Oh, boy. It's going to be one of those days.

And now, the moment that I know he has been waiting for as well as some us, I introduce to you, a very dear friend, a man with an enormous heart, someone who has protected our nation, someone who has risked his own life, someone who has trained so many people, whose family members are graduates of West Point. The accolades go on and on and on. He'd like you to think that he's just a character --

MAJOR KILBRIDE: I am.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: -- but he is so much more. An extremely caring individual, someone who has been the steward of this highly successful Toys for Tots program.

I bring you Major Chuck Kilbride, United States Marine Corps.

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(Applause.)

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Remember, Chuck, we have a Board meeting that we have to get to.

MAJOR KILBRIDE: You may think I came here to roast you, and you're probably right, but you've been with us for a lot of years with Toys for Tots. Macagnone has been doing a good job. Has not been returning phone calls lately, but Mary, Mary Diglio, she's a wonderful, wonderful girl and she does all of your work and she should probably be the Councilwoman.

(Applause.)

MAJOR. KILBRIDE: Muscarella, you've been doing a great job with us.

COUNCILMAN MUSCARELLA: Thank you.

MAJOR KILBRIDE: How many times am I supposed to say, you, Muscarella asked me to say his name five times.

COUNCILMAN MUSCARELLA: You're up to three.

MAJOR KILBRIDE: And little Lou over there, congratulations on your recent win at the ballot box. Jimmy, you're the best. Carol, I remember her husband used to be the Postmaster of Massapequa, wonderful, wonderful guy. The Post

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Office. The Post Office helps us out. 389 ZIP codes collect toys for us and her husband, we got a plaque for him down in -- in the Massapequa Post Office.

You know, Altadonna, you're going to have to work harder for me to mention your name. But seriously, we go to like 267 events joined Toys for Tots. We visit all 69 incorporated villages. We do the three townships. Oyster Bay, without question, gets the most toys because you work the hardest at it because you're very compassionate folks or maybe that's because Mary is the most compassionate person. Thank you.

Mary's hair looks very nice today, too.

Tony told me to say that.

But, seriously, we collect a lot of toys, we help a lot of people. This week,
Supervisor Saladino, you're going to be at
123 Audrey Street, I think it is. Julie Kaffir, we went out and we bought \$10,000 worth of enabling toys for children with autism. We also bought
\$10,000 worth of toys for Down Syndrome.

(Applause.)

MAJOR KILBRIDE: And we also buy toys, a tremendous amount of toys, for cerebral palsy, so

we get around and we hit everything -- it's 100 percent penetration in Nassau and Suffolk County, you know, and, you know, it's a privilege to come here and just to say thank you because that's really what it's all about.

Putting a smile on a child's face. A new unwrapped toy is a symbol of hope and I want you to get your meeting going, but I would just like take a real quick picture with all you guys so I can get out of here and go get these toys out.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Of course.

MR. KILBRIDE: And Staff Sergeant
Quinton wants to say thank you, too. Say thank
you.

STAFF SERGEANT QUINTON: Thank you.

MR. KILBRIDE: There you go. Thank

you.

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(Applause.)

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you, Staff
Sergeant Quinton. Thank you, Major, and so they
don't feel left out, also included in the big
holiday push for so many needy children was
Councilwoman Johnson and Councilman Tom Hand, so
this was a family affair where everyone jumped in
to help, but we certainly are proud of our Marines.

12 1 Thank you. 2 We're going to take a quick photo and 3 move to our next presentation. 4 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Mary, please 5 join us. Like I said, it doesn't happen without 6 7 your magic. 8 (Whereupon, a photo session ensued.) 9 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Folks, real 10 quick, this is Emma, Councilwoman Alesia's 11 assistant. She did a great job. 12 (Applause.) 13 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Once again, we 14 thank Staff Sergeant Quinton, our Town Board 15 members and the offices, especially of Councilman 16 Macagnone and Councilwoman Alesia and their staff 17 members. 18 As you see, Mary, and they are taking 19 those toys and, of course, our good friend, Major 20 Chuck Kilbride. Another big hand, the United 21 States Marine Corps. 22 (Applause.) 23 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Great program, 24 Toys for Tots. 25 Our second presentation this morning

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features our good friend, Mike Polansky and The Greater Long Island Running Club.

Over the years, the Town of Oyster Bay has worked closely with the Greater Long Island Running Club, and when I say over the years, I mean the decades because Mike always reminds me of his work in the 1970s with Councilman Saladino.

We have worked together to coordinate some of Long Island's most prolific running events and one of these events is the Annual Town of Oyster Bay Triathlon, an incredibly popular event that combines swimming, biking, and running, and is considered by many athletes to be the ultimate test of endurance; although, on days when we've had a number of hearings in a row, that could be a close second.

This event happens right here in Downtown Oyster Bay and concludes at Theodore Roosevelt Park and Marina.

Another important component of the Town of Oyster Bay Triathlon is that it raises money for important causes. Proceeds of this year's event benefited the Life Enrichment Center right here at 45 East Main Street in Oyster Bay.

The Lifetime Achievement Center

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represented here this morning by its Executive Director, Judy Palumbo, was founded in 1977 and serves individuals 55 years plus from many North Shore communities in the Town of Oyster Bay.

Members of the Lifetime Enrichment

Center enjoy exercise, eating healthy,

communicating via the Internet, learning how to use

the Internet, volunteering, dancing, singing,

maintaining active lifestyles, and having that

camaraderie that is so important to the human

psyche and the human being, especially as we age.

Now, I'm pleased to call upon Greater Long Island Running Club President Mike Polansky, for a special check presentation to the Lifetime Enrichment Center. I'm also told that he is spending his birthday with us today.

MR. POLANSKY: That's correct.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: So on behalf of the entire Town Board and all of our residents, wishing you a Happy and Healthy birthday as well as a Happy Hanukkah.

MR. POLANSKY: Thank you, Joe.

First and foremost, Happy Holidays.

Happy and Healthy New Year to Supervisor Saladino
and the entire Board. It's a great time of the

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year for everybody and, by the way, we hold our annual Ho Ho Holiday Run this Saturday at JFK Middle School in Bethpage. Everybody should come down and maybe you might even want to run in it. You made a, sort of, attempt at it, the Oyster Bay Supervisor's Run, but, Joe, we would welcome you as a runner this Saturday.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you.

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holidays. No matter what holiday you celebrate, it's enlightening, it's fun, and we have this opportunity to participate in our Holiday Mail for Heroes program. You can fill out holiday greeting cards for our brave men and women of the United States Armed Services, serving both here and abroad and bring them with you and we'll make sure we get those to them.

Residents have been coming in asking for this help. We hear you loud and clear. It's a very important initiative and it's about time we applied big pressure to get these homeowners and lending institutions to act responsibly.

Our continued commitment to fight fighting this zombie home issue is in an effort to preserve the beauty and integrity of our community and it's quite evident with today's action. We clearly prove our resolve to cleaning up, repairing, and in cases, tearing down these properties.

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We must continue to answer the call of our residents and I thank those residents who are here today on this issue and have been here before. You clearly are making the commitment to work with us, to keep this on the front burner moving forward so that while we do respect the rights of property owners, we will guarantee that those property owners and lending institutions respect the rights of you, our very important residents.

9 COUNCILMAN HAND: 1 Here. 2 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Will the Town 3 Clerk call the first hearing? MR. ALTADONNA: To consider the 4 5 petition of the Hicksville Water District for 6 authorization to issue refunding bonds to refund 7 the outstanding portion of the District's 8 \$13 million Water District (serial) Bond, 2011. 9 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And this will be 10 presented by -- okay, Mr. Darienzo. 11 Is there also a representative here 12 from the Hicksville Water District? 13 MR. DARIENZO: There is. 14 Good morning, Supervisor and Town 15 Board. 16 This public hearing came through my office. You've often heard me speak about how we 17 18 have Town -- we have debt for Town purposes, we 19 have debt that we issue on behalf of Water 20 Districts, and in this case, we have the Hicksville 2.1 Water District who issues debt on their own but it 22 still requires permission from this Town Board and 23 the Town Board from the Town of Hempstead, so the 24 Water District is here today to request permission

to issue refunding bonds and issue new bonds.

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SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Now, for clarity and so the public understands why they are here before the Oyster Bay Town Board when they have their own Board of Commissioners who is responsible for how this money is spent and how they carry out the duties and responsibilities of the Water District, but due to State law, as we know, it is mandated that they came before us and do their borrowing through our Town.

Can you talk to that issue?

MR. DARIENZO: You put it as clear as you can. It's -- they are here because of State law. They need our permission and the permission of the Town of Hempstead because the Hicksville Water District falls between those two townships, so they will be responsible for issuing the debt, paying the debt, and how they are spending the money they are going to be borrowing.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Can you speak to us about the rate that they would have the opportunity to borrow at?

MR. DARIENZO: Honestly --

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The Hicksville Water District is, of course, you know, in two parts, a Hempstead part and an Oyster Bay part. The reason they have to come forward today, as you've stated, is they need permission under State Law to issue bonds even though they're relying on their own credit and their own taxing power.

It's an unusual situation that stems from the fact that they were an existing District when the Constitution was amended in 1938. They retained their power to issue their own debt.

When you create districts now in the Town, you issue bonds on their behalf generally and so you have your own districts that you control and you issue debt for, but Hicksville Water District is a holdover from an earlier time and it has retained its power to borrow, so that's why they're here this morning and if you'd like details on what kind of water improvements are going to be funded with the new money bonds, we do have the engineer from the Hicksville Water District here as well, but, generally speaking, it's improvements to the water system that will allow us to provide cleaner water than is possible now because it will have enhanced ability to remove volatile organic

14 compounds and also offer up other improvements to 1 2 service. 3 But we do have another spokesperson if 4 you'd like as well. 5 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Well, let's ask our Board members if they have any other questions 6 7 for you. 8 Does anyone? 9 (No verbal response given.) 2 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Our second 1 2 hearing, would Town Clerk Altadonna, please call 3 our second hearing? 4 MR. ALTADONNA: To consider a petition from the Hicksville Water District for 5 authorization to issue up \$21,445,000.00, the 6 7 District's 2017 Capital Program. 8 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Mr. Darienzo, 9 would you step forth, please, and give us your name and position, please? 10 11 MR. DARIENZO: Rob Darienzo, Director 12 of Finance. 13 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: For the Town of 14 Oyster Bay. 15 MR. DARIENZO: For the Town of Oyster 16 Вау. 17 The purpose of this second public 18 hearing -- the first public hearing was for the refunding, or more commonly used term, the 19 20 refinancing of existing debt. 2.1 This public hearing is for permission 22 for them to issue new bonds for new capital 23 improvements/projects. 24 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And the same 25 applies, by State Law, they're mandated to come

before us for a vote in order to issue these bonds? 1 2 MR. DARIENZO: Everything that was stated previously applies here as well, yes. 3 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: The difference is 4 5 that on the previous hearing, they came --Hicksville Water District came to us for the 6 7 permission to reissue bonds, we assume at a lower 8 rate? 9 MR. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Rich, would you 6 7 start off by stating your presence, please? 8 MR. HUMANN: Sure. 9 Richard Humann, CEO, H2M Architects and 10 Engineers. 11 A pleasure to be in front of the Town 12 Board and Supervisor Saladino and the rest of the 13 Board. Happy Holidays. 14 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Happy Holidays to 15 you, too. 16 MR. HUMANN: So H2M has been 17 representing the Hicksville Water District since 18 the 1950s. Hicksville has been always committed to 19 providing drinking water at the highest quality and 20 continuing to invest in its infrastructure. So the 2.1 capital program that they are embarking on with 22 this bond financing includes several major projects 23 for them. 24 I'll briefly describe the projects and

clearly any questions that the Board might have,

please feel free.

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So one of the projects, Hicksville has an existing treatment system at their plant No. 1 site on Bethpage Road over by Sears. They've been treating for volatile organic removal since 1982. The plant needs to be upgraded so there's a major project in there to do upgrades for a facility that is approaching 40 years old.

Another project that the District is going to be including is a treatment system at their plant No. 4 on the Newbridge across from Holy Trinity. It is a site that's dealing with one of the emerging contaminates that were part of the EPA unregulated contaminate monitoring program.

Emergent contaminants are a significant issue.

Nationally, they are also an issue for us locally and Hicksville is looking to put in some advanced treatment systems, deal with some emergent contaminants.

At their main office, plant No. 8, they've also been treating for volatile organic contaminants for the past 25 years. Concentrations have been increasing at that location and they need treatment improvements there. Their sites over by the Long Island Railroad Station on Barclay Street

2.1

is Plant No. 10 which has also started to detect some volatile organics at that location.

Unfortunately, when you, you know, live on top of your water, a lot of the past uses and industrial uses eventually affect water quality, so a site that had never had treatment on it since its inception requires treatment now.

And the District also for the last four years hasn't embarked on a water main replacement program. Now, you know, the District has been, you know, developed for the past 95 years. Water mains in areas that they get frequent breaks, it's very expensive to fix the breaks so they have a plan program to now go in and replace ageing infrastructure water mains so that, you know, their care and capacity can be improved, their fire protection capacity can be improved, something that Hicksville has continuously done so at the high level, basically those are the projects that are included in this bond.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Just a couple of questions and I know the kinds of questions I hear over and over, you and I have been working on water issues and providing clean water for many years together.

7 1 So the questions that we hear over and 2 over again, and we'll just -- I ask you to answer 3 the question as it relates to the water being 4 pumped by the Hicksville Water District. 5 MR. HUMANN: Sure. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Is the water safe 6 7 to drink and what is its quality? 8 MR. HUMANN: It's absolutely safe to 9 drink and it's -- I put its quality up against any 10 water quality in the country. 11 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: As one of the 12 best and safest? 13 MR. HUMANN: It's excellent, excellent 14 water quality. 15 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: By issuing these 16 bonds to allow for the update and maintenance of 17 the system, does that add to continuing the quality 18 of the water, does it add to keeping the infrastructure needed to deliver water to the 19 20 residents, updated and working properly? 2.1 MR. HUMANN: Absolutely. 22 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Is there anyone 23 else who has a question? 2.4 COUNCILMAN HAND: Rich, real quick, is 25 there any litigation pending for principal

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the District because they do a fantastic job in providing quality drinking water to the residents at a low cost, and they're always up there maintaining the system and upgrading the system, so I compliment them on that.

I support the Bond Resolution. I'm glad to hear that my main questions was on, what are the capital projects that were being proposed and I was pleased to hear that, you know, they presented those projects. The one real concern is that it's District 4, well, 4 over there on Newbridge Road.

They mention that they're going to be putting a treatment system in there and I believe, you know, I would ask, is that for the 1,4-Dioxane that's been that's detected in that area? What's the capital cost associated with that? What's the operating cost? What type of treatment is there? And has the District been able to track down the source of the 1,4-Dioxane? Thank you.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: We will get you those answers if you'd kindly take a seat, Paul.

Rich Humann, would you please come on back up, state your presence and answer these questions, which I know you have the background,

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the resume, and the tremendous experience to be able to do?

MR. HUMANN: Richard Humann, CEO, H2M Architects and Engineers.

So, yeah, the plant 4 Project, again,

Plant 4 is sited across from Holy Trinity High

School on Newbridge Road. 1,4-Dioxane was detected

as part of the EPA sampling program so this project

is going to address treatment for 1,4-Dioxane.

There's currently no specific drinking water standard. 1,4-Dioxane is included in the New York State Sanitary Code as an unspecified organic contaminant so it has a drinking water standard of 50 micrograms per liter. The well does not exceed that standard; however, it has detected 1,4-Dioxane at concentrations of 33 micrograms per liter.

With a lot of the uncertainty about what that means, the District had proactively removed that well from service, really, a few years ago, so the well has been inactive. It's needed.

The well is needed for fire protection and for water pressure purposes within the distribution system. So, yes, there's treatment for 1,4-Dioxane, as well as improving the treatment

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system that exists for other VOCs.

with the DEC to try to obtain information with some potential sites that are upgrading of that so there is some active investigating that is going on. We have not determined the source. We do know that there is a VOC plume that affects that site and 1,4-Dioxane is commonly found with plumes that include a compound called trichloroethane.

So trichloroethane does affect that site. They've been treating for that for twenty years so now 1,4-Dioxane, it's not a surprise that we have it, we just, you know, wish it wasn't at the levels it was at and force us to have to treat. So as opposed to waiting for New York State or the Federal Government to set a standard, Hicksville is being proactive and they're going to be pursuing treatment.

The treatment process is likely going to be advanced oxidation. It's process where you oxidize the compounds, you break it down, you put through a UV reactor and you basically destroy the compound. There's pilot testing that needs to be performed that Hicksville is going to perform as part of this project.

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And out of the pilot testing, the most effective, there is UV emittance, there's oxidation. You, kind of, come up with the right formula in order to optimize treatment, and out of that, you also will determine what the operating costs will be.

We know that it is going to be energy intensive. That process is energy intensive so I would probably reserve what I think the O&M costs are going to be until we do pilots. That's really where the number's going to come out.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: For the purposes of the folks in the room, those watching, the general public, most people are not as technical as you are, an engineer, one of the nation's leading authorities on this issue. But so people understand, when it comes to 1,4-Dioxane, the State and the Federal Government have not yet set standards in law on this but we know that's coming from the meetings we've held with the DEC and the public information that they've put forth.

So the Hicksville Water Department wants to get out in the front of the curve to deal with this and the other VOCs, or volatile organic contaminants, that we know are being dealt with.

13 And finally, my last question was where 1 2 I started, which is so important in terms of 3 reassuring the public, is the water at the tap in Hicksville safe to drink? 4 5 MR. HUMANN: Absolutely safe to drink. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Will this 6 7 expenditure continue to upgrade and maintain the 8 system so that the residents of Hicksville can be 9 assured that they and their family are their children are drinking safe water at the tap? 10 11 MR. HUMANN: Yes. 12 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you. 13 Does anyone have any other questions. 14 (No verbal response given.) 15 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Okay. We are 16 going to ask if -- we have someone else from the 17 public would like to be heard on this issue, Larry 18 Sklar. 19 MR. They have been helping with all the issues that were going on when our plume was a major concern over by Cantiague Rock Road and then moving down and all the other things that they've done and then up until -- you were there not so long ago when they dedicated the other plant to Nick Brigandi.

And our Water District is doing a fabulous job. We really appreciate their efforts. In hearing about this stuff today, just I thought I'd take an extra opportunity and just compliment them because we are, in the public, extremely satisfied with what they're doing. That anything that they would come before the Town to ask for help with, we'd want them to get it, and that's the end of that tune.

2 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Will the Town 1 2 Clerk call the third hearing? 3 MR. ALTADONNA: Hearing Local Law to 4 consider a Local Law entitled, a Local Law to Amend 5 the Code of the Town of Oyster Bay, New York, Chapter 96 - Dangerous Buildings to add sections 6 7 and provisions addressing vacant and abandoned 8 buildings. 9 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Before they 10 leave, I'd like to thank everyone associated with 11 the Hicksville Water District for the very 12 dedicated work that you all do in protecting our 13 most precious resource. 14 Thank you to all of you. 15 Okay. We have a presenter, yes. 16 Please step forward and state your 17 presence. 18 MR. PRESTON: Thank you. 19 Good morning, Supervisor. Good 20 morning, Board. 2.1 My name is Andrew Preston. I'm 22 attorney at the law firm, Bee, Ready, Fishbein, 23 Hatter & Donovan. We're located at 170 Old Country 24 Road in Mineola. 25 My firm was retained through grant

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funds provided by the State Attorney General's

Office that result from the New York State

Abandoned Property Neighborhood Relief Act of 2017.

That State Law resulted in the State Attorney

General's Initiative called the Zombie and Vacant

Properties Remediation and Prevention Initiative.

As part of that State initiative, the Town was recently awarded approximately \$350,000 in State grant monies. A portion of those monies were put aside for the retainer of special counsel, which is my firm. I give that as background to first say, thank you to the Town for retaining us, and also to let those present know that the funds expended in retaining my firm are revenue neutral to the Town's budget.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: But the clock is ticking so we want to get right to the presentation.

MR. PRESTON: The proposed amendment is to Chapter 96 of the Town Code.

When my office performed a review of the Town Code to figure out how to better strengthen it to assist the Town in aiding the blight of abandoned properties, we note that Chapter 96 already provides a mechanism for the

Town to do so.

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What this amendment does is streamline and strengthen the procedures which are already in place in the current Town Code, so to give a brief overview of the proposed changes, there are definitional requirements that have changed where boarding up is required of vacant properties.

Boarding must now be done under

Subsection 2 with clear polycarbonate boarding

rather than wooden boarding. There are further

definitional updates to what constitutes a survey

and how the Department of Planning and Development

is to deem a property vacant and abandoned.

There are further updates to provide gender neutral language, because it's a more modern update of the law than it last was, and Subsection 6, 7, and 8 are now modified to streamline notice and service requirements of homeowners.

Finally, Subsections 10, 12, and 13 contain slight modifications to the hearing procedure and who performs that hearing. The -- there are two completely new sections to the Code. Those are Subsections 23 and 24. While they are two separate sections, they're corollary sections. One applies to residential property; the other to

2.1

commercial property. Each of these sections imposes an affirmative obligation upon any person or entity maintaining a foreclosure against a vacant property in the Town by way of requiring that a bond be posted so that the property may be maintained pending that foreclosure.

These two sections expand upon the Statewide Neighborhood Relief Act as evidenced in RPAPL 1308, 1309, and 1310, by expanding the obligations to include properties that don't have standard first line mortgages from large banks. It expands upon the protections available to the Town.

I'm available to answer any questions the Board may have.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Will this Code, if enacted as presented, provide us the teeth to move forward on properties that we have been unable to remediate prior?

MR. PRESTON: Yes, it will.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: We have many residents here with us today who recognize and have continued to alert us to homes and properties in their neighborhood which are unsightly, which are dangerous, which greatly and negatively affect the quality of life in their community.

6 If this is passed, will this help the 1 2 Town of Oyster Bay to better protect these 3 residents in their particular situations with houses that we are not able to take down based on 4 5 safety the issue that we've utilized to take down other houses and properties in other places in the 6 Town? 7 8 MR. For the last ten, twelve 20 years, VFW of Hicksville started off getting 2.1 \$1,500. It's grown to \$4,000. 22 In their statement, it says they feed 23 meals to veterans. They changed it around when I 24 started asking questions. They're feeding meals is

buying a pot of coffee and getting six rolls from

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Francesca and serving it to whoever walks in there any day of the week. They say they do things at the hospital. They go there once a month and play a game and give out \$30.00.

You, yourself, know and have seen many, many times, if you go into Massapequa the month of May, you got VFW Massapequa Park, 90-year-old guy sitting on a corner, is raising money, and they do great work at my organization. We just did our -- for the 25th year, we just did our last luncheon at the BK Sweeney's for Veterans.

Prior to two years ago, we used to do

400 meals, Meals on Wheels program on Thanksgiving

Day, were volunteers that we delivered to everybody

that lived in the Town of Oyster Bay that needed a

meal. They're getting this money. They don't

deserve it. I'm going to ask this Board not to

vote on it and investigate it.

\$4,000 grant should be broken up to four different veterans organizations. We have a 170 veterans organizations in the Town of Oyster Bay. Why should they get all the money? It's a block grant. Block grant is supposed to go for causes in the community and they do not do them for causes. That, we do.

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Now, you want to ask the question why are they getting all this money? A certain club met there for many years. Now, this club isn't even happy with them. They are getting out. Okay. Somebody that sat on this Board for 15 years was the head of that club.

Is it political? No.

I was told here ten years ago, forget about that grant. How much do you need for your Thanksgiving dinner. Somebody showed up every year with a check from this Town from different groups but, unfortunately, the last two years, nobody showed up with a check and we can use some help.

So we feel that the Board should consider this \$4,000 and it should be shared with more than just one organization, being that it is a block grant coming from the Federal Government, just as all the other block grants.

Now, you look, the other organizations that are getting the money, all well deserved. From the Senior Citizen's Center here to the Hispanic Organization to all groups that do great work, but they take in a large, large body of people that they take care of.

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MR. BELL: In response to Mr. Sklar's comments, I'd like to point out that every year, the Town of Oyster Bay receives an allocation of Community Development Block Grant funds from Nassau County.

With these funds, one of the projects we'll put forth is that we fund public services, which, essentially, we give sub grants to community groups without our use of grant funds.

Now, for the purpose of arriving at how we provide these grants, we advertise a public notice around March of every year where public services are made aware of an opportunity to apply to us for funding.

So in response to Mr. Sklar's comments to this particular group, they submit an application for funds. We first vet it for eligibility. We, in turn, share with the County, who, in turn, shares it with the Federal Government and it -- we adhere to a proper procedure here where we post a legal notice, folks are encouraged to submit an application. We vet for eligibility. All payments to these come -- these public services, are reimbursement based so they'll document their expenditures, proof of payment,

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submit it to us. We, once again, vet for eligibility and make payment, so any grants made through this program are carefully verified.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Just so we can better inform the public as to the process and get to heart of the some of the statements made, and obviously, all the residents have the right to come up and speak to us and we are here to listen, but we also need to inform people of the facts so I want to ask you a few questions, and obviously, if the Board has questions as well.

MR. BELL: Certainly.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: We get requests from multiple veterans groups and multiple community groups, correct?

MR. BELL: Yes, we do.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And has it been your experience that the Town provides grant monies to other veteran organizations, other community organizations, these not-for-profits? Talk to us a little but about what requests we get and what we have continued to provide.

MR. BELL: Sure.

So with use of our Community

Development Block Grant, this year we will receive

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the \$1.1 million, and in short, it goes to three different functions. One is a residential rehab program where we perform work on residents, low to moderate income resident's homes for weatherization projects, handicapped accessibility projects.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Which is, by the way, an excellent program. So many residents take advantage of and we encourage all of our seniors and residents, those with disabilities, anyone eligible to please contact our Town, your department and the Town of Oyster Bay so we may get them into the program.

It's an excellent way to get a new roof, to get new windows, to provide bathroom and kitchen updates, wheelchair ramps for walkers and wheelchairs, better accessibility. The list goes on and on. I'm so thrilled, as are the Board members, to be working and providing these grants for our homeowners.

MR. BELL: Thank you, Supervisor.

We are very proud of the program.

So we do have the residential rehab program. We have a program which is called the Public Facility Improvement Program where we invest into streetscaping-type projects in low to moderate

income census tracks.

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And then we have our public services component, which we're speaking about earlier, where groups that can meet certain eligibility criteria, including catering to a low to moderate income population, may qualify for sub grants of our Community Development Block Grant funding.

So there is a process. I'd be happy to speak with Mr. Sklar and have a discussion about how you could apply in the future, but once again, all these people have applied, been carefully vetted, and all payments will be contingent upon a reimbursement where documentation is carefully reviewed.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: As per the rules and regulations of the programs?

MR. BELL: Absolutely.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Okay. So I'd like you, Mr. Bell, to please meet with Mr. Sklar, but I'd also, on behalf of the Board, we would like you to continue to work toward a plan and please bring a draft of that plan to my office so that we are ensuring that we're informing more veterans groups and reaching out to all the many groups that might be eligible for these block grants so that

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we're making sure that we make every effort to inform and to walk them through the process and assist them with the paperwork so we make it easier for every eligible group in the Town of Oyster Bay to utilize these grants wherever it is possible.

MR. SKLAR: Excuse me.

I made out applications for this block grant for years and I've never even got a nickel.

So, I don't know how you investigate or how you check that qualifies one organization in this whole Town of Oyster Bay with all these veterans organizations to get all this money.

That's what I don't understand.

Did you ever check with the hospital to see if they actually go there and do anything? Did you ever go there to see if they're actually serving meals?

MR. BELL: We --

MR. SKLAR: I mean, that's what it says that they do in the papers.

MR. BELL: There is a monitoring component to our public services where we do monitor these programs and we do visit these programs and ask for them to show us how they operate the programs that we provide funding for.

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SUPERVISOR SALADINO: So what I'd like you to do is after this meeting, is go over to sit with Mr. Sklar to give him more information about this, but also to work toward informing, immediately, all of the many organizations that could qualify for this program.

Are we providing these monies to other veterans groups besides this one?

MR. SKLAR: Absolutely not.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Sir, we're working very diligently to get you your information.

MR. BELL: They appear this year to be the only VFW organization that's applied and been deemed eligible this year is the VFW William Gouse. The remaining other programs are other public service natured programs.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Okay.

Well, let's work harder to be more inclusive of additional veterans organizations.

Let's work with the media to work with us to get the information out to everyone in a way that embraces all of our subgroups and our community groups. Let's work with direct contact with them via mail, phone calls, e-mails.

46 1 MR. BELL: Certainly. 2 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And let's work 3 with Public Information to ensure that we are 4 putting together a cohesive plan to ensure that 5 everyone gets information through mailings and other types of communications, our website and so 6 7 forth. 8 MR. BELL: That's a great suggestion, 9 Supervisor. I'll work closer with Public 10 11 Information. We'll develop an outreach plan. 12 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And I'd like you 13 to report back to my office with my staff so that 14 we can oversee -- we can see that plan, see your 15 suggestions, and ensure that it's the best plan to 16 be inclusive of as many veterans and community 17 service organizations that we possibly can get into 18 the plan. 19 MR. BELL: We will do that, yes. 20 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you very 2.1 much. 22 Any other speakers? 23 MR. ALTADONNA: You have Paul Molinari. 24 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Paul, yes, 25 please. I'm sorry, Paul.

48 to the community, especially when they've proposed 1 2 the change as Joel mentioned before, they went from 3 400 unit -- approximately 400 units to 600 units. 4 It's going to have a big impact in that area. I do have one quick -- a couple of questions. 5 Is Seritage doing the EIS and who's 6 7 their consultant and do they have a specific timeframe on that? 8 9 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: We will get you 10 an answer on that. 11 Commissioner, you have information on 12 this? 13 Get that for you immediately. 14 Commissioner, could you restate your 15 presence, please, for the record? COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: Commissioner 16 17 Leslie Maccarone, Department of Planning and 18 Development, Town of Oyster Bay. 19 The applicant's consultant is VHB, who 20 will be performing the environmental review 2.1 process. 22 MR. MOLINARI: They don't have any 23 specific timeframe? 24 COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: Not at this 25 moment because this was the first portion the Town

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had to enact the positive declaration, so at this point, I'm sure they are going to ramp up their process to now submit because this had to happen first before they can start submitting paperwork.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Paul, do you have any other questions?

MR. MOLINARI: On that, no, but that's, you know, very important because we want the Downtown Revitalization to move more quickly than them.

I urge the Town -- you know, the schedule for the deal, Downtown Revitalization, is for them to have a new vision, proposed projects by March, so I encourage the Town to move as quickly as possible on the rezoning for the downtown area and that takes precedent over the Sears property.

COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: And that will.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Okay. So there is the answer on that, and I can tell you as one of many people who has been regularly attending the public meetings, Councilman Macagnone has been absolutely wonderful and very connected to this project in terms of its stewardship, as well as Councilwoman Rebecca Alesia and the whole Town Board.

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This is a very exciting feather in the cap of the Town, its leadership, but most importantly, the residents. And as you know, these meetings are held to get the residents' input.

They've been almost -- almost weekly in terms of participation and we thank you for your participation so the -- what some might perceive as slowing down the process, could also be seen as ensuring that we get the full compliment of the public's input on this with many opportunities for the public to learn, to be heard, and to continue in the process.

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Supervisor, just two things.

First of all, slowing down the process, since you got involved and had helped with the third track and helping with this, the process is moving -- I'm looking at Commissioner McCaffrey, quicker than ever expected.

And second of all --

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you.

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: -- Commissioner

Maccarone, could we do a -- perhaps suspend any

projects until this committee can get the

25 recommendation out in Hicksville?

51 1 COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: Well, that 2 would be up to the Board to enact a more 3 moratorium. 4 We cannot, Planning and Development, 5 cannot just stall a project unless there's an order from the Town Board. 6 7 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Supervisor, I 8 thinks perhaps we have the Town Attorney look into 9 that? 10 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Yes. Let's look 11 into that and if you would report --12 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Thank you, 13 Commissioner. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: -- back so that 14 15 my staff and Councilman Macagnone any other of the 16 Town Board members would like to provide input, 17 let's take a look at the different options to 18 prioritize this process and to take into 19 consideration Mr. Molinari's input. 20 MR. MOLINARI: That's an excellent 2.1 idea, Councilman, and I would only encourage that 22 the Town move forward with it, and with an 23 amendment that if a project that comes in that is 24 similar to what the vision that has been proposed 25 for the downtown area, that those -- that that

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project would be allowed to proceed, so that's my
input on that.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you.

If I may just add one piece of input in the fact that while we are taking into consideration your views, the views of all residents, we don't want to get away from the fact that we've worked very hard to let the world know that we are encouraging people to come forward, invest in Hicksville, invest in Hicksville's downtown, that we would not be taking steps to discourage the public and private sectors investment in Hicksville and that the Town of Oyster Bay has now opened its doors to the public's input as well as those who want to come and invest in our Town.

MR. MOLINARI: Thank you.

I don't know how much time I still got left, but on the --

MR. ALTADONNA: We stopped the clock.

MR. MOLINARI: Oh, okay. Thank you.

On 889, the Inspector General Code,

back when you held a hearing on the Inspector

General Code, everyone supported the proposed Code

and the main concerns I heard, and by many

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accounts, the Board members and from the public, was on the qualifications for the Inspector General.

So, you know, in reading, you know, I didn't see, in going through the backup, I've read the Code, I had some concerns about changes to the Code, but I didn't see anything on what the Inspector General's qualifications would be because the last time when they held a hearing. It was being limited to an attorney.

Many people spoke to the Board members, said that should be opened up to more professions, et cetera, et cetera.

Now, as for the code itself, in my experience in working in the federal government and working -- working -- you know, reading rules and regulations and helping develop rules and regulations for different programs, when I see wording such like, subject to privilege, that is a very ambiguous and confusing term and, to me, when -- in the Federal Government, when we had some terms like that, you can drive a -- basically, a truck through it. There's a loophole.

So I don't understand why that wordings been put in and why several of the other changes

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that have been proposed in the Code cnd if possible, maybe you should table it and relook at these type of wordings and then vote on it at another meeting.

Thank you.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you, Paul.

I'd like to ask our Town Attorney to come forward so that we can shed some more light on this process.

MR. NOCELLA: Supervisor, Members of the Town Board.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Would you please state your presence?

MR. NOCELLA: Yes, of course.

Joseph Nocella, Town Attorney.

I understand Mr. Molinari's concerned with the idea of privilege but, in reality, a privilege is a very specific term of art in the legal world. It applies to confidences between attorney and a client. It really is not something that would allow for a door to open that you could drive a truck through.

I understand why it might appear that way to a layperson, but if anybody were to assert privilege on a particular matter, and it's

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necessary at all times to preserve privilege
because the legal system wouldn't function without
it, if you didn't preserve privilege, then the
system would literally fall apart because there
wouldn't be the free flow of exchange, the request
for information, the advice that could be given in
confidence without the privilege.

But the privilege is actually very narrow and it applies to the communications between client and attorney and it wouldn't allow for shielding of information from the Inspector General except in limited categories where they need to shield that information, the exchange of information in a privileged capacity, has to outweigh any other concerns.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: So if I may, just on that issue, would the public be correct to assume that we have added this aspect so that our legislation holds up to constitutional muster?

MR. NOCELLA: That is correct. That is correct.

The Inspector General -- in fact, if somebody asserted privilege falsely, the Inspector General, based upon the experience and qualifications, would know enough to challenge that

assertion.

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It can't be just asserted and then people walk away, but if we did not, as you just noted, can put in there, the protection for privileged material, we would be running afoul of constitutional protections.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And as the evolution of this process goes on, have we made changes to better reach the goals of this position?

MR. NOCELLA: Yes. In fact, we have.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Including opening it up so a wider array of professionals and experienced residents could apply for the job?

MR. NOCELLA: Yes. That is correct.

For example, I think it was pointed out that sometimes auditors who might not have a legal background are oftentimes in the best possible position and with the greatest amount of experience, or at least equivalent to an investigative attorney, to perform an Inspector General function, and that is one of the refinements in the law.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Well, as I stated earlier, the idea for this came from Albany. I was part of the team in the legislature that created

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the Inspector General for fraud abuse and waste of the Medicaid system and we continue to move to more closely mirror some of the language that was utilized to create that position statewide in that Inspector General and now coming here to the Town and working with my colleagues on the Board.

Not only did we feel this is a good idea to implement in the Town, but I'm very proud to say that we were the first on Long Island to fund the position through our budget and continue to move to break ground as the trailblazer in this initiative.

MR. NOCELLA: Yes. That's entirely correct.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Councilman?

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Mr. Nocella, so who's going to be attorney for the Inspector General?

MR. NOCELLA: Well, to the extent that the Inspector General does need legal advice, like all the departments, they have the option of coming to the Town Attorney's Office. If for some reason or other, the Inspector General perceives a conflict because -- for example, my office might have been directly involved in a procurement, then

58 they would notify us of the conflict and they would 1 2 be able to obtain outside counsel. 3 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Okay. Thank you. 4 5 Supervisor, I'm going to ask that we do table this. We're missing two Board members, and I 6 7 remember at the hearing, I asked that we not vote 8 on this until January, so if we could table this to 9 January 9th meeting, I'd appreciate it. 10 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Just looking at 11 the schedule on January 9th. 12 Well, it is certainly that is 13 structurally possible for us to do. 25 environmental review process here. As your

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departments have indicated, this Resolution today is just to basically tell us that we have to study the environmental impacts of what we're applying for and what we're proposing.

There will be a public scoping session. There will be a draft environmental impact study. They'll be public input. They'll be comments. They'll be a final environmental impact study, so that whole process, that lead time, can take a significant period of time, probably a lot longer than you're proposing for your downtown revitalization, so I'd just ask that you consider that in terms of how you move forward with the possibility of a moratorium because we will have a long process to go through and we're nowhere near breaking ground, public hearings, or anything like that, but we would like to be able to continue to move through that, what will be a lengthy process, and do all those studies and those reports and have them sent to the public and to the Town Board and, you know, work with the Town and the public to go through that process and just try and get closer to a point where we could have a public hearing in the future.

Other thing I would note, about a year

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before we even applied, we started having meetings with all of the civic associations in the area. We must have met six or seven times with the various civic associations. I continue a dialogue with the President of the Midland Civic Association and we do remain available for any future meetings with the civic associations.

Thank you. Appreciate the time to speak.
