2 1 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Ladies and 2 gentlemen, welcome to the Town Board meeting of June 6, 2017. 3 4 I'm going to bring up for the purposes 5 of our prayer, someone very important to our community. Pandit Shri, a respected priest 6 7 [inaudible] of Asamai Hindu Temple in Hicksville. 8 Asamai is a temple that strives to 9 educate and preserve traditional Hindu values. 10 It's located on East Barclay Street and this temple 11 provides religious and spiritual guidance to Afghan 12 Hindus on Long Island and especially throughout the 13 Town of Oyster Bay. 14 So, Panit Shri, if you would please 15 lead us in prayer. 16 All rise. 17 (Whereupon, a prayer was recited by 18 Panit Shri.) 19 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you very 20 much, respected priest of the Asamai Hindu Temple 21 in Hicksville. 22 Ladies and gentlemen, now for the 23 Pledge of Allegiance, we are very privileged to be 24 led by a firefighter, emergency responder, a true 25 hero, someone that has led and served our

3 1 community, is a member of the North Massapequa Fire 2 Department for seven decades, Ex-Chief Fred Penna. 3 Would you please step up to the podium. MR. PENNA: Thank you, Supervisor 4 5 Saladino. It's a pleasure to be here. 6 7 Hand salute. 8 (Whereupon, the Pledge of Allegiance was recited and led by Fred Penna.) 9 10 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you, sir. 11 It's important that we continue to 12 honor those who serve our community, especially in 13 this case as a volunteer. 14 Seven decades Ex-Chief Fred Penna has 15 been a member of the North Massapequa Fire 16 Department. He is celebrating his 70th year with 17 distinguished service with North Massapequa's Fire 18 Department. The only break in his volunteer fire 19 service was due to his service to our country with 2.0 the United States Army. 21 Ex-Chief Penna served as Captain of the 22 Hose and Engine Company No. 2 and ultimately 23 ascended to the prestigious rank of Chief of the 24 department. He's also served as Commissioner of 25 the North Massapequa Fire District where he ably

balanced the needs of the fire service with the needs of the taxpayers.

The Penna family has a long and distinguished record of service to the North Massapequa Fire department including his father, Henry Penna, Sr., who was Chief of Department in 1940. Also members of the fire department are his brothers, John, Henry, Eugene, and his son, Fred Penna, Jr., all members of this wonderful department.

It is the Town of Oyster Bay's distinct honor to recognize Ex-Chief Penna's seven decades of fire service and to join in commending and thanking him for a lifetime of responding when fellow citizens are in need, saving the lives, saving the property and protecting our community.

We are very proud of your service and we would like to join you for a photo to recognize all you have done as we get that message out to the entire -- all of the residents of the Town of Oyster Bay.

Chief, did you serve in the second World War?

MR. PENNA: No, sir. I did not.

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Because I know

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5 1 today is the 73rd anniversary of D-Day. I want to 2 thank you for our service to our nation and I hope 3 our residents remember that 73 years ago, our 4 troops stormed the beach over in Normandy and a lot 5 of great, great people were lost. 6 MR. PENNA: Thank you, sir. 7 I wasn't in the second World War. 8 was in during the Korean War and --9 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Thank you for 10 your service, Chief. 11 (Applause.) 12 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: We will be 13 presenting a Town citation at the installation and 14 we'll be proud to have him back here. 15 (Applause.) 16 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: The Chief and his 17 lovely bride have been married for 64 years. 18 (Applause.) 19 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: There's a lot of 2.0 things going on in the Town of Oyster Bay to report 21 to you. 22 We'd be here all day if we reported 23 everything that we're doingm but we've been 24 reporting that on Facebook and multitude of 25 different ways including the May Eagle Scout

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ceremonies that the Board has joined me with over the weekend.

It's been a wonderful weekend of respecting and recognizing the heroes in our community and we're here to recognize another group of heroes in our community and the Oyster Bay Town Board takes great pride in it as we kick off the popular One Town, One Book, Oyster Bay Reads Summer Reading Project.

The One Town, One Book program now in its sixth year in the Town of Oyster Bay is the initiative of Oyster Bay Town Councilwoman Rebecca Alesia. Thank you for this wonderful program that you brought to the Town.

The program is a national movement that seeks to challenge communities to read the same book or books within a theme and discuss reaction with friends and family. The goal is to promote literacy while creating a great sense of community within our Town.

The Town is very excited to join with our local library directors who are here this morning and presenting details of the 2017 program.

And I turn the floor over to the wonderful person who has initiated this program and is making it

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better and better each and every year, looking out for our children and do increase literacy in the Town of Oyster Bay, Councilwoman Alesia.

COUNCILWOMAN ALESIA: Thank you so much, Supervisor.

This is probably my favorite day of the year in Town Hall. We've been doing this program, as you said, for six years, and every year in June, we do announce the theme, and this year I'm excited to say that the 2017 program's theme will be "Building a Better World."

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SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Very important information to every resident, to every taxpayer, and information that we are very proud of and quite important to announce is the outcome of a recent case in court.

In July of 2016, Phoenix Variable Life Insurance Company sued the Town of Oyster Bay in an effort to recover money that a prior concessionaire borrowed from that company.

Phoenix argued that the Town guaranteed repayment of the approximately \$7.8 million loan.

The Town vigorously and most appropriately opposed Phoenix claims for multiple reasons.

First, the Town Board never approved the supposed guarantee; second, that supposed guarantee was not even properly signed; and third, that guarantee, even if it was properly signed, violates the New York State Constitution that municipalities may not lend their credit on behalf of private entities.

In other words, the supposed guarantee was bogus and simply not legitimate. Last week,

Federal Judge Sandra Feuerstein of the United

States District Court dismissed the suit with

prejudice, ruling that the Oyster Bay Town Board

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did not authorize or ratify the loan guarantees and in her 43-page decision stated that the Town of Oyster Bay was a victim in this situation.

Understand that this decision is monumental. It's a win for the taxpayers, it is a win for the Town's reputation and it lays the initial groundwork for the Town to be victorious in court in recovering the costs the Town forced to incur as it relates to this conspiracy against the Town and its residents.

This, ladies and gentlemen, is a watershed moment and very, very important in terms of the Town's reputation, the Town's ability to recover, and as I said, the judge stated, in her decision, that the Town was the victim.

He's been 25 reviewing the proposed ordinance and suggested to

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us, in fact, making some modifications and revisions to the initial draft of the ordinance that we've noticed this public hearing for.

And so as to allow the attorney to make all the changes and edits that he feels are appropriate under the governing law, and most importantly to allow the residents a full and fair opportunity to review the draft law, we request that the Town Board adjourn this hearing to the next Town Board meeting, June 20, 2017 at 10:00 a.m.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: For the purposes of public information, can you briefly state what our motivation is in adopting these new amendments?

MR. ROZEA: Simply stated, Supervisor, it's to restore under the under -- under the Federal Telecommunications Act, the fullest extent of the Town's zoning powers to regulate the placement and installation of any type of telecommunications facility including the small cell repeaters that we've seen popping up throughout the Town.

MR. ROZEA: Being that the Board is adjourning the hearing, I think it would more proper that the comments be heard for the purposes of the ordinance at the June 20th meeting.

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: But if they are going to speak about it, we should reopen this hearing so it will be on record, correct?

MR. ROZEA: They can certainly go on record, yes, but it will be without the benefit of the ordinance.

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: True. We will get their thoughts in and their words and it will be part of the record, but the hearing then will be continued on the 20th then.

11 1 ALL: "Aye." 2 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Opposed, "Nay." 3 The "Ayes" have it. 4 Our hearing is reopened and our first 5 speakers are Marlene and Elliot Wald. How are you today? 6 Hi. 7 MS. WALD: Good morning. 8 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Would you please 9 state your name and address for the record? 10 MS. WALD: Okay. 11 Marlene and Elliot Wald, 15 Pine Drive, 12 Woodbury. 1.3 Supervisor Saladino, Councilwoman and 14 Councilmen, we've lived in Woodbury for 15 thirty years. During this time, we have assumed 16 the Town officials have looked at, for our family's 17 well being and best interests. However, we now 18 have a mini cell tower repeater, I'm still not 19 exactly sure what it is, on our front lawn. 2.0 was no warning this was coming and no one explained 21 what it was, why it's there, is it working, who 22 owns it. We don't know anything. 23 This is potentially harmful and I have 24 some readings to give you and it doesn't belong in 25 a residential neighborhood. We have families, all

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different ages, people getting pregnant. This technology is too new to have long-term conclusive studies done about it. And there may be safe limits set by the government, and I'm sure we're going to hear about that from the companies who are putting these things in our neighborhood, but if we just look back to 9/11 and remember the government said it was perfectly safe to go there.

Are we going to wait for people to get sick? It's too late for that. These have to go and that's why we're here. And I think I speak for everyone in our community that, you know, we really appreciate that you support us and I know it's going to be hard because they're there now, but they really have to go.

I'm asking, please, get these off our properties, out of our neighborhood.

COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: One way or another, your homes are not the right place for these things. They don't belong in your neighborhood.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: We share your sentiment. We share your outrage and we are working diligently. We, at a previous Town Board meeting, we hired a firm who is one of the experts

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at this to help in this process. We alerted the public through the media. I believe a member of the media is here and multiple members are here now, at press conferences, here in public meetings, over and over on Facebook, on the Internet, we've continued to be very adamant about our position to respect your feelings on this and to support your initiatives.

So we're working on this as we've stated in the past, this is -- we are mandated by federal law, we have contacted our federal representatives, our federal senators asking them to change the law to give the Towns and Villages the right to decide where they go and to initiate and pay for a new study that studies the modern technologies, not to go with a study that was concluded prior to '96.

So all the issues you have brought forth are greatly appreciated. We concur and we have been voicing that with a very loud voice.

MS. WALD: Does anyone know if these are currently working?

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Some of them are on.

MS. WALD: How do we know?

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SUPERVISOR SALADINO: We've been -- let's get that answer for you.

Matt, could you give us an update on this to answer the questions of the residents?

MR. ROZEA: You're correct, Supervisor, some of the sites are active. Others have not been energized.

We've constructed -- requested of certainly of Crown Castle, the vendor whose been installing these sites to hold off on doing any other work until we've had a chance to fully review what's taking place, what we contemplate doing with respect to our ordinance that we'll be hearing on the June 20th meeting and then to sit down and listen to us and ask -- respect our wishes and the wishes of the residents with respect to these sites and where they're being located.

So the short answer is some are energized, some are not, but for the moment, they're not doing any other work as far as we're aware.

MS. WALD: How do we find out if one is working, energized? How do we know?

 $$\operatorname{MR.}$$ ROZEA: We will attempt to get the list of energized sites.

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I would also recommend, or suggest, that you can reach out to Crown Castle yourself. They are a company located on Long Island and they will be responsive if you reach out to them. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: So the answer is we will provide you with information and would you provide this family with the contact, phone numbers and e-mail address so they too can reach out to them. And we're continuing to work towards strengthening our position to get these moved and away from homes. COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Excuse me, Supervisor, can we put Crown Castle's information on the website so residents can easily obtain it and contact them? SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Certainly. COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Thank you, sir. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thanks. Thank you for being here with us and you will see continued progress on this issue. The next speaker on this issue is Robert Shallow. MR. SHALLOW: My name is Robert Shallow, 14 Elm Street, Woodbury.

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I want to thank the Supervisor and the Council persons for your support. It's very important that these be removed from the residences where they were placed. As the previous speaker said, we were given no notice. All of a sudden these ugly towers are in front of our homes. They are eyesores and they certainly hurt the value of our properties. Your support is greatly appreciated.

Thank you.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: We concur with you, sir. Thank you for being with us today.

The next speaker is Kevin Chan.

MR. CHAN: Thank you, Town.

Kevin Chan 12 Elm Street, Woodbury.

These -- these cell phone towers are considerably lighter in color than any other utility poles and they're not concealed in the trees like any other -- any of the other utility poles.

Aesthetically, they're obtrusive and they will definitely negatively affect property values because no one wants to see a really light cell phone tower in the middle of the yard.

Thank you.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you.

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17 1 We concur. I am looking for anyone 2 else who put in something on these towers. 3 Looks like Mr. McKenna. MR. RIPP: I put a slip in also, sir. 4 5 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Okay. Mr. McKenna? 6 7 MR. McKENNA: Good morning, Town Board. 8 Kevin McKenna, 3 Edna Drive, Syosset, New York. 9 10 I just want to add, in prior meetings, 11 you had made statements that -- that you had 12 rescinded permits for various towers. 1.3 I would ask that copies of the 14 documentation that you sent rescinding this be also 15 posted on the Town's website. You do have a link 16 for the wireless; although, nothing has been 17 updated for many, many weeks on there. 18 I think it would be helpful to see the 19 documents where you rescinded and I was curious to 2.0 know whether or not you can comment on what the 21 response was from whoever you sent the letters to 22 on the -- on the rescinded request. 23 Did that change anything since you've 24 done that, and also, I'd be curious to know any 25 responses that you've got regarding letters that

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you say you've sent to the federal government, to the governor, whoever, whoever it is you've sent, and whatever you can comment on that would be appreciated.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Mr. Rozea -- I'm sorry, Town Attorney, join us.

MR. ROZEA: Supervisor, the -- per your instructions, I spoke general counsel at Crown Castle and told them that the permits were revoked.

The following day, we retained outside counsel who's handling the matter on a going forward basis. There is nothing in writing there and there was no response from Crown Castle.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you.

Are there any other speakers on this issue? Yes?

MR. SKLAR: Good morning, Supervisor and Town Board.

I'm very disillusioned with this
business with these antennaes. I remember going
back about eleven years ago, a couple of companies
wanted to put up a 11 antennaes and they needed the
Town's approval and a former attorney for the Town,
Jacquemimi had said that if the Town voted against
them putting up these in antennaes, the federal

19 1 government says they can put them up any place they 2 wanted to without the Town's approval. 3 So until a federal law changes, I don't know why we're going through all these motions. 4 5 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: The answer to that is because we have engaged with a law firm 6 7 who's an expert at this. They are ensuring that we 8 write the legislation in a way that gives the Town 9 the best leverage to control --10 MR. SKLAR: Excuse me, you said they're 11 experts. 12 If we don't get the approval, do we 13 have to still pay them? 14 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: If we don't get 15 what approval? It is not about an approval. 16 We will pass the best legislation in place and then begin the process with the carriers. 17 18 MR. SKLAR: That's a federal 19 legislation? 2.0 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: No. 21 We are in control of the Town 22 legislation and we will ask our federal senators to 23 change the federal legislation. Hopefully, they 24 will respond. Hopefully, they will responsive to 25 the public. Senator Schumer and Senator

20 1 Gillibrand, even if they are not or if they are 2 unable to change the federal law, we are increasing 3 our leverage, our ability to control this situation in every means possible. The Town Board made a 4 5 commitment to the residents and we will keep that. MR. SKLAR: How do we control it when 6 7 the federal law says --8 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: I'll make it 9 easy. Maybe we can make it quick. 10 We're going to fight something that's 11 wrong that our residents feel is against their 12 health to the best of our ability. If it's wrong, 1.3 if the Senate -- if the United States government is 14 wrong in this, we are going to fight and, 15 hopefully, we get this changed. But we're going to 16 fight until we're told we can't fight any longer. 17 That's why we are fighting, that's why we're 18 spending the money, for the safety and health of 19 our residents. 2.0 MR. SKLAR: Well, according to our 21 federal government, they still say. 22 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: They're wrong. 23 They're wrong, okay. MR. SKLAR: 24 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: And we are going

to fight them until they see that we're right.

21 1 MR. SKLAR: Okay. 2 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: And I applaud 3 the Supervisor in his efforts. 4 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you. Thank 5 you. (Applause.) 6 7 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Are there any 8 other speakers on this issue? Yes? 9 Please step forward and state your name 10 and address. 11 MR. RIPP: My name is Robert Ripp. 12 live at 77 Sunset Road in Massapequa, New York. 1.3 I've been trying to follow along with 14 the past litigation history with regards to the 15 cell phone tower issues and I found a number of 16 actions where the Town was named as a defendant, but I wanted to ask Mr. Saladino -- I notice he is 17 18 leaving -- he had mentioned a couple of times that 19 the Town was the plaintiff in a number of actions 2.0 and I just want to make sure that I'm reviewing 21 everything that's available. So if he gets a 22 chance, I'd like him to identify what legal actions 23 the Town's instigated in any of these cell phone 24 matters. 25 I'd also like to bring to your

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attention, in 1999, there was a ruling against the Town. It looks like the same exact predicament.

It's Cellular Telephone Company vervus
Town of Oyster Bay, which Cellular Telephone is
AT&T. If you haven't read it, I really suggest you
do because the Town did everything that they could
do, like you're doing everything that you can do,
and they had a hearing, and when you read the
decision, it seems, in my opinion, and I might be
wrong but when you read it and you can confirm, but
it seems like the Town, like, the attention was
more placed on the possible scientific data of
health and not enough on aesthetics.

When you read the decision, it seems that if more people would have come up -- the judge's decision reads that they didn't feel that the aesthetic argument was strong enough because not enough residents mentioned it. Most residents spoke about the possibly medical side effects, whatever. I really suggest that you read it. It's Cellular Telephone Company versus the Town of Oyster Bay, 1999, and I think it might help us to build a strong case this time.

Thank you.

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Thank you.

23 1 (Applause.) 2 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Yes, sir. 3 Would you step forward please? MR. CHAREN: Good morning. 4 5 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Good morning. Could you please state your name and 6 7 address? MR. CHAREN: Dr. Jacob Charen, 107. 8 9 Cypress Drive, Woodbury, New York 11797. 10 The international agency for research 11 on cancer has classified RF fields as possibly 12 carcinogenic to all humans. Very few human studies 1.3 have focused specifically on cellular phone towers 14 and cancer risk. 15 RF radiation emissions, according to 16 the World Health Organization, are now categorized 17 as recognized possible carcinogens. Antennaes 18 should not be placed in residential neighborhoods. 19 The FCC should study the health effects of 2.0 antennaes. The company, Crown Castle, who 21 installed the poles and equipment in Woodbury 22 should remove all cell equipment. Current cell 23 phone antennaes and equipment should be moved to 24 more appropriate commercial locations away from our 25 homes and children.

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Please move them immediately for possible future health issues for our children and ourselves.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you.

MR. CHAREN: Also, as I was reading, I noticed that the cell towers do not go ground level. They go horizontal and upwards.

The thing is, I know -- I'm in a colonial. My windows are right in front of me and I'm on the second floor doing my work, so it's going straight at me. The only thing protecting me is a glass window and my skin.

So I question, you know, if you're a ranch, maybe not, but if you're a colonial or higher, those horizontal beams are coming straight at you.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: So it sounds like you're 100 percent in support of the actions we are taking?

MR. CHAREN: Oh, 100 percent, for my children, grandchildren and -- you know, I remember the Buster Brown shoes with the fluoroscope coming up. I was around then and the kids would get on there and, you know, you'd do the size of the shoe

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and that fluoroscope was going right into the gonads and that was done in storefronts. Okay.

Fluoroscopes, this, I've seen so many things over the years of oh, this is safe, this is safe, and over the long run, it's not. It is just safer to be protected, and as far as I'm concerned, those towers should be shut off now, not later, and then, put back on if, you know, the judges believe so.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Sir, your statements are in lockstep with what we on the Town Board have been saying all along. The Town has already sued in the past on this issue. We will continue to go to court. We will take every step that we can legally take in terms of shutting these down, moving them out of residential areas. We have already worked with -- we are already working with one of the best law firms to be give us the best advantage in court and every other process and you can be rest assured that we are in lockstep with you and it sounds like you're in full support of us and the steps we're taking to take to protect you, your family and your community.

MR. CHAREN: Thank you very much for representing the people.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you.

26 1 God bless you. 2 (Applause.) 3 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: If there are no 4 other speakers on this issue -- yes, sir. 5 Did you speak on this already. MR. CHAN: Yeah, but can I go one more 6 7 time? 

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: We are exceptionally proud to be holding this hearing and working on this Resolution today and to describe this to the public, we have Matt Rozea of the Town Attorney's Office.

MR. ROZEA: Supervisor, It's very simple.

If you're boycotting American allies, we're not interested in doing business with you. Before the Town will enter into any type of contract for the provision of construction services, other services, or information technology services, the prospective vendor will have to provide a certification that they are not engaged in a boycott, as that term is defined in the ordinance, of any of our American allied nations, including, but without exception, the State of Israel, Ireland, and our NATO allies.

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SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you.

This is something very important to me personally and to so many of our Board Members and to so many of the members of the community. I was involved in legislation of this type in Albany statewide and it feels as though this is something that's very right to be doing in the Town of Oyster Bay.

Have you had input from the community?

MR. ROZEA: Well, that's what the public hearing is for. I've not received any personal input.

COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: Mr. Rozea, any company that is engaged in a boycott of the State of Israel should not be doing business with the Town of Oyster Bay, that's my input.

MR. ROZEA: That -- and that's what the law provides.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And for the record, I have met with a variety of community groups including those at the shuls including the one that Councilwoman Rebecca Alesia belongs to.

And the good people at these communities let us know that this is something that they're very in favor of, very much in favor of. As it relates to

4 all of these countries, including the State of 1 2 Israel. MR. ROZEA: Very good. And that's all 3 I have for the Board. 4 5 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Does anyone else have any other questions for Mr. Rozea? 6 7 Do we have public comment on this 8 issue? 9 MR. 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MR. ALTADONNA: It's Finance to consider the application of the Jericho Water District upon financing for improvements to said Water District.

We do have a speaker on that one, too.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you.

MR. INGHAM: Good morning, Supervisor Saladino, members of the Town Board.

My name is Mike Ingham. I'm a partner in the law firm of Carman, Callahan & Ingham, 266 Main Street, Farmingdale, New York.

And I'm here today to present the

Jericho Water District's bond application. I'm

proud to represent the Jericho Water District since

1986. It's been a long and great career with them

and I'm here to help them get this bond passed

today.

For the record, I have submitted as the requisite affidavit, conflict affidavit, disclosure affidavit as part of this bond application to the District -- to the Town, disclosing my relationship with my partnered requirements as required by the Town's ethics code.

With me here today on the bond petition are several individuals who will support and the

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developer for questioning on the bond hearing.

We have with us, Chairman Abbate. He was the Chairman of the District for quite a while. We also have with us Superintendent Peter Logan, who's been a long-term Superintendent at the District and I believe his career at the District spans 30 years. We also have with us our business manager, Kathleen Cannon, and she is here to answer any questions on the financial aspect of the bond. We also have with us from H2M, our engineer, Joe Todaro if there are any questions concerning specifics on the bond.

Commissioner Beckley is our new commissioner. She unfortunately had a prior commitment and she is now in Africa. Commissioner Rasmus also had a prior commitment and he cannot be here today.

So before we move on directly to the issue of the bond, which is to increase the funding levels or an authorization on the funding level for our weekly tank, I'd like, for the record, just to give you background about the District and about the tank itself.

The District was formed in 1922. The Jericho Water District provides water to

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approximately 20,000 services in an area of about 37 square miles. It is clearly the largest commissioner elected District in the State of New York. It serves a population of approximately 60,000 people.

We serve the Incorporated Villages of Brookville, all Brookville, Laurel Hollow and Muttontown, portions of the Villages of Matinecock and Upper Brookville, unincorporated areas of Syosset, Jericho, East Norwich, Woodbury, and unincorporated areas of Glen Head and Greenville.

The District has approximately 25 water supply wells with a total pumping capacity authorized by the New York State DC of nearly 15 million gallons per day.

The District's distribution system consists of 353 miles of water main and the District owns and maintains approximately 3,366 fire hydrants. Directly speaking to the weekly road tank, the weekly road tank is located in Brookville on a site of approximately five acres. The weekly road tank was constructed in 1924 and is a one million gallon riveted steel storage tank.

The District experiences rapidly dropping tank levels and pressure during peak hours

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of long hot, dry summer months. What this results in is that the tank, even at a million gallons, reduces pressure and can, on an unfortunately very dry day, reduce to almost no tank water in the tank so we have no pressure.

So the reason we're here is to make sure that that tank is enlarged from 1 million gallons to 1.5 million gallons, a 50 percent increase in the size of the tank. This should provide us with adequate pressure, not only for the Brookville area, but throughout the entire distribution system in our northwest quadrant.

We retained H2M as engineers through an RFP process and they were selected as qualified engineers to work on the design of this new tank. The tank is -- is, as I said, approximately 100 years old and we have had estimates from the engineers that to rehabilitate the tank at this stage of the game would cost about \$3.4 million. The last time it was rehabilitated was 1982.

At that time, we were not required by regulations to include lead paint on that tank. To do so today, per the engineer's estimate, cost about \$3.4 million. That would give us service life for another 15 years, which on a tank that

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old, makes absolutely no sense. We're going to be throwing money away. So we're here today because the first bond issued we had in 2010, plus the approximately \$4.2 million for the tank in 19 -- 2013, I'm sorry. We came back and requested another \$625,000 for the tank, but our engineer estimates say the tank is going to cost 10.5 and there's two main reasons that is occurred.

Over the past ten years, there have not been a lot of new tanks erected. The housing industry has been fairly stable and no new tanks have been created and that has resulted in consolidation in the industry to approximately two to three main contractors who are involved with this work. So costs have gone up, but more importantly, the scope of the project has changed as well.

We've moved, and lucky to have five acres to work with, we moved the tank to the middle of the five acres to be less intrusive on our neighbors. To do that, we had to relocate the water main, electrical cables and we've also changed the scope to add new electrical panels, electrical controls, and to include bulk storage for this tank, so that has increased the size of

7 1 the scope of the project and the costs. 2 So we're conservative in our estimate, 3 it's not to exceed amount, it does not have to get there but we want to be safe and conservative 4 5 because we need the money on hand if we need to expend those funds. We have to have funds on hand 6 7 before we can bid the project. 8 So if there are any questions, I'd be 9 happy to take them from the Board or any members of 10 the public. 11 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Anyone? 12 My first question is for the clarity of 13 the public, total amount you're borrowing, you're 14 asking for today? 15 MR. INGHAM: \$10,500,000. 16 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: \$10 million, 10.5? 17 18 MR. INGHAM: Right. 19 And our analysis by our business manager, Ms. Cannon, has indicated that over the 20 21 life of the bond, that will cost the average 22 homeowner in Jericho Water District \$20 year or 23 slightly over a nickel a day. 24 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: \$20 a year. 25 And for the clarity for the public,

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people are wondering why you're coming before the

Town of Oyster Bay to do this bonding as opposed to

doing it through Jericho itself?

MR. INGHAM: Jericho -- that's a relatively straightforward question.

Jericho does not have the power to issue bonds. The power to issue bonds for all Water Districts throughout the State was abolished in 1932.

In 1933, the residents of Jericho Water District voted to continue them on as an independent commission elected District, but the power to issue the bonds comes through the Town.

The Town pledges full faith and credit, but it is the taxpayers of the District who really pay the bonds and it is their full faith and credit to be able to pay those bonds, which is really the issue, and I can assure you that District will be able to do so.

We're kind of lucky at Jericho because in 2010, that was the first time we've ever taken out a bond issue since perhaps the establishment of the District.

We've been fortunate enough to have good guidance, especially by past Chairman Nicholas

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Bartiluccim and we've also been lucky to have pure water. So we have to do some treatment now, but we really haven't had the bond like other Water Districts had to do so.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And this is their first bond in how long?

MR. INGHAM: Well, the bond in 2010, we debated that. As long as -- Mr. Bartilucci was on the Board from 1967, there was no bond indebtedness then. So we believe the bond indebtedness really was only the beginning of the District, perhaps back in 1920s, maybe the '30s, those bonds are already paid off and there's no bond indebtedness in the District.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Okay.

And the purpose of this, these expenditures are to protect the public drinking water supply and to make sure that there is a volume suitable for the need of the community?

MR. INGHAM: Absolutely.

Because when we do run into significant water demand in the hot summer months, we believe this additional 500,000 in storage will keep pressure adequate enough to service not only Brookville, but the entire surrounding communities.

10 1 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And you'll be 2 changing the capacity from 1 million gallons to 3 1.5 million gallons upping it by 50 percent? 4 MR. INGHAM: Yes, Supervisor. 5 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And has the District looked at to ensure that this will be 6 7 sufficient for many years to come? 8 MR. INGHAM: We have. 9 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Okay. One last 10 question just for the clarity of the public. 11 This -- the taxpayers of the Town of 12 Oyster Bay on their tax bill will not be paying for 1.3 this, only those who utilize the Jericho Water 14 District? 15 MR. INGHAM: Absolutely correct. 16 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: On their portion of their taxes? 17 18 Absolutely correct, and MR. INGHAM: they pay that tax, they pay that bond through their 19 2.0 taxes. 21 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Separate from the 22 Town of Oyster Bay residents? 23 MR. INGHAM: And that money, our bond 24 indebtedness payments is withdrawn from the taxes 25 that you remit to us on our tax bill.

11 1 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you very 2 much. 3 Are there any other questions? 4 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: If I may. 5 Mr. Ingham, just to clarify, it is a State law that requires you to borrow this money 6 7 through us rather than on your own? 8 MR. INGHAM: Yes. We can't borrow on 9 our own, right. 10 COUNCILMAN HAND: Just a quick comment 11 in regards to the extra half a million gallons. 12 That's very important to fire services to maintain that? 1.3 14 MR. INGHAM: Absolutely. 15 Fire service requires a minimum of 25 16 pounds per square inch of pressure and if the tank 17 had gone -- gone to empty, we would not -- we'd be 18 hard pressed against that. 19 Now, that doesn't mean the distribution 20 system wouldn't support -- the support from the --21 from other tanks, but it's much safer to have that 22 extra capacity to keep the tank safe and to keep 23 the pressure adequate. 24 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you. 25 Are there any other questions?

12 1 We have questions from the public. 2 Would you come forward, please? 3 you state your name and address? 4 MS. SCHULTZ: Good morning, 5 Mr. Supervisor and Council Members. Laura Shutlz, 22 Barbara Drive, 6 7 Syosset. 8 I am President of Residents for a More 9 Beautiful Syosset. 10 I was not going to speak on this issue, 11 but in listening to the great presentation, a 12 question right -- came right up to my mind. 13 assume you are projecting out for future needs by 14 building this tank. Okay. Does this -- does this 15 projection --16 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: You could just 17 address your questions this way. 18 MS. SCHULTZ: Sure. Thank you. 19 Projecting out, if we're looking out, 20 does this projection include development on the Cerro wire site? 21 22 The Cerro wire site is a MR. INGHAM: 23 work in progress as the Town knows. This well will 24 not directly impact the Cerro wire site. It's a different section of the District. The District, 25

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in reviewing the Cerro Wire site, commissioned a water feasibility study through our engineers at a cost of \$89,000 which was paid for by Cerro Wire.

That water study was just completed.

It is part of the DEIS, and it looks like, from our preliminary analysis, that we will need to put in a new tank, an elevated water storage tank and a well to supply the Cerro Wire development.

I mean, it is the intention of the District to negotiate directly with Cerro Wire or the Simon Properties to have them pay their share of that tank and that well before any water is delivered to the Cerro Wire site.

COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: But this specific tank would not impact that site? It doesn't service --

MR. INGHAM: Tangentially, it services a different area of the -- of the District. We've got 25 wells, so we have -- we have wells all throughout the District is where -- it has 37 square miles, we have to, but the Cerro Wire area is removed from Brookville and the specific tank area.

Thank you.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you.

14 1 Mr. Frier? 2 MR. FRIER: Good morning. 3 Bob Frier, 33 Chestnut Lane, Woodbury. 4 Just a question. The gentleman 5 mentioned approximately \$10 a year per home in that -- in the Water District that gets served by 6 7 the Jericho Water District. I'm assuming he's did 8 some calculation based on a particular interest 9 rate that they were going to be borrowing on. 10 just curious what that interest rate would be. 11 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Fine. 12 Thank you. MR. INGHAM: It's blended. 13 14 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you. 15 MR. INGHAM: The first five years will 16 be under bond anticipation notes or bands. Those This is still an 17 currently at 2.5 percent. 18 outstanding time to borrow long range. That's 19 blended with a projection of 4.5 percent which may 2.0 be in existence, I think, in a few years from now. 21 It could well be 4.5 percent municipal bonds. 22 blended rate is 4 percent. That gives us \$20 per 23 year. The average homeowner was assessed at 24 \$500,000. 25 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you.

15 1 MR. RIPP: I signed up for a form. 2 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Yes. 3 The gentleman in the back, please. Good morning. 4 5 MR. PADILLA: Joseph Padilla, 4 Hawthorne Street, Farmingdale, New York. 6 7 I don't live in the area that is being 8 serviced, but I do represent painters that do live 9 in that -- in those areas. So being that their 10 bond is for prevailing wage -- probably be a 11 prevailing wage project, all I'd like to do is just 12 make an introduction and hope that they use local 13 labor for the project, for if they do get bonded 14 for it. 15 That's it. 16 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you. 17 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Excuse me, Joe. 18 A previous council person who is now 19 Commissioner of Parks wanted to bring up 2.0 something -- maybe we should readdress it that 21 anybody bonding through us should follow the 22 prevailing wage -- has to follow the prevailing 23 wage, but also our apprentice requirement that the 24 Town of Oyster Bay has been very progressive with 25 it. Maybe we should address that with this project

16 and other projects. 1 2 MR. PADILLA: I agree. 3 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Thank you, Joe. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you. 4 5 Yes, Mr. Ripp. Hello, my name is Robert 6 MR. RIPP: 7 Ripp. I reside at 77 Sunset Road in Massapequa, 8 New York. 9 Some information I'd like to share. 10 Just to be clear, please don't misinterpret, I'm 11 not accusing anybody of anything. 12 I have documentation with me to 13 substantiate everything I'm going to tell you. 14 think it is very important. I believe that before 15 you vote on anything today, I think the Town should 16 seek an advisory opinion from the Ethics Board 17 regarding all business between Water Districts and 18 the Town of Oyster Bay. And the reason I'm 19 bringing it up is, Mr. Ingham had mentioned that he 2.0 submitted an affidavit because of his relationship 21 with Mr. Carman, and that's great, but that's what 22 the Ethics Board is there for, to take a look at 23 that. 24 And if what I've what I've determined, 25 what I've just discovered is that the firm of

17 1 Carman, Callahan & Ingham represent a number of 2 Water Districts. I don't know if they represent 3 all of them, but I know they represent Massapequa, Bethpage, I think, Plainview, Jericho. I know that 4 5 in Massapequa, the firm receives a \$36,000 retainer through a no bid system every year. 6 7 And Massapequa, I don't know how they 8 do it, but they do no bid contracts for everyone. 9 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: This is Jericho, 10 right? I think we're talking about Jericho. 11 MR. RIPP: Yes, I know, and I'm going 12 to get to Jericho. Yes, I'm sorry. 1.3 Actually, in Massapequa, Mr. Hand was a 14 member of the commission there who's been voting 15 for Mr. Callahan --16 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: We're talking 17 about Jericho. 18 MR. RIPP: Yes, I know, and I'm going 19 to address Jericho. 2.0 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: What we're asking 21 is that you please stay germane to the subject at 22 hand. 23 MR. RIPP: Yes, okay. 24 So my point is that I think before the 25 Town gets involved, does anymore business with

2.2 1 Disclosure Statement, so on and so forth, and that 2 also not needs to be reviewed by the Town 3 Attorney's Office, Mr. Sabellico; it needs to be reviewed by the Ethics Board. And again, I 4 5 reiterate what the prior resident said. I would ask that you postpone this vote until after the 6 7 Ethics Board hears this matter -- these matters. 8 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Mr. Supervisor, 9 I think there's some validity to this. I'd like to 10 get a ruling from the Ethics Board, so I'd like to 11 request we postpone the decision on this vote until 12 we do get a ruling on it. 1.3 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Let's start off 14 by asking our Town Attorney to come forward before 15 people jump to conclusions. 16 Thank you very much. McKENNA: Thank you. 22 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Ask for our Town 23 Attorney to step up, please. 24 MR. NOCELLA: It's a -- Supervisor and 25 members of the Town Board, it's a relatively

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straightforward question because there is no interest for there to be a conflict.

In other words, if the law firm were being retained by the Town of Oyster Bay, then there could be a conflict of interest between Mr. Ingham's law firm and the Town of Oyster Bay because of persons who are already working for the Town of Oyster Bay.

In this case, they are representing the Water District. The only thing we're doing is approving the financing that helps the Water District. It's not directly helping the law firm. There is no interest of anybody on the Town Board or in Town government for there to be a conflict of interest. It's that simple.

COUNCILWOMAN ALESIA: Mr. Nocella -- oh, I'm sorry Supervisor.

Is there any reason that we couldn't delay a vote and ask for an opinion from the Board of Ethics?

MR. NOCELLA: It's within your discretion, but there doesn't seem to be at least the predicate that even arises to the level where they would find that there could be a conflict because there is no interest.

2.4 1 COUNCILWOMAN ALESIA: I understand what 2 you're saying. I just think that we're living in a 3 time where even the appearance sometimes is more significant than the underlying. 4 5 I would agree with Councilman Macagnone's statement that maybe we should get an 6 7 opinion. 8 (Applause.) 9 MR. NOCELLA: Again, it is within your 10 discretion. 11 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And is this an 12 issue for the Jericho Water Board to be dealing 1.3 with as opposed to the Town that's just dealing 14 with the assistance following state law so that 15 they can get their financing? SKLAR: I find it to be the best 8 water I ever drank. ALTADONNA: Yes, sir. 4 Hearing P-3-17, to consider the 5 application of Taco Bell of America, LLC, for a Special Use Permit and Site Plan Approval to 6 7 construct and operate a restaurant to be utilized 8 for the new Taco Bell restaurant on the premise 9 located at 424 Jericho Turnpike, Syosset, New York. 10 (Whereupon, a break was taken from 11 11:45 a.m. to 12:00 p.m.) 12 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Ladies and 13 gentlemen, we're going to proceed with our hearing. 14 Ladies and gentlemen, if everyone would 15 take a seat, we're going to proceed with this 16 hearing. 17 I want to point out to the public that 18 we're having some technical difficulties with the 19 live stream. 24	SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you.
25	MR. AMATO: I stand corrected.

5 Good afternoon. I said good morning 1 before. 2 3 Mr. Supervisor, Members of the Board. I'd like to note my appearance for the record. 4 5 Alfred L. Amato, A-M-A-T-O, Amato Law Group, PLLC, 666 Old Country Road, Garden City, 6 7 New York representing the applicant, Taco Bell of 8 America, LLC in connection with its application to construct a 2,126 square foot restaurant with 9 10 drive-thru service at 424 Jericho Turnpike, 11 Syosset, New York, Section 15, Block 64, Lot 108. 12 For the Boards's convenience, we 13 circulated three reports in front of you. 14 One is a Planning Evaluation Report. 15 think you will find this quite helpful during the 16 course of the presentation. 17 You'll notice that there are a list of 18 the Appendices A through M in this report which 19 deals with photographs of the site, site location, 2.0 elevation, site plans, landscape plans, zoning map, 21 aerial photographs and a lighting plan. 22 You also have before you the traffic 23 letter from Atlantic Traffic dated May 31, 2007 --24 '17 rather, and you also have before you, an 25 affidavit from Mike Lynch, a real estate appraiser.

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We've also submitted into the record, a New York State Department of Transportation approval for the site.

If you don't have that before you, We have one copy that's been marked into the record.

The site, Taco Bell is seeking site plan approval pursuant to 246-6.2.1.1 of the Code, Special Use Permit pursuant to 246-5.2 to construct a drive-thru service restaurant with a drive-thru window of a freestanding building.

We also are respectfully requesting this Board to make it a declaration. This application was first filed before this Board on May 12, 2016, and the interim, I guess, just standing about a year, we have been working with the Town Planning and Development Department.

On February 16, 2017, we conducted a community outreach meeting at the American Legion Hall, notified the public and we discussed the project, we presented site plans of what we're proposing. We also presented elevations and we received comment from the public.

The only change that had been requested is the neighbor to the south requested that the existing 6-foot fence be replaced with an 8-foot

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fence. We are willing to do that if the Board so directs. That would also require a variance from the Zoning Board of Appeals.

As the Board is well aware, the property occupies 100 feet of frontage along

Jericho Turnpike. It's located 425 feet east of the intersection Jericho Turnpike and South Oyster Bay Road.

The site is 4.6 acres which is 20,065 square feet and it's zoned neighborhood business.

The site is currently occupied with the 7,420 square foot commercial strip center. There are four uses on the center. The Inn Between, which is a restaurant/lounge, a dry cleaners, a Nationwide Insurance office site.

Taco Bell's proposal is to remove the entire building, all 7,425 square feet and construct a single 2,126 square foot building on the property.

As a result, the site coverage, which is currently 37 percent, will be reduced to 10.6 percent on the lot. The building will seat 40 people and have a drive-thru window for a queue of eight cars. The building is a modern design. The architectural elevations has been submitted to the

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Board and is in Exhibit G of the planning package which each Board Member has before you, and also the project engineer will describe the elevations to you when he speaks after me.

To give a little more detail on the site, the Code requires 21 parking stalls. Taco
Bell is code compliant and is providing 22. The curb cut will largely be the same, and as I mentioned at the onset of the hearing, New York
State Department of Transportation has approved the curb cut with full ingress and egress.

The drive aisle will be at 24 feet and we believe that between the curb cut and the drive aisle, we are representing significant on-site safety improvements since the current aisles at the sites do not line up with the driveway. There's also significant landscaping and buffering improvements to the site.

Currently, the site has 3.5 percent landscaped area, all in the rear of the property.

We are increase -- proposing to increase the landscaped area from 3.5 percent to 21 percent, which is a 17.5 percent net increase of landscaped area.

Further, we are proposing to double the

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size of the existing buffer along the residential area which is on the south border of the property and the east border. Currently, it's, 5 feet, we're proposing to increase that to 10 feet and also filling in evergreen vege -- filling it in with evergreen vegetation and the starting height of that vegetation would be 5 to 6 feet.

And as I said before, the -- both of these property lines have a 6-foot fence. One of the community members asked that to be increased to 8 feet and Taco Bell is more than happy to do so if the Board directs us to do same. The existing trash is in a dumpster. Taco Bell is proposing a masonry trash enclosure on a concrete pad at the southwest corner of the property.

There are a couple of variances that Taco Bell would need from the Zoning Board of Appeals if this Board should so approve this application. They deal with signage, loading -- loading zone and also the 8-foot fence that we mentioned.

I have three experts with me. Eric

Mine, he's from Bohler Engineering. Bohler

Engineering prepared this -- the planning

evaluation and special use -- special use permit

10 1 evaluation -- evaluation that's before you with all 2 the exhibits. He will walk through some of the 3 items. 4 I covered the design of the site, the 5 building, the elevation, and the on-site traffic flow. 6 7 Paul Going is a traffic expert from 8 Atlanta Traffic. He'll speak as to, obviously, traffic and its lack of impact at the site will 9 10 have ongoing traffic patterns. 11 And Mr. Lynch is an appraiser and he 12 conducted an analysis and he'll tell you that the 1.3 proposed build of this Taco Bell will have no 14 detrimental effects on real estate value. 15 So if I may proceed to Eric Mine. 16 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: All these 17 experts are hired by Taco Bell, right? 18 MR. AMATO: Of course, sir. COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: 19 Okay. 2.0 Just want to make sure we got that on the record. 21 22 MR. AMATO: Understood. 23 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Before we begin 24 with your -- the testimony of your exerts, a 25 resident has been asked if she could speak prior to

11 1 their testimony because of a time constraint and 2 I've decided to allow that. 3 MR. AMATO: Absolutely, Mr. Supervisor. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you. 4 5 Mrs. Stein, would you please step forward? And Mr. Stein, okay. 6 7 Just state your names and address for 8 the record, please. 9 MS. STEIN: Diana and Craig Stein, 10 9 Ann Drive, Syosset, New York 11791. 11 We live right behind where they're 12 planning on building the Taco Bell. There are 1.3 currently smaller businesses that bring less 14 traffic into that specific lot. It is currently a 15 neighborhood restaurant, not a large fast food 16 chain. If you think about the current environment, 17 we're trying to create a healthier environment for 18 our children, not bringing fast food. We don't 19 want -- we should not be increasing the density of 2.0 fast food establishments in the area, in the 21 suburban areas. We should be decreasing them in 22 today's society. 23 We currently have -- across the street, 24 it's enough, we already have a McDonald's there. 25 There's a Chipotle. We don't need another Mexican

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restaurant, another fast food Mexican establishment right there. We don't need -- in addition, it's a residential neighborhood. We don't need another facility open until 4:00 in the morning on Jericho Turnpike. It brings potential crime and safety issues and potential drugs into the area at night.

I don't need that hanging out right in the area where my children will be, you know, walking to school, to and from school.

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: I live just south there on Whitman. I'm very familiar with the neighborhood, know the problems. I know even Panera people make their -- no, excuse me. Leaving PizzaRev or Chipotle, people making an illegal left turn across Jericho Turnpike.

But continue.

MS. STEIN: It will also bring extensive traffic issues to the area. That is already a very high trafficked area. The Seaford-Oyster Bay 135 is just east of that facility. There -- it's very high traffic at night between -- especially between 3:30 p.m. and 6:30 p.m. It is extremely hard heading east on that area. Cars coming out of there making a left turn or illegal lefts will cause additional traffic

concerns.

1.3 1 patterns and additional, hopefully not, but traffic 2 accidents that already exist right now on Woodland 3 Gate and Cedar Street. When you go to even just make a normal 4 5 legal right turn out of Cedar Street and people are making the left from Cedar across the way --6 7 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Or they're 8 making a U-turn because they want to go to the 9 restaurant down that block. MS. STEIN: Exactly. 10 11 So it adds undue added congestion. 12 There -- what is the upside to the local residents? 1.3 There are no benefits to this facility. 14 drive-thru -- we don't have any drive-thrus, other 15 than the McDonald's right now, which we don't need 16 and we don't need this in addition. 17 It will add increased garbage removal 18 needs because, again, that facility is a local 19 small establishment that is there right now. 2.0 We don't need a high fast food 21 restaurant that will bring potential animals to the 22 We are a residential community and we don't 23 want to change that. 24 MR. STEIN: And we have safety

As you know, Jericho Turnpike is highly

14 1 trafficked. We're hesitant to walk our kids along 2 Jericho Turnpike as it is. Most of us don't. 3 Adding a Taco Bell will exacerbate It's, you know, it's -- you take your life 4 that. 5 in your hands when you walk along Jericho Turnpike. And as my wife pointed out, you know, traffic 6 7 heading east to the Seaford, that will back up. 8 It already backs up for miles. It will 9 back up even worse if the site is successful and 10 highly trafficked, traffic gets much worse. 11 it's unsuccessful, now we have a vacant QSR 12 location ready for another fast food restaurant or 13 basically an eyesore left for us to deal with. 14 MS. STEIN: So please take that into 15 account. 16 MR. STEIN: Please consider our views 17 here. 18 MS. MR. MINE: Good afternoon, Supervisor, members of the Board.

Eric Mine, Bohler Engineering,
2929 Expressway Drive North, Hauppauge, New York.

Here on behalf of Taco Bell. I'm here to discuss the site plan that my firm prepared. We are proposing a 2,126 square foot building in lieu of the over 7,000 square foot building that exists on the site.

The Taco bell restaurant will have 40 seats. You'll enter the site from Jericho
Turnpike. On the west side of the site, there will be 17 parking stalls including two ADA accessible

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stalls and there will be five additional parking stalls to the rear of the restaurant. The trash enclosure will be to the southwest corner of the site. The drive-thru queue starts at the rear of the site and queues around the eastern side of the building.

We're providing for eight cars in the queue, which is more than the five required by Code, and then you'll exit the drive-thru and the parking area both from the same curb cut out onto Jericho Turnpike.

In laying out the site the way we did with the geometry of the building, we were able to get a 10-foot buffer on the east side of the site whereas currently there's no landscape buffer and a 10-foot buffer at the rear of the side as well where there's currently only a 5-foot buffer.

We are proposing to maintain the existing mature trees at the rear of the site so there's a verticality to the screening we're providing and we're supplementing underneath with some leather leaf viburnums and other junipers so that it's a year round screen. And as Mr. Amato indicated, we are willing to modify the fencing to an 8-foot fence in lieu of the 6-foot fence

18 1 proposed. 2 That's essentially the site. Ιf 3 there's any questions, otherwise, we'll move on to the next expert. 4 5 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you. MR. AMATO: Paul Going, please. 6 7 MR. GOING: Thank you. 8 My name is Paul Going. I'm with Atlantic Traffic and Design Engineers, 9 10 2929 Expressway Drive North in Hauppauge. 11 We prepared a letter report, which is 12 in front of you. A copy of the DOT approval that 1.3 we received is also in -- well, I don't think you 14 each have that, but we did turn that in. 15 existing condition, as previously stated, you've 16 got a small strip shopping center with four uses 17 there. 18 There's a full movement driveway on 19 Jericho Turnpike. Jericho Turnpike at this 2.0 location is a 40 mile per hour road. Across our 21 site frontage, Jericho Turnpike has two lanes in 22 each direction and has a two-way center turn lane 23 down the middle. 24 This section of Jericho Turnpike has 2.5 higher westbound traffic in the morning, higher

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eastbound traffic; although, not as high as the morning peak, but higher eastbound traffic in the evening.

What's proposed is a Taco Bell restaurant. Taco Bell restaurant would be 2,126 square feet which is -- that's a relatively modest size fast food restaurant. It would have 40 seats and the site would continue to basically be -- to be served by the existing driveway. Just full movement and that driveway would be in basically the same location where it is now, but it would be reconstructed.

The Taco Bell, as you're probably familiar with, it's much busier in the evening hours, in the dinner hours. It's convenience use. People stop by on their way home, people will stop by Taco Bell on a Saturday on their, on their way to or from somewhere else. We call that a passby trip. And, basically, the location here on the eastbound side of the State highway is the preferred location for a Taco Bell being that in the evening, you have more traffic going away that way.

Typically, for use like this on a well trafficked road like this, you'd get 70 to 75

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percent of your traffic making right turns into the site and out of the site. Primarily, people would be doing -- doing that movement as opposed to left turn, but we're proposing to print the left turn and the DOT has approved that, which again, is the same as the existing condition.

We did look at the number of trips generated by the Taco Bell in comparison to the existing uses. We calculated the number of trips using data presented by the Institute of Transportation Engineers in a book called Trip Generation, the 9th edition published in 2012. We calculated the existing site as a shopping center and calculated the proposed Taco Bell as fast food with drive-thru.

What we saw was that the maximum increase in site trips was calculated to be 90 occurring in the weekday morning peak hour and that's closely followed by 89 in the Saturday midday peak hour. That's the total trips in and out, so when we're talking about 90 trips, we're talking about 45 customers.

COUNCILWOMAN ALESIA: Can I just ask, that's 90 trips over what's currently happening at the Inn Between?

21 1 MR. GOING: That's correct. 2 COUNCILWOMAN ALESIA: Per hour? 3 MR. GOING: Say that again. 4 COUNCILWOMAN ALESIA: 90 trips per 5 hour? 6 MR. GOING: 90 trips in the peak hour. 7 That's 90 trips in the weekday morning peak hour, 8 which would be higher than the other hours through 9 the day. 10 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: As opposed to 11 eight -- or 7 as you have listed here. 12 MR. GOING: That's correct. So the 13 difference there is 90 versus --14 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Only a slight 15 difference. 16 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: If you wanted to 17 put that increase in a percentage, what would the 18 percentage be? 19 MR. GOING: I'm not sure what you're 20 asking. 21 I mean, shopping centers like this with 22 a restaurant, they're not very busy in the morning 23 peak hour. Taco Bell is -- as you may note, serves 24 breakfast. It's not a huge part of their business, 25 but they do serve breakfast.

2.2 1 What I calculated was using IT Trip 2 Generation Rates for Fast Food which is not 3 specific to Taco Bell. 4 Taco Bell is probably a little less 5 busy in the morning, but again --COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: Why was the 6 7 morning peak chosen? 8 MR. GOING: We listed the morning peak 9 as well as the lunch peak, the dinner hour, and the 10 Saturday lunch. 11 I pointed out the morning peak just 12 because you do have that low trip generation of the 13 shopping center in the morning and that's -- so 14 that's where we had the greatest difference. 15 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: But every one 16 has a significant increase in traffic. 17 MR. GOING: I disagree with that. 18 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: The difference 19 plus 90 for the weekday morning. Plus 73 weekday 2.0 midday, plus 41 weekday evening, plus 89 Saturday 21 midday. 22 To me, that's a significant increase. 23 COUNCILWOMAN ALESIA: Especially 24 heading toward the 135 entrance in that direction. 25 It's a lot of increase.

2.3 1 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: If it was plus 2 3, I'd say, okay, it's not significant. Plus 89, 3 plus 73, plus 90. MR. GOING: Well, both the IT and the 4 5 New York State DOT recognize --COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: I'm talking 6 7 about a resident of Syosset. That's an enormous 8 increase. 9 MR. GOING: I understand what you're 10 saying, but based on traffic -- typical traffic 11 engineering protocols and standards, the DOT and 12 the ITE both recognize 100 trips as a threshold 13 over which traffic is significant. 14 In this particular case, the DOT has 15 reviewed our traffic, they've approved our traffic, 16 and they've approved the layout. 17 MR. AMATO: And also, I'd like to 18 mention to the Board that Mr. Going's findings are 19 exactly the same as Cashin Spinelli's findings 2.0 dated October 27, 2016. The number counts, the IT 21 counts and its conclusions are the same as the 22 banks -- I'm sorry, as the Town's consultant 23 analysis of the traffic situation. 24 MR. GOING: And let me -- I want to get 25 into one other item which is the passby trips.

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As I previously said, fast food is a convenience use. When you have a convenience use, they are serving people who are already on the road as opposed to adding new trips to the road.

For fast food, ITE has -- indicates an average passby rate of about 50 percent which means, you know, half the customers.

So when I mentioned before, those 45 customers, about half of them, 23, would be people already on the road. 23 would be cars added to the road at 50 percent.

At this location, given the amount of traffic on the road, I would expect an even higher passby rate. I would guess maybe 70 percent, but definitely at least the average that's published by ITE, the 50 percent passby would be at this location.

MR. AMATO: What is your conclusion?

MR. GOING: My conclusion, the proposed project will not have a significant negative impact on traffic. The proposed project has been designed per Town standards, as well as typical engineering standards, and it's been reviewed by the DOT and I don't see any significant negative impact.

MR. AMATO: And my understanding is you

2.5 1 have reviewed Cashin Spinelli's findings and that 2 your findings and your calculations are almost --3 are they identical? 4 MR. GOING: Correct. Yes. 5 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Doesn't mean we have to agree with their finding either, though. 6 7 MR. AMATO: Thank you. 8 Mr. Lynch, please. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Good afternoon. 9 10 MR. LYNCH: Good afternoon, 11 Mr. Supervisor. 12 My name is Michael Lynch, real estate 13 appraiser; address, 15 Dewey Street Huntington, 14 New York. 15 I have appeared many times in the past before this Board and Mr. Amato has submitted my 16 17 report along with my qualifications appended to. 18 Good afternoon, again, Members of the 19 Board. 2.0 I'm here on the Taco Bell application 21 for the redevelopment of this -- of the site which 22 is situated along the south side of Jericho 23 Turnpike approximately 425 east of the intersection 24 with Oyster Bay Road in the Hamlet of Syosset. 25 It's a NB business zone parcel.

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It's presently improved as the Board's aware with the strip center which contains approximately 7,425 square feet and improved with four store units including the Inn Between restaurant, a dry cleaner establishment, an insurance agency and a psychic.

What is proposed is a 2,126 square foot restaurant, Taco Bell, fast food establishment with a drive-thru. As noted, the square footage of the property is roughly one-third of what is presently there as far as site coverage. We'd be moving from a 37 percent site coverage down to 10.6. The overall landscaping in the site would be roughly seven times what presently stands there. It would be a 21 percent landscape coverage where presently is approximately 3 percent landscaping.

As far as the surrounding area, as you know, immediately adjacent to this to the west was a recent redevelopment of a site which is presently the new Chipotle restaurant. That is now part of the adjacent Plaza which contains two additional fast food type of establishments which includes a PizzaRev and a Jamba Juice. Opposite the property to the north along Jericho Turnpike is a DSW Shoe outlet store. Opposite to the northwest along

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Jericho is a Panera Bread establishment.

To the rear of the property, the property abuts the rear yards of the homes along Jarvis and Winthrop Avenue. And then further uses to the west of the property include an AT&T store, Starbucks, Carvel, along with some professional and office uses. The application today for the site plan approval as well as the special permit to allow for the Taco Bell restaurant in my estimation, will not have a negative effect to the community.

Again, we're taking a site with a site coverage of roughly 37 percent and going down to roughly 10.6 percent. The site is essentially devoid of any essential landscaping. The applicant proposes a 21 percent landscape which includes substantial buffering along its easterly and southerly boundaries with the residents to the south and to the east on Jarvis and Winthrop Avenue.

Also offered is an 8-foot stockade fence which would further attenuate any potential impact that the drive-thru may have. Also noted, as the engineer discussed, the setback of the current strip center is approximately 84 feet.

28 1 We're proposing to move this forward, 2 closer to Jericho Turnpike 53 feet, so there would 3 be a substantial increase in the rear yard to the homes immediately to the rear. 4 5 So, overall, I think it's a net positive redevelopment of the site with respect to 6 7 what is proposed with landscaping, buffering, 8 et cetera, and with respect to the smaller 9 footprint that is proposed. 10 So at this -- my conclusion is that the 11 proposed redevelopment of the site will not have 12 any adverse impact to the surrounding community or 13 property values. 14 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: I have a 15 question. 16 MR. LYNCH: Yes. 17 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: It appears as 18 though at the rear of the site will be the point at 19 which patrons utilizing the drive-thru will order 2.0 their meals. 21 How far would those cars be from the 22 property line? 23 MR. LYNCH: I believe the engineer may 24 have a better question -- better answer to that. 25 MR. MINE: Yeah, there's a 10-foot

29 1 buffer plus the drive-thru lane itself is about 2 12 feet wide with a vehicle being about 6 feet, so 3 you're looking at a good 16 feet from the property line. 4 5 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: I'm sorry, the buffer you said? 6 7 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: A good 16 feet 8 or 16 feet? 9 MR. MINE: Well, depending on how you 10 define it. It's 16 feet to the passenger side of 11 the vehicle or it would be 22 feet to where the 12 speaker is. 13 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Okay. So the buffer is -- what's the total of the buffer alone? 14 15 MR. MINE: The buffer is 10 feet and the lane itself is 12 feet. 16 17 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: When cars enter 18 into that curb, will their headlights be pointed 19 toward the properties that are immediately are 20 adjacent on the south side? 21 MR. MINE: Yes, and just like that 22 exist today. In fact, the existing establishment 23 has parking to the rear where the headlights when 24 people park would be shining through the fence.

The drive-thru patrons are going to be moving

30 1 through the drive-thru so it's a 10-foot buffer at 2 the rear with an 8-foot high fence as well as, you 3 know, 6 foot high plantings --4 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: What are the 5 hours of operation? SUPERVISOR SALADINO: That was my next 6 7 question. 8 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: Did you say that 9 parked cars --10 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Just a moment 11 Councilman, if you don't mind. The Councilman had 12 a question in. 13 MR. AMATO: The hours of operation, 14 they open at 7:00 a.m.; they close at 4:00 a.m. 15 However, that is something we can discuss with the 16 Board because the Inn Between right now is open until 2:00 a.m. 17 18 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: I live right 19 there. I very seldom see Inn Between open after 20 midnight. 21 MR. AMATO: All we can tell you is 22 what's publicly posted on their website. They're 23 open until 2:00 a.m. 24 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Well, it's 25 practically -- they're very seldom open past

31 1 midnight. 2 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: In this case, the 3 drive-thru would be open 'til 4:00 a.m. as per your 4 application? 5 MR. AMATO: Well, as per the application of the drive-thru is. For the building 6 7 is the sit-down restaurant is 2:00 a.m., but that's 8 obviously something we could discuss with the 9 Board. 10 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Are there are any 11 other questions? 12 MR. LYNCH: Thank you very much. 1.3 MR. AMATO: Mr. Supervisor, that ends 14 our media presentation. 15 We'd like to hear what the community 16 has to say and be afforded the opportunity to 17 address any concerns that they may have that have 18 not otherwise been addressed. 19 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you. 2.0 We have a number of people who would 21 like to speak on this. We've already heard from 22 Diana and Craig Stein on this application 23 previously. 24 Peter Morley. Is Peter Morley here at 25 this time? We'll call him again.

32 Michael Allesi? We'll call on him 1 2 again. 3 Neil Barons, it looks like, from 50 Dawes Avenue. We'll call on him again. 4 5 Laura Schultz? MS. SCHULTZ: Hello, again. 6 7 Laura Schultz, 22 Barbara Drive, 8 Syosset, New York, President of Residents for a 9 More Beautiful Syosset. 10 Many of the speakers that you just 11 called had to leave because of the lateness of the 12 hour, so I'm speaking for a lot of people. 1.3 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Sure. 14 MS. You have listened to the residents of 16 17 Woodbury today regarding their health and safety. 18 We ask you to also listen to the residents 19 of Syosset today for their health and safety. 2.0 We believe this project will have a 21 negative effect on the Syosset community. 22 intersection of Jericho Turnpike, South Oyster Bay 23 Road and Jackson Avenue is the busiest intersection 24 in all of Syosset. Thousands of drivers use 25 Jericho Turnpike and Jackson Avenue and South

33 1 Oyster Bay Road to get back and forth to the 2 Seaford-Oyster Bay Expressway. 3 Lunch hour and rush hour traffic along 4 Jericho Turnpike is already a nightmare in this 5 area. Drivers ignore the "no left turn" at 6 Chipotle and PizzaRev So even though it says no 7 left turn, they still go back. They get their food 8 and they go back. Right, Councilman? We note that 9 all the time. 10 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Probably a third 11 of them do that. 12 MS. SCHULTZ: Yes. Yes. I go to lunch 13 at Panera and I see it all the time. 14 The hours of our operation of Chipotle 15 and Panera Bread end at 10:00 p.m. The hours of 16 operation proposed for this Taco Bell go from 17 7:00 a.m. to 4:00 a.m. It is too late. 18 Residents for a More Beautiful Syosset 19 ask you to please deny this special use permit. 2.0 Thank you very much. 21 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you. 22 Next speaker, Michael Lynch. 23 Nope, he's part of the presenting team. 24 Pei Chao? 25 MS. CHAO: Hi. My name is Pei Chao,

34 1 11 Jarvis Avenue, Syosset. 2 I'm the south neighbor that's asking 3 for the 8-feet fence, and I have two young children 4 and there's a three-year old that just moved in 5 next door last week so we're concerned about the kids safety and the noise. 6 7 I don't want people -- to hear people 8 talking in my backyard until -- almost 24 hours a 9 day if they have the drive-thru so if they could 10 have the shorter drive-thru hour or maybe no 11 drive-thru at all. 12 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Are you opposed 13 to the application or is it that you're just 14 opposed to having a drive-thru or the hours of the 15 drive-thru? 16 MS. CHAO: The hours of the drive-thru. 17 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: The hours of the 18 drive-thru, okay. 19 What would you see as a reasonable time 20 to limit them to? MS. CHAO: 10:00 for the walk-in and 21 22 12:00 for drive-thru. 23 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Seven days a 24 week? 25 MS. CHAO: I quess, yes.

35 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: That's what I'm 1 2 asking. 3 MS. CHAO: Or just like 12:00 on the weekends and 10:00 during the week? 4 5 MS. CHAO: Oh, sure. That would be If I could say -- have a say, yes. 6 7 Monday through Thursday, 10:00 p.m. and 8 weekends. 9 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: So Sunday 10 through Thursday night, 10:00 p.m. and then 11 weekends, midnight. 12 MS. CHAO: Yeah. I would accept that. 13 Thank you. 14 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Thank you. 15 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Anyone else on 16 this application? Mr. Frier? 17 18 MR. FRIER: Bob Frier, 33 Chestnut Lane 19 in Woodbury. 20 I guess my -- I'm concerned that --21 that the Syosset portion of Jericho Turnpike more 22 and more is reminding me of Old Country Road in 23 Westbury. It's just fast food restaurant after 24 fast food restaurant. The traffic, all times of 25 day, is heavy, not just at peak hours.

So I have serious safety concerns about that and just -- just the character of what's being built in that area, it's becoming just fast food restaurants so I would like -- you know, even to ask the Board to, you know, maybe have a separate meeting and, you know, invite residents and let's talk about a vision for that area and how we -- you know, how we would like to see it developed as time goes on.

One of the things that I didn't hear addressed in the meeting is that where is the trash going to go from there? And that's also going to be --

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: That's in the application.

MR. FRIER: But, you know, is -- how is that going to affect the residents right behind there.

37 1 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: What times the 2 pick ups will be and deliveries. 3 MR. FRIER: Yeah, and just the smell that emanates from it. 4 5 COUNCILWOMAN ALESIA: I was thinking about litter also. 6 7 COUNCILMAN MUSCARELLA: Yeah, but the 8 smell is contained with their thermalization of 9 their odors, they say, but it is on the application. You wouldn't see it. 10 11 MR. FRIER: So my -- you know, my 12 concern is for the neighbors beyond there but it's 13 also just a major safety question. Those numbers 14 that you mention in terms of the traffic that goes 15 to the Inn Between and what they're estimating is a 16 huge jump in traffic, so I really think it's a bad 17 idea for the -- for Jericho Turnpike and it's a bad 18 idea for the neighborhood. 19 Thank you. 2.0 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: As you've heard 21 from the questions from the Board, they're 22 already -- have those concerns. 23 The next speaker -- I'll announce these 24 names again, Neil Burns, Syosset Neil Burns? 25 Michael Alessi? Michael Alessi?

38 Would Frank check and see if there's 1 2 anyone outside? 3 Michael Alessi? Not present, currently. 4 5 Peter Morley? Okay. Mr. McKenna, I think you raised your 6 7 hand first. 8 MR. COUNCILWOMAN ALESIA: I don't think -sorry. I was in the shopping center adjacent to it
twice in the last three days and I did not see a
sign.

MR. McKENNA: I give them credit that they did notify some of the local residents but, you know, again, not to be repetitive, but with a sign, you really would have a massive outcry on this.

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: I'm going to tell you, people that live around me didn't know anything was proposed there until I told them and they would have like to come to a meeting if it was a night meeting, but they work during the day, so I agree with you.

MR. McKENNA: Just a -- just a few

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things that haven't been talked about.

I was thinking -- I was thinking back, you know, when I was younger and I used to go to the drive-thru at Jack in the Box in Plainview and I, you know, real world -- and I don't know whether they -- they've done a study on this or whatever, but there's a lot of kids in Syosset and I could just envision. I know when I go to Chipotle and PizzaRev and it draws -- it draws the young folks and especially at lunch time from Syosset High School and the kids from Syosset High School are going to drive west on Jericho Turnpike and they're in a rush, you know, they're on their lunch hour and I can't even imagine the activity.

Those numbers they have, I think, are very, very low compared to what in the real world that would be. I'd be curious to know what the Plainview location does. But that left turn there, they're going to make the left and they're going to make the left with a sign, without a sign, you know, they're going to be in a rush to get their food. After they get their food, they're going -- this is during the daytime, they're going to take the packaging and you're going to find the -- I'm going to find garbage halfway back to Syosset High

41 1 School on the roads. 2 Real world, I'm talking reality. 3 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: No one's arguing with you. 4 5 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you. MR. McKENNA: At nighttime, they didn't 6 7 talk at all about signage and lighting which is 8 probably in there, but who knows if the light is 9 going to be disturbing to the neighbors behind. 10 But the big thing, I would imagine is, 11 that that speaker on a drive-thru is going to echo 12 at night, and if I lived behind there and I had to 1.3 listen to people ordering tacos until 4:00 in the 14 morning or even until midnight, I'd be very 15 disturbed. 16 The gas fumes from the cars that are 17 going to be idling there, I don't know if any kind 18 of testing is done on, you know, gas fumes, whether 19 that could even go into the backyards of the 2.0 neighbors. Curious to know whether it is a franchise or not. 21 22 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Taco Bell of 23 America, so I don't think so. 24 COUNCILMAN MUSCARELLA: Yeah, it's a 25 corporate store.

42 1 MR. McKENNA: Is it franchised? 2 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: I think it is 3 corporate. 4 MR. SKLAR: I'm not an expert at this, 9 but a feasibility studies was my expertise in a 10 real estate business and you keep talking here 11 about traffic and traffic, okay? 12 Taco Bell is not going to bring anymore 13 traffic to that location because it's there are 14 already. If you look at the location, if you know 15 the location, the only customers they are getting 16 are those traveling east because there is no way 17 you're crossing over at that location from the 18 other side. You can't get into Starbucks, you 19 can't get into the Mexican restaurant, you can't 2.0 get into anybody. It just doesn't happen with the 21 way that traffic flows down Jackson Avenue. 22 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: People do try 23 everyday. 24 COUNCILWOMAN JOHNSON: They shouldn't, 25 but they do.

45 1 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: They do try 2 every day cutting across Jericho Turnpike into 3 Chipotle, the PizzaRev, into Jamba Juice, into the 4 paint store, into the Starbucks, into the dentist's 5 They are making lefts into there. MR. SKLAR: But not from the west side, 6 7 from the east side. 8 COUNCILWOMAN ALESIA: They make a 9 U-turn. 10 COUNCILMAN MUSCARELLA: Larry, there's 11 an arrow that points them to make a left turn. 12 MR. SKLAR: The arrow is not before 13 Starbucks. It's at the corner of Jackson Avenue, 14 so you got to --15 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: They do they 16 make that left, Larry. I see it. 17 MR. SKLAR: What? 18 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: They make the 19 left into that shopping center every day and into 20 the Inn Between. 21 MR. SKLAR: Okay. You make the 22 left-hand turn and you want to go into the back of 23 Starbucks, you can't get over that because all 24 those cars are parked and they're making the 25 right-hand turn.

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I've been to this intersection every single day. Okay. And I can never get from the left side to the right side going west. And if you look at Jericho Turnpike, I don't think anybody's going come there just because there's a Taco Bell.

There are 75 restaurants between the expressway and Woodbury Road. They've all been counted. There's 75 different restaurants.

There's six pizza places in that two mile span.

When the next one opened, they said, oh, nobody's gonna go there, but every one of them is in business. So the concern is the traffic going east and I don't think that affects anybody there.

Thank you.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Are there any other speakers on this application?

Yes. Yes, gentleman in the back.

MR. O'CONNOR: Good afternoon.

I just want to take a second. I've been standing in the back listening to the whole meeting.

Supervisor, Town Council, my name is Dan O'Connor. I'm actually a resident of Glen Head, 9 Sylvia Street in Glen Head.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you.

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MR. O'CONNOR: I advise businesses, a lot of times, especially start up businesses. Just a few things I wanted to say is one, the gentlemen earlier brought up a good point. I'm not sure if you know why he brought it up, but he asked if this was a franchised location versus a corporate location.

Sometimes when you look at McDonald's, McDonald's makes their franchisees work at least 40 hours a week in the location to keep it cleaner and keep it upkept, and the owner actually has to be in there or a member of the owner staff.

Taco Bell, I believe, and you are correct in saying this, is a corporate which is just basically employees so it's a little bit different than having an owner on the location.

I would also ask for advisement that maybe the Town looks into, since it is a corporate account, some of the other accounts that they may own or locations that they may own in Town of Oyster Bay and see if they're friendly with the neighbors, see if there's any garbage issues, see if there's any police activity issues.

And the last thing I want to mention is one thing that I very rarely hear is how the

48 1 deliveries to the location are being made. 2 believe it's mostly 18-wheeler with a lift gate at 3 possibly odd hours. So, again, it's just a reminder to maybe look into some of those issues, 4 5 so I appreciate the opportunity to speak out. COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: The hours of the 6 7 garage pickup, when that will be. 8 MR. O'CONNOR: Exactly. So just some 9 of the side things that maybe you may not have 10 thought to look into. 11 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Just so you and 12 the residents are assured, we have multiple 13 concerns at this location. 14 MR. O'CONNOR: Okay. Thank you for 15 letting me speak. Enjoy your day. 16 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Mr. O'Connor, 17 always good to see. 18 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Any other 19 speakers? 2.0 Anyone else, member of the public who would like to be heard on this issue? 21 22 Okay. If the applicants would step 23 forward. 24 MR. AMATO: Thank you, Mr. Supervisor, 25 for giving me the opportunity to address the public

commentary.

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Taco Bell will be willing to stipulate that the drive-thru would close by 2:00 a.m. and that the restaurant itself would close at 12:00 a.m.

And as I mentioned before, the Inn

Between is open to 2:00 a.m. I understand

Councilman's statement that practically they may

not be doing that, but based upon our investigation

and everything that's available, they are open at

2:00 a.m., so basically, more or less the same in

terms of the hours of operation.

I have to stress this Board, the traffic concerns. New York State Department of Transportation has already approved the curb cut and doing so has said this use and this entrance way in getting in and out of the site is safe.

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: They don't vote on this though; we do.

MR. AMATO: I understand, but what I'm saying is that over that intersection and that curb cut, that's their jurisdiction. That's not the Board's jurisdiction.

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Okay.

MR. AMATO: Okay. In terms of a couple

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of the items that were mentioned and I'll call our experts back. We're going to turn to traffic. We heard the number of differential, the morning peak, 80 to 90 trips, that's -- you have to divide the number by 2, right? So 40 is -- 80 is 40 because it's coming in, going out.

COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: It is still 1,000 percent increase though, right?

MR. AMATO: Right. But based upon --

MR. AMATO: Right. But based upon -COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: That was the
number I was trying to get.

transportation standards, based upon our hired expert, based upon the Town's hired expert, it does not have a measurable impact on that roadway, particularly since -- but based upon the Town's expert and our expert, and based upon the IT, 50 percent of all that traffic is already on the road and Mr. Going will testify, he's analyzed other Taco Bells in Long Island and actually the number is higher than the IT, 70 percent of the traffic is already on the road. 70 to 75 percent, Mr. Going will offer some more testimony along those lines.

In terms of pickup and deliveries and the commercial vehicles coming to the site, there

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will be one box truck delivery per month for nonperishable goods; three tractor-trailer deliveries per week that could be coordinated with the Town. Pursuant to reasonable conditions, that could be off typically. We'd like to do it off-peak but if the Board would like to suggest something else, we're more than -- more than happy to consent to any reasonable conditions.

In terms of garbage pickup, that would be typical front loader, 30-foot truck, three times per week. Exactly, the same as the Chipolte, which is right next door. And I'd like to add that right now, you have a freestanding dumpster that gets knocked around. We're putting this in a masonry enclosure and also that enclosure and all the garbage will be inspected by -- I think the company is called EcoLab which is pest control and inspects stores for cleanliness and that's in their contract by Taco Bell to make sure the site is clean and free of all pests and varmint and such.

It is a corporate store and what I would say with that, there's a lot more capital that's behind -- that will be going to the site.

There's tremendous improvements that's being made here. There's a lot of money going into the site

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and it's going to be kept clean. It's a substantial investment and, you know, I understand that this is a nice, I guess, neighborhood strip center, but it has zero architectural features.

The site is a tremendous improvement architecturally. We have a 37 percent -- we're going from 37 percent lot air coverage to 10 percent, so I would ask the Board to take a step back if you look at objectively, what's going on here in terms of just the numbers and the designs and such, the applicant is really trying to put his foot forward and present the best that it can to this Town to have the nicest design and the least impact upon the surrounding community.

The other thing I'd like to say is that in terms of posting, we -- our firm hired a company that put the sign company to post and we submitted an affidavit. We'll check it again after the hearing.

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: You mind sending me a picture of that sign, please, being posted?

MR. AMATO: We have an affidavit that they did it -- it is in the record already.

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: A picture of the sign being posted in front of the place?

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MR. AMATO: Yes.

If someone from -- ripped it down, we can't exactly put up a camera and watch what's happening there. We don't know if it's been ripped down because, obviously, we would have put it -- we would have hired them to put it back up. But you our undertaking that we hired a sign company, photos were taken, and it was signed, the site was posted.

In terms of lighting, if you look at the planning report which we presented to the Board, and if you look at Exhibit M, that's a lighting plan. These are standard 14-foot lighting fixtures.

Yes, sir?

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Going back to sign for a second, I do believe it's the applicant's responsibility to make sure the sign's up for more than day, more than one week. At least every day, at least a week before the application is going to be heard by this Board.

So, yes, I do believe it's your responsibility to have that sign posted and make sure that it is up and visible.

That's my opinion as a Councilman, I do

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believe the responsibility of the applicant.

MR. AMATO: As I told you, we hired a company to have it posted. We signed an affidavit. We will double check to see if the sign is there.

We're not personally aware of whether or not somebody tore down the sign but, obviously, all the notices did get out because we do have a number of people here that have appeared.

In terms of -- not to dismiss you, but can I move on?

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Please.

MR. AMATO: Okay. Exhibit M is the lighting plan. That these are light fixtures that cut off at the property line so there will be no lighting spillover so Exhibit M, you'll see the light fixtures and you'll see that there's no spillover to the property lines.

In terms of sound, if you'll look at

Exhibit B, that's a decibel exhibit. The speaker

is designed such that it has volume feedback and it

will not be audible past 8 feet. So, you've heard

earlier testimony that that speaker box is 22 feet

from the property line. It's designed to be

audible at 8 feet and there's a decibel exhibit to

show that at the property line, it's a no longer

audible once a cast crosses the property line so that's Exhibit B.

There will be no alcohol served at the store. I don't know if some Taco Bell's do that, but that's not what's being planned here.

In terms of on-site safety, we believe that the site is being made safer than the current conditions as currently, the drive aisles do not line up with the driveway. So you come in, you are cutting across parking spaces as opposed to this -- this site will be realigned.

I'd like to have Mr. Going comment some more on the traffic and, specifically, comparing his study to what he has found analyzing on-site existing stores for Taco Bell on Long Island.

MR. GOING: Thank you.

Basically, we have done studies at approximately 13 Taco Bells on Long Island. This is mostly associated with rebuilds of existing stores and, basically, what I can tell you is that the IT numbers that I spoke of for -- for the lunch period, for the dinner period on a weekday, and for the Saturday lunch period are the ITE numbers are indicative of what a Taco Bell does.

The morning period, we actually haven't

done a lot of morning studies, actually, but based on my experience, the mornings are less busy at a Taco Bell than the ITE would show.

And any other questions?

COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: Did you look at the other locations in this area on South Oyster Bay Road, on Hempstead Turnpike? Were those included in your study?

 $$\operatorname{MR.}$ GOING: Not specifically those locations, no.

COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: Because those would seem to be the most relevant since they're similarly situated in the same area.

MR. GOING: I don't disagree with you, but as I said, this is data that we've collected at store rebuilds and locations that we've just collected over the years, so we didn't specifically look at any locations for this.

MR. AMATO: And what I would offer to the Board, if there are specific stores that you would like the applicant to study, that you think are analogous to this site, we'd be more than happy to study them and present the findings to the Board.

Mr. Mine?

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MR. MINE: So, sure, yeah, I just want to jump in on Mr. Amato's statements relative to the onsite circulation.

So as he mentioned, when you pull into the site currently, there's a row of parking, kind of, right down the middle so you have to choose to go to one side or the other and then there's a small alleyway to get to the rear of the building where there is additional parking.

The new layouts proposed such that you come into the site and it's a channelized driveway, two-way driveway with perpendicular parking to the drive, clearly striped, and you'll have clear sight lines to the drive-thru entrance at the rear of the site with the clearance bar indicating that it's for the drive-thru.

It's going to channelize traffic.

Drive-thru traffic will exit at the same point that the on-site traffic does and that is controlled by a stop bar and stop signs.

And additionally, there's pedestrian access from the right-of-way that includes ADA accessible ramps and it's also controlled via some fencing we proposed at the front of the site to make sure it's pedestrian friendly as much as it is

58 1 vehicle friendly. 2 MR. AMATO: So, Mr. Supervisor, we 3 await the Board's direction on a couple of 4 questions. 5 One, if there are some other existing Taco Bells you would like us to analyze to further 6 7 support our traffic study. 8 Second, whether the Board's preference 9 that we replace the existing 6-foot fence with an 10 8-foot fence. 11 And I think that would get -- this 12 concludes our initial presentation for -- our 13 presentation today unless there's some further 14 questions by the Board. 15 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: Could you provide 16 us with the list of Taco Bell locations that were 17 studied? 18 MR. AMATO: Absolutely. We'll provide 19 the list and the data. 2.0 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: Just to be clear, 21 you said that the earliest they would consider 22 closing would be 2:00 a.m. for the drive-thru and 23 12:00 for the restaurant? 24 MR. AMATO: Yes, sir. 25 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: And that's seven

59 1 days a week? 2 MR. AMATO: That's seven days a week, 3 yes, sir. 4 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: That's a deal 5 breaker, that we couldn't go to midnight during the week? 6 7 MR. AMATO: Could you hold one second, 8 please? 9 I just want to confirm my 10 understanding, it's -- we would have to check the 11 economic models. 

2 1 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Would you please 2 call the next hearing? 3 MR. ALTADONNA: Sure. Hearing P-4-17 to consider the 4 5 application of 4000 Hempstead Turnpike, LLC for a special use permit to operate a 246 square foot 6 7 convenience store together with existing gasoline 8 service station on premise located at 4000 9 Hempstead Turnpike, Bethpage, New York. 10 MR. ALTMAN: Good afternoon, 11 Supervisor, fellow Board Members. 12 For the applicant, David Altman from 13 the law firm of Harris Beach, PLLC, 538 Broadhollow 14 Road, Suite 301W, Melville, New York. 15 Just a little housekeeping, I'm going 16 to submit a couple of additional green cards into 17 the record which were returned subsequent to the submission of the affidavit of mailing and posting 18 19 for this site. 2.0 Also with me this afternoon is the 21 clients -- or the project engineer, Chris Tartaglia 22 from Highpoint Engineering. Chris is sitting to my 23 right. I also have with me, Frank Filiciotto, from 24 Stonefield Engineering. Frank is a licensed

engineer in the state of New York. He's appeared

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before this Board before as well on many occasions relative to traffic and parking testimony.

And you're familiar with Mr. Lynch who appeared on the last application. Mike Lynch is here with us today as well. Mike is a licensed

New York State real estate appraiser. He's prepared a written report relative to the effect of this application on real estate values. In fact,

I'll submit that report into the record right now.

Here's an original nine copies essentially concluding no adverse impact from the applicant's proposal.

That being said, I'll just try to be as brief as possible on this application. It's fairly straightforward. The property is 4000 Hempstead Turnpike located in Bethpage, New York. It is known by Nassau County Tax Map Number Section 49, Block E, Lot 226.

It is situated at the southeast corner of Hempstead Turnpike and Hicksville Road. The lot area is approximately 20,697 square feet, just under half an acre in area. The property has frontage on Hempstead Turnpike of 149.65 feet and frontage on Hicksville Road of 51.84 feet.

The property south lot line is 164 feet

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and the west line is 119, almost 120 feet. This property is a little unique in that at the corner, which is at the northeast portion of the site, that corner and part of the development which has existed there for years, is within the New York State right of way. The app -- that State right-of-way measures approximately 2,000 square feet in area.

The applicant has written permission from the State pursuant to a written agreement dated to 2/1 of '99, agreement number 2004 to use the state right-of-way for purposes of parking, beautification, i.e., landscaping, and, of course, signage.

That being said, this, as I mentioned, is an existing gasoline service station and repair facility. It has been used as such since circa 1949. A record obtained from the Town indicate that permits and variance relief were granted to operate an automotive repair and gas station at the site back to April of 1949. The applicant acquired the property many years later, as recently as July of 2013. The deed for that acquisition is recorded in the Liber at 12961, Page 469.

The applicant has taken steps since its

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acquisition to upgrade the site including in 2015, the replacement of certain fuel tanks at the property. Today, the applicant seeks to legalize a small convenience store which exists within the building. The convenience store, unlike many of the applications this Board entertains today where you have these 3 and 4 and 5,000 square foot convenience store applications, this one is a --would be almost considered kiosk in size in that the convenience store component here is approximately 246 square feet.

The overall building itself is a little over 2,600 square feet with the repair portion which is occupied by a Jiffy Lube and has been for many years, the three bay repair facility of approximately 2,222 square feet.

The applicant, as part of this application and to bring the site into compliance with contemporary gasoline station standards we all come to expect today, we pull in a gasoline station for the most part, that we have an overhead canopy to protect us from the elements.

This particular station does not. The station itself has six product dispensers. There are two proximate to the Hicksville -- I'm sorry,

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four proximate to the Hicksville Road frontage into proximate to the Hempstead frontage.

That being said, the applicant proposes to install a canopy along the Hempstead frontage which will measure 24 x 64 or 1,536 square feet and a canopy over the pumps approximate to Hicksville Road of -- measuring 24 x 48 or 1,152 square feet.

As a result, there will be a slight increase in the overall lot coverage of the site to approximately 24.9 percent or 51,000 -- 51,056, including the building. The character of the area, I'm sure the Board is well aware in this area, is predominantly commercial in nature. East along Hempstead Turnpike is completely commercial including an auto -- two-story auto glass facility next door.

Due south of the subject site is also commercial. It is a recreational batting cage facility and mini golf facility. Little bit further south on Hicksville Road is a site known as an Exxon mart, approximately 450 feet south.

To the north on Hempstead, we have Hempstead Turnpike as well as a Mavis Tire, a diner, and then a retail shopping center. Due west, we have Plainedge Plaza with the Rite Aid

Pharmacy and freestanding bank facility.

And then on the northwest corner, and this Board may be aware, was the recently developed and constructed Quick Check facility. So to put it in comparison, the Quick Check facility, which is roughly almost 7,000 square feet with a multitude of pumps to put it in perspective, we're looking for roughly 240 some odd square feet for our little convenience Store kiosk here.

Nearest residents to the site is on Hicksville Road. It's on the opposite side and it's more than 350 feet away. So, in summary, there's no residents proximate to or directly impacted as a result of this particular application.

There will be a few variances
necessitated by the application today. The
variances largely relate to setback of the canopies
from the front side in rear lot lines. That is,
sort of, part and parcel with development of older
gas station sites, as the Board is aware, and I
think the site is somewhat indicative of older gas
station sites.

They're built at busy street corners and typically on lots of 20,000 square feet or less

so when the sites are redeveloped under today's design standards, variances are often required to meet setback requirements. So we'll be proceeding to the Board of Appeals assuming this Board looks favorably on today's application for that variance relief.

I will also note, and I did mention somewhat tangentially in my previous comments, that this particular site is not, in terms of precedent setting, in fact, as I mentioned, it's been in existence for almost 70 years, but there are other gasoline service stations with convenience stores in the area.

We have one owned by LTR Gasoline Corp. at 4125 Hempstead Turnpike -- that's Section 46, Block W, Lot 64 -- that was granted permission for site plan approval and a special use permit by Resolution 598-03.

We have Hess Corp. which is now a speedway at the northeast corner of Hempstead Turnpike and Stewart Avenue, that's Section 49, Block C, Lot 303. That was Resolution 163 of 13.

We have the Quick Check, which I recently -- which I just mentioned. That was adopted last year. That was by Resolution 64 of

9 1 2016. 2 And then finally, we have the Bolla 3 Mart right down the street, which I mentioned 4 previously, and that was by Resolution 791 of 2010. 5 In addition, the site also has certain ground signage and other related signage for the 6 7 gasoline service station. A couple of the signs, 8 particularly the Hess signs for the gas station, 9 are located within the state right-of-way. 10 All that being said, that concludes my 11 comments. I wanted to keep it as brief as 12 possible. We ask that the Board look favorably 1.3 14 towards that end. I will also submit into the 15 record, copies of Stonefield Engineering's traffic 16 report and study so we have that. That is dated June 1 of 2017. 17 18 If there's any questions of myself or 19 any of my colleagues here today, we are certainly 2.0 happy to address any concerns the Board may have. 21 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Are there 22 questions? 23 COUNCILMAN MUSCARELLA: Yeah, I have a 24 question.

I went through -- I went by the

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property to post the public hearing for today, very nicely done. My pet peeve with gas stations is post-Sandy hurricane, when people went out and drove to get gas and they could not obtain the gas because it wasn't that the gas didn't exist, it was that the facility did not -- be able to pump the gas because of electricity.

MR. ALTMAN: Lack of power, right.

MR. MUSCARELLA: Do you have a generator on the property? Is there a generator that the electric goes out that you can --

MR. TARTAGLIA: I'll introduce myself for the record.

My name is Chris Tartaglia, owner of the firm Highpoint Engineering, appearing on behalf of the applicant.

So the site does not have a permanent on-site generator. I think the site area's somewhat limited to be able to provide that.

However, what it does have or shortly will have, is a transfer switch which would allow a portable generator to be connected and operate the facility. And in fact, that's a state law at this point. This site meets those thresholds and would have to have that transfer switch in order to

11 1 comply with the law. 2 MR. MUSCARELLA: And you would be up 3 and running the gasoline 24, 48 hours? 4 MR. TARTAGLIA: As soon as that 5 generator would be there, that would be in operation, and as soon as they could get product, 6 7 if they were running down. 8 COUNCILMAN MUSCARELLA: It is going to 9 stay BP? 10 MR. TARTAGLIA: Yes, there were really 11 no changes. 12 The only change is, as Mr. Altman indicated, were putting canopies up over the 13 14 existing islands. No changes to any 15 ingress/egress, pump islands or anything. 16 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Okay on the 17 convenience? 18 MR. TARTAGLIA: The 246 square foot 19 convenience, yes, sir. 2.0 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: It is not 21 currently being used as convenience store? 22 MR. TARTAGLIA: There's a small 23 built-out little snack shop area in there, yes, in 24 the full disclosure. 25 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: It's being used

12 1 legally or illegally? 2 There is no approval for MR. ALTMAN: 3 it. It was there when the property was acquired a 4 few years ago. We looking to legalize it as part 5 of the operate of the site. 6 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Have you received 7 any feedback from the residents? 8 MR. ALTMAN: No, we have not been contacted by anybody. There's no residents 9 10 proximate to the site, Mr. Supervisor. 11 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Has the owner or 12 the manager on site received any feedback, even 13 verbal feedback from the residents? 14 MR. ALTMAN: Not to my knowledge, 15 Mr. Supervisor. 16 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: Is alcohol served 17 on the premises right now -- sold? 18 MR. ALTMAN: There are alcohol sales, 19 beer sales. 2.0 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: Which was never 21 approved by anybody? 22 MR. ALTMAN: There is a State liquor 23 license. 24 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: But was not 25 contemplated when the structure was originally

13 1 built? 2 MR. TARTAGLIA: In 1949, no, not that 3 I'm aware of, no. 4 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Is the sale of 5 alcohol mandatory to your application? MR. ALTMAN: It is part and parcel to 6 7 the application, yes, sir. 8 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: If you're 9 application is not approved, would you be able to 10 still sell alcohol there? 11 MR. ALTMAN: We have the license from 12 the State. The answer would be yes. 13 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: But you don't have 14 an approval from the Town to use the property in 15 that fashion? 16 MR. ALTMAN: At the moment, no. 17 That's correct, sir. 18 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: You wouldn't be 19 able to sell anything if the application was 20 denied? 21 MR. ALTMAN: Ultimately, that's true. 22 Bearing in mind, of course, that we do 23 have our neighbors who already sell in the area 24 too, right? 25 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Understood.

3 1 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you. 2 We are going to have a presentation by 3 the Department. Commissioner, would you please approach 4 5 the podium and state your name for the record? COMMISSIONER LENZ: Richard Lenz, 6 7 Commissioner of Public Works and also Highways. 8 At the last Town Board meeting, it was 9 requested that Engineering and Highways put 10 together a proposal or -- a presentation, excuse, 11 of how we're taking care of our roads and 12 complaints and that's what we have a set up for you 13 today. 14 Matt Russo, he's a professional 15 engineer, he's the Division Head of Engineering. 16 He's going to lay out to the Board how DPW and 17 highways aren't going to be handling Town 18 complaints for the road repairs and reconstruction. 19 And also here today is also John 20 Bishop. He's the Deputy Commissioner of Highways. 21 So, if you have any questions, we can 22 also entertain and get into those also. 23 Matt Russo? 24 COUNCILWOMAN ALESIA: Commissioner, 25 before you step away, I just want to thank you very

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much for putting this together.

I know that I kind of put you on the spot at the last Board Meeting. We just have had -- I'm sure everybody up here is having a lot communication with residents that are confused as to what happens when they submit a complaint so it's wonderful that you're doing this.

I really appreciate your effort, John Bishop's effort, Matt Russo's effort.

Thank you.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: I too echo the sentiments of Councilwoman Alesia.

When I took office here, we said we are going to show the residents what we are doing, we are going to show them how and we're going to show them why. This underscores the fact that we are utilizing -- we are showing them through actions that we are following through with those promises.

COMMISSIONER LENZ: And because of the weather, you know, the bad weather conditions, the bad storms and stuff, it damages our roads even more between the salt and the sand and also expanding and traction of the roads. That's why we're having so much problems with our roads lately.

5 1 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Due to the 2 subzero temperatures we've experienced over the 3 winter? 4 COMMISSIONER LENZ: Absolutely. 5 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Commission, could it be that our roads are, for the most part, 6 7 are over 30 years old? 8 COMMISSIONER LENZ: A lot of the roads 9 are past their life so we will be getting into a 10 regular program. 11 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: That's not just 12 for us, it's for everywhere and every municipality. 13 COMMISSIONER LENZ: Absolutely. No, no 14 no. It's not that -- thank you very much, 15 Councilman. It's not -- it's not just for the Town 16 of Oyster Bay, it's within the Long Island, I could 17 really say. 18 And also, well, you can see what the 19 President is doing. He has initiatives for doing 20 the bridges over and things like that, you know, so 21 it's -- it's a structure -- infrastructure all 22 So we want to get the presentation so this 23 way you can see from -- how we start with -- with 24 the complaints and things like that. 25 All right. Thank you, Matt.

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MR. RUSSO: Good afternoon, everyone.

Matthew Russo, Town of Oyster Bay

Department of Public Works, Division of Engineering.

So what we'll be doing today is just going over the current road evaluation that's being undertaken by the Division of Engineering. And also, since there are some new members of the Board and for the public's benefit, just a brief walkthru of how projects get implemented throughout the Town.

So the Division of Engineering is within Public Works. We have a staff of six technical people. Our primary objective is project management of the construction projects throughout the Town of Oyster Bay. Engineering basically acts as an engineering consultant to the other departments. So any major construction project that happens throughout the Town, for any of the departments, will come through our office. So we'll work with Highways to do, you know, road reconstruction projects.

Environmental, we will do -- there are stormwater management projects, tank management, as well as oversight of our landfills at old Bethpage

and Syosset.

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For parks, obviously fields, pools, and General Services will be doing building improvements in generators. That's the sort of projects. So, basically, we're a liaison between the requesting department and the implementation side of the consultants and the contractors. Engineering does not invent the projects that are undertaken by the Town. The requests come directly from the Department, from their capital budgets so they'll come to us with a project and then will implement it.

Project management, these are some of the tasks that are involved in having a project go from its inception through the completion of construction.

Like I said, we'll liaison with the requesting Department, but we'll work together to put budgets, coronation with the consultants, and the contractors. We'll go over codes and standards to make sure we have all the necessary permits. We'll work with National Grid, PSE&G.

Many utilities that needs to be part of the project, develop contract specifications, and provide construction management in which a large

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part is complain and dispute resolution with -- either between a contractor or resident.

So how our project gets completed,

first, it starts with the request from the

Department. We'll get into the procurement of

outside engineering services, which I know there's

a big push to do more work in-house if possible and

we're doing that.

But I'll get to the reasons why for we use consultants services for our major projects.

So once we have an engineer on board, we begin the study or design phase for the project. Once the design is complete, we go to bid and ultimately, we get into construction. Besides project management, these are some of the other services we'll provide to other Departments and the Town Board.

Field investigations for evaluations like we're doing now, drainage issues, structural issues. We'll prepare reports as necessary. We will do some design work in-house, prepare contract documents for some smaller projects, as well as doing some sampling and testing as needed.

So why do we go to outside services for our jobs? Well, basically, it is the workload, the availability of personnel. For a typical road job,

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these are the many different types of specialties that are involved in getting a job completed.

Starting with a survey crew, which we do not have a survey crew at all in the Town.

That's a five-person operation on its own. Once the survey is completed, we get into the design phase where we'll have multiple engineers working on the different specialties.

As far as the regulatory oversight, the DEC for a road project has several layers of oversight starting with the natural resources and historic preservation review of any project we undertake. And then as a project gets further advanced, we have to go back to DEC for approval of our stormwater design.

And then, once we get into construction, we have a full-time inspector who is out in the field throughout the job as well as support staff. So there's a lot of people involved, more people than we have and this is just for one project.

For a typical road job, the design phase takes over 1,000 hours, 1,000 man hours to complete, so if we were to try and do it in-house, it would basically take my entire division working

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on nothing else for five weeks.

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: How many mile project would that be, Matt?

MR. RUSSO: A mile, mile and a half is our typical size.

Bid phases, you know, that's a shorter period, but once we get to construction, it would be having one personnel out in the field continuously for six months with a part-time support from the office. So it's a large burden and that's why, for the most part, we go to outside services for our contracts.

So I'll get into the evaluation that's being undertaken for our roads. I started with an initial list of priority roads that our Highway Department has provided based upon complaints received from the public and the staff is currently going out into the field and evaluating the roads that have been detailed. This is our inspection form that our engineers are using so they're recording the information about the road itself, its dimensions which will be used for developing cost assessments later on.

We'll be noting the type and condition of the curbs, the pavement and the drainage

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structures, so it's pretty detailed and that's from segment to segment. It's not entire roads; it's intersection and intersection. It's time consuming but we're getting through, we're making progress.

So once all the evaluation reports have been completed, we compile all that data into a spreadsheet. We are going be getting to categorize the roads by their condition, and at that point, we'll be determining what repairs are necessary for each road.

Three -- I'll write down the three categories basically for the types of repairs that would be done. Spot repairs, which is, you know, random pothole, maybe a piece of curb or filtrating structure.

These types of small, localized, these will be done by our in-house by the Highway

Department. Then we also have road resurfacing

where we basically have a fresh layer of asphalt is put down on the existing road; and then reconstruction is when we rebuild the road from the ground up.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Approximately, how deep is the bed of our roadway?

MR. RUSSO: Typical design is five to

six inches of stone and then we have three inches of asphalt on top, inch and a half of the base asphalt, inch and a half of the top asphalt.

There different methods for reconstruction. We have full depth where everything gets ripped up, carted off, and new is placed or we can do mix replace which basically recycles the existing roadway, which -- it is a preferable method but it is site specific whether or not you can use it.

COUNCILWOMAN ALESIA: Excuse me, Matt, when you talk about road resurfacing, is that like those -- the long patches that you're talking about?

MR. RUSSO: Yeah, that's when -- I'll have a picture but that's basically when the top layer of the asphalt that may be damaged or you have your cracking. It's ground up and removed and if the base layer of asphalt that is stone base remains in place, and you put a fresh even coat of asphalt on that.

COUNCILWOMAN ALESIA: And that we do in-house?

MR. RUSSO: No, those projects -- yeah, we do have some small equipment that can do some

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small pieces, but to do an entire sections of road, we would go out to a contractor for that.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: For the purposes of the information to the public, the process you just described, is that the same process that's referred to as mill and fill?

MR. RUSSO: Yes, yes, it is.

So, it's spot repair. This would be basically a pothole in this instance, that's localized, the rest of the road is in decent shape so we mark that a repair and it would be patched and it would look like that.

Mill and resurfacing, we would use it, in a case like this where you can see that the existing curbs and drainage system are intact and function properly, there's no major settlement on the road, it's basically, you just have your areas of cracking throughout the job.

Might be already some spot repairs in this area where we might have had some curb repair in the past or possibly a gas service connection where the road has been opened up.

So in an instance like this, where if we were to move forward with the project, this would be a candidate for the mill and fill where we

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would just put a fresh layer of asphalt on the top.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Is it more

prevalent a need to do spot repairs in very close proximity to a drain?

MR. RUSSO: The drainage structures are typically a point of failure in the road with the maintenance of the drainage structures when they're vacuumed out, we get all the debris out. There's the possibility that that structure can be undermined if you remove some of the supporting material. Soil that's holding that structure in place and then it will begin to settle and that's when we would do either drainage structure replacement or we could elevate the casting, the metal section that's flush at grade and then do an asphalt repair around it. So this is the mill and fill operation where you can see on the left-hand side.

The road -- the top layer of the road has been removed. In this case, you can see that the existing curves are left in place because they were in good condition, and on the right side here is the fresh asphalt that's going back down.

Full road reconstruction, this would be a candidate, it's kind of hard to see, but you can

see the areas of the curb have settled, either due to soil conditions, possibly a tree, they may have been there in the past, pushed the roots had pushed the curb line out, significant cracking throughout the road, major settlement. This would be a condition where we would recommend the full depth reconstruction.

So that's -- this is a picture of a job we did in Massapequa recently and you can see brand-new curbs, brand-new stone base and new asphalt going in. So once we determine the type of repair that is necessary for a road using its dimensions, we'll develop some cost estimates for Highway to use.

The spot repair, it's hard to estimate.

It's a case-by-case basis, what's involved.

Whether it is a drain structure or just a simple pothole.

For resurfacing, based upon past experience, it's about \$500,000 per mile to do the mill and resurfacing. And for reconstruction, about a million and a half per mile, and that number does vary depending on the site.

If the road has drainage and if that is sufficient, that number will go down, but the more

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work that goes into it, more drainage work, if it's a road elevation, that number can go up to \$2 million, but million and a half are our typical budgeting number.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And the 500,00 per mile reflects that mill and fill without the cost of the curb, sidewalks, drainage, just --

MR. RUSSO: Correct. Just the asphalt. It might involve some minor base repair, but it's basically just the top layer of asphalt.

All right. So working with a potential budget, trying to stretch the dollar as much as we can, we wouldn't want to put all the money in one type of repair, so it's best to spread it out so this is theoretical.

This is not our, you know, the typical way we do it, but we would take whatever budget was made available to us and divide up between our spot or localized drainage repair which we could do multiple sites and the balance split between resurfacing and reconstruction.

And you can see, based upon the cost estimates we provided, we could do three times as many miles with a mill and fill than with a reconstruction. But again, not every -- it depends

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on the road. Not every road is a candidate for that. All right. So after we've developed the cost estimates and the roads have been prioritized, we'll begin implementing the projects. We'll go to design and construction based upon available funding.

Currently, for this year, the sources of money we have are the available funds from the Highway Capital Budget.

We also have approximately \$1.6 million available to us for reimbursement through the CHIPS program, that's a New York State DOT funding program. The Community, local roads, and Highway Improvement Program is what CHIP stands for. So we have a million six that will go to any reconstruction project we do during the calendar year.

And we also have a site specific grant that we have obtained from the New York State multimodal program to offset the costs to reconstruct the Seabreeze and Canal roads. That's the balance of the area off of Alhambra Road.

We've done Alhambra and Beach over the last couple of years, that's the remaining piece, and we have obtained a grant that will be used towards the

construction.

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So to conclude, it is an ongoing process based upon the initial list of roads that we were given. We're working our way through that.

Moving forward, it will be a cooperate effort between Engineering and the Highway

Department so we'll be coordinating with their administration and operational personnel to get reports back from the field on roads that we should go out and inspect.

And as our list of priority roads are developed, we'll use that list to plan for the future, for a long-term planning of our capital budget. So that's the presentation so I'll take any questions that you guys might have.

COUNCILWOMAN ALESIA: I have a question.

So if I'm an average resident who has a street that's in bad shape, which I am, how do I know when mine is -- when is mine going to get done? I mean, that's what people want to know. How can I find out where mine is in the batting order?

MR. RUSSO: Like I said, Engineering works for the other departments so the first point

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of contact should be the Highway Department. And the Highway Department will be able to tell them whether or not if it's even on the radar or if it is being worked on.

If it is an Engineering project, if we have implemented a program for that road, they would be forwarded to Engineering and then we could give them an update on where they are in the process.

Once a road project is given to us from Highway with the funding, we'll go out to procure a consultant. Depending on the size of the road and the complexity, a road done in Hicksville or Bethpage is a lot simpler than a road done in Massapequa or the North Shore where you have to deal outfalls instead of recharge basins.

The process is a lot longer because the permits that are necessary. But a design could be completed in anywhere from six to nine months and then we'll go to bid and then, a typical construction period is six months. So once we have been given the green light, we're looking at just under two years from start to finish to have it done.

COUNCILWOMAN ALESIA: Wow, that long,

20 1 huh? 2 MR. RUSSO: Yes. 3 COUNCILWOMAN ALESIA: What about for the resurfacing? I suppose to the reconstruction? 4 5 MR. RUSSO: What we'll do with the resurfacing, we could either utilize -- if it's a 6 7 localized road that needs to be done and we have 8 the ability to use our requirements contract, 9 Highway Department can issue a work order for that 10 repair. 11 But based -- since we're doing such a 12 large amount of roads that are being evaluated 13 right now, what we could do is take all of those 14 roads and put it into a standalone bid contract. 15 And those projects go very fast because 16 the equipment it is in and out, so we could have --17 again, you have to prepare -- you still have to prepare construction documents. They're nowhere 18 19 near as complicated if you're doing a full 20 reconstruction project. 21 Let's say it's a standalone road, we 22 could just issue a work order; it can done in a 23 couple of weeks. 24 COUNCILWOMAN ALESIA: I think you're 25 aware, I know the Commissioner is, that we had a

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petition, the Board had a petition submitted by a resident who was actually here earlier. I don't think he was able to stay the entire time, but it had a pretty significant signatures from residents of Plainview that fell within one specific geographic boundary.

Would that an area that would be resurfacing, would it be reconstruction and what can we do?

MR. RUSSO: From the inspection reports that I have received for that area, I believe road resurfacing could be accomplished for that where there isn't a ton of issues with settlement, curb issues. It's basically asphalt that's in poor condition. So that would be a candidate for resurfacing so just having the ability to either issue a big contract or cooperatively with possibly another agency to get that work done.

COUNCILWOMAN ALESIA: Thank you.

I really appreciate your effort and the time that went into it, Matt.

Thank you.

MR. RUSSO: Thank you.

COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: You had mentioned that they were rating the roads and creating a list

of priorities.

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Is that list available? Is that something that could be made available to the public so that they know which roads are being looked at, which ones are on the radar, and which ones are coming up in the queue?

MR. RUSSO: Yeah.

Like I said, we had our lists provided from Highway with just a list of areas, I believe, addresses as well specific areas. I don't see why that wouldn't be -- couldn't be made available. We just have not gotten to the point where all the data has been compiled from the inspection reports, that will take a little time. But once that is completed and the evaluation is complete, I don't see why that wouldn't be available as well.

app that a lot of other municipalities are using that enables residents who come across a pothole or an issue, to take a picture with their phone and immediately I think it geo caches, is that right -- and it like -- it uploads to the municipality the location. Maybe that's something that we could look into just to sort of streamline the process for your crews and for us in Town Hall so, you

23 1 know, kind of cut out the middleman. 2 MR. RUSSO: Sure. COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Matt? 3 MR. RUSSO: Yeah, I believe the number 8 doesn't vary that much from year to year and the 9 multimodal funding for Seabreeze and Canal is a 10 one-shot deal. 11 But -- so the CHIPS funding, we know 12 we're going to get so that could be used towards 13 any project we do. 14 Any other grant program that we apply 15 for, the problem is it takes a while for that money 16 to come through and it is typically a reimbursement base, it's not cash in hand once you get the 17 18 agreement so if we're talking for immediate 19 projects, the 1.6 and the 381 is what we had this 20 year on top of the Highway budget. 21 COMMISSIONER LENZ: I just wanted to 22 add -- Councilman Macagnone, we had submitted 23 approximately \$3 million worth of road work to the 24 Governor's Office for grant purposes. 25 Of course, we haven't heard anything

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yet, but that's already in the works. All right.

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Thank you, Rich.

I know you guys are doing the best you can with what we have. I appreciate the effort.

I'd like to see more money put into the roads.

Eventually, hopefully, we'll have it.

COMMISSIONER LENZ: Good.

of the things we talked about -- I know you had stepped off -- was that there are apps now available for the phone that enable residents to sort of create a direct ticket if they see an issue, a pothole or whatever, can go to -- other municipalities are using them. I was wondering if that might be something you --

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: We should certainly look into it and decide if that -- and see what it costs and the more we have, the better ability we have for residents to let us know what's going on, calling our offices and transmitting to us these needs, the better.

COMMISSIONER LENZ: And as Matt was saying, Highway has been fielding a lot, a lot of pothole requests for repairs and John Bishop with his crew has been doing an outstanding job in

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trying to get to everybody.

Unfortunately, due to a limited crew when a little bit -- you know, I mean, we're doing the best we can so we'll get to -- eventually, we'll get to everybody.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: As you stated before and as we've seen at other municipalities, because I talk to the heads of all the different municipalities, including the State, that the fact that we had a very difficult winter, a lot of cold temperatures, even if you don't have a lot of snowstorms, just a cold temperatures of the expansion and the cracking of the roads.

Do we see more problems in the spots that are the low spots near drains? Obviously, that's got to be the lowest spot in the road to draw the water toward the drain. Are we then seeing more problems, cracking and so forth near the drains, near the lowest spots in the road because there's more water being absorbed?

COMMISSIONER LENZ: Yes, we are.

So that's something that we have to take care of around the castings and also sometimes the piping that is going out from there, there's also -- sometimes it might be a crack in the pipe

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or something and that's also causing problems that we have to take care of.

know you are in numerous associations with other professionals of your type, municipal professionals, municipal engineers, are these the problems that they're all talking about and they're all seeing these problems throughout all the municipalities in the State?

COMMISSIONER LENZ: Absolutely.

And as I say, it just seems to be because we've been having such bad winters, such bad, long winters. It's not necessary just snow, as you had stated, it's also the coldness. And if you remember this year, the coldness lasted a long, long time and that's when we start getting more cracking and then more heaving of the road and that's when we get the more damage.

COUNCILMAN HAND: Commissioner, could you talk about the coordination of efforts with gas companies, water departments as they schedule water mains and gas mains and how we can have some cost sharing there?

COMMISSIONER LENZ: What we normally do is when we're doing a road job, we ask the

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utilities to -- well, first of all, we contact all the utilities, tell them that we're going to be working in the area. We also -- water from the water companies, the gas companies, the electric companies, we ask them to do all their repairs before we get in and then they'll make all the repairs, then we'll come in and finish the road to the proper elevation and take care of it that way.

There is times where there is damage to the pipe especially our water mains, again, because of the bad winters, that they have to come in in the middle of winter and make those repairs. So then they'll come back later on and patch and then later on, they'll come back and do the proper repair. So we do -- have been working together with all of them in trying to make the proper repairs at the times.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Any other questions?

I have a question for Matt. Statement and a question. The statement is, this is a wonderful presentation. We appreciate this, and I know the public appreciates this. It's helpful to the media.

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MR. SKLAR: Second longest meeting I've ever been to. The last one, you fell asleep at 4:00 in the morning at Syosset High School.

In reference to 301, that's 75 Thorman Avenue. I spoke about this five or six weeks ago. We had cleaned up this property. It's an abandoned house on Thorman Avenue in Hicksville, Right next to a beautiful \$650,000 house that I just built a veteran next door.

I had asked, can we go to the County and have this house condemned? It's an unsafe house. It's half falling apart. We have vagrants that come periodically and break open a back door and sleep in the back. The homeowner next door can't believe what's going on and I'd really love to see something happen with this property already.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you, Larry.

We'll get you an answer.

 $$\operatorname{MR.}$$ SKLAR: Now, I have the second one I'd like to mention.

In North Massapequa, on Lake.

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Is this part of the calendar?

MR. SKLAR: It is important. You really want to hear it because this is a comic, okay.

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On Lake Street, there is a housing development owned by the Town of Oyster Bay. Call Jim Pickens and he won't give you an answer. They put in brand-new doors in this entire development last week, over a week ago, but they made one mistake.

They put in fire doors in the rear instead of putting a door with a lock and key so the tenants can get in and out. Got handicapped people, senior citizens living there and they can't get in through the handicapped entrances and it's five days already and nobody did anything.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: We will make sure that that gets addressed immediately. That's very important.

MR. SKLAR: Thank you.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: You that we look into that.

MR. SKLAR: It's Lake and -- 40 Lake Street and Clark.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: 40 Lake Street.

Okay. Thank you.

Robert Frier? Robert Frier?

MR. McKENNA: He had to leave.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Paul Molinari?

RIPP: I wanted to start out with 22 Resolution 309. I want to bring your attention to 23 the backup material here -- first of all, this is a 24 Resolution where we're looking to sell \$15 million 25 in revenue anticipation notes and the backup

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information, there's very little information here.

It's says that -- there's no mention of any of the interest rates or the terms and it claims that -- normally, from what I understand in a revenue anticipation note, you -- you bought -- you sell the notes, get the money, and you do some sort of project with it.

And what you have here is in anticipation of the receipt of aid from the State of New York, the sales tax revenue and mortgage stock recording as what you intend on counting on to repay this \$50 million.

And I like to bring your intention that the lack of backup material, I don't believe you should proceed with this Resolution today.

I don't know if you received the

June 2nd decision in my last Article 78. I

specifically had made an Article 78 based on the

Town's repeated violations of the open meeting law

and I'd like to inform you that Judge Brown ruled

that the Town of Oyster Bay Town Board shall report

to the New York State Committee on open government

for a training session.

COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: Which Resolution is this on?

14 This is on 30 -- I'm 1 MR. RIPP: 2 speaking about 309. 3 And if you read what -- the point I'm trying to make is, if you get a chance to read 4 5 this, this is Index Number 183417, Ripp against Town of Oyster Bay, you'll find out that the judge 6 7 rules that you need to answer people's questions up 8 here. Not answering questions is considered 9 violating open meetings law. 10 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Let me start off 11 right now by answering a question and providing 12 some information. 1.3 Just for public consumption, this was a 14 lawsuit that you brought against the Town and you 15 lost, so it's very important --16 MR. RIPP: No, I won. This is a -this is a lawsuit that I brought against the Town 17 18 and I prevailed on everything. 19 This lawsuit has to do with -- there 2.0 are two instances of violations of open meeting law 21 which you're now going to be attending remedial 22 training on. There were a number of FOIA requests 23 which were legally withheld which. 24 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: I think we're 25 getting a little off.

15 1 MR. RIPP: I'd like to answer the 2 question, please. 3 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Certainly. 4 MR. RIPP: So -- so I just want to 5 question so we're on the same page. All right. The judge in this -- in this action has 6 7 ordered that you have 30 days to answer my 8 outstanding FOIA request by June 30th, you have to 9 provide to the court all the information in regards 10 to Mr. McCaffrey and the 26 individuals that were 11 interviewed for his position. 12 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Let's get. All 13 of these things have nothing. 14 MR. RIPP: What's going to happen is on 15 July 18th, we're all going to go back to court. 16 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Mr. Ripp, let's 17 get you an answer. If you make --18 MR. RIPP: I'm sorry. I'm still 19 answering question. Let me finish answering your 20 question. 21 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Make the 22 accusation, we're not answering questions because 23 right now, you're way off of the Resolution. 24 MR. RIPP: I'm answering your question, 25 sir.

17 1 received it yesterday and e-mailed to the entire 2 Town Board. 3 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: I did not receive a copy. I apologize, but I didn't receive 4 5 it. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Let's make sure 6 7 we get another copy to the Council Members. 8 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: I got it from 9 Mr. Ripp this morning actually. He e-mailed me a 10 copy this morning. 11 MR. NOCELLA: Sure. 12 I can show you how it was e-mailed to 13 all -- even from my phone, but it was e-mailed from 14 my office. 15 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Either way, let's 16 make sure that each and every one of the Board 17 members have a copy in their possession so that --18 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Mr. Nocella, so 19 if I don't get back to you personally, please reach 20 out to me because I will say I got it. 21 Thank you. 22 MR. NOCELLA: Yes, absolutely. 23 Councilman Imbroto did get back to me, 24 acknowledged receipt of it. I'll note that if --25 I'll actually ask everybody to acknowledge receipt.

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Just receipt and if I don't get an acknowledgement from you, Councilman, I'll forward it in some other form.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Well, it was not germane to the issues at hand for the public's consumption. I believe it's very important to set the record straight.

Mr. Ripp is under the impression that he won this lawsuit.

Can you speak to that?

MR. NOCELLA: That's largely incorrect.

Almost every form of relief that he sought was denied by The Court. He wanted to nullify two Town Resolutions. The Court denied that request. It upheld the Resolutions and said we could go forward with that.

And there were other applications that were made by Mr. Ripp, they were denied in their entirety. During oral argument, Mr. Ripp was asked about his FOIA requests and he said he was no longer interested in them and he abandoned them.

That's part of the judge's written order; however, did grant the FOIA requests. We believe that's an error as we also believe certain other elements of Judge Brown's decision are in

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error and we intend to take an appeal which incidentally stays any relief that was granted.

Mr. Ripp didn't correctly note that

Judge Brown recommended that the Town Board have

open public meeting training, but I want to note

that Supervisor Saladino's entire proposals that

lead to open and transparent government caused us

to have this as part of the agenda anyway.

We were planning on training, especially for the new members of Town government and for the new members of the Town Board and all those would benefit from a refresher course on that.

So even though that segment of

Judge Brown's order is stayed, it's still something
that's consistent with your initiatives toward open
and transparent government, we intend to go forward
with voluntarily.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Mr. Nocella, is it true that we have now added ethics training to the different types of training for our Town Board Members and our employees?

MR. NOCELLA: That is absolutely correct.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And is it true

20 1 that the Town Board members have attended that --2 I'm sorry, the newest one, I'm not positive if he 3 has --4 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: I did not. Т 5 was out of town. COUNCILWOMAN ALESIA: I haven't 6 7 attended it yet. 8 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Can we make sure 9 that not only that we provide new dates for ethics 10 training for out Town Board Members that we're also 11 including this information that the judge had 12 recommended? 13 MR. NOCELLA: Yes, most definitely. 14 Again, Supervisor, I believe it had 15 been planned by you all along as part of your 16 transparency and open government initiatives, so 17 that's why regardless of whether the judge's order 18 is stayed while we're pursuing an appeal, we intend 19 to go through with it voluntarily. 20 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you very 21 much. 22 So, Mr. Ripp, let's get to the 23 question. 24 MR. RIPP: So, 309, the resolution 25 itself, sir, I don't think you should vote on this

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2.1 1 today because it is my opinion based on the judge's 2 prior decisions that you haven't produced enough of 3 the backup information that nobody can really understand. 4 5 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: You're opinions were proven to be faulty. 6 7 MR. RIPP: I'm sorry? 8 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Your opinions 9 were proven to be faulty by The Court. You just 10 heard the decision. 11 MR. RIPP: I just heard Mr. Nocella's 12 rendition, but the transcripts that I have are 13 going to prove everything that he just wrong. 14 So in relation to 309, I don't think 15 that the Town has followed the open meetings law 16 and provided adequate information before you vote; 17 especially, \$15 million in revenue anticipation 18 bonds. 19 I mean, I'll ask you, what do you 20 intend on doing with the money? 21 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Okay. If you're 22 done, you can take a seat and we'll describe that. 23 MR. RIPP: No, I'm not done and my

time's not up so I have some more Resolutions, but

I'd like to ask you, what are we going to do with

22 1 the \$15 million? 2 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Happy to get 3 these questions answered once you're fully done. 4 MR. RIPP: Okay. So just answer that 5 one. 6 Do we intend on using it? 7 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Sir, maybe we're 8 having a communication --9 MR. RIPP: I'd like to know what we're 10 going to do with the \$15 million? 11 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Maybe we're 12 having a communication breakdown. 1.3 Please use your time to give us the 14 information you like us to know and then please 15 take a seat and we'll get the information answered. 16 MR. RIPP: I'd like to know in regards 17 to Resolution 318, I'd like to know why we're 18 involved in doing business on school property. 19 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: Wasn't that 20 tabled? 21 MR. RIPP: 318 was tabled, sorry. 22 And Resolution 323. I don't understand 23 why the Town -- this looks -- this is almost like a 24 mini Singh thing, in my opinion. 25 Why would the Town get involved in a

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surfing school where the revenue we expect to get is between 4 and \$5,000? You don't, again, this isn't something that you're missing some serious backup information. There's no -- there's no insurance information here.

These are surf lessons, stand up board lessons. Does it make sense for a company that's going to make 4 grand a year for the Town? What if somebody drowns down there? At that -- to me, that makes no sense at all.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you for your opinions.

MR. RIPP: You're welcome.

In Resolution 312 -- well, actually, 312 and 324, these -- I want to try and straighten this out because we spoke about this in the past.

Now, 312 is the Liberty Industrial site and from what I understand, what we're in litigation now is how much we're going to pay for the property, so I'd like to know how much -- how much we've paid year to date in litigation over that and then -- and then 324 -- is it -- yeah, 324, now this is the Bethpage Community Park.

Now, we're in litigation over that because somebody is going to be responsible for the

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proximate \$81 million cleanup, so I'd like to know where we stand on that one also.

And then I just have 301. It's really the zombie houses. I was under the impression that that 45 Thorman, I thought we had passed --

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: 75.

MR. RIPP: 75. Thank you,

Mr. Macagnone.

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I thought you had passed a Resolution to demolish that time, a meeting ago. Maybe I misunderstood, but what I'm interested in is, if you remember the grant money that we received back with Resolution 617 of 2016, I think we've got almost \$400,000, and the Town had made plans to hire people and to train people for the zombie -for the New York State Zombie Register Plan, so I'd like to know how we're making out with that, who's handling that, but what I'd really like to know is what we're going to do with the \$15 million for the revenue anticipation bonds, how you plan on spending that money. If it's just going to be used for you to make, you know, ends meet, to meet payroll, or if you have some sort of projects planned, so if you could answer me that about the 15 million, I'd really appreciate it.

25 1 Thank you. 2 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Miles of road 3 would be nice. 4 MR. RIPP: You know what, while I have a couple of minutes. I had -- I was wondering, you 5 6 know, what maybe it's for public comment. 7 thought maybe the Town we might be able to get more 8 hands on involved with some of the road 9 construction and maybe create some employment for 10 people, but we'll talk about that at public 11 comments. 12 Thank you. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you. 13 14 Is Mr. Darienzo here? 15 MR. RIPP: You going to answer my 16 question, sir? 17 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Please be 18 respectful. 19 Mr. Darienzo, would you please step up 20 to the microphone? 21 Mr. Darienzo, we've had conversations, 22 we've had conversations, many conversations about 23 financial issues, correct? 24 MR. DARIENZO: That is correct. 25 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Okay. So we have

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bonds that are coming to maturity?

MR. DARIENZO: The Resolution that's on the calendar today is for revenue anticipation notes. We're asking the Town Board to authorize the possibility to issue them at some time during 2017. There isn't -- there have been no issuance made for this purpose so far this year and there cannot be unless the Town Board says so.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Isn't it correct that we're still waiting for monies from the County, our portion of the sales tax and other revenues?

MR. DARIENZO: That is the exact reason for this resolution.

While the Town of Oyster Bay prides itself on paying its bills in a timely fashion as soon as they come in, not every receivable that's due to us comes in in the same timely fashion so it's no secret that our cash position has deteriorated over the couple of years and we're in a precarious situation which we are making inroads towards improving, but we're not all the way back just yet, so this allows us to borrow money on a short term basis until such time as the money due to us comes in.

27 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And then we'll be 1 2 paying it back? 3 MR. DARIENZO: Correct. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you very 4 5 much. MR. RIPP: I'm sorry, what was the 6 7 interest rate, sir? 8 MR. DARIENZO: As I mentioned --SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Wait a second. 9 10 I'll be asking the questions. 11 So would you please tell us about this 12 interest rate? 13 MR. DARIENZO: The Resolution 14 authorized the possibility to issue debt at a time 15 later this year. There's no interest rate because 16 we haven't borrowed any money yet. 17 If the Town Board agrees to allow us to 18 potentially borrow money, at that time, we will 19 sell these notes, and at that time, we'll have an 20 interest rate, but there's no interest to report at this time. 21 22 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: So basically you 23 want us to vote on something we don't know what 24 it's going to cost us? 25 MR. DARIENZO: Well, I can't exactly go

to the market to borrow money without your authorization.

MR. MUSCARELLA: That's how it's always been in the past, correct?

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Councilman, I realize it's been that way in the past, but it really hasn't worked in the past.

MR. MUSCARELLA: But you can't just determine that until you know whether the Fed raises the rate, what our bond rating is, and everybody else in the marketplace, correct?

MR. DARIENZO: Typically, a revenue anticipation note is different than a bond anticipation note or a bond itself.

You guys, the Town Board authorizes a capital program almost every year. We haven't done one for the past couple of years, but when we authorize a capital program each year, those authorizations are in effect for a period of five to forty years. The Town Board authorizes the possibility at any time during that timeframe, to issue debt. And so you never know at the time of the authorization exactly how much interest is going to be.

In this case, because it's a revenue

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29 1 anticipation note, the request is to be issued at 2 some time during 2017 so shorter period than any other authorization that comes before this Board. 3 4 With that being said, I still can't 5 quarantee what the interest rate will be at the time of borrowing. 6 7 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: Mr. Darienzo, do 8 you go out into the market? Is that how this is done? 9 10 MR. DARIENZO: Yes. Absolutely. 11 Once, you know, we issue debt two to 12 three times a year. Our next band renewal is due 1.3 up on June 28th, so if the Town Board sees 14 favorably, we will have a revenue anticipation note 15 that happens at the same time as the band renewal. 16 To have the issuance happen all at one time to save 17 costs for our bond council, our financial advisors 18 rather than have another issuance, you know, three 19 or four months down the road. We will be 2.0 duplicating the same efforts and paying them twice. 21 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Are there any 22 other questions? 23 Thank you very much.

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MR. RIPP: Are you going to answer --

MR. DARIENZO: No problem.

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SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Mr. Ripp, you're going to have to show a higher level of patience and decorum in this room.

You just were upset when I called Mr. Darienzo up here because, I guess, you were assuming I was calling on another resident when actually I was calling on a Town employee to get your question answered.

I am now calling on another Town employee to get to one of your other questions answered, but we're dealing with a situation that does frustrate the residents when they come here in good faith to conduct themselves with decorum and patience and deal with government.

As it is, they've had to listen to you make accusations that are far from the truth and I will remind you, again, to conduct yourself with decorum, with patience and professionalism.

I'd like to call -- I'd like to call.

I'd like to call Commission --

MR. RIPP: You are making blanket -- SUPERVISOR SALADINO: This is exactly what I'm talking about.

I'd like to call Commissioner Pinto to come forward.

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Thank you, Commissioner Pinto.

We're going to try to get the residents questions answered even in despite the fact he's arguing against getting questions answered that -- right now. The question came up about the surf school.

Please, Mr. Ripp, try to contain yourself.

The question came up about surf school and can you tell us if the public had asked for a surf school? Can you tell us a little bit of the history of this?

COMMISSIONER PINTO: I'll tell you what I know about surf school. It was done last year as a pilot program which the Town and the residents really enjoyed the relationship that we had with the people doing it.

The Town residents were loving it, so this year we decided to go out and put out an RFP.

I think it's a three-year contract. Quite honestly, the first -- the first group of proposals came in a little bit lower than what the committee had hoped, so we sent it back out and the fees have been elevated.

Matt Rozea and myself. 4 5 Then she writes, "After reviewing all the documentation sent, Michael," this is the guy 6 7 who's bidding from the other company, "Michael 8 advises that his quote was higher then Allied 9 Risk," who is Salerno's insurance company. 10 And basically Michael tells them that 11 they should go with Salerno Brokerage. 37 1 I'm not -- I wasn't in the insurance 2 business. 3 Mr. Muscarella was. I hope you're not connected to Salerno Brokerage. I'm only kidding. 4 5 MR. MUSCARELLA: No. MR. McKENNA: No, I was not in this 6 7 business, but this is a big -- this is a big bid. 8 I mean, we should have gotten six, ten bids, you 9 know, it wasn't put out to the public and it wasn't 10 on the website. 11 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: As soon as you're 12 done. 13 MR. McKENNA: I'm done. 14 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Okay. 15 Well, why don't you take a seat and 16 we'll get you some answers on that. 17 Mr. Rozea, would you please come 18 forward? Town Attorney. Please, Mr. Scalera. 19 Can you walk us through the process to 20 reach this point including the facts related to how we advertised for the RFPs and what we did to 21 22 follow the law on this. 23 MR. SCALERA: All right. 24 Good afternoon members of the Town 25 Board. It's been a while since I was up at the

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Donna Swanson briefed me. She had to run off to court. Donna Swanson handled this, but I know how she did it. We, you know, we've done this in the past. One of the things I've been hearing repeatedly, a constant theme of a lot of the meetings but I've never got up here to quite explain it, there is a difference between an RFP, request for proposal and a bid and a lot of folks in the audience sometimes use it interchangeably.

A bid, pursuant to General Municipal Law, 100-103, is what you call the bid that goes out and it comes back sealed. And then they're opened in this Town Boardroom and numbers are written down, that's a bid.

There's an RFP, which is more likely what we use for things like lawyers, and services, like, insurance services and the like.

Big difference between the two. Two different statutes, two different sets of rules.

In this particular instance, insurance goes out in an RFP. An RFP, you can send out -there's many ways that you can do an RFP. You can publish it in the newspaper. You do not have to.
You can send it out by e-mail, you can send it out

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by letter, you can send it out by fax. You can do it many different ways. In this particular instance, Donna Swanson, of our office, the Town Attorney's Office, went out to five different brokers, went to five different brokers with an RFP. The RFP had the specs of what we needed for insurance, what kind of coverage and the like.

What kind of deductible, of the five brokers, two of them -- one of them is Salerno Brokers, his company, and the other one being CBS Coverage, Inc. responded to the RFP.

Salerno Brokerage provided two quotes from insurance companies. CBS provided, I believe, only one. Of the three quotes of the actual insurance companies, the lowest responsible one, the best one for the interest of the Town was Allied. I don't know the rest of the name. Allied is the actual company that's insuring the Town and that is what is presented for this Board to choose.

It is insurance that we purchase every year. Not all brokerage firms respond. It is not uncommon in the fourteen years I've been working here where you could send it to ten brokerage firms. For some reason, they don't respond. But we sent it to five and we got back those three

quotes from those two brokers. And the comment that Donna -- I saw the comment of -- the note she put in the file that she met with Matt Rozea and the person from CBS Coverage and that person you mention the name, Kevin, that person basically saw the quote and said, "I'm not going to able to beat Allied Insurance Company at the \$178,000."

That number, if you look back on prior Resolutions going back ten years, it's pretty much been consistent between the 165 to the 185 range, so this pretty much falls in line with that. And that's it. It's that simple.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Can you please tell us what process we went through in order to alert these insurance companies these, brokers, that we were interested and how many did we contact and why aren't we contacting more?

MR. SCALERA: All for -- the answer first -- to answer your first question, Donna sent it to five brokerage companies, five.

Can we send to more? Yes. We'll send to more, but five is in keeping with proper procedure under General Municipal Law 104-B. We sent it to five, and we got those responses.

Like I said, we've had this issue

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before where people question it.

Can we send it to more? Sure, you can send it to what -- you could send it to 100 brokers, you can send it to 1,000 brokers, you can publish it if you like, but again, we have to balance as well because in the service industries where RFPs are used, publication of RFPs does become guite expensive.

We can go into the hundreds of thousands of dollars a year going into RFPs. So what we're doing now and Mr. Nocella, from my office, what we're beginning to do is get more people on e-mail lists, particularly with attorneys and we'll e-mail them. We're using that method. And we'll proceed with this in the future to get more brokers.

But, again, the price, Mr. Supervisor is pretty similar that I've noticed over the years.

MR. MUSCARELLA: First of all, when you go to the market, different insurance agents would bid on certain insurance. The expertise within the field that they have will go. Municipality insurance is pretty difficult.

Number two, Salerno, who is a broker, goes out to the marketplace. He markets it to

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every company so a new insurance agent who wants to bid on it is normally shut out of the market because he can't obtain the market that he already went to.

The only way you can obtain the quotes of the current Salerno would be to get a change of broker. Okay? But what happened probably was an agent came in there, looked at it and said, can't compete. Because he goes to every company that specializes within municipality insurance. what he probably did. He gets all the quotes and he provides the best quote for the Town of Oyster Bay. And that's what the procedure has been in the past. You can go to ten different brokers or most of them will decline writing it. Okay. Or even bidding on it so -- because a number one, there of the expertise and, two, you know, they go to the marketplace. The marketplace is already obtained, the quote is out there and it comes back to the Town of Oyster Bay.

So, the Town does get other quotes from this particular agent, Salerno, so he'll come up and say for property, we have five different insurance companies that actually bid on it --

MR. SCALERA: Correct.

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MR. MUSCARELLA: -- and the best one is this company, that's an admitted company, we'll suggest that.

Also what's contained within the quote is the loss history of the Town of Oyster Bay or the client. So they would look at that and say this is the past and, I guess, Donna Swanson is determining, okay, go with it. She has a trust with the agent. So I know in the past, I know no other agent has competed because they can't, because they don't have the expertise.

MR. SCALERA: It was good you mentioned that because in talking to Donna Swanson, there were, like you said, there were some -- there were some brokers whose response was, we're not going to give you quotes. There were actually responses. I just gave you the two that actually gave us affirmative responses, an actual policy quotes.

MR. MUSCARELLA: An agent will come, gather the information, go to the marketplace, get a quote. They know what the quote is currently that the Town of Oyster Bay is paying.

From that point on, they'll determine whether it's worth it or not to come back to Town

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of Oyster Bay, but within the agency, I would assume, Salerno, which he's doing, he, in the past, I've looked at it, he's come up with multiple companies that specialize within municipality insurance, and that's why.

MR. SCALERA: I do know, just from experience, that Salerno Brokerage Company does obtain insurance from insurance carriers for other municipalities.

MR. MUSCARELLA: He's also a very large agent, he's very professional and he gives service that, I guess, Donna, and so that's where it's at.

MR. SCALERA: But he did come back with the most -- the most efficient or the lowest price out of the other ones so we're not going to reject it if it's the lowest price given the coverage that we wanted pursuant to the specs in the RFP. Okay.

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Also on 323, can we get a copy of the bid documents?

I mean, it just says who won the bid.

I can see who else bid on it and see what the comparison is.

I'd like to be able to see -- you're from the Town Attorney's Office. I'd like to see apples to apples. If you don't mind, from now on

The State is interested and the time is right to utilize, not only my relationships, but the resources of the recent State budget which calls for preserving open space.

Realizing that this was the right thing to do and because of our attention to our environmental resources, we are utilizing this opportunity to present these properties for permanent preservation.

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I believe that the -- all the residents that I've spoken with support this initiative, they support open space preservation, they support recharge of our ground water, protecting the species and as well as the importance of recognizing that we preserve property wherever possible. So I thank you for the support of our Board.

Is there any public comment on this issue?

Mr. Ripp? We just ask that your comments be germane to this Resolution.

MR. RIPP: Robert Ripp, 77 Sunset Road.

Sounds like what you're doing is the right thing, but the problem is I don't see any reason why you didn't release any of this information, why this even has to be a Walk-On Resolution.

these properties have been identified in recent months since I took office. The Governor passed legislation to further provide open space and protect our environment as of the April 1st budget. What we did not -- what we were not sure was whether or not this legislation -- this is about Albany legislation. Whether or not we would need a Home Rule Message so we are doing this in case The Home Rule Message is required and why we're not waiting is because there's a limited amount of days left of session in Albany where the State

Legislature can vote.

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We can continue to look at this meeting after meeting here because there's an unlimited amount of public meetings here in the Town of Oyster Bay, but there are limited amount of session days and we want to provide them with a backup.

This is all very common to the process in Albany where they are -- where they require Home Rule Requests in order for legislation to reach the Assembly or Senate floor, depending on the legislation, so that it meets the muster and one of the requirements is something known as a Home Rule Message or Request.

We are providing that to not put any hurdles from our end for this legislation reaching the Assembly floor and we appreciate the work of our legislators and our Governor to recognize that we must do everything possible to protect the open spaces left here in the Town of Oyster Bay here in Nassau County.

23	Let the record reflect P-13-17 passes
24	with seven "Ayes."
25	P-14-17 passes with six "Ayes" and one
