2. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Good evening, 1 2 ladies and gentlemen. Welcome to our Oyster Bay 3 Town Board meeting of Tuesday, September 12th. 4 I'd like to ask you all to rise, 5 please. 6 Before we poll the Board, I would like 7 to ask you all join me in a moment of silence in 8 memory of those we lost sixteen years ago during 9 the September 11th attacks on our nation. 10 (Whereupon, a moment of silence was 11 observed.) 12 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you. 13 Our 9/11 remembrance ceremony at Tobay 14 Beach was a very moving tribute to their memories 15 and our hearts go out to all of the families, and 16 survivors, especially those in the Town of Oyster 17 Bay. 18 This evening's prayer will be led by Father Frank Nelson, Pastor of Maria Regina Roman 19 20 Catholic Church in Seaford, New York. 21 Maria Regina parish is a Roman Catholic 22 Community Church located in the south shore of the 23 Town of Oyster Bay and consisting of some 6,000 24 families.

According to Father Frank, on any given

3 night, you might find 15 people cooking in the 1 2 parish kitchen to provide food for the Interfaith 3 Nutritional Network and a family faith session for 4 over 1,800 children, perhaps choir practice or hand 5 bell choir and the rosary being prayed at Our Lady's Grotto on Jerusalem Avenue, Liturgy 6 7 committee meeting and outreach volunteers providing 8 food or advocacy for any number of the ministries. 9 So, to lead us in the pledge, Father 10 To lead us in prayer, rather. 11 (Whereupon, a prayer was recited by 12 Father Nelson.) 13 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Our Pledge of 14 Allegiance -- thank you, Father. 15 Our Pledge of Allegiance will tonight 16 be led by Lisa Ryan, President of the Blue Star 17 Mothers, Moms of Military New York 12. She's a 18 proud Army mom and a Hicksville resident. 19 Lisa, would you please join us? 20 (Whereupon, the Pledge of Allegiance 21 was recited and led by Lisa Ryan.) 22 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you. 23 Now, I'm proud to call Lisa up to the 24 podium for a special Blue Star Banner Presentation. 25 Please welcome Lisa and the members of

her chapter in attendance with us this evening.

The Blue Star Mothers of America are a national organization that provide support for mothers who have sons or daughters in active service in the United States Armed Forces.

Lisa.

MS. RYAN: Thank you.

Good evening. My name is Lisa Ryan. I am the President, as he stated. Same with Nicole DePaolo, she is one of our vice presidents and Mary-Anne Barcellona, who is our Chapter Secretary, also a Town of Oyster Bay resident. Her son has separated from the Unites States Marine Corp.

Nicole has two sons currently serving in the United States Air Force. One is getting ready to deploy to the flood zones and my son is currently serving in the United States Army. He is currently serving in a land very, very far away, which I'm not allowed to tell you.

Our Chapter started in December 2014.

We started with 22 members. We now have over 74

families that are currently in our Chapter. If you know a military family in your neighborhood and they have one of these banners in their window, please let them know that there's a Blue Star

Mother Chapter in their area.

We're here. We meet the third Thursday of every month at the VFW in Hicksville. There's a Chapter in Suffolk County, if you know anybody in Suffolk County. Tonight we're presenting the Town with two banners. One for each of the Town Halls and a flag that can be hung.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: We'll come down to accept that and I am also going to ask

Councilwoman Rebecca Alesia, a very proud mom in her own right, to help by presenting this Town citation to you with the help of all of our Board members, our elected officials.

MS. RYAN: Thank you.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Jim Stefanich is a Blue Star dad. Also very proud.

(Whereupon, a Town Citation was presented to the Blue Star Mothers by Councilman Alesia.)

(Applause.)

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: As I mentioned earlier, we had our 9/11 remembrance ceremony at Tobay Beach. It was a very moving tribute.

Since the last time our Board met, the Town of Oyster Bay has dedicated a street in

remembrance of FDNY firefighter Raymond Pfeifer of Hicksville.

I ask that you all join me in a moment of silence in memory of Ray and those first responders who have passed away and continue to battle 9/11 cancers and illnesses.

(Whereupon, a moment of silence was observed.)

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you.

It is important to point out, we also had a very special ceremony at Burns Park on the morning of 9/11. Many, many members of the community took place -- took part in that as well as our firefighters and emergency responders and we thank them all.

Now, much has occurred in the past several weeks. We've recognized good samaritans for saving the lives of a resident who almost drowned while boating on the Long Island Sound.

We also joined with police and other community leaders in denouncing the antiSemitic graffiti at Syosset and announcing a Crime Stoppers reward to help those impacted by the devastation left behind by Hurricane Harvey.

We collected thousands of donations

from residents which are now on their way down south to help out the survivors of Harvey and now, obviously, the survivors of Irma. I want to thank our residents and Island Harvest for doing such a great job with helping to make a difference.

Unfortunately, Hurricane Irma struck our fellow Americans in Florida. We are renewing our efforts in collecting donations for families in these areas and will to keep the victims of those impacted by Hurricanes Harvey and Irma in our thoughts and prayers.

On a more upbeat note, we launched free wi-fi service at Tobay Beach to the delight of many. We hosted the Town's first ever waterfront festival and 32nd Annual Bluefish Tournament. That was this past Sunday. Thousands of residents enjoyed the events of the day, the live concerts, all of these delivered free to our residents. It was really a fun and special day, as well as a day of education in environmental protection. Our residents expressed much satisfaction with both.

I remind our residents, the Town continues to offer free adoptions at our animal shelters throughout the month of September.

Additionally, a free rabies vaccination

clinic will be offered for dogs and cats and ferrets on September 16th.

I also remind our residents that our Traveling Town Hall Tour continues this week providing enhanced transparency, helping residents in their own neighborhoods with anything they might need help with in terms of Town of Oyster Bay services.

And I remind residents that the Town and YES Community Counseling Center are hosting a free overdose prevention and Narcan training seminar on Wednesday, September 27th, at Massapequa High School, and we would like the public to join us so that we can make a big impact in the combat of the heroin and the opioid crisis.

Tonight, the Town Board welcomes corporate officials and two local franchises from the 7-Eleven Corporation here with us this evening. The Town of Oyster Bay is proud to honor the community contributions and exemplary actions of 7-Eleven.

Besides operating highly respected and popular franchises across the nation, the 7-Eleven Corporation is involved in numerous charitable endeavors that help people, advance worthwhile

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causes, and make our communities an overall better place to live.

One shining example is the generous support as a luncheon sponsor of the 2017

Long Island Special Olympics Spring Games held at Bethpage High School which featured more than 500 special needs athletes competing in various sporting competitions. It's a great service to our local residents who can now enjoy reading a good book in the great outdoors.

Troop Leader, Tina Giordi, who would like to say a
few words about this exciting and innovative

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Okay. The way this works, and for everyone's information, our statute includes the following:

We are allowing membership in the Academy of Model Aeronautics to serve as proof of the liability insurance. One million dollars per occurrence, two million dollars aggregate. That's, obviously, if anyone gets hurt.

From October 1st until April 31st, you just get the permit and you use your drone at will. This covers landing and taking off from Town property.

MR. KRAMER: But the way the form is written, and the way we're reading it here, it doesn't say that particularly and it's general in the way it's said.

It basically says all these things and all these things, so if it's written this way, that means you have to write it that way.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Well, I think it's relatively clear and we can bring Matt Rozea

up but basically, you don't need to contact the Town. You just need the permit. And I want to make it very clear that there's no charge for this permit. Some people were frustrated with the fact that the media didn't get that information out.

We are not looking to charge anyone and there's no criminal penalties, only the civil penalties of a fine for breaking the Ordinance.

So from May 1st to September 30th, that's the tines when people are out sunning themselves in bathing suits, using our pools, more children outside, and to protect their privacy if something is spotted, for instance, on the Internet. We want to be able to go back and know who was using their drone with their camera on that particular day, but we didn't want to make it so difficult so as to have to report every single day all year long because it's a little different situation during the colder months.

MR. KRAMER: I understand that and I agree with you on it in that sense.

The time frames are 9:00 to 7:00 p.m.

Over that period of time, under the laws of the FAA and other ones, we can't fly -- we can only fly a half hour after sunset, and as of right now, which

would be in that time frame, I would not be able to fly at all for that day in the evening because sunset is already at 7:00, so if the number between 9:00 and 7:00 was adjusted -- for us, most of us who want to -- going to be flying these types of drones that are over -- or planes or anything else over the weight limit of 2 pounds, we're more of a -- a better hobbyist. We are looking at what we are doing. We are going out usually to look at sunrise/sunset from the photography point of view.

The law says we can fly -- under the FAA, we can fly a half hour before sunrise and one hour -- and if you were to do an item that says more like a half hour before sunrise, one hour after sunrise, one hour before sunset, half hour after sunset, that would allow us without the permitting process of going over and over and in to file for that over the whole course of the Summer, which is most of the time when no one is going to be at the beaches in the first place. Very few who are at -- at most of the parks where we would be doing our flying. That would be an acceptable, you know, time frame for us. That would probably cover 98 percent of the people flying as of right now during the Summer hours. The other 2 percent would

be filing for the permits when they want to go
during the day. I don't know if that would be a
worthwhile amendment. I think it would be a
worthwhile amendment. I think it would cut down on
your paperwork immensely and you would satisfy
almost all the photography people in the world.

Listen, I also look at it and say,
well, if you're asking for a camera and you say
what is the camera, why is this camera on this
drone, in the particular draft that you have, I say
are you asking that of every person who walks into
the park with their camera, why do they not get
attacked for the camera they're having?

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Well, it's very clear and we went over that in so many different Board meetings and public sessions that when someone has a drone, it gives them the ability to --

MR. KRAMER: Take pictures like my 600 millimeter zoom?

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Well, you know, it's a little different. When someone's on the ground, there's a little different expectation and you can see them.

Having said that --

37 1 MR. KRAMER: I have some photos of the 2 sun the other day, the eclipse. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Having said that, 3 4 we're very happy to take your views into 5 consideration and to consider an amendment to further improve upon the legislation. 6 7 MR. KRAMER: I would accept that as if 8 it was something that was going to be looked at if 9 you guys aren't going to be approving this 10 particular amendment tonight with these types of 11 amendments on it. 12 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: Mr. Kramer, do I 13 understand that for the most part, other than these 14 minor scribbles, you support the legislation, you 15 think that it's a fair compromise? MR. KRAMER: I do think it's a fair 16 17 compromise. 18 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: Okay. 19 Because we -- we had many meetings with 20 stakeholders in the drone community, the 21 photography community, to hammer out these details 22 to have something that's workable for everybody. 23 So, you think that, for the most part, 24 it was a good compromise, but there's a couple 25 minor tweaks that you would suggest?

MR. KRAMER: Yes.

I would agree and someone else will be up here to talk about the minor.

COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: So perhaps we could revisit that at a later date just so that we have a framework that works for everybody and then we can revisit it?

MR. KRAMER: Some of the other people that came into the group and met and sat down weren't able to make it tonight and some of these comments were discussed amongst them and they seem to agree with that type of scenario also.

COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: Okay.

So if you could provide us with something in writing, maybe some further suggestions, we could revisit that at a later date.

MR. KRAMER: Yes. Thank you.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you, sir.

In relation to the people that were previously mentioned, we have letters from Scott Harrington who said, unfortunately, I have an obligation that came up last minute, would not be able to attend the hearing, but he would appreciate it if the following letter could be read out loud at the hearing.

"As an Oyster Bay resident and local UAV based business owner, I'd like to commend the Town Board for their decision to accept input from the local hobbyists and commercial UAV community to draft tonight's proposed ordinance.

"Creating sensible legislation for this emerging technology is no simple task and the Town's openness to input has helped create what I believe is the best UAV legislation yet on Long Island.

"My hope is that other towns in the near future will look to Oyster Bay as an example of UAV law that works, a law that smartly addresses privacy and noise concerns without putting an economic burden on the many great UAV startups in the area.

"In passing this ordinance, I hope we can ensure that drones are operated in this Town safely and courteously.

"Thank you again to the Town Board and Town Attorney for the great work.

"Scott Harrington."

I also have a letter from Anthony Anzalone.

"Dear Town Board and Supervisor

Saladino, I am one of a small group of UAV pilots that attended the meeting with Mr. Rozea to discuss this legislation.

"Unfortunately, I cannot attend this evening; however, I would like to thank the Board and Mr. Rozea for taking the time to listen to our input and incorporating our advice and expertise in crafting this new draft. It was a pleasure working with Mr. Rozea.

"After careful review, I feel this ground work is substantially better to what was previously brought to the table. At this time, I have no other objections to the draft that is being proposed; however, I encourage the Town Board to consider this a work in process and continue to be open to suggestions as issues arise.

"Respectfully, Anthony Anzalone."

And I can say for one, that we are very open to suggestions as they arise and future amendments to this legislation.

Our next speaker is Ed Anderson.

MR. ANDERSON: Good evening, everyone.

Ed Anderson, Syosset.

I was one of the people who came in at the last discussion of this bill and I also want to

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compliment the Town Board.

Thank you to Matt for spending the time with us to take input from the community. It is very well reflected in the new legislation which I also endorse.

Since I came in with such strong objections to the previous one, I felt that I wanted to come down personally to say how much I appreciate your openness to input and I think that this is a very fine piece of work. I have a couple of minor suggestions.

As you put in context, I have no problem with the Bill as it stands, just, I'm offering a couple of small points.

The first one has to do with penalties. Since this substantially involves regulation of an activity which has, to this date, not been regulated at all by the Town, I'm concerned that people are not going to be able to know about it. So your first offense here is a \$500 penalty. So the average hobbyist has been flying in the park for the last thirty years safely and without incident.

Someone who is now enforcing this says, oh, here's a bill for 500 bucks for doing what

you've been doing your whole life.

I suggest that you institute a first offense warning that can then be recorded so a repeat offender can be recognized rather than hitting them with an immediate bill of \$500. So, just a suggestion. I think it will go a long way to avoiding seriously disgruntled citizens.

Another minor point, again, none of these are what I would call show stoppers, just offers of suggestions. And I think this goes to somewhat of what Ken was talking about. Your permit is for a period, October this to April that, or whatever the dates were, but on one of the details that has to be filled in, it says, and on what date are you going to be flying. Well, I'm going to be flying from October this to April that. So, you know, there's an assumption here that this is a single instance when, in fact, it's not. It's just an inconsistency of the permitting process with the rule. That's all it is.

COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: And you're referring to the application form?

MR. ANDERSON: Yes. Yes.

COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: Yes, we could work

25 on that.

MR. ANDERSON: Just something that -you know, I would look at this and think, how the
heck do I fill that in? You know, it's a six-month
permit if I'm going to fly from October 1st to this
that.

The second item that I wanted to bring again, it is around the permitting. Has do with whether or not this is a permit for a person or a permit for a device.

As I was reading through this, it appears to be that you're permitting me as opposed to any device. Now, I fly model airplanes. I don't fly drones. But I have 30 aircrafts.

Now, do I need 30 permits or do I need one permit to permit me to use my 30 aircrafts in accordance with the regulation. It is a matter of clarification.

When we went through the FAA registrations which were then struck down, I was registered, not my aircraft. So I think you just need to clarify in your Bill what's being registered here.

Just like my driver's license doesn't say which car I drive, it says I'm permitted to drive, so just a clarification on the permitting

process.

The last thing is it doesn't say how the permit is going to be handled. At the last meeting, we talked about them being done online on the website. There's no reference to it here.

So, is this something that people are going to have to come down to Town Hall to get a permit or is there going to be a website for it?

Just a question to you that has to be addressed.

Last item is, how are you going to publicize this? Again, you're now regulating something that's never been regulated before.

A lot of this hobby activity, people flying in the parks, thing I did with my dad when I was a kid. How are people going to be notified that now this activity is regulated? I don't know what the normal procedure is, but, again, this goes back to the warning. This goes back to people who want to comply with the rule, want to comply with the law, have no desire to break any rules, just don't know they exist.

Just some thoughts for you, but, again, my compliments to the Town, to Matt for the fine work that was done here. This is a tremendous improvement over what we saw before.

I'll go back and 10 listen to your answers. 11 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Okay. 12 On 593, that would be, I believe, Commissioner Lenz. 13 14 COMMISSIONER LENZ: Good evening. 15 593 is -- really, it's telecommunications. That's really P&D in this 16 17 particular time. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Commissioner, 18 19 would you step up? 20 COMMISSIONER LENZ: But I have some 21 other. 22 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: No. There's a 23 Highway component to it, so you can --24 COMMISSIONER LENZ: Absolutely. 25 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Why don't you

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just take a seat right in front so we can talk about that, but if you can start off with that, Commissioner Maccarone?

COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: Yes.

Resolution 593 is to bring on a consultant to Planning and Development who we procured through our Town's procurement policy.

The name of the firm is Center For Municipal Solutions and they are one of the leading companies in the country.

They have overseen over 5,000 installations of cellular communication towers and antennas. As you know, the Planning and Development had not issued any -- we were not charged with any issuing of any permits in the Town Highway right-of-ways. Any existing cell towers on private property or antennas, they do come through Planning and Development under our Zoning Ordinance; however, in the right-of-ways, we have never been charged with administering that program.

So under this new legislation that's being passed tonight, Planning and Development will be coordinating with the Highway Department, but we will be issuing the permits and overseeing the entire process.

We -- based upon the federal legislation and rules and regulations that we have to comply with, it is a learning curve for the Department of Planning and Development.

The staff has been gearing up over the last few months. The Plan Examiners have been reading the legislation, speaking with other municipalities who already have some legislation in place and educating themselves. This consultant will work with us because there's very tight guidelines as municipalities have to respond and review building permit applications for these things.

We have a 150-day timeframe. It is called a shock clock. So when an application is submitted, we must begin reviewing the applications within that 150 days and any comments we give back to an applicant, they can take as long as they want, but as soon they submit the application, the clock starts ticking again. So this a two-year contract. It is based upon, you know, our needs, if we need to use them.

One thing that is very important to note is that this is no cost to the Town of Oyster Bay. The applicants, when an application is

submitted, they are required to set up a trust account and any money that is spent for the consultant will be drawn from the trust account and will be replenished as needed, so...

The consultant has worked for a number of municipalities on Long Island including Great Neck, Laurel Hollow, Southold, Town of Hempstead. There is a number of municipalities and so that's kind of where we are tonight.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Can you tell the audience and those watching on the Internet, under what conditions would a special use permit from the ZBA be required?

COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: There are certain -- whether it's in a residential zone or a commercial zone, those would go before the Zoning Board of Appeals and there would be a public hearing, but getting to the Zoning Board of Appeals, there is a lot of background information, site visits, balloon tests, all the things that have been put into the new legislation, we will be reviewing ahead of time, within the 150 days, including the Zoning Board of Appeals hearing.

So it is a very condensed timeframe, but there will be public notice to the residents of

that area. The ordinance calls for, and really strives for co-location, not placing these in residential zones, to enhance the quality of life, to try to get them in the commercial zones to see where existing poles exist so that we're not installing new poles, and those are the things that the consultant will work with us in our site visits.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: That's probably one of the most important factors here.

Clearly, a motivation and we've discussed this, talk to us a little bit more about our discussions about keeping these out of residential areas.

COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: Yes

That is one of the goals that we will work and strive for. The applicant will be required to provide us with a map and try to demonstrate why they need a pole or an antennae in a certain location, but then we will go out to try to find an area. We will look to place them on municipal property. You know, maybe perhaps locating them near sumps, away from residential areas, in commercial establishments as well as they have to demonstrate the need for this type of

1 structure in the location that they're asking for. 2 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Based upon your 3 research, would it appear as though this is one of 4 the most stringent codes in the nation? 5 COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: Absolutely. 6 Absolutely. 7 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Why do you say 8 that? 9 COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: Just based 10 upon all the studies that need to be reviewed when 11 they submit their applications and all the check 12 points that are in place to provide for a full 13 review of any of these antennas in the 14 right-of-way, whether it's what we call, a whip 15 antenna or, you know, a major tower which, I mean, 16 technology is going away from the major towers. There are all these smaller antennas that are going 17 18 up, but we have to keep in times with the new 19 technology and, you know, this new Ordinance will 20 help us with that. 21 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Are there any 22 other questions for the Commissioner? 23 Thank you very much, Commissioner. 24 Commissioner, would you join us? 25 want to speak to some of the Highway aspects of

this process.

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COMMISSIONER LENZ: What originally was happening is, as discussed earlier, these are right-of-way antennas that were being put in on telephone poles and things like that.

After reviewing it, when we came into office, I realized that this was -- needed to be researched even more so and that's why we wound up looking into changing the code and also getting a different consul -- a consultant to assist us in this area.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Okay. Thank you.

COMMISSIONER LENZ: Do you want me to
answer the other questions also while I'm up here?

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Yes. Thank you.

582, Resolution 582 was to put a concrete restoration contract out for emergencies.

COMMISSIONER LENZ: Okay.

19 It's just for -- yes, sir.

COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: We discussed this at our meeting. We have to have it just in case God forbid, another hurricane hits up here and trees take a sidewalk out. We have to have something so the right-of-way wouldn't have to go out to bid.

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COMMISSIONER LENZ: That's exactly what it was for and in assisting us, we used Nelson and Pope to assist us in putting the specification together. That was the reason why we went that way.

On Resolution 545, what we are asking for is to have an existing contract with Benson.

It's a second-year contract.

Now, there's a misinterpretation in what the Resolution says. It's only a maximum of \$250,000. When I say "only," that's to repair the methane piping, methane treatment facility and methane flaring system.

Again, this is just a requirements -- requirement emergency contract. This is not a permanent contract.

It wasn't a bid or anything. It was bid last year and we're just extending the contract for a second year in case of an emergency on the methane at Old Bethpage Landfill.

COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: Commissioner, we are very happy with their services?

COMMISSIONER LENZ: Yes, we have been and that's why I felt it was necessary to do it again.

In the past, we had used Benson for the treatment plant. Over the years, we have done such a -- the Town of Oyster Bay has done such an excellent job on the treatment plant, we have turned that over to the DEC because our treatment is not necessary over at Old Bethpage Landfill anymore. We have treated everything we need to and now they have another plume that they're taking care of with that.

So, again, this is only for the methane treatment facility.

On Resolution 536, what we did is we bid the project. This is for the North Amityville Community Center.

COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: North Massapequa.

COMMISSIONER LENZ: North Massapequa. I've said that so many times. I don't know why that comes out.

North Massapequa Community Center, we bid it -- well, first of all, let me back up for a second.

The insurance company said that they feel the job is worth around \$900,000. We bid it and that's using a single prime contract, it came

2.1

to 1.4. I said, okay, well, we are not close to the insurance company.

We repackaged it, bid it again and it came 1.2 and that's using a four prime contract so we went back to the drawing board, so that's for this, for Wilkie to repackage everything and to rebid it. Okay, so we went back to the drawing board and now we went to the insurance company and said, hey, listen, we got two bids, one 1.4, one 1.2, what can you do for us.

They reviewed with different contractors, various contractors, and they're willing to do it at their -- through the insurance monies so there's no additional cost to the Town to rehabilitate this facility.

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Are they going to follow the labor laws of New York City?

COMMISSIONER LENZ: They're going to follow the labor laws.

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: They're going to have certified payroll?

COMMISSIONER LENZ: Yes, sir.

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: And we're going to have apprentice language requirement?

COMMISSIONER LENZ: Yes. Yes.

MR. OSTRICK: Hi. I was just reviewing the revised draft. I was wondering what the new terms regarding inspection of the wireless facilities are. I couldn't pick it out of the revised draft. I want to understand it.

MR. ROZEA: It is pretty straightforward.

What we're requiring is that the carrier or the applicant who is responsible for the installation certify to the Town on a semiannual basis that it's equipment is operating within the limits that have been established by the Federal Government and the FCC with respect to RF.

So this is -- I want to be very clear about what this is. This is not regulating environment effects.

What we're doing is asking that they certify and provide the data to show that their equipment is operating within the limits established by the FCC.

Alternatively, in certain cases, an actual RF test will be required of the applicant to demonstrate compliance with the regulations, but we're not regulating on the basis of environmental

effects.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And the carrier is responsible for all those costs, not the taxpayers?

MR. ROZEA: Undoubtedly.

MR. OSTRICK: Before you disappear, the second half of that is, what are associated penalties with failure?

MR. ROZEA: Well, if the equipment is not operating within the limits established by the FCC, I would imagine that there's -- first of all, regulatory action that the FCC may take is against the carrier, but there is certain relief set forth in the Ordinance with respect to noncompliance with the Ordinance, but I don't want to speculate too far as to what may or may not happen with respect to a carrier or particular equipment that is or is not operating within the established facility. It could be any number of forms of relief, yes.

MR. OSTRICK: I'm not trying to be difficult. I haven't had a chance to read it, so I just don't know what the penalties are. I didn't see it in the Ordinance.

COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: Page 19 has the penalties.

MR. OSTRICK: Okay. Thank you.

Thank you for that. I appreciate it.

I just want to thank the group of you. You moved swiftly. Our residents had a lot of concerns about this. I know there were a lot of other residents besides those in Hunting Hill, Woodbury.

I appreciate the diligence that the office showed, the Attorney's Office and the office as a whole. Talking with our residents, we have another upcoming meeting so I'll be happy to brief them on this.

The only other thing that I got an e-mail about that is partially related to this is right at the entrance to our neighborhood, one of the existing poles, which I know are subject to ongoing discussions, and I don't want to have the group comment on that because I know you're involved in litigation.

The only thing I wanted to bring to your attention is that the group let me know that the area where the pole was placed in the corner of Avery Road and Elm Street is where we wanted to put neighborhood signage.

It's directly smack in the middle.

There are a number of communities within Woodbury

65 1 that have signage for their neighborhood so it's 2 something I wanted to bring to the attention as 3 part of the discussion with the group. It is not a 4 necessarily health-related concern because I know 5 that's not going to get us very far, but in terms of the willingness to relocate that, that would 6 7 help the group. 8 Thank you. 9 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you. 10 Thank you for recognizing our 11 tremendous commitment to protecting the community. 12 Mr. Rozea, would you please make sure 13 that the carrier knows of the community's interest 14 in placing signage at that location? 15 MR. ROZEA: Of course. 16 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you. 17 All right then. 18 Looks like there are no other speakers, 19 so is there any correspondence? MR. ALTADONNA: No correspondence. 20 21 I'll call for the vote, Supervisor? 22 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Yes, please. 23 MR. ALTADONNA: Motion to adopt 24 Resolution Nos.
