1 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Good morning,
2 ladies and gentlemen, and welcome to this meeting
3 of the Oyster Bay Town Board for Tuesday,
4 September 13, 2022.

5 For those joining us this morning, you
6 have the opportunity to be heard on matters brought
7 before the Town Board, as well as during the public
8 comment portion at the end of the meeting.

9 As always, this meeting is being
10 live-streamed on social media and on the Town's
11 website, oysterbaytown.com. These proceedings are
12 recorded and later transcribed, and your voice is
13 very important to us.

14 Statements, comments and input from the
15 public, relative to our meetings, are always
16 welcomed and respected, and we will always respect
17 one another and everyone speaking at the meeting,
18 please.

23 Leading us in prayer this morning, as
24 we begin every Town Board meeting with prayer,
25 please welcome Rabbi Joel Levenson of the Midway

1 Jewish Center in Syosset.

2 Under Rabbi Levenson's direction, the
3 Midway Jewish Center offers spiritual guidance and
4 dynamic programs, and you are quite the friend to
5 us.

6 Rabbi, welcome.

7 RABBI LEVENSON: Thank you, everyone.

8 Let's join together in prayer.

9 Our God and God of our ancestors who
10 gives salvation to nations and strength to
11 governments, bless and safeguard these United
12 States of America and all those who dwell therein.

13 May brotherly love ever be found among
14 all citizens of our land. Impart in the hearts of
15 all of us a steadfast purpose to work as one for
16 the safeguarding of freedom, justice and peace, and
17 grant to all constituted officers of this Town and
18 State wisdom and understanding that they may lead
19 this Town and this County and our State in justice
20 and righteousness, and we say, Amen.

21 ALL: Amen.

22 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Rabbi, thank you
23 very much, not only for being with us today, but
24 for your inspiration during our 9/11 ceremony --
25 the ceremony we held last Thursday -- there's been

1 a number of them here in our Town, all of them
2 wonderful, but we appreciate your friendship and
3 your participation at that very important ceremony.

4 God bless you, and thank you again.

5 Leading us in the Pledge this morning,
6 we're very privileged to have two distinguished
7 Vietnam War-era Veterans from the Bayville American
8 Legion -- United States Marine Corps Corporal E4
9 Joseph Hili and United States Marine Corps Sergeant
10 Joseph DiLorenzo.

11 Gentlemen, the podium is yours.

12 (Whereupon, the Pledge of Allegiance
13 was recited by Veteran Joseph Hili and Veteran
14 Joseph DiLorenzo.)

15 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you,
16 gentlemen.

17 We greatly appreciate all that you do
18 for us, all that your fine organization does for
19 Bayville, for the entire Town of Oyster Bay, and
20 for all Americans.

21 God bless you both.

22 I'd like to take a moment to remember
23 all of our Veterans, all of our -- those in the
24 United States Armed Forces serving in the Homeland
25 and throughout the world, for our men and women in

1 law enforcement, and, of course, for all of our
2 first responders, who are very important to
3 recognize throughout the year, but especially at
4 this time when we remember those we have lost on
5 9/11, and those we continue to lose due to 9/11-
6 related diseases.

7 The attacks on America on 9/11 were
8 horrific and so tragic, and we're very appreciative
9 for all of those who we have lost.

10 (Whereupon, a moment of silence was
11 observed by the assemblage present.)

12 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you.

13 Please be seated.

14 This is an important time, as we said,
15 to recognize all of those who played a role in 9/11
16 and also our ceremonies, which we're extremely
17 proud of.

18 We held a ceremony on -- last Thursday
19 at TOBAY Beach, and it was absolutely wonderful.
20 And our staff did an incredible job with the
21 planning and the carrying out of that ceremony, so
22 we want to especially thank the Department of
23 Community and Youth Services, the Department of
24 Public Safety, our Parks Department, and all of our
25 residents and friends who attended.

1 It was a very, very special tribute,
2 and I am hoping that from Public Safety we can get
3 those videos that we had of the photos of our loved
4 ones, get that out on our website, if it's not
5 there yet, so everyone can take a moment to look at
6 the images of our loved ones. It was wonderful
7 videos that were shown that day. We really want to
8 thank everyone for that ceremony.

9 We'd also like to commend retired NYPD
10 Detective Tom Smith and retired FDNY Lieutenant
11 Frank Haskell and their Board for the commitment
12 for the Towers of Freedom 9/11 Military Monument in
13 Massapequa and their dedication toward all the
14 planning that goes into that annual ceremony. We
15 salute you.

16 This year's ceremony was held this past
17 Sunday. We rang the bell at that monument twice
18 for the moments that the planes hit the Towers --
19 each of the Towers -- and then after a very
20 heartfelt ceremony -- there wasn't a dry eye there
21 for sure -- after that moment, we all took turns
22 putting flowers on the monument, and then each
23 person there who wanted to get a chance to ring the
24 bell, and it sent a strong message around the world
25 to hear that bell ring over and over and over

1 again. It said that we will never forget, that we
2 are one community, and that our resolve is as
3 strong as it's ever been.

4 I want to especially thank my
5 colleagues who were in attendance at all of the
6 different ceremonies and, of course, that Sunday
7 night, another ceremony was held up on the North
8 Shore. Because of the rain, it wasn't held at the
9 monument, instead, it was held in T.R. Park --
10 Theodore Roosevelt Park -- inside the equipment
11 storage garage.

12 So we would like to thank the
13 commitment and involvement of everyone in Oyster
14 Bay including the Atlantic Steamer and Oyster Bay
15 Fire Companies.

16 We'd like to thank Senator Gaughran and
17 former Senator Carl Marcellino, who co-chaired the
18 committee and hosted that ceremony.

19 Thank you, again, to all of my
20 colleagues who attended that ceremony as well. It
21 was very, very special, and we continue to
22 recognize so many at this time of year, but let's
23 remember that we are one Nation all year long.
24 Let's remember that we are one family in the Town
25 of Oyster Bay all year long.

1 Let's remember that our military
2 personnel risk their lives, so we can have a
3 freedom of speech and listen to one another, and
4 let's remember all of those who wear the uniform
5 and rush into danger to protect our lives, our
6 safety and our property.

7 Whether they are our police force, our
8 Public Safety, our first responders, our
9 firefighters, our volunteer firefighters and those
10 in healthcare, and I thank everyone for your
11 different roles, and I appreciate the fact that
12 this time of year -- and we're going to work on all
13 year long -- staying together as one family and one
14 country.

15 Before we start the business of our day
16 this morning, I remind our residents that September
17 is National Children's Cancer Awareness Month, and
18 the Town is proud to advance initiatives that seek
19 to cure and support those affected and their
20 families.

21 Every year, we partner with the
22 Christina Renna Foundation to build awareness
23 around this important cause by tying gold ribbons
24 around the columns entering Town Hall. We've also
25 illuminated our building in gold and honor those

1 affected by childhood cancer.

2 As some know, on January 11, 2007,
3 after a hard fight and a courageous battle,
4 16-year-old Christina Rose Renna succumbed to a
5 rare soft tissue cancer. Christina never prayed
6 for herself but, instead, for others so that they
7 would be spared the ravages of this disease, and
8 the obstacles it presented. She dreamt of a world
9 free of cancer, and that is the continuing
10 inspiration for Christina's family, and the members
11 of the Christina Renna Foundation.

12 Our own Councilman Tom Hand is a Board
13 member with this amazing organization. We commend
14 his work and are extremely proud of the part to
15 support these efforts and eradicate childhood
16 cancers, so we thank Councilman Tom Hand.

17 But I'd also like to thank, personally,
18 thank our Councilwoman Laura Maier for all of her
19 work as well in recognizing, helping and supporting
20 all of those affected by cancer, especially
21 children.

22 Why don't we give you both a minute or
23 so to talk about an issue that's very important to
24 your hearts.

25 Would you like to go first,

1 Councilwoman.

2 COUNCILWOMAN MAIER: Sure.

3 Thank you, Supervisor.

4 So, I think, many of you have been
5 following my journey, my son's journey for the last
6 three years -- I can't believe I'm saying three
7 years -- so August 19th of 2019, my then
8 three-year-old son, Mason, was diagnosed with very
9 high-risk acute lymphoblastic leukemia. Say that a
10 few times. Little did I know that from that moment
11 on that our lives and our world would change
12 forever.

13 He is a strong little boy. He's six
14 years old right now, just entered first grade and
15 is playing every sport imaginable -- soccer,
16 basketball, football, baseball -- his favorite
17 sport -- but little do people know that the battle,
18 the journey that he has been on these last few
19 years.

20 And I have been very fortunate to not
21 only have the support of my family, but to have
22 support of the Board members and the community, and
23 this is something that not everyone can really
24 battle alone.

25 He's doing incredibly well, we're not

1 going to say that this journey has been easy
2 because it's been anything but that, but he has
3 struggled for the last few years with his
4 treatments, had a couple of setbacks from -- he's
5 had infections, and he's gotten pretty ill, but I
6 can say that in four months from now, he will be
7 ringing that bell signalling the end of his
8 treatment and the beginning of the rest of his
9 life.

10 So I'm very fortunate that my son has
11 done extremely well, and I know there's a lot of
12 children that do not have the benefit or the
13 advantage of really making it through the treatment
14 because it really is really difficult.

15 And the drugs that they do receive are
16 extremely harsh on their bodies, and, I think, the
17 most frustrating thing that I've seen -- I've
18 witnessed -- is there are not really too many
19 drugs. The research that goes into childhood
20 cancer is not a lot. I believe the number I last
21 read was about 4 percent, and that's too bad
22 because these kids, these children are our future,
23 and they need to be given a better chance to
24 survive.

25 And I remember when Mason was diagnosed

1 with leukemia, the doctor coming over to me and
2 saying, listen, you're lucky. This is probably the
3 best cancer you want to get, the best diagnosis,
4 and I look, and I'm, like, why would any cancer,
5 why would any diagnosis be something that we want
6 to receive.

7 Fortunately, leukemia is definitely
8 very treatable as a child. As you get older, it's
9 more a tougher battle to go through, but I will say
10 I'm very fortunate that I've had the community to
11 really rally behind me and my family, most
12 importantly, Mason.

13 If anyone has since seen him, he looks
14 like a normal kid. He's happy. But I've said in
15 the past, I said, whoever picks on this child when
16 he gets older, they're really in for a rude
17 awakening because he's a tough cookie. And he's
18 the youngest of three boys, so I think that says a
19 lot right there.

20 But, you know, I think I said, and I
21 know this is kind of corny, but I have said that
22 there is a reason why he got sick. There's a
23 reason why they chose my child. And trying to turn
24 something that's extremely negative into something
25 positive, you know, creating awareness in the

1 community. Because, I say, it's a club that no one
2 really wants to be a part of, and once you are a
3 part of the club, I feel a lot of people -- I don't
4 want to say that there's any shame or a stigma
5 behind it, but many people just don't talk about
6 it, and I found what's really helped me and my
7 family is just being very open about his diagnosis
8 and the struggles and battles that we've gone
9 through the last three years.

10 I think that's really important because
11 there's a lot of people that, kind of, suffer in
12 silence and don't really know who to turn to, which
13 is why I've gotten myself involved in Leukemia &
14 Lymphoma Society over the last year, and they've
15 been tremendously helpful.

16 They help with funding a lot of
17 programs and just bringing awareness to this
18 disease in communities that may not really have the
19 advantage of having the education or things that
20 are available pretty readily to me. And they're
21 really partnering with the hospital the last few
22 years to -- in helping with toy drives, things that
23 are fun, and people are, like, why toys, I think
24 that's really silly. And if you've been in a
25 hospital, if you've seen a child who's extremely

1 nervous about going through having a surgery or
2 having, you know, chemo for that day, the smile
3 that it brings to a child's face in just getting a
4 small toy, even if it's for five minutes, I think
5 makes a world of difference.

6 So, you know, I say, you know, there's
7 a reason why they chose my child. They definitely
8 messed with the wrong child, but there's a reason
9 why my child got sick, and I will continue to be
10 not only an advocate for him and for children that
11 are suffering from cancer, but to help bring
12 awareness and light to this awful disease and help
13 people that, you know, don't really know who to
14 turn to.

15 And, I think, that was the biggest
16 thing I found when Mason got sick was being able to
17 talk to somebody that has gone through it. And
18 it's really great that I've had a lot of people,
19 kind of, rally behind us and talk to be, like, oh,
20 I'm here to help you, whatever you need, but it's
21 really something else being able to talk to another
22 parent, another sibling, or someone that has gone
23 through exactly what you've gone through.

24 I think that's tremendously helpful,
25 and I've been lucky enough over the past three

1 years to be able to communicate and connect with a
2 lot of families that didn't know who to turn to,
3 didn't know who to ask for help or even answer
4 simple questions that, you know, someone that has
5 not gone through it really just, you know, wouldn't
6 know the answer.

7 So, again, you know, this is an
8 incredibly challenging month for us, but also, I
9 think, it's a great month bringing light to this
10 disease, and I'm hoping that in the future that,
11 you know, we bring more awareness not only to
12 childhood cancers, but also more treatments and
13 more drugs. Because I don't know if you knew, but
14 the drugs that these children take are adult pills.
15 They're adult strength pills just, basically,
16 broken down into a child's strength, so the poison
17 that goes into their bodies definitely is really,
18 really hard on them.

19 But, again, I'm lucky enough that in
20 four months, Mason will be ringing that bell,
21 saying a big "F-you" to cancer, and we'll have a
22 big party, but I just -- I want to thank everyone
23 that's on the Board here, everyone that has, kind
24 of, rallied and supported me for these last -- if
25 you could believe it -- 37 months. I can't be

1 more, you know, thankful for that.

2 And I don't think that I would have
3 been able to make it through this journey, this
4 path without everybody. And also my Massapequa
5 community has been tremendous over these last few
6 years in being super helpful and supportive to my
7 family and Mason.

8 So I'm looking forward in four months,
9 and, kind of, reporting back that he's officially
10 done with treatment, and we'll be starting 2023,
11 kind of, flipping over and turning over a new leaf,
12 basically, starting the rest of his life.

13 So thank you, and if you know anyone
14 out there who is really struggling and really
15 doesn't know who to turn to or has questions, I'm
16 always here for a resource, and even though I'm
17 still going through that journey, for me, it's very
18 therapeutic to really, kind of, talk through it.

19 And I love supporting the families that
20 really don't know where to turn, don't know who to
21 ask because it can be a struggle really taking that
22 first step and just asking for help, you know,
23 really wanting to connect to somebody because the
24 first person I connected with -- she lived two
25 blocks from me, and I had no idea her son went

1 through leukemia. He was diagnosed at the exact
2 same age, and when Mason was in the hospital in
3 August of '19, he, actually, was scheduled the next
4 month to get his port taken out. So he is doing
5 incredible, and I can't thank her enough for her
6 help and just being there to either cry, you know,
7 late at night or just simply asking a question.

8 So if anyone knows anyone out there
9 that is struggling with a diagnosis and just
10 doesn't know who to turn to, needs some help and
11 support, please give them my information. I'd be
12 happy to connect with them.

13 Thank you again. This is a big month
14 for us and just getting the word out there --
15 knowledge is powerful -- but I really, really hope
16 that in the future, we continue to do more research
17 for childhood cancer because there's just not --
18 there's simply not enough being done, and there's
19 just too many kids dying from something that, you
20 know, if we put a little bit more money, a little
21 bit more refining into, it's something that they
22 can definitely, you know, be cured from and live a
23 happy, healthy life, so, thank you.

24 (Whereupon, a round of applause
25 ensued.)

1 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Councilwoman
2 Maier, Mighty Mason continues to be in our thoughts
3 and prayers and, of course, in this Town, as I've
4 said so many times, we're a family, and we circle
5 the wagons around Mason and your entire family.

6 Councilman Tom Hand.

7 COUNCILMAN HAND: My hat's off to
8 Councilwoman Maier. She's taken a terrible
9 situation and has done the best she possibly can as
10 have many other families that have gotten a cancer
11 diagnosis.

12 I work with the Christina Renna
13 Foundation. Christina wasn't fortunate at all.
14 She was diagnosed with RMS -- rhabdomyosarcoma.
15 It's a near death sentence, and, unfortunately,
16 it's such a severe, severe brain cancer that, as
17 the Councilwoman stated, there was no way to treat
18 it with anything other than adult conventional
19 medication.

20 So the Renna family, what they did was
21 took a tragic situation and they tried to turn it
22 around. They've raised tens of thousands --
23 hundreds of thousands of dollars for Cold Spring
24 Harbor Labs right here on Long Island. They have
25 brought together some of the best minds in

1 medicine, and they're working on some cures.

2 I was at an update about two weeks ago,
3 and we have some really good information that
4 they're coming up with medication. They have
5 pharmaceutical companies now that are jumping on
6 board to tailor the discipline and medication for
7 children as opposed to adults. So we are starting
8 to make strides.

9 And I think Laura was a little bit
10 modest. She stepped up in a very tough time, and
11 she became leukemia's Woman of the Year, raising
12 over \$250,000. Thank you very much.

13 (Whereupon, a round of applause
14 ensued.)

15 COUNCILWOMAN MAIER: It was a team
16 effort, may I add, and quite a few people that are
17 in this room were helpful in raising those funds.
18 So, you know, as much as, yes, you know, it was my
19 team that was put together, it was -- I did not do
20 this alone, and it was really everyone's effort and
21 persistence in helping get that money, so I thank
22 everyone that was part of that team, so, thank you,
23 Tom.

24 COUNCILMAN HAND: We wish Mason and all
25 others, you know, going through this ordeal the

1 very best, and let's look forward to trying to
2 snuff out cancer in the future.

3 Thank you.

4 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you to both
5 of you and your families.

6 Ladies and gentlemen, we have some
7 presentations this morning. This one honors a
8 distinguished and extremely accomplished resident
9 of our Town, Dr. Paul Pipia of Syosset.

10 Dr. Pipia was elected President-Elect
11 of the Medical Society of the State of New York,
12 which is the State's primary professional
13 organization for physicians.

14 There is no greater honor than to be
15 recognized at the highest level by your peers, and
16 that's exactly what Dr. Pipia has received. This
17 is a remarkable achievement and is a source of
18 great pride for all of us here in the Town of
19 Oyster Bay, our Town Board members, the entire Town
20 of Oyster Bay family, and all of our residents,
21 quite frankly.

22 Dr. Pipia is a Board certified
23 physician and is Chairman of the Department of
24 Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation, as well as
25 the Interim Chair of the Department of Neurology of

1 the Nassau University Medical Center and Deputy
2 Medical Director of the Nassau County Medical
3 Center.

4 Dr. Pipia is someone who we also
5 consider a very close friend. He is an amazing
6 member of the community, he helps people in every
7 way possible, he's a great administrator, but he's
8 an incredible human being with a very special
9 family.

10 I've had the pleasure to work with your
11 brother before he became a judge also. There must
12 be something going on in your family because you're
13 all exceptional.

14 We're very fortunate to have you with
15 us today, but we are extremely fortunate to honor
16 you, Dr. Paul Pipia. Let's give Dr. Pipia a hand.

17 (Whereupon, a round of applause
18 ensued.)

19 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: We know that the
20 Medical Society of the State of New York is very
21 privileged to have you at the helm, and they'll be
22 doing great things.

23 Count on our support, count on our help
24 for you and the Medical Society, and we're just so
25 happy for you.

1 So if all the elected officials would
2 join me and join Dr. Pipia down at the rail. We're
3 also joined by a great friend who's been active in
4 Nassau County. He's a Nassau County Commissioner
5 and a long time friend, Bobby Kumar Kalotee.

6 Thank you, Bobby, for being with us as
7 well, and I know you share our sentiments toward
8 Dr. Pipia.

9 (Whereupon, a Town Citation was
10 presented to Dr. Paul Pipia followed by a photo
11 opportunity and a round of applause.)

12 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Folks, we have a
13 consistent theme this morning because Dr. Pipia is
14 certainly out there saving lives, but he's not the
15 only one saving lives, and we have another group
16 with us today that we are -- that's so important to
17 honor because of their heroism and their work;
18 particularly, those who displayed great heroism and
19 poise in helping others in time of crisis.

20 Back on July 9th of 2022, this past
21 Summer, local first responders were alerted to a
22 call to help involving a person who passed out in
23 the water off Oakcliff Sailing in Oyster Bay.

24 The victim was a 15-year-old boy and
25 was a participant with Oakcliff Sailing when his

1 vessel capsized.

2 By the way, Oakcliff Sailing, if you
3 don't know, is one of our Nation's and a world
4 premier sailing school and facility training people
5 to compete on the international stage.

6 Witnesses said that this boy attempted
7 to upright the boat, and his lifejacket became
8 entangled, and he was held underwater. One can
9 only picture how incredibly scary those moments
10 must have been.

11 Dylan Whitcraft, a coach with Oakcliff
12 Sailing, was able to cut the life preserver --
13 including breaking the tiller extension -- and
14 untangle the victim. Then he pulled the victim
15 onto the hull of the boat.

16 Seeing the victim was not breathing,
17 Dylan then hit the victim's chest, who then
18 expelled a large amount of water. Compressions
19 were then started by an Oakcliff sailor as the
20 victim, who had been out cold for about 20 to 40
21 seconds, was transported to the dock. They were
22 soon joined by additional Oakcliff Sailing
23 personnel including the Executive Director, Dawn
24 Riley, who's with us today as well, the Nassau
25 County Police Department -- we have some of our

1 favorites of the Nassau County Police Department
2 here today, we are also very proud of you all, and
3 as we started this meeting talking about our first
4 responders and people in uniform, we want to thank
5 each and every one of you and your entire
6 department. They were also joined by the Town of
7 Oyster Bay Public Safety personnel, led by Bay
8 Constable Joe Rogers, who immediately provided a
9 medical assessment of the victim.

10 At that time, Bay Constable Taylor
11 Plank; sergeant of our Bay Constables, Mike Rich;
12 Mike Bauman (phonetic), and also sergeant of our
13 Bay Constables, Sam Cessia (phonetic) secured the
14 scene and nearby boats, took statements, cleared
15 the way for an ambulance from Oyster Bay Fire
16 Company No. 1 for transport.

17 Constable Rogers rode in the ambulance
18 and continued medical treatment along with a medic
19 from Oyster Bay Fire Company No. 1 on the way to
20 the hospital's trauma center.

21 After administering oxygen, the
22 patient's pulse oximetry rose to acceptable levels,
23 and soon the victim was alert and back to being
24 oriented. Thank God.

25 Had it not been for the expertise of

1 all concerned and all involved throughout, the
2 outcome of this harrowing event would have been
3 tragically different. The bottom line is, you all
4 came together with your professionalism and your
5 care to save this young man's life.

6 We are here to proudly recognize today
7 Dylan Whitcraft and his colleagues with Oakcliff
8 Sailing. Dylan could not be in attendance, but
9 Executive Director Dawn Riley will accept the
10 recognition on behalf of Dylan, and she will also
11 accept an additional Citation on behalf of Oakcliff
12 Sailing.

13 Joe Rogers and his fellow Oyster Bay
14 Constables are always at the ready, and we are so
15 proud of them, and we thank them for their
16 exemplary ability to act decisively and
17 courageously when others are in need.

18 Gentlemen, your actions were
19 lifesaving, and that's not new to this incident. I
20 want to make it clear to all of you, everyone
21 watching, and every resident of the Town of Oyster
22 Bay that our Public Safety officers and our Bay
23 constables have a long history of protecting and
24 saving lives.

2 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: We are now going
3 to proceed to our normal Resolution Calendar, and
4 after that is up, anyone who would like to speak on
5 our Resolutions, please feel free to.

6 We ask that you fill out a slip, and
7 then after that is done, we will take our vote, and
8 then after that, if you would like to be heard on
9 Public Comment, we will entertain whatever you have
10 to say.

11 Folks, to anybody who is here on the
12 Greenvale sign issue, obviously, today was not the
13 hearing on that, but we want to hear what you have
14 to say. We will continue to study this issue, and
15 we will take all the appropriate actions with the
16 appropriate protocols, as per law, on this issue.

17 So we want to let you know we have
18 heard you, you are still welcome to write to us, to
19 e-mail us, and I will give you the information on
20 where to e-mail us so it's very, very clear.

13 At this time, we're going proceed to
14 our Regular Action Calendar, which you have already
15 called, and we have some speakers on that.

16 I'm sorry, is there more Public Comment
17 on the Greenvale issue.

18 (Whereupon, a member of the assemblage
19 raised their hand to be recognized.)

20 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: How many people
21 would like to be heard on Public Comment with a
22 show of hands?

23 (Whereupon, members of the assemblage
24 raised their hands to be recognized.)

25 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: We have one in

1 the back.

2 Sir, would you like to be heard on
3 Public Comment.

4 I'm asking.

5 So, yes. So that's one of you or all
6 four of you.

7 AUDIENCE MEMBER: Just me.

8 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Just you, the
9 woman in the back, and, of course, Kevin, who never
10 misses an opportunity.

11 So let's bring you up. Let's bring you
12 up. Let's hear you. If you'd like to be heard on
13 Public Comment, I'll continue to extend that
14 courtesy, and we really appreciate your waiting
15 here, and then we'll go to our Action Calendar.

16 Thank you for your patience today. It
17 is much appreciated.

18 (Whereupon, Supervisor Saladino entered
19 into Public Comment Session beginning at 2:51 p.m.
20 and the proceedings resuming at 3:12 p.m. as
21 follows:)

22 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: In terms of our
23 Regular Action Calendar, is there anyone who would
24 like to be heard on our Regular Action Calendar?

25 (Whereupon, there was no response from

1 the assemblage.)

2 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Okay. No one has
3 raised their hand, so --

4 AUDIENCE MEMBER: Resolutions -- is
5 that what you mean by Action Calendar?

6 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Resolutions.

7 Yes, Kevin. I look forward to hearing
8 your presentation timely and briefly and
9 respectfully -- the big three here.

10 MS. FAUGHNAN: How many Resolutions?

11 MR. McKENNA: I have six Resolutions.

12 Okay, I am Kevin McKenna from Syosset,
13 Edna Drive.

14 I have ten minutes. I might get done
15 sooner. I'm sure you're happy to hear that.

16 I just want to get this live-stream
17 going, so I can broadcast this to Nassau County NY
18 News followers. We have 16,000 followers in Nassau
19 County. We do get about 40,000 views a month right
20 now.

21 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: I hope you're not
22 trying to create a commercial for yourself during
23 your time.

24 MR. McKENNA: I'm, actually, doing what
25 you're doing on the radio. You're, actually, doing

1 it on the radio on 660AM, and you also just did it
2 on a -- since you brought it up -- you also just
3 did your own commercial on the HGTV network where
4 you promoted yourself with the guise of giving
5 monies to the landlords and the renters. I found
6 that unbelievable.

7 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: You mean we were
8 consistent with the rules and regulations and the
9 uses of that grant, and part of it is letting
10 people know that that grant is available because if
11 you don't let people know, how would they possibly
12 apply?

13 MR. McKENNA: Mr. Supervisor, it's my
14 time.

15 I agree with what you're saying right
16 now. What's shocking is -- is that you haven't
17 sent out a Supervisor blast about it. What's
18 unbelievable is that --

19 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: We, actually,
20 have, Kevin.

21 MR. McKENNA: I didn't get it. If you
22 did, I apologize.

23 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Well, then, I
24 apologize that you didn't get it. You're a very
25 important part of our constituency.

1 MR. McKENNA: Anyway, let me move on.

2 So my first -- we're talking on the
3 Personnel Resolution.

4 I have a copy right here of the
5 Personnel Resolution, and I see on here that you
6 have all the departments, you have all the titles,
7 but you do not have the names. You do not have the
8 names of the individuals that you're hiring, giving
9 promotions to, transfers, and I just want to point
10 out, on the record, that you are violating New York
11 State Open Meetings Law by not putting names on the
12 Personnel Resolution.

13 So you, actually, right here, are
14 giving a position in the Comptroller's Office where
15 somebody is getting a title of Multi-keyboard
16 Operator II at a salary of \$144,500. I'd like to
17 know the name of the individual, and the public
18 would like to know the name of the individual
19 that's getting hired as a Multi-keyboard Operator
20 for \$144,500.

21 New York State Open Meetings Law states
22 that you must provide the names of the individuals
23 in the Personnel Resolutions.

24 Could we get the name of that
25 individual? And I'd like to know -- I'd like to

1 know if John Bishop, who is no longer the Deputy
2 Commissioner of Highway, which I'm really, really
3 surprised that you haven't made an announcement
4 telling all the residents in the Town of Oyster Bay
5 that he's no longer because he was an unbelievable
6 employee in Highway, and I'm really shocked that
7 you didn't have a party for John Bishop celebrating
8 all the successes that he had in the Highway
9 Department, and I'm told that -- I'm told that he
10 was transferred into the Comptroller's Office, and
11 I'd like to know if John Bishop is the guy getting
12 the salary of \$144,500.

13 And I'd also like to know if a job was
14 posted -- if John Bishop was able -- or is able --
15 to be able to be transferred into the Comptroller's
16 Office. That means that the Comptroller's Office
17 had an open position, or they created an open
18 position in order to accept him because he was
19 forced out of the Highway Department.

20 So did you -- did you put up a job
21 posting.

22 Did you put up a job posting for the
23 Town of Oyster Bay employees to interview for that
24 job, let alone the public.

25 Would you like to answer that now.

1 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: We're going to
2 continue with the policy that we've always had.
3 You ask all your questions --

4 MR. McKENNA: Okay. Okay.

5 Folks, just remember he just said that
6 he would answer the question when I got done.

7 Okay. Resolution 624. This is a
8 Resolution to accept the recommendation from the
9 Town of Oyster Bay's Housing Authority for a
10 reappointment to the Board.

11 I did see in the backup the names of
12 the individuals that you're going to vote on to
13 appoint to the Board. Many residents, especially
14 some residents that live in Plainview, in the Town
15 of Oyster Bay Housing Authority, we'd like to know
16 -- residents would like to know -- deserve to know
17 what was the process for you picking these
18 individuals to be on the Town of Oyster Bay Housing
19 Authority Board?

20 According to Deputy Commissioner Jim
21 McCaffrey of the Town of Oyster Bay, Jim McCaffrey
22 has told me verbally, face-to-face, that the Town
23 of Oyster Bay Housing Authority, which receives
24 millions and millions of dollars from the
25 government in grants, which, apparently, that money

1 is not being used to maintain the facilities of the
2 Town of Oyster Bay Housing Authority -- I don't
3 know where that money is going, I'm trying to find
4 out -- but Jim McCaffrey has told me that -- he's
5 here right in the room in the back -- he's the
6 Deputy Commissioner of Economic Development -- nice
7 guy -- jack of all trades -- he's told me that the
8 Town of Oyster Bay Housing Authority is totally
9 separate from the Town of Oyster Bay. It's a
10 separate entity, and we know it legally is a
11 separate entity. It's the Town of Oyster Bay
12 Housing Authority.

13 So if it's separate, then why would you
14 appoint Board members to that Authority like Jim
15 McCaffrey, who has been the chairman of the Town of
16 Oyster Bay Housing Authority.

17 And my question is, I'd like to get an
18 answer, why are you putting Town of Oyster Bay
19 employees on the Board of the Housing Authority if
20 you want to maintain that it's a separate
21 Authority.

22 I'd like to know the answer to that
23 question.

24 I'd also like to know why the attorney
25 for the Town of Oyster Bay Housing Authority is an

1 outside attorney hired by the Housing Authority.
2 I'd like to know why he refuses -- his name is
3 Robert Miletsky.

4 Right, Frank.

5 Robert Miletsky. I'm sure you know who
6 he is.

7 Well, the Town -- Jim, you know who he
8 is because you hired him.

9 Robert Miletsky is the Town's outside
10 -- why does the Housing Authority of the Town of
11 Oyster Bay need to waste money on an outside
12 attorney, Robert Miletsky, who refuses to provide
13 an answer to a FOIL request?

14 I have FOIL requested the financial
15 statements that are required to be given to HUD to
16 try to find out where all those millions of dollars
17 are going to the Housing Authority. Robert
18 Miletsky refuses to provide a response to that FOIL
19 request, so Town Board members, when you're not out
20 taking pictures of yourself and promoting yourself,
21 try to find out where all that money is going to
22 the Housing Authority because it's not going
23 towards maintaining the properties.

24 You have a resident in Plainview that
25 because he has complained about the deplorable

1 conditions in the Housing Authority, now he's being
2 retaliated against. He's being retaliated against.
3 His name is Richard Einhorn. He lives in the
4 Plainview Housing Authority, and because he has
5 called attention to maintenance issues over the
6 past year. He's been threatened by Deputy
7 Supervisor of the Town of Oyster Bay. Greg Carman
8 has threatened Richard Einhorn and told him that if
9 he continues to do that, that he's going to have
10 the police department arrest him. That was stated
11 by Greg Carman to Richard Einhorn.

12 You know what? I'm not even going to
13 continue. I've said enough. I've given you enough
14 to do; although, I know it will fall on deaf ears.

15 Have a nice day.

16 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Is there anyone

12 COUNCILMAN HAND: "Aye."

13 MR. LaMARCA: Councilman Labriola?

14 COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: You've called the
15 roll?
