12	SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you, Rabbi.
13	Those are very inspirational words and

15	I ask you to please remain standing as

17	Girls and Company Kickline.
18	To lead us in the Pledge yes, let's
19	give them a hand.

21	SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you.
22	Wonderful young ladies.
23	To lead us in the Pledge of Allegiance

Ladies, if you would please lead us in 1 2 the pledge. 3 (Whereupon, the Pledge of Allegiance 4 was recited by Grace Carney and Giavanna Vovelli.) 5 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you very much to both of you. 6 7 And now I ask, ladies and gentlemen, to 8 join the Town Board in a moment of silence for our 9 men and woman in this United States Armed Forces 10 serving here and abroad. 11 Also, in recognition of the men and 12 woman in law enforcement and all of our first 13 responders who put themselves at risk for our 14 safety each and every day. 15 (Whereupon, a moment of silence was 16 observed.) 17 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you. 18 Please be seated. 19 We were led in the Pledge of Allegiance 20 by two of an entire team of amazing women, and 2.1 we're proud to recognize the tremendous success of 22 the Bethpage High School Golden Girls and Company 23 Varsity Kickline. 24 The team was declared a winner -- one 25 of the winners of the National Championship in

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Small Varsity Kick at the National Dance Alliance Championship in Orlando, Florida. They placed Second in Pom and were recognized for innovative choreography, technical excellence, and sportsmanship.

Locally, they were the Regional

6 local high school students for their exceptional 1 2 accomplishments and academic excellence. 3 Congratulations to high school senior 4 Thomas Lam and Jericho High School senior Madhav 5 Subramanian. I'll try that again, I'm sorry. Madhav Subramanian, for being named the 2019 6 7 Regeneron Science and Talent Research finalists. Many of you -- let's give them a hand. 8 9 (Applause.) 10 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Many know the 11 Regeneron Science Talent Search. Some remember it 12 as it was previously called the Westinghouse Science Talent Search. 13 14 Would the two of you please come 15 forward to be recognized, Madhav and Thomas? 16 (Applause.) 17 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: There were nearly 18 2000 entries nationwide. These young men were two 19 of 40 students to be named a finalist nationally. 20 They recently traveled to Washington, D.C. to 2.1 display their research projects and also network 22 with notable scientists and members of Congress. 23 This is the nation's oldest and most 24 prestigious precollege science competition, which 25 means, guys, you're very, very special.

MR. ABBATE: Good evening, Supervisor Saladino, Members of the Town Board.

For the applicant, Tom Abbate,

A-B-B-A-T-E. I'm an attorney with offices at

88 Sunnyside Boulevard in Plainview, and I've never

done anything with algorithms or blood vessels.

Thank you for making me feel completely inadequate, but those gentlemen -- I've been doing this for over thirty years, I feel like I haven't achieved anything. But I have a client who is achieving something, and I'm very proud of her.

So tonight's application, while it's brought in the name Chief Dog, is really my client, Maria Guillen, who's sitting to your left in the front row. And this is our request to establish a doggie daycare center. The subject location is on the west side of South Broadway in Hicksville, just south of where that intersects with Bloomingdale Road.

So if you're familiar with it, you know that it becomes triangulated at that area, and we're smack dab in the middle. Because of that,

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this location is ideally suited for a use such as this because we're buffered -- we're abutted, I should say, by industrial uses on all sides, and then we have the two roadways, so they act as de facto buffers to any resident who would even be potentially affected neighbors.

Irrespective of that, this use has no outdoor component whatsoever. Everything is going to be conducted indoors. Moreover, doggie daycare is permitted as-of-right. We're in the LI zone, the Light Industry zone, and this is a use that's committed as-of-right.

Why am I here? Because part of our operation includes boarding, keeping animals overnight, and that is a special permit and that is the unique and exclusive province of you as the Town Board.

To provide you a little more detail, the building we're going into measures about 2,500 square feet. Our demise space, our rented space is about 6,800 square feet of that. Maria is a franchisee of an organization known as Hounds Town, Hounds Town USA. Hounds Town was started back in 2001 by the fellow -- a fellow by the name of Mike Gould. Mike Gould, from 1997 to 2002 was the

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commanding officer of the Nassau County Police

Department. Prior to that, he was in the NYPD's

K-9 squad.

And what I'd like to do, just to give you some more information, we have a presentation packet, I'm not going to read it, I don't expect you to go through it, but it provides all of the information concerning Hounds Town's operations. I offer that up as one exhibit for edification purposes.

So while it's in three states now, it's got a strong Long Island connection. Mike being a Long Island resident and Nassau County, obviously, commanding officer, and we have facilities in Farmingdale, Commack, Garden City, Port Jeff, and more. This is not Maria's first time doing this.

She, along with her two partners, currently run the Hounds Town that exists in Farmingdale, and that's in the Town of Babylon, so she is an experienced proprietor of doggie daycare.

The manner by which Hounds Town operates, and maybe its credo, is interaction of the animals. They believe that the socialization skills of the animals is very important.

For that reason, every member of the

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staff is specifically trained by Hounds Town. They must attain training. They even have emergency medical training as part of their requirements to have a job and maintain a job with Hounds Town.

It is doggie daycare. You bring your dog and they socialize. Curiously, there are no sessions. You could bring your dog for however long, however short you want, provided you meet vaccination requirements and you pass a test. And that's a temperament test. They make sure that your dog can socialize.

In terms of generation, how active is this, well, we take about 45 dogs maximum a day, but I'm talking more in terms of traffic. We're -- we are calculated under our code, including the other uses in our building, to require 40 stalls.

We have 81, so we have more than ample parking on site, and most of our customers are of the pick-up and drop-off variety. I don't know if any of you were fans of Car Talk, right, the Russian limo driver, pick up and drop off, that's what we have here.

Our hours or operation are Monday through Friday 6:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. and Saturday, 8:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. We don't have any doggie

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daycare, nor do we have grooming on Sunday, but we are open. We have about a three, four-hour window where you can either pick up or drop off your dog from boarding.

Now, clearly, the use is in great demand. We wouldn't want to be establishing ourselves in the Town of Oyster Bay. It's obvious we all have busy lives, and finding someone to watch over your pet, even during the day sometimes can be difficult, so we're fulfilling a need, but Maria at Hounds Town fulfil a greater need.

I was able to have a conversation with some of our friends in these T-shirts, I didn't get a T-shirt, but I want a T-shirt. Because what Hounds Town does, and they've done it in the past, they're doing it presently in other towns in Long Island, is that they partner with the municipal animal shelters.

So they have partnered with the animal shelters in the Town of North Hempstead, Town of Hempstead, Islip, Brookhaven and Smithtown, and we want to add the Town of Oyster Bay to that roster.

What does it mean? It means when our shelter is at capacity, dogs can be brought to, either on a daily or overnight basis, to Hounds

Town.

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And it's not just to handle overflow, but because we have that socialization component, rather, because we have the obedience component, and because we have trained staff, we are able to acclimate these dogs. We are able to take these dogs from somewhat feral animals to domesticated animals.

What's the result? They become more suitable for adoption, so that's the greater good that Hounds Town provides here and which we want to present now. We don't just do it with a municipal animal shelter, we do it with rescue organizations as well, and they are listed in the presentation packet.

I will offer up a series of letters,

I'm not going to read them, you don't have to read

them now, but they're virtual testimonials, and

they come from the animal shelters of the Town of

Smithtown, Town of Hempstead, and the Town of

Brookhaven, and they not only talk about the

overflow, but about assimilating animals just as I

described. So four letters as one exhibit.

Now, Mr. Supervisor and Members of the Town Board, I have a tremendous amount of

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information I could give you, but I think, really,
I've imparted that which you need to know and
within the presentation packet and within the
letters is the rest.

So unless you have any questions of me or Mrs. Guillen, I end my presentation.

COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: I just have one question.

What precautions, and I think you already, sort of, answered this, but what precautions are taken to make sure that the animals are safe, to ensure the safety of the animals?

MR. ABBATE: Okay. So the -- we've got a trained staff, as I told you, and we have separate areas. We have socialization areas; we have feeding areas; we have sleeping areas.

There's a place where dogs can rest and whatnot.

Moreover, I said everything is pick up and drop off, but if you want to hang out and look at your dog, the manner by which we've designed the interior space is that there are viewing corridors.

So you can walk down and see your dog at all the different stations that are within Hounds Town. The reason it's called town is because they designed it with a fire station, a

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barber shop, a library. They make it look rather cute, and there are lots of toys and whatnot for the dogs to play.

The dogs are also fed. If you have any special dietary restrictions you want to give us, certain food for your dog, we'll do that as well.

Moreover, on top of the trained staff, we have video surveillance throughout the entire building. So the site is always monitored. As Ms. Guillen explained to me, it's very, very rare that you're going to see a dog suddenly have a medical issue.

They will exhibit certain behavior, behavior that perhaps, I'm not trained to recognize, but that Maria and the Hounds Town crew are trained to recognize by virtue of their specific training.

COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: And the staff are present 24 hours when they're boarding?

MR. ABBATE: No. No. They're -they're there during the hours. It's the industry
standard, even with the bigger, bigger chains, that
there is not someone overnight, but again, there's
video monitoring, and the dogs, at that time, are
in enclosures.

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Those enclosures, by the way, are PVC.

There's no steel, no iron bars, no chicken wire, or anything of that nature, and we monitor that via that surveillance.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Can you tell us who is monitoring that during the 24 hours, especially during those off hours? How often is it watched? What kind of technology do they use?

MR. ABBATE: Well, it's camera technology that's fed directly into the home, either on the laptop or on the Smart phone device or your tablet, and there's a schedule that they set up amongst the employees. Generally amongst the proprietors, to monitor it for certain periods of time.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: What about the owners, are they allowed to watch their dogs or check in on their animals?

MR. ABBATE: No. No, we don't do that.

It's funny, I inquired about that at PetSmart and they don't do that either. So basically we're following the industry standard along those lines.

COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: When the animals are in a common area, there's always trained staff

all take that -- yes.

12 1 present? 2 MR. ABBATE: Oh, yes, and during peak 3 period. 4 COUNCILMAN MUSCARELLA: What's the ratio between staff and the animals that are there? 5 MR. ABBATE: Well, at a peak period, if 6 7 we have 42 dogs, we've got 12 employees as opposed 8 to those nice young men, I can't do math. What's 9 that ratio? I know I'm not going to get a 10 Certificate of Merit. I've given up on that dream. 11 COUNCILWOMAN JOHNSON: We've heard a 12 lot of the positives. 13 Are there, in any of the other Hounds 14 Towns that you have, any outstanding violations 15 that we should be aware of, code violation with any of the other towns? 16 17 MR. ABBATE: No, none whatsoever. 18 In fact, I asked Mrs. Guillen that 19 question. As I said, she's been operating the 20 Farmingdale location for several years now, not 2.1 only without any violations, but without incident. 22 So, they are doing a thriving business and that's 23 the reason they want to come to the Town of Oyster 24 Bay. There is a demonstrably need, but I think we

1.3 1 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: 42 dogs, that's 2 a lot of waste. 3 What is the procedure for the waste? 4 MR. ABBATE: Okay. None of the waste 5 goes, you know, directly outside. It is all It's all put in bags and it is all put in 6 7 a refuse enclosure. We don't put anything right 8 into the, you know, ground or to the sewers or 9 anything like that. It's all bagged, every bit of 10 And we can control that because this is solely 11 an indoor operation without any outdoor component. 12 COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: Mr. Abbate? 13 MR. ABBATE: Yes. 14 COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: I was looking at 15 your site plan and I saw that you have some kind of 16 a sound protection barrier in there? 17 MR. ABBATE: We do. 18 So, you know, under the Fire Code, I 19 believe you have to have three-quarters-inch 20 sheetrock. We have double three-quarters in 2.1 sheetrock. 22 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: It's 23 five-eighths. 24 MR. ABBATE: Five-eighths. 25 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: It's

14 five-eighths. Commissioner, correct me if I'm 1 2 wrong, it should be double five-eighths. COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: I'm not quite 3 4 sure of that. 5 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Okay. But standard would be double five-eighths on a demising 6 7 wall. MR. ABBATE: For fire? 8 9 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Yes. 10 MR. ABBATE: Okay. I think that's what 11 we have, then. I was told double. 12 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: You're listed --13 COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: I have a --14 MR. ABBATE: She has -- from the 15 architect. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: You're listed in 16 17 your --18 (Multiple crosstalk.) 19 MR. ABBATE: And, by the way, this 20 application is also for site plan approval, so 2.1 we -- everything we have submitted, including 22 architectural, show all those details up to the 23 New York State Building Code and Local Code as 24 well. 25 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: You're listed in

15 1 your presentation as stating that this 24-hour 2 surveillance includes fire suppression system? 3 MR. ABBATE: Oh, yes. 4 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Police and fire 5 department alarms? 6 MR. ABBATE: Fire, smoke alarm, burglar 7 alarm, yeah, we're fully wired. 8 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Do you have a 9 system with a backup that will be dependable at all These are dogs, animals lives on the line 10 11 here. 12 MR. ABBATE: Generator backup. Right, 13 so it's not solely responsible in having an 14 electric feed to the site. We have generator 15 backup on site. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: You do. 16 17 MR. ABBATE: For all of our alarms and 18 for our video equipment. 19 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: In terms of the 20 safety to the animals, do you screen prospective 2.1 employees against things like the New York State 22 Animal Abuser Registry and other methods of 23 screening? 24 MR. ABBATE: Absolutely. 25 The training doesn't come from Maria.

16 1 The training comes from Hounds Town USA, so any 2 prospective employee must go through that training 3 regimen from Hounds Town, and they do the checks as well. 4 5 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: They do. So --MR. ABBATE: We do. And then you have 6 7 to -- as I said, do the medical test, the test with 8 the animals itself -- themselves, rather, so we're 9 very, very particular about it. If we weren't, we 10 wouldn't be a success. You know, if we 11 willy-nilly, you know, took anybody off the street, 12 me, to take care your dog, they wouldn't be well 13 cared for. So that's why Hounds Town has been a 14 success, why Mike Gould, former officer, was able 15 to establish these, and is doing so in a very 16 successful manner and he's lucky to have women like 17 Maria being his franchisee. 18 Any other questions? 19 COUNCILMAN HAND: Yeah, real quick. 20 Do they have a veterinarian on call. 2.1 MR. ABBATE: Why don't you come up, 22 Maria? 23 This is Maria Guillen, Franchisee of 24 Farmingdale and the proposed franchisee in 25 Hicksville.

17 1 MS. GUILLEN: We build a relationship. 2 The one in Farmingdale, we have a 3 24-hour vet that we work with all the time, so 4 they're like five minutes away. I just have to 5 find one closer to the Hicksville location that's 24 hours. 6 7 COUNCILWOMAN JOHNSON: I think there's 8 one right on Brush Hollow Road. 9 MS. GUILLEN: Okay. 10 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Yes, there is. 11 MR. ABBATE: Is that a plug? 12 COUNCILWOMAN JOHNSON: No, I --13 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: No, I have also. 14 MS. GUILLEN: Yeah, so I want to get 15 one closer to this facility where we have one in 16 Farmingdale that's a couple of minutes away. 17 COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: Can you just 18 speak more a little -- a little more about the 19 partnership you're talking about with our animal 20 shelter? 2.1 MS. GUILLEN: Sure. 22 We do it at Farmingdale a lot with 23 They'll call us saying they pulled some 24 dogs -- well, they pull dogs from mills, dog mills, 25 and they have nowhere to put them, and they'll call

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up, can we bring in a girl or boy or whatever and, you know, board them there for a while until they get a foster available?

So we work with them, we give them a reduced rate, and we take them in. We just had the dog that was abused in the McDonald's parking lot. I don't know if everybody seen that a couple of months ago. The -- I guess she was court advocate -- or an advocate for the dog through the court, and wound up contacting us and we had her for three months.

We had to keep it quiet because the owner still owned, technically, the dog, and then he was just -- he just surrendered her. So now that she moved on to a trainer upstate, so we just -- I had to let her go after three months, but yeah, she was with us for three months. We gave her a very reduced rate. So we'll do that with the shelters as well.

COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: Well, thank you.

Is this facility going to be very similar to the Earmingdale facility?

similar to the Farmingdale facility?

MS. GUILLEN: They're all run the same way. Everything under the Hounds Town umbrella, they come in and they look and make sure that we

19 have -- everything is pretty much the same. And we've -- at this time, according to John Tassone, the Deputy Commissioner of Public Works, we've rejected all bids, which means that I guess we're going to continue to send all our recycling to the Town of Hempstead and not yield any money from that and have the expense of sending it to them.

What is our recycling plan?

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Why don't you finish with your questions and take a seat? Just as everybody else does, and we'll go through --

MR. NEWHOUSE: Okay. I have more --

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: -- and give you and give all of the public information and updates on our recycling and what we're doing and what this is all about.

MR. NEWHOUSE: Aren't we continuing -- aren't we sending all our recycling to the Town of

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SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Again, I'll wait until you finish with all of your questions, you have a number of them as you go down the list, and then I'll ask you to please take your seat and we'll address this information to inform the public.

MR. NEWHOUSE: Excellent. Very well.

forgive me. Okay.

Dune stabilization, No. 194, I understand you'd like to spend \$5,000 on fruit, supplies, and groceries, items for the people. I think this is a fabulous program. Aren't there better ways to spend our money while we have -- whatever the number is, \$650 million of debt. This infuriates me as a taxpayer and I think we could do better.

How about a quarterly mailer instead?

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I've gotten four mailers in the last month. That's over 200 grand. We can do better than that and I hope you'll really take that to heart.

(Applause.)

MR. NEWHOUSE: Thank you.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Ladies and gentlemen, this issue has come up from time to time, and it's important for everyone to realize the importance of communication in this Town.

The prior administration was criticized for not communicating enough with the residents about government finances and all the programs that we have to offer.

From the day I started, it was important, and we all know it was important to increase transparency, better communication, and that's -- and we offer hundreds of programs.

And that's why we have improved the ways we communicate online -- thank you -- online, on the Town's website.

As a matter of fact, we have -- good government groups have assessed our work and have given us awards in the last two years for increase in transparency inclusiveness.

I also recognize that not everyone goes

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online. I travel to many events, meet with many residents on a daily basis. When I'm meeting with seniors, I ask the question, how many people have visited the Town's website, how many people go online. It's less than 20 percent, on average, and they tell us thank you for that information, or they have questions.

In this Town, we respect everyone's rights, everyone's opinions, and everyone's interaction. And one of the ways to do that is to communicate in many ways. We're evolving our digital communications, and quite frankly, our website is the best it has ever been.

Our programs are very thorough from grieving your tax assessment to volunteering at your local fire department to helping The Safe Center for the victims of domestic violence.

Signing up for senior housing opportunities, senior repairs on their homes, as well as recreational and athletic and youth programs, programs for the developmentally disabled, and we communicate it all.

And we use every opportunity, including reaching out to the media and sending e-mails and making sure we're doing everything to communicate

all of our programs.

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We offer many free events, from the car show to the waterfront festival, movies in the park, our free Summer concert series, and the residents appreciate it and they've let us know that. So we continue to use every means just like every other municipality on Long Island and throughout the state. And I think we're doing a better job than the vast majority of them in terms of our online presence.

we're working to protect our environment and the shoreline, which is something that's very important to this administration and to this Town Board. And our programs like Dune Day, the harbor cleanups, the homeowner waste disposal program, all of the many programs that we have are very important to our residents and we're going to continue to work hard in every way possible from word of mouth to mail to digital to attracting people to our website.

Not all of our residents have e-mail and the senior citizen population, just like everyone, deserves equality and respect, so we're going to continue to work to do the best job possible to keep our residents informed of what the

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goings on are and listen to them, and that's really made a tremendous difference in turning this Town around.

In terms of recycling, I'm going to ask our Commissioner of DPW to please step forward so we can talk about the many aspects of our recycling program that the Town's presented.

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Supervisor, you mentioned the solid waste day. I know it's May 18th. It happens to coincide with the PGA Championship at Bethpage.

Are we changing that day, and if so, are you going to send out a mailer?

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: I'm conferring with the office to figure out the best approach, and we are working with Public Safety, as well as the police department and the PGA people as well as the folks at Bethpage State Park.

I move on to recycling, I think it's important to point out that these programs that you're describing, a lot of them are free of charge or meant to be affordable so that people have something -- people who can't afford an expensive Summer camp or something like that can have a free

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or affordable entertainment option.

It's not something that we do to make money. And to say that we're not making enough money off our Summer camp, I think is a little misguided.

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Honestly, I was one of the kids that went to the Summer camps because we didn't have enough money and it was a great time.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: You grew up to be an upstanding citizen who's serving on our Town Board.

COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: Some would say.

COUNCILWOMAN JOHNSON: Who's really good at mini golf. I would just like to hear from the Commissioner, is that 15 number of enrollment, was that pertaining to the specialized camps?

COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: This is not the camp. This is for a vendor that provides a program at the camp.

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Right. It's not the camp.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Event that we approved and then provides a program and pays a licensing fee, and it comes from a process where

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everybody gets an equal opportunity to present to the Town, including those who want to recycle, and I know I'm one of them.

evolution, not only here on Long Island, but throughout our state, our nation, and even internationally. And I know that you have been tasked by myself and our administration and our Town Board members to seek out new ways to be the most efficient and to have the highest percentage of recycling that we possibly can while looking at the growth opportunities in this field.

So can you speak to this Resolution for our Board and for the public?

When single stream ended, we -- well, before it ended, we met with the contractor. He told us he wanted to end it. We said, you can't, you have a contract with us. He maintained the contract with us for one full year. What I'm saying is this was a couple of months before the end of that one-year contract.

We had the -- the Town of Oyster Bay had made over a half a million dollars on single stream.

25 1 Yes, I would have --2 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: It was a good 3 deal. COMMISSIONER LENZ: Yes, I would have 4 5 loved to have kept it. Unfortunately, with China and 6 7 everything else that you hear about recycling, it 8 was not -- we were not capable of keeping it. 9 What we did is we --10 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Just to stop you 11 for a moment. 12 COMMISSIONER LENZ: Sure. 13 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: By China, you 14 mean China, the government and the businesses in 15 China stopping the purchase and the acceptance of 16 recycling materials from other countries? 17 COMMISSIONER LENZ: Thank you for --18 yes, Supervisor. 19 What we did is we then put out a bid 20 for multiple tasks to take up what we were losing 2.1 in single stream; meaning, paper or bottles and 22 cans, things like that. 23 MR. ALTADONNA: What about cardboard? 24 COMMISSIONER LENZ: We then, also at 25 the same time, we're negotiating with other

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2.6 municipalities and talking to other municipalities 1 2 throughout Long Island to see if it would be 3 beneficial for the Town of Oyster Bay to work 4 together. 5 In this particular case, we talked to District 6 in Town of Hempstead. They were willing 6 7 to work with us as a shared service, and that's 8 where our -- excuse me -- our material is going 9 right now. COMMISSIONER LENZ: Right.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Majority of the country -- the companies that deal with this and we continue to have a team of people who are focused on bringing us the alternatives that work, especially in the long term.

COMMISSIONER LENZ: Yes. Absolutely, Supervisor.

Yes, your administration and you have met with us on several occasions to go over all of this, and as I say, this is the best for the Town of Oyster Bay.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: We sent a team of our employees to look at it and research the program in Jamaica, Queens.

29 1 COMMISSIONER LENZ: Yes, we did. 2 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: That grinds glass down into a sand product. We're looking at all of 3 4 the ways to collect glass, and are examining a 5 pilot program to deal with the glass specifically. COMMISSIONER LENZ: Yes, we are. 6 7 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And we've 8 increased the drop off places for cardboard as well 9 and improved upon our communications, including through mailers --10 11 COMMISSIONER LENZ: Right. 12 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: -- to teach the 13 public what are those products that we're seeking 14 because we have the market for them and how they 15 can prepare them for pickup. 16 COMMISSIONER LENZ: Exactly, yes. 17 MR. Have you identified how much tonnage we're giving in cardboard to District 6?

we -- yes, we take tonnages on a daily basis of each truck that comes in, each Sanitation truck that comes in, we take tonnages on every single truck that leaves the facility, meaning that goes to District 6, so I can get you that information.

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: I will tell you that I did ask the Commissioner to supply me with the amount of tonnage we did over the last two years and was going to give me a monthly update on it, so I've been watching it also.

MR. ALTADONNA: No. What I'm looking for is are we offsetting the cost from District 6 or is that part of the bid, and if District 6 doesn't care about the cardboard because they're charging us anyhow, maybe we can segment that out to offset our costs for District 6?

COMMISSIONER LENZ: It is, right now, part of the cost, but we -- that's something we

31 would look into. 1 2 MR. ALTADONNA: If you could segment 3 the cardboard out and bring that revenue back into 4 the Town, that would be wonderful. 5 Thank you. It's not a Town of Oyster Bay camp, per se. When we got involved a couple years ago, we asked them for additional percentage of their revenue, so I think we're up to, like, 15 percent of what they take in.

As for the Town of Oyster Bay Parks & Recreation camps, we're thriving.

I mean, last year, we increased our revenue, like, 10 to 12 percent. The numbers went up. We have camps for our children, I believe, in six different parks right now, so we're thriving with our camps, but what you saw on the calendar tonight are not Town of Oyster Bay sponsored camps.

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They are contracts that are taken out with the Town of Oyster Bay to use our facilities to run their own camps.

I don't know how many numbers there are. There could be 10 or 15 kids, but that is on -- that's for those organizations that have the contract with the Town.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Commissioner, on all of our recreation projects that go through your department, do we use a varsity of means to promote them, to alert the public if they'd like to take advantage of these programs?

COMMISSIONER PINTO: We're consistent with what went on before I became the Commissioner. We're consistent with the way we advertise. We've always advertised our camps and I think we're doing the same thing now. So, yes, the answer is yes to that.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And always on the website, electronically, Facebook, through mailing, social media?

COMMISSIONER PINTO: We do that. I think that has increased on the social media side because that avenue has really expanded the last couple of years, but we advertise greatly.

34 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Are we going to 1 2 through the school districts? 3 COMMISSIONER PINTO: We send some 4 flyers to the school districts. You know, we 5 advertise there. I'm a 5 professional engineer. 6 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: So the question 7 came up about what we're doing to ensure that we, 8 first of all, get the lowest price on when we put 9 the projects out to bid and then in terms of 10 overseeing. 11 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Actually, we're 12 looking for the lowest responsible bidder, not the 13 lowest price. 14 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you. 15 That's, in fact, the case, the lowest 16 responsible bidder, which saves some money to the 17 Town in the long run, certainly. 18 And then that process of oversight to 19 ensure that the contracts, Town Attorney, Inspector 20 General, and what your department does to ensure 2.1 that the work is done and delivered in a timely 22 fashion and in an efficient fashion. 23 COMMISSIONER LENZ: What winds up 24 happening is, as I said -- excuse me -- we put it 25 out to bid, we get the lowest responsive bidder,

47 1 and when -- in this particular case, it was a Parks 2 project, so what we would do, we would meet with 3 Parks, we would make sure that we're meeting all 4 their expectations, and put it on the plans of 5 specifications. What was mentioned before about 6 7 fencing, it was one of these things, if you put it 8 in the specifications, the different gauge, the 9 first time, it would have been the same cost 10 because it would have increased the cost. So just 11 because it's a change order does not mean that 12 you're then increasing -- go ahead. 13 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: I tend to 14 disagree with that because consulting gets paid 15 extra to bring it up, to approve it, to watch it, 16 and everything else. 17 COMMISSIONER LENZ: I understand, but 18 in this particular case --19 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: You and I have 20 had long discussions on this. 2.1 COMMISSIONER LENZ: Yes. 22 But in this particular case that was 23 brought up, we are going from a Gauge 9 to a Gauge 24 6, meaning that it's thicker and heavier.

was -- once the gauge -- once the contractor had

48 brought it to Parks' attention, they felt that it 1 2 wasn't going to be strong enough for the children 3 that are going to be there, that it was a little 4 more flexible than what they were looking for. 5 In hindsight, maybe it was something that I should have brought to their attention a 6 7 little bit more, but as I said, we meet on a 8 regular basis to go over every project. 9 In this particular case, when you're 10 asking about the gauge, it's not going to be --11 yes, it was 7,000, but it would have been included 12 in the contract, it wouldn't have changed the cost 13 of that contract that much. COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: 14 That much. 15 COMMISSIONER LENZ: Okay. 16 Is there anything else? 17 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you. 18 MR. ADELMAN: What gauge are we using 19 on this new project? 20 COMMISSIONER LENZ: This is the field 2.1 replacement. It's not putting fence. 22 MR. ADELMAN: Okay. No fence. 23 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you, 2.4 Commissioner. 25 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Excuse me,

49 Commissioner. 1 2 COMMISSIONER LENZ: Yes? 3 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Just for the 4 public knowledge, the fields approximately 5 twelve years old --COMMISSIONER LENZ: 6 Thank you. 7 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: -- and it's time 8 for them to be replaced. 9 COMMISSIONER LENZ: That was -- yes, 10 that was a better way to put it. It should have 11 been explained that way, yes. 12 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And it's not only 13 replacement to have a new field, but there is an 14 expense of liability caution that --15 COMMISSIONER LENZ: I was just going to 16 say, what we do -- what we do, I believe, it's a 17 twice a year, Parks Department checks every field 18 for safety. There is an actual firm that comes in 19 and does a safety test that's scientific safety 20 test, and in this particular case, those two fields 2.1 have failed the safety test. 22 So what we're saying is, in the future, 23 it's not a good idea -- well, not failed right now, 24 but what I'm saying is it has a useful life. 25 What we need to do is now make those

50 changes before the Summer when we're going have 1 2 more kids playing on it again. 3 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you, Commissioner. 4 5 COMMISSIONER LENZ: Thank you. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Our next speaker 6 7 will be Kevin McKenna. 8 MR. ADELMAN: We have one more question 9 about 216, Tobay. 10 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: The legal fees 11 for Laser Industries. 12 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Counselor, would 13 you step forward, please? 14 MR. ADELMAN: (Inaudible) and is there 22 a lease? 23 MR. SCALERA: There is a lease. 24 Resolution brings in the outside counsel, the same 25 counsel that is working with the adjacent tenant.

Yes, and it is a landlord/tenant matter 1 2 and it has not been officially commenced in 3 landlord/tenant court, but the conditions proceed 4 it necessary to bring it to landlord/tenant courts 5 have been done. COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: And we're happy 6 7 with this firm from previous proceedings? 8 MR. 52 1 MR. McKENNA: On Resolution --2 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: -- ask your 3 questions and take a seat and then like for 4 everyone else --5 MR. McKENNA: I just wanted to put that out there. 6 7 On Resolution No. 214, I'd like to 8 know -- I'd like to know how many bidders did 9 respond to the synthetic fields on that bid, and 10 I'd like to know if the Inspector General, in fact, 11 reviewed that bid. 12 Is the Inspector General here tonight? 13 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Sir, again, just 14 like everyone else, if you'd kindly ask all of the 15 questions you'd like to ask this evening and take 16 your seat. 17 MR. McKENNA: On Resolution No. 209, 18 Resolution 209, I'm wondering why we're authorizing 19 an inter-municipal agreement with the School 20 District today that starts back in November of 2.1 2018. 22 I'd like to know from the Inspector 23 General if that's legal, or from the Town Attorney,

why is it the Town Board, right now, is voting on a

Resolution where -- what are we in -- the end of

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March for an agreement that starts in November?

On the mailers, actually, Supervisor, you actually sparked a thought when you were talking about how elderly or certain folks don't use the Internet or e-mail, and that's absolutely true. I would think that's it a -- I would think that it's a very small percentage of the 293,000 residents in the Town of Oyster Bay that fit that category.

Your e-mail list, which I happen to have a copy of now, thanks to the Town being open and transparent, I have your complete e-mail Supervisor's list right now.

If I could provide you -- if could provide you with names of all the elderly people in the Town of Oyster Bay, wouldn't it make sense for us to just send the colored mailers to just those people and probably save 75 percent of whatever the costs are that you're spending right now because you're sending this colored mailer?

I agree that certain people need a mailer. Why not just send the mailer to those -- to that audience? It's very easy to identify that audience. If you could respond to those questions, I'd really appreciate it.

54 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Excuse me, first 1 2 question, I'd like to ask our representative at the 3 Town Attorney's Office. 4 MR. SCALERA: Frank Scalera, Chief 5 Deputy Town Attorney. 6 I think the first question was about 7 the synthetic fields that were being replaced over 8 at --9 MR. ALTADONNA: How many bidders? 10 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: That question 11 we'll bring up with the Parks Commissioner and --12 MR. SCALERA: How many bidders, that 13 was the question. 14 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: How many bidders? 15 Are you aware of how many bidders responded to our 16 RFP? 17 MR. SCALERA: How it's typically done? 25 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: How it was done

55 1 for this one specifically. MR. SCALERA: General Services can 2 3 probably talk better on that, but I do know that 4 there is -- there's a running list as well -- to 5 send out to people in the -- to firms and entities that are in the industry of making --6 7 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: And it's also advertised on line. 8 9 MR. SCALERA: It's also advertised in 10 the newspaper. It's also advertised on our 11 website. So we, kind of, cover all bases. 12 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Also on Dodge 13 Report. 14 MR. SCALERA: On Dodge Report, that, I 15 don't know, but I guess General Service. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: So we use both 16 17 our website and e-mailing to try to do it 18 electronically, but we aren't able to get out to 19 everyone on just that alone. 20 MR. SCALERA: Or the publication 2.1 legally and practically covers anybody else who we 22 don't know. 23 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: What I'm asking 24 you specifically is that we send out to people via 25 digital messaging, e-mailing and so forth, and we

56 also put it on our website, just like everyone gets 1 2 an opportunity to bid. MR. SCALERA: Correct. 3 4 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: But those methods 5 aren't enough, we continue to use mail, we use publications, we use a variety of different ways 6 7 and I'm assuming it's because over the years, 8 municipalities have learned to get a message out, 9 it requires a digital presence, it requires a mail 10 presence, it requires publications, and every way 11 possible to get the word out. And I'm going to ask 12 to get that confirmed from General Services and from DPW. 13 14 Would you agree with that statement? 15 MR. SCALERA: Yes, I do. 16 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: All right. 17 Thank you. 18 Commissioner, would you please step up? 19 COMMISSIONER LENZ: Rich Lenz, 20 Commissioner of Department of Public Works. 2.1 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Questions have 22 arisen about the bidding process on the two fields 23 that are on our Resolution this evening. 24 COMMISSIONER LENZ: Yes. 25 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Can you tell us

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about that process, that specific process and what was done to reach out to the industry and what the responses were?

Stated, that's the way we normally do. We go to Newsday. We go to Dodge Report. We put it on the Town website. It's always on the Town website. We also give a list -- every project that we go out, we give a list of contracting firms that we have either dealt with in the past or that we know that would be interested in taking out bids.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And we send out to everyone on that list?

COMMISSIONER LENZ: Yes, we do.

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Commissioner,

just to educate the public --

COMMISSIONER LENZ: Yes?

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: -- Dodge Report is an industry standard that all prospective bids go out on -- I know municipal ones do, so that everybody gets a view of it. If you look at stuff, say, field replacements, anybody that's looking to do it, would just query that on the Dodge Report and our bid would come up.

COMMISSIONER LENZ: Yes.

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Now, in this particular case, several contractors took out the plans and specification and reviewed it.

In this particular case, only one bid. What we had put in the plans and specifications is that we have specific dates that these fields would be closed, the existing fields, and that they would have to do their construction period, which is a tight timeframe, so that we could reopen so that we would not be affecting any of the players in their particular sports.

So that's why it was a little bit tighter and that's why we're recommending that we go with this contractor. We had looked at our engineers estimates and this was right in the ballpark of what our engineers estimates were.

Unfortunately or fortunately, that's the local paper, so it has to be there.

And then, as I say, in the past, we've worked with certain contractors. We have then asked General Services to send notifications to those contractors that either have submitted in the past or something, so that we make sure that we're going out to the widest pool of workers that we can.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: People who have all the -- all the companies that have the qualifications to do the job.

62 1 COMMISSIONER LENZ: We try to, yes. 2 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And meet the 3 Town's criteria and State law? 4 COMMISSIONER LENZ: Yes, we do. 5 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Is this the only time when we've put an RFP out and had only one 6 7 acceptable bidder? COMMISSIONER LENZ: 8 No. 9 Just -- I apologize for correcting, but it's not -- an RFP is usually used for consultants. 10 11 A bid is used for contractors. 12 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: I'm sorry, put it 13 out for a bid, I apologize. 14 COMMISSIONER LENZ: I didn't mean -- I know you do know that. 15 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: This isn't the 16 17 only time we've put a bid out and have only had 18 one --19 COMMISSIONER LENZ: No. It happens quite often, unfortunately. 20 2.1 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: It happens quite 22 often. 23 COMMISSIONER LENZ: In some cases, 24 we -- I have closed it down and rebid, but in this 25 particular case, that's why I want to make sure

63 everybody understands, Councilman, it's very 1 2 important that we had certain deadline dates that 3 the contractor must meet, so if we don't award, 4 then I'm going to miss those dates and I'm going --5 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: It couldn't be a fly by night contractor because they couldn't, 6 7 realistically, meet the dates. 8 COMMISSIONER LENZ: Exactly. 9 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you, Commissioner. 10 11 COMMISSIONER LENZ: Thank you. 12 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: I see we have a 13 representative from the Department of General 14 Services. 15 Would you come forward, please? 16 Would you give us your name and title, 17 please? 18 MR. RAYMOND: Good evening, Supervisor, 19 Town Board. 20 Ralph Raymond, Deputy Commissioner of 21 General Services. 22 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: To bring more 23 clarity to this issue, we know that we put out 24 responses for bidders and your department handles 25 that?

Typically, what we do is we contact bidders to pick up and -- the bidders that are in that trade, we typically -- what we do is we contact them via e-mail or by phone and we periodically canvass the list to make sure that all the bidders have picked up. If they don't, then we call them to tell him that we have a bid.

We also advertise in Newsday and we also advertise on the website.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Do we try to reach -- do we reach out to --

MR. RAYMOND: Absolutely.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: -- responsible bidders in large geographical area, of Tri-State area, perhaps?

MR. RAYMOND: We reach out all over the place. Whoever is a bidder in that particular industry, we would -- we would contact them via phone, e-mail, to let them know that there is a bid that they can pick up and they can bid.

And as I said, what we also do is we actually keep a list of those bidders on a database and a paper list and we go through it as the time goes on, and when the bid comes to a closure, if we

65 see that there's not enough people that picked up, 1 2 we recontact them again to remind them that there's 3 a bid out to come and pick up. And all of those 4 methods were taken. 5 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And by putting this information on the website, we're, in essence, 6 7 putting that out to people across the nation? 8 MR. RAYMOND: Absolutely. 9 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Companies across the nation? 10 11 MR. RAYMOND: Yes. 12 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Is it unusual, 13 have we had instances when there was only one 14 responsible bidder on a job? 15 MR. RAYMOND: Sure. Sure. Absolutely. 16 Yep. Absolutely. 17 It depends on the time of the year. 18 depends on the actual project. Some bidders are 19 busier than others and -- you know, we've had this 20 in the past. 2.1 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Is there anyone 22 on the Town Board who has a question? 23 COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: Most of my 24 questions were addressed, but I was going to 25 suggest to you in the future, because I think what

66 1 it comes down to is that when there's only one 2 bidder in a sealed bid, I think the public needs to 3 be reassured that we have done everything that is 4 possible to include as many vendors as possible. 5 And when it comes back to us that there's only one, I think there are a lot of 6 7 questions that have to be answered. I think it's 8 important to be very transparent in your report to 9 the Board why you believe that has happened. 10 In this instance, I heard the 11 Commissioner of Public Works say it was this very 12 tight timeframe that they had to operate in. 13 When you give a timeframe like that, is 14 that -- is it customary to maybe find the 15 contractor, is it fines that they fear, is that the 16 reason maybe why we've discouraged people from 17 returning these bids? 18 MR. RAYMOND: No. We go to the extra 19 steps. 20 If we're at a short -- if we have a 2.1 short time period, the extra steps is we actually 22 contact actual responsible bidders and let them 23 know that there is a bid out there to be picked up. 24 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: No, no. you're missing his point.

67 1 He's talking about work completions, is 2 there a fine if the work isn't completed in the 3 date specified? 4 COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: Is there onerous fines on the vendors? Is that what -- is that why 5 they are discouraged? 6 7 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: Is there something 8 discouraging people from bidding? 9 MR. RAYMOND: Not to my knowledge, no. 10 I understand what you're saying. 11 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Honestly, there 12 should be. 13 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Well, let's bring 14 the Commissioner up before do that, before we jump 15 ahead. MR. RAYMOND: I think he's asking 16 17 specifics. 18 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you, Deputy Commissioner. 19 20 MR. RAYMOND: Thank you. 2.1 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Commissioner 22 Lenz, thanks for returning up to the podium. 23 COMMISSIONER LENZ: Yeah, one of the 24 things I should have mentioned while I was up here, 25 just keep in mind, some of the jobs that we do are

68 very specific jobs; meaning, that if it's like 1 2 electrical instrumentation or something like that, 3 there's only a few contractors that can bid. 4 In this particular case --5 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Can you tell us why? 6 7 COMMISSIONER LENZ: Well, in this 8 particular case, this is a carpet field. It's a --9 it's a field that only certain vendors make, so when a vendor makes a field, not the contractor, 10 11 when the vendor makes a field, he then only 12 certifies certain contractors to install his field. 13 That's why it's limited to the amount 14 of contractors, in this particular case, that can 15 do this work. I don't know -- does that answer? 16 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: It's a specialized 17 job. 18 COMMISSIONER LENZ: It's a specialized 19 job, right. 20 COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: I think that's 2.1 important that the Board hears that. That can 22 satisfy the question, especially if the public has them of us. 23 24 At some point, we can turn to a 25 report --

69 1 COMMISSIONER LENZ: Right. 2 COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: -- from the 3 Commissioner that says --COMMISSIONER LENZ: Sure. 4 5 COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: -- these are the reasons we believe that nobody or very few people 6 7 picked up the bids, and then only one bidder returned it. 8 9 I mean, because we need to transparent about that. 10 11 COMMISSIONER LENZ: Absolutely. 12 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Commissioner, on 13 the Councilman's earlier question about performance 14 incentive and penalties, do we have that? 15 COMMISSIONER LENZ: We do not. 16 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: We really should 17 think about doing that. 18 COMMISSIONER LENZ: We would consider 19 it. 20 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: If, you know, 2.1 get the job done on time, on schedule and on 22 budget, and if not, they get penalized. 23 COMMISSIONER LENZ: As I say, we were 24 taking into account -- and just so you know, 25 this -- just so you know, this field can be built

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70 in the timeframe that was given with no problems, it's just that there's specific dates. I mean, if you really want the dates, I can give them to you. COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: You're more concerned about the timeframe of the bidding and awarding the contract than the actual work. work is not going to be a lengthy process. COMMISSIONER LENZ: No. Burns Park is -- you cannot start construction before April 27th and you have to be done by May 27th. We know for a fact that that is a doable contract, but it's a specific contract. The reason being is like I described earlier, is to allow the children to be able to play on it up until April -- up until the end of April. Then in Combs, it's July 4th, and it runs 30 consecutive days. COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: The fact that it's already an existing field, a lot of the base work doesn't haven't to be done.

COMMISSIONER LENZ: Right. Exactly.

COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: Which is why it needs to be a specialized project?

COMMISSIONER LENZ: Yes. Yes.

But what I'm saying, I just want to

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make sure that we -- I did not specify one specific product. I left it open to several different types of products, different fields, but there's only one contractor that was willing to supply his field.

The other gentleman, like was said earlier, the other contractors might have been very busy. They might be doing other school districts or whatever, and they chose not to bid.

But I want to make sure everybody understands, there was four bidders that took out the plans and specifications. Usually, what we do is I do not contact them until after we discuss it with you and you make the decision if we're going to go with it or not, then I call them and find out what the problems were. We can do things a little different, but that -- I'm saying that's the norm.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Are there --

COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: Is there -- sorry, Supervisor.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: I just wanted -because you know the industry very well, are there
quite a few schools and municipalities on Long
Island, maybe the Tri-State are that are putting in
fields simultaneously?

COMMISSIONER LENZ: The one that's in

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Farmingdale, the Farmingdale High School, they're doing -- just as a small example, they're redoing the whole field.

Go ahead.

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Unfortunately, ten to fifteen years ago, turf fields were the rage, and now they have to all be replaced.

COMMISSIONER LENZ: Yes.

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Couple of years from now, we might have more people bidding because there will be less work out there.

COMMISSIONER LENZ: Right.

But when a vendor -- as I said before, when a vendor makes this turf field, turf field is slang for the stuff. What I'm saying is there is a turf field, turf field or like -- so there's only certain contractors that can install this type of material.

It couldn't -- it's not any contractor. You cannot go to any contractor. It has to be a specific contractor.

That would be like IT, for instance.

There's only certain vendors that will be able to install Microsoft equipment.

I'm just using that as an simple

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7.3 example -- that's not really a proper one -- but 1 2 just as an example, there's only certain vendors 3 that can install certain things, and that's what 4 happened in this particular case. 5 COUNCILMAN MUSCARELLA: We understand. COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: Commissioner 6 7 Lenz? COMMISSIONER LENZ: Yes. 8 9 COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: The vendor who 10 ultimately was awarded the contract had -- has no 11 idea that there are no other bidders, correct? 12 COMMISSIONER LENZ: They do not. 13 COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: They think that 14 four other bidders picked up when they're --15 COMMISSIONER LENZ: Yes, they know 16 that. 17 COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: When they're 18 doing their numbers? 19 COMMISSIONER LENZ: Absolutely. 20 COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: And the question 2.1 I have to you is, I heard you say that you think it 22 was within the range of our consultant? 23 COMMISSIONER LENZ: Yes, it is. 24 COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: And is it below 25 or above the range?

13	if there's an error in what we did or is the
14	contractor wrong.
15	In that particular case, I would bring
16	the contractors in and say, what seems to be the
17	problem? And we would go back out to bid. I would
18	not award, usually, in that particular case.
19	COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: Thank you.

22	very hands on with the bidding process.
23	COMMISSIONER LENZ: Thank you.
