2 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Good evening 1 2 ladies and gentlemen, and welcome to Oyster Bay 3 Town Hall for our Town Board meeting of Tuesday, June 26, 2018. Welcome everyone. 4 5 To lead us in prayer this evening, we welcome our good friend, Deacon Jim Murphy of 6 7 St. Edward the Confessor Roman Catholic Church in 8 Syosset. 9 Deacon Jim is beloved by his parish family and the community at large and is always 10 11 there for his congregates in times of celebration 12 and to provide solace in times of sorrow. 13 We thank him for taking time out of his 14 schedule to be with us this evening and we greatly 15 appreciate all he does to make our Town a better 16 place to live, a Town of tolerance and love and 17 understanding for one another. 18 Deacon Jim, the podium is yours. 19 Please step forward. 20 All rise. 2.1 (Whereupon, a prayer was recited by 22 Deacon Jim Murphy.) 23 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you, Deacon 2.4 Jim. 25 While you're still standing, please, we

3 will now ask for Jericho High School senior Warren 1 2 Wang to lead us in the Pledge of Allegiance. 3 Warren, if you would step forward, 4 please. 5 (Whereupon, the Pledge of Allegiance was recited by Warren Wang.) 6 7 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you. 8 Actually, just one more moment of 9 silence, please, if I may ask for our United States 10 Armed Forces serving abroad and here in the nation, 11 as well as all of those men and women in law 12 enforcement and our volunteer fire service. (Whereupon, a moment of silence was 13 14 observed.) 15 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you. 16 Tonight, Oyster Bay Town and our Board, 17 and all of residents are proud to recognize an 18 exceptional student athlete and humanitarian 19 Jericho High School senior, Warren Wang. 20 Warren is a true Renaissance man who 2.1 has accomplished more in his 18 years than many of 22 us do in a lifetime. In addition to being an 23 outstanding student who will attend the University 24 of Pennsylvania, U Penn Wharton, in the Fall, 25 Warren is a national master in chess.

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He ranked 4th in New York State and 32 in the nation among 18 year olds. He won the World Amateur Chess Championship in 2016 and 2017, and has twice appeared on the cover of Chess Life Magazine.

To get a true essence of what drives
Warren, you'll have to look to a defining incident
in his life that occurred seven years ago.

Back in 2011, a devastating fire destroyed Warren's home and its contents, including his cherished chess board, pieces and the many awards he has earned over the years. His family was forced to live in a hotel for 18 months, and from that point forward, he learned never to take anything for granted.

Quite frankly, a great lesson for all of us. While many would have felt despair, Warren was heartened by the outpouring of support his family received and was inspired to give back to his community and put the needs of others first.

In 2014, he and his younger brother, Wesley, founded a nonprofit organization known as Chess Sanity, to teach the game to students from Kindergarten to 12th grade.

He and his brother raised funds for

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Chess Sanity by conducting an informative ten-week chess class. This money allowed them to give away free chess sets and lessons to more than 20 schools throughout the organization's Adopt-a-School Initiative.

There's more to Warren than chess, though. He's also a member of the National Honor Society and the Quiz Bowl. He is a co-captain of his varsity tennis team and captain of the varsity badminton team, which won the Nassau County Championship title this year.

Warren's exceptional acts of generosity and volunteerism are the foundation of a healthy community, and serve as an important role model for others.

At tonight's meeting, the Oyster Bay

Town Board provides the ideal backdrop to proudly

recognize Warren's efforts, some of Warren's

talents, and his commitment to the community and to

other students.

This underscores the importance of giving back to the community and putting the needs of others first. On behalf of my colleagues on the Oyster Bay Town Board, we salute his actions and the extraordinary community service of Jericho High

6 1 School senior, Warren Wang. He's joined here by 2 his family, and we ask Warren to step forward, and 3 I would like to ask Councilman Anthony Macagnone to 4 help us by presenting a Citation to Warren Wang. 5 (Applause.) (Whereupon, a Town Citation was 6 7 presented to Warren Wang by Councilman Macagnone 8 and a photo session ensued.) 9 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Warren, would you 10 like to say something? 11 WARREN WANG: I just would thank the 12 Town of Oyster Bay. I started playing chess at 13 about four and a half, and I never knew it would 14 take me this far. 15 And I know when I leave for college 16 next year, my nonprofit will be handled by my 17 brother, and it's just -- it's just great to see 18 the impact it has on other people around me. 19 That's always what I strived for in life, so thank 20 you. 2.1 (Applause.) 22 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Keep up the good 23 work and keep making us proud. 24 Before we move forward with the 25 business of the day, I believe it's very important

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to provide an update to our residents on a very important matter, residents who are here today, residents who are following on the Internet.

In regard to the proposed development in Syosset, the Town will require independent environmental and health testing of the former Syosset landfill site and the Department of Public Works site in Syosset, and we will accept the developer's offer to fund this testing and analysis, while it must and will be done independently.

As a matter of fact, we will settle for nothing less than independent testing that adheres to establish quality control standards and the methodologies and protocols set forth by the Environmental Protection Agency of the United States of America, the Department of Environmental Conservation from the State of New York, and both State and County Health Departments.

Our residents deserve to be part of this process. They deserve to receive precise and verifiable test results, and any independent testing performed will demonstrate a strict compliance with all applicable regulations and industry standards.

8 1 Irrespective of the extensive historic testing at the sites, the Town's unwavering 2 3 commitment to facilitating additional testing will be completed and done so with unprecedented 4 5 transparency. 6 We announced this to the media this 7 past week and we will continue to push forward to ensure that this gets done fully independently. 8 9 We will continue to keep you apprised 10 of this independent testing as the process moves 11 forward. 12 (TIME NOTED: 7:27 P.M.) 13 14 15 16 17 18 19 20 21 22 23 2.4 25

8	MR. ALTADONNA: Hydrant rental, to
9	consider hydrant rental agreements for the Glenwood -
10	Glen Head Fire Protection District for the periods
11	July 1, 2018 through December 31, 2018.
12	SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Good evening.
13	MS. FAUGHNAN: Good evening,
14	Supervisor, members of the Town Board.
15	Elizabeth Faughnan, Deputy Town
16	Attorney, Town Attorney's Office.
17	This evening, we are here for this
18	hearing to discuss hydrant rent for the period
19	July 1, 2018 through December 31, 2018, and
20	question?
21	COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: No.
22	MS. FAUGHNAN: No, okay.
23	As you may recall, the Town is here to
24	consider the rental of the fire hydrants because
25	the Town this is an area where there is no

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elected fire district with fire commissioners.

This is an instance where there is a private fire company, a private not-for-profit company that provides fire protection services.

My understanding is something like 80 years ago, there's a State Controller opinion that says that water districts must rent the hydrants to either a fire district or a fire department. The reason being, a water district maintains the water infrastructure, it maintains the water mains, but the fire hydrants are necessary for the fire departments or the fire companies to fight fires and provide those services.

And that -- the State Controller opinion stated -- and, again, I don't have it, this is my understanding -- stated that is not the responsibility of all of the residents of the water district or the customers of the water company to provide the fire hydrants at no cost to the fire departments or fire districts.

As a result, the water districts, or in this case, the water company charges for the usage of the fire hydrants so that the fire department is actually allowed to go in and open the hydrants and

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use them to fight fires.

That was a very long intro and I apologize. The Board considers several of these contracts every year. There are contracts with Oyster Bay -- for the Oyster Bay Fire Protection Area, for Plainview, and this is, as stated before, for Sea Cliff, Glen Head.

In other contracts, the fees are different than in this one. The fire hydrant rental fee for the Plainview contract is \$90 per hydrant. I will tell you, I did do some research, and North Massapequa, they charge about \$90 per hydrant as well. My own home district, which is an elected district, Locust Valley, charges \$73.17 per hydrant.

Having said that, in this area, the water services are provided by New York American Water, which is a private company. It has to get approval from the New York State Public Service Commission for its fire hydrant rental fees.

My understanding is the fee has been the same since at least 2013, and the fee is a rental fee of \$748.62 per hydrant per year.

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Excuse me?

MS. FAUGHNAN: \$748.62 per hydrant per

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year. That fee has been consistent for at least the last five years. So that is a total \$167,690.88 per year.

In January, the Board passed Resolution No. 36 of 2018, approving payment of the fee to New York American Water for the six months, January 1st through June 30th, at that rate of \$748.62 per year, halved for the six-month period for a total amount not to exceed \$83,845.44.

I'm going to hand up Resolution 36 as an exhibit for this hearing (handing). It is actually not the Resolution. It is a copy of the Resolution.

At this time, I would ask the Town

Board, we have not -- I have not prepared a

Resolution for tonight for you to review and pass
or not pass, but I would ask that the Town Board

consider approving payment to New York American

Water for the fire hydrant rental fee.

For the balance of the year, it would end up being retroactive from July 1st through December 31, 2018 for the \$748.62 per hydrant for the last six months of the year for a total amount not to exceed \$83,845.44.

For that money, the fire -- the company

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has to make sure the hydrants are maintained. They have to make sure there is a proper water flow, which is anywhere from 500 to 1,000 gallons per minute to come out of the hydrant and make sure there's enough water back in the tank to be able to fight a fire.

COUNCILWOMAN JOHNSON: Can I ask a question?

MS. FAUGHNAN: Sure.

COUNCILWOMAN JOHNSON: Is there a disruption during that time period when the water flow or the pressure in the tank, does that then come off our balance, so to speak?

MS. FAUGHNAN: It does not.

And I will say, we have not signed a contract with New York -- generally, we -- there is a hearing and the Town Board approves the signing of a contract as well as payment of the fee. The last -- there has not been a contract in a few years because we could not agree on a contract.

COUNCILWOMAN JOHNSON: Is there any way of knowing how often disruptions in the water pressure and tank pressure and water supply might happen during any given time period?

MS. FAUGHNAN: We have gotten several

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phone calls from residents. I can tell you, over the past three weeks, I've gotten at least three phone calls of different situations. One resident called to say, on their home water service, that they had not had any water pressure for ten hours.

My understanding is the equipment failed in one their tanks and their tank leaked and was empty. I believe it was the -- you know, I don't want to say which tank it was because I don't recall. The Glen Head tank, that's what I thought.

When I called the water company afterwards, I called the next day, I was told there was a minor disruption and some low water pressure.

Obviously depending on where you are on the main -- and I'm not a water expert, I'm not a -- I'm a lawyer talking about -- learning about water and water flow and whatnot. Depending on where you are on the main also might affect how much pressure you might get at your home. Also might -- what might affect it is how many other people are pulling water at the same time.

Obviously, if you're pulling -- if there are 100 homeowners on that block pulling water for a sprinkler, there might be a problem with water pressure as opposed to another block

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where there's only one person pulling it. But then again, that's why they run the water mains and I don't.

COUNCILMAN MUSCARELLA: Beth, are you asking us to vote on this hearing tonight?

MS. FAUGHNAN: No, I am not. I have not prepared a Resolution. No, we do not.

What I would do is, we are working, or I have been working with some of the residents in the area who have concerns with the quality of the water service and the cost to the residential customers, and we are trying get more answers for them and find out why the costs are so high.

Obviously, there are complaints to the Public Service Commission regarding the cost, regarding the fact that there were overcharges in real property taxes, and therefore, surcharges that, perhaps, and I say that with a smile, perhaps were overcharged to the residents and need to be refunded.

There are a lot of issues going back and forth. And, again, all their rates have to be approved by the Public Service Commission.

The Town of Oyster Bay did make comments to the last case matter that was opened

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with the Public Service Commission regarding the fees and the quality of the services that have been provided to the homeowners and the business owners in that area.

And we will continue, after the hearing closes tonight, going forward, and even if the Board did approve payment of the water -- the hydrant rental fee for the last six months of the year, we will -- I will continue and I know other members of the Town will continue to work with the residents to try and get them the answers that they deserve and try to work with them to provide better service at a lower price.

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Councilwoman,

I'm concerned that the high price for the hydrant

rental is something that's necessary for the safety

of our residents, and it's --

MS. FAUGHNAN: Correct.

COUNCILWOMAN JOHNSON: I think we all are.

COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: It's very high.

MS. FAUGHNAN: It is. And it's --

COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: Ms. Faughnan, the

last time this came up, the reason we did it for

only six months was because there had come to light

12 some information that there had been some 1 2 misrepresentations regarding taxes and things of 3 that nature, and that was why we only approved it 4 for half the year. We were hoping to have that 5 resolved by now. I'm assuming it hasn't been resolved? 6 7 MS. FAUGHNAN: Nothing has been 8 resolved because the rate is set by the New York 9 State Public Service Commission. 10 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: Back in 2013, you 11 said? 12 MS. FAUGHNAN: Well, it's remained 13 consistent. Every year, they have to go in and 14 apply for rate changes -- or any time they want a 15 rate increase, they have to go in and apply for a 16 rate increase. 17 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: Was this rate 18 affected by the misrepresentations the same way that the residential rates were? 19 20 MS. FAUGHNAN: There you go. Therein 2.1 lies the rope, Councilman. 22 If you look at the bills from the water 23 company, they include on the bill, a -- they have a 24 fire hydrant fee, and then they include a tax

surcharge, and then they include also -- they also

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include a gross receipts tax. When the Town of Oyster Bay had -- each time the Town of Oyster Bay has approved it, the Town has only approved the fire hydrant rental fee.

So no matter what they have billed the Town of Oyster Bay for, the Town has only paid the fire hydrant rental fee.

So, whatever surcharge they're adding, whatever gross --

COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: So they actually want more money than this?

MS. FAUGHNAN: Yes.

So the Town has only approved -- and I have in front of me, a copy of the 2016 bill which a came in at one point for a prior balance, and then the first quarter of the following year, and it came in for \$184,000, and the Town of Oyster Bay only had Town Board approval and a Resolution for \$167,690.88 for year 2016, and that is all that the Controller's Office paid because it is all the Town Board authorized payment for. So, no matter what they are billing, the Town has only paid the rental fee approved. The Town Board has not approved anything above the fire hydrant rental fee of \$748.62.

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1	COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: All right.
2	Thank you.
3	MS. FAUGHNAN: Sure.
4	But it does involve further study and
5	investigation, obviously.
6	SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Are there any
7	other questions?
8	(No response.)
9	SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you.
10	MS. FAUGHNAN: Thank you, Supervisor.
11	SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Is there anyone
12	in the public who would like to be heard on this?
13	Mr. Adelman?
14	COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: I have one more
15	question.
16	When does this come before the Public
17	Service Commission next for?
18	MS. FAUGHNAN: Well, there is currently
19	a case open with the Public Service Commission and
20	the Town Attorney's Office it's case number
21	there's actually two cases that are open Case
22	No. 16-W-02589, which is a proceeding on the motion
23	of the Commission as to rates, charges, rules and
24	regulation of the New York American Water Company,
25	Inc. for water service.

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And then there's also Case No.

17-W-0300, petition of New York American Water Company, Inc. for approval to offset the RAC/PTR surcharge, PSC No. 5.

So there are two cases in there already. I think it comes up, quite frankly, any time there is a problem with the rates and they're going to adjust the rates.

apologize -- there was an interim staff report that was issued on April 30th. The staff of the Public Service Commission filed the interim report on its investigation into New York American Water's property tax overcharges, and that report was issued on April 30, 2018, in which the staff of the Public Service Commission gave recommendations as how to deal with tax overcharges, how to deal with whether to refund them now or whether to just hold them and use them to offset, perhaps, future increases where the staff had made their own internal recommendations.

The remainder of the staff's report is due to be filed the end of this week, by June 30, 2018. I did not see it on the Public Service

Commission website this evening, so it would come

16 in some time between now and June 30th. I will say 1 2 the Public Service Commission is open to comments 3 up until July 23, 2018. 4 So, again, the Town Attorney's Office 5 did file their comments electronically on June 21st, but the comment period will remain open 6 7 until July 23rd. 8 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you. 9 MS. FAUGHNAN: Thank you, Supervisor. 10 MR. ADELMAN: Arthur Adelman, 11 110 Dubois Avenue, Sea Cliff, New York. 12 In regard to the hearing on the hydrant 13 rentals, a very important aspect of hydrant rentals 14 is the maintenance of the hardware, hydrants 15 themselves. Councilman Hand will know that because 16 17 he was a Water Commissioner and I -- was it your 18 responsibility when you were Water Commissioner to 19 flush the hydrants or did the fire department do 20 that? 2.1 COUNCILMAN HAND: It was us. 22 MR. ADELMAN: It was us. 23 New York American Water has not done 24 their annual flushing of the hydrants this year, 25 and it's purely an economical reason. They're

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having problems with water supply out of the Glen Head tank, and in order to flush the hydrants, they would have to open up and purchase water from the surrounding water companies via the interconnects that are available in three or four spots.

I'm very upset that they're charging \$750 per hydrant and not doing a thing. I spoke to American Water. They wanted to know how I knew this. I said I put tells on about half a dozen hydrants in the neighborhood. Just piece of tape, you know, put it on just to see if they were opened, and the tape was still there.

And I got it confirmed by an employee that they didn't do it because they don't want to spend the water -- to spend the money on the water from Roslyn, Jericho or Glenwood. I think this -- if you write a letter during this period to the Public Service Commission, I think it's important to include this aspect that they're negligent on their maintaining of the hydrants.

And the price is crazy. I mean, I have a bill here from the Sea Cliff district area. This is Glenwood. Sea Cliff gets their own bill and it's the same amount for the basic on the hydrants

18 1 and the hydrant charge on this bill, was a 2 quarterly bill, was just under \$60,000 and it had 3 over 20 percent of that -- about 20 percent 4 additional for -- what they call incremental property tax surcharges, which I find crazy because 5 I didn't think they could tax a governmental --6 7 aren't governments --8 MS. FAUGHNAN: Exempt from tax. 9 MR. ADELMAN: Exempt from taxes, so 10 this whole is -- you know, not good. 11 Anyway, thank you. 12 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you. 13 MR. ADELMAN: I know we've go to pass 14 the -- something because they got to get paid and 15 we need our hydrants functioning. COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: 16 17 MR. ADELMAN: But I think there needs to be some official inquiries in what's going on. 18 19 Thank you. 20 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you, 2.1 Mr. Adelman. 22 I'm going read a very brief letter 23 because I think it makes very clear where the Town 24 of Oyster Bay and where this Board stands, and not 25 only this Board, but all of the elected officials

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in the Town of Oyster Bay.

We have been dealing with this issue for months and months, and it's not new information when speakers come before us. And we have sided with our residents unequivocally. This is a letter from all of the elected officials in the Town of Oyster Bay addressed to the New York State Public Service Commission.

"Dear Commissioners, As elected officials representing America's third largest township, we write to express the Town of Oyster Bay's continued outrage and that of our residents over a rate hike approved by the PSC in May of 2017 for New York American Water.

"We are deeply concerned with the astronomically high water rates being charged by New York American Water to residents that reside in the areas they service. We call on the PSC to reverse its decision and unanimously join us in requesting that the New York State Controller perform a thorough and comprehensive forensic audit of New York American Water.

"In support of affected rate payers, the Town of Oyster Bay recently submitted legal arguments which stated that the PSC order and the

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rates, that they are both unconstitutional and unlawful because, one, resident's right to equal protection was violated, and, two, this order to permit a rate increase can be construed as an example of taxation without representation.

"As has been established by legal precedent, it is unconstitutional for an unelected board to impose taxes upon State residents.

"In addition to the legal comments submitted to you in respect of your investigation of the New York American Water rates, a legal brief was submitted to Supreme Court Albany County in the incorporated Village of Sea Cliff versus Public Service Commission, et al.

"By now, you are well aware that side-by-side comparisons with surrounding public Water Districts clearly demonstrate a great disparity and, quite frankly, an apparent injustice upon residents served by New York American Water. They often pay as much as four times the amount as compared to adjacent water rate payers.

"Certainly, the service provided by

New York American Water is no different than that

provided by the local Water Districts. For these

reasons, we support a State takeover of American

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Water and call upon the State Legislature to accomplish such an initiative.

"Safe, clean and affordable drinking water should not be a luxury. It should be a dependable resource within the reach of all when you live in the most modern and advanced nation in the world.

"Thank you in advance for your consideration of our request to ask that you take immediate action to correct the inequities that are taking place in communities served by New York American Water."

I don't understand why we need those transcripts considering that's not our game.

So I would -- I don't know why we would want to spend \$12,000, but I think we already spent it. The way I read the backup documentation, Town Attorney has already obtained the transcripts, I think.

My question on 441 regarding the payment for -- counsel for former Supervisor and his civil problems. In a way, I feel that there should be some indemnification, but I think that there should be some agreement about using an attorney that's not \$850 an hour. I think that's way beyond what a common man would pay for an attorney.

I know the attorneys we're paying for Resolution 423 for the -- against AIG, local attorneys, they're charging the Town \$300 an hour for partners, which I find is a reasonable sum. \$850 for Mr. Venditto's attorney, I think is

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outrageous and the Board might consider not approving this Resolution and moving forward with his litigation and seeing if they'll settle to do a 50/50 split, maybe. Who knows?

The last item I had -- oh, for the new one, the Walk-On 443 about starting -- adding

Mr. Genova to the litigation of Mr. May and Singh and SRB and whatever on a civil case, I applaud for doing that and I support that Resolution.

Our next speakers will be John Collins and Harriet Clark.

MR. COLLINS: Supervisor and Town Board members, I'm President of the Friends of Raynham Hall; Harriet Clark is our Executive Director.

A little later in the meeting, there's a Resolution to approve a contract so we can begin to complete the restoration and rehabilitation of 30 West Main Street, the museum's new education center.

And if you'll indulge me for just a minute to sort of give you a little idea on what Raynham Hall has been doing.

History, of course, is central to our

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identity as a community, both individually and as a community. And as John Steinbeck stated poignantly in his book *The Grapes of Wrath*, "How will we know who we are without our past?"

Raynham Hall Museum celebrates and informs the public with that sense of identity in each of the 5,000 school kids that come from all over Long Island to visit the museum on a field trip each year. Tonight we're about to embark on the final phase of our three-year capital fund campaign, which involves the completion of renovations to the building at 30 West Main Street to become the museum's new education center and administrative offices.

At tonight's meeting, we're being asked to -- you're being asked to review, and hopefully approve, a contract to allow the Friends of Raynham Hall to proceed with the completion of the renovations to 30 West Main Street.

The story of the Townsend family and their ties to American history are compelling. The museum building, 20 West Main Street, started as a four-room farmhouse building about 1740, and was acquired by Samuel Townsend, who was only then 23 years old, and expanded to eight rooms.

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The property originally extended all the way north to the harbor, and present day Audrey Avenue was named for Samuel's daughter when the property was subdivided at the turn of the last century. Samuel's brother, Jacob, lived next door where the Masonic Lodge is now located.

The two brothers were engaged in commerce together, owning four ships. They were also active in Town government, and eventually, they sided with American independence over the greater safety of loyalty to the Crown.

Raynham Hall was occupied by British forces for a period of six months between 1778 and 1779. It was in March of 1779 that Samuel's middle son, Robert, agreed to become the central member of George Washington's legendary intelligence gathering network called the Culper Spy Ring, which was essential to his efforts to outsmart the far better equipped and trained British forces.

In Victorian times, Samuel's grandson, Solomon, inhabited the home and expanded it to 22 rooms, changing the style to suit the tastes of the time.

For 65 years, the Friends of Raynham
Hall have partnered with the Town of Oyster Bay to

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tell this inspiring story and to preserve a tangible part of our Town's rich history.

Raynham Hall, as you maybe know, is the only house museum on Long Island that is accredited by the American Alliance of Museums, and it's been so for about thirty years. Unlike most house museums that have staggered exhibits and declining attendance, Raynham Hall is thriving, in part due to AMC TV series, Turn, which I hope many of you have seen, and Brian Kilmeade's New York Times bestselling book, Washington's Secret Six.

The Town of Oyster Bay is -- made

Raynham Hall's success possible by its generous

annual grant, underwriting a third of the museum's

annual operating budget, and by acquiring the

property at 30 West Main Street for the new

education center.

The Town also funded the restoration of the wood shingle roof on the museum several years ago.

To all this, the Friends of Raynham
Hall wish to say, enthusiastically, thank you to
the Town Board for their faithful and strong
support of the museum.

The museum's capital fund campaign has

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raised nearly \$1.7 million, which has allowed us to restore the museum building and the front facade of 30 West Main Street, and, of course, many of you have probably seen it as you've gone by, we had a use it or lose it grant to allow us to do that.

In a recent grant from the Robert David
Lion Gardiner Foundation for \$405,000, it made -it has made it possible for us to proceed with
plans for the completion of the renovations of
30 West Main Street.

Your approval of the contract to proceed with this final phase of the renovation work will allow the museum to fulfill its long held dream of obtaining an education center for expanded programs, exhibits, lectures, and other educational activities.

Again, we thank you for your faithful and continued support of the museum.

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indicted, or I guess he's still indicted, I'm not sure, County Executive Mangano. Why do we need to spend money for that?

And on the other resolution that has to do with the legal fees, the vote on the legal fees for Former Supervisor Venditto, I would ask the Board to not vote on this at all, to await the criminal proceedings in Nassau County and the outcome of the SCC charges.

You have the ability to delay the whole thing, put it off. A vote against it is going to just trigger a lawsuit, which legal experts say the Town and the public is going to lose, so I urge the Board to table the matter and not vote on it and let Mr. Venditto wait.
