It is an honor, as always, to have you 1 2 here with us. 3 Thank you for your service to our 4 Nation, and thank you for your continued service to 5 Veterans and to this community in the decades that have followed. 6 7 God bless you both. 8 MR. BELLOSPIRITO: Thank you. 9 MR. SELBY: Thank you. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Ladies and 10 11 gentlemen, let's take a moment to keep in mind our 12 women and men in the United States Armed Forces 13 serving here in the Homeland and abroad, and the 14 men and women in all of law enforcement, our first 15 responders, as well as our health care heroes, who are continuing to work very hard and diligently for 16 us on the frontlines. 17 18 God bless all of them. Please, God, 19 bring them safety as they continue to do their job 20 to protect us. 2.1 (Whereupon, a moment of silence was 22 observed by the assemblage present.) 23 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you, 24 everyone. 25 Please be seated.

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Today's is a very exciting day for the Board Members and for our residents -- for everyone -- because we take such pride in recognizing someone very special who is joining us today.

We, the Members of this Board, our elected officials, and the entire Oyster Bay Town family are very proud to welcome Town of Oyster Bay's Kristine O'Brien, who just competed in the Summer Olympics in Tokyo, and is on the U.S. Women's Rowing team.

Let's give her a hand.

(Whereupon, a round of applause ensued.)

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Kristine O'Brien, and the U.S. Women's Eight Rowing team, finished in fourth place, which is an absolutely amazing accomplishment. We could not be more proud of you.

The performance capped off the first Olympic appearance for Kristine, a 29-year-old Massapequa Park resident and a St. John the Baptist graduate.

As a side note, Kristine received plenty of support back in Massapequa during the race as her family and friends filled a local watering hole -- I guess we could say it -- Johnny

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McGorey's -- to attend a watch party cheering them on. I thought the ceiling was going to fall down because of all the cheering. You have brought so much pride to the Massapequas, to the Town of Oyster Bay, to Long Island, to New York State, and to America.

Kristine earned four medals while competing in the World Championships, including gold, as both a Member of the 2018 Women's Eight U.S. Team and the 2015 Women's Four Squad. She also won the 2012 Varsity Eight and Team title with the University of Virginia at the 2012 NCAA Championships. In addition, she was named the 2010 ACC Freshman of the Year and was a Member of the ACC Crew of the Year from 2010 to 2013.

I'm envisioning a wall in your house that is very, very full -- packed with awards, bringing pride to your family, your friends, your neighbors, and, as we said, the whole community, and this entire Town. You've had an incredibly successful career, one that places you with the very finest in the world.

Kristine, it's such an honor to have you here, an Olympian with us this morning. Our Town Board Members are so incredibly proud -- I

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know Jeff was leading the charge at McGorey's. Go ahead.

MR. PRAVATO: Supervisor, I know, it was a great night at McGorey's meeting the family. The excitement that was in the air. The place was packed, cheering you on from far away, but it was such a great night to see the camaraderie of our Village come together to be with one of our own just to cheer her on all the way around the world, and we wish the best for you and your future. It was a great night.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Wonderful, wonderful news.

So come on up, please.

I am going to ask Massapequa Park resident Tom Hand to help by presenting you with this Town Citation.

We are all so proud of you.

(Whereupon, a Town Citation was presented to Kristine O'Brien, followed by a photo opportunity and a round of applause.)

MS. O'BRIEN: Thank you so much. I really appreciate all of your support.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: You are a hero of heroes in our Town. And as boaters, if we ever run

10 out of gas, we're calling you to row us home. 1 2 (Whereupon, there was laughter among 3 the assemblage present.) 4 MS. O'BRIEN: Thanks so much. I really 5 appreciate all of your support. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Can you just give 6 7 a real brief story of, maybe, something that 8 happened, a pinnacle moment, a story, a quick 9 little view of what it's like to be an Olympian? 10 MS. O'BRIEN: Yeah. I mean, I'm going 11 to get emotional. It's just the greatest honor to 12 represent my Country. 13 (Whereupon, a round of applause 14 ensued.) 15 MS. O'BRIEN: It's just really nice to 16 have so many people support me. It's been a lot --17 they know -- been a lot of work, so, yeah, I really 18 appreciate it. 19 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you very, 20 very much. 2.1 MS. O'BRIEN: Sorry. 22 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Hey, you're as 23 proud of our Country as we are, and watching you 24 compete, watching you do so well -- the hometown 25 gal -- brought us all to tears, quite frankly.

You're amazing. You're the bar for the rest of us to strive for. For young boys and girls coming up who are interested in sports or, quite frankly, any of us who are trying to achieve a goal that's important in our heart, important to ourselves, you epitomize what it means to earn your successes.

God bless you. Congratulations.

MS. O'BRIEN: Thank you so much.

(Whereupon, a round of applause

ensued.)

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SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And thank you, again, Tom Hand.

For our next presentation, ladies and gentlemen, this morning, we welcome Jennie Reigler of Plainview and Richard Haunss of Syosset, who are here today to build awareness to a debilitating condition known as Complex Regional Pain Syndrome.

Jennie's sister suffers from the condition -- an extremely painful, neurological pain syndrome that affects one or more extremities. Tough way to go through life.

Advocating on behalf of his daughter,
Kristen, is Richard Haunss. Kristen was a three
sport athlete at Syosset High School, worked as a

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Tobay lifeguard, and went on to Cornell University and Columbia University. Two fine, fine schools. It speaks to her academic prowess as well as her athletic pursuits.

She now lives in Manhattan and is a financial writer. In addition to building her career and making her mark upon the world, she faces this daunting condition, which requires such strength.

The Town of Oyster Bay is proud to support this crucial awareness initiative to let people know about this. You know, there are so many rare diseases that the rest of the public just doesn't realize, and we've taken on the responsibility proudly toward awareness and all the different pursuits.

Each Board meeting in October, I've been reminding people to please reach out to your loved ones and make sure they get screened for Breast Cancer, but this is another initiative to bring awareness to this disease.

So we are proclaiming Monday,

November 1, 2021, as Color the World Orange Day to
help spread awareness, and both families ask

everyone to please wear orange on Monday,

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November 1, 2021, and post a picture on social media by hashtagging, #crpsorangeday.

Michele Johnson, thank you for setting the tone early. We appreciate that. We also support this important cause by illuminating Town Hall in orange light during the month of November to raise awareness of this poorly understood pain disorder.

Would both families please come forward, and I'm going to ask Michele Johnson -- who's so aptly dressed for this special presentation -- and Councilman Lou Imbroto, and I'm going to ask all of our elected officials to join you in front for this presentation.

(Whereupon, Town Citations were presented to Jennie Reigler and Richard Haunss followed by a photo opportunity and a round of applause.)

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Is there anything you would like to say about this?

MR. HAUNSS: Just quickly. The Color the World Orange originated about eight years ago, and, as the Supervisor said, the actual date would be November 1st, and on that day, there will be probably over one hundred municipalities,

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buildings, that will be lit up in orange.

And it's interesting that so many people when you start looking, or you start talking to that have it -- and I, actually, was recovering from knee surgery a couple of years ago, and my daughter called me and said that there was a podcast on with my physical therapist and was interviewing somebody about RPS, and she said, would you ask Jaime -- will you somehow get in touch with her, and I said if you don't want to give out her name and number, but if I give you my daughter's number, do you think you could ask this lady to give her a call. And within ten minutes, my daughter had a call from this woman, Beth, who lives in North Carolina, who, ironically, we found out was Jennie's sister, and they have gone on to do some initiatives together, and we appreciate whatever support you have.

I like that scarf, I got to tell you. That scarf makes my tie look bad. Anyway, thank you, again, very much. I appreciate it. (Whereupon, a round of applause

LaMARCA: Motion made by 16 Councilwoman Johnson and seconded by Councilman 17 Imbroto. 18 I believe we have some slips in. 19 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Yes. We have 20 some residents that would like to be heard. 2.1 Our first speaker will be Arthur 22 Adelman. 23 Come on up, Arthur. 24 Good morning, Arthur. 25 How are you?

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MR. ADELMAN: I'm fine.

My name is Arthur Adelman.

I live at 110 Dubois Avenue, Sea Cliff,
New York 11579.

I have quick remarks regarding 629, I think it is, the condemnation of the Peninsula Golf Course in favor of the Town residents.

I'm curious, with all the information

I've garnered, and that's been made public and

easily accessible, we've heard stories -- we've

heard reported about all the benefits of the Town's

takeover of this private golf course in lieu of

allowing a gentleman or a company from Florida to

purchase it, and a person who claims he's going to

maintain it for golf, but we haven't talked about

the financial ramifications of the condemnation.

I'm aware that if it becomes Town property, the land then comes off the tax rolls, and we will have to expend "X" millions of dollars to compensate the existing owners. None of that has been made public or being -- I don't know if it's being weighed on your decision, or if the condemnation is the -- the passing of condemnation is the final procedure that the Board takes in the process of taking over the land.

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I'd like to be fully aware of the process. I haven't seen it done before in my short time as a resident of Town of Oyster Bay, so if you could enlighten me on the financial ramifications and the full procedure of what goes on after the passing of condemnation — if the Board still reviews, whether to go ahead with it, if it's financially viable, if other alternatives have not been entertained, such as negotiating with the present and potential buyer of the property, of allowing a rezoning of the property to maintain it as a golf course and maintain it on the tax rolls of the Town and the County and the local school district. That's all.

I want to thank you all for getting here today. The weather was miserable. We do have flooding on some local roads in Matinecock, whatever -- by Oyster Bay Road, it's flooded on my way here.

And I wish you all the best of luck in the upcoming election and, hopefully, I'll see you all here next month.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you, Arthur. Thank you very much.

To that point, if you see me looking

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down at my cell phone, it's because we're also managing the potential of flooding and issues on our roads with the Highway Department and the Department of Public Safety.

Thank you to both of them.

So I'm going to be brief because what we're doing today, if passed, is to begin the process of the acquisition of this property.

We have held hearings -- the hearing on this was on July 13, 2021. So at the prior Board meeting, we voted to advertise this and use the means to let the public know that there would be a hearing.

Then, we went out on our website and so forth and got more information out. Then, we held that hearing on July 13th, and, then, after that, we, once again, put this -- we kept the rolls open for people who wanted to comment via letter or e-mail and so forth, and, then, we advertised that we would be putting this out on the Calendar -- the Resolution Calendar -- Resolution No. 628, for this Board meeting.

So we've spent quite a bit of time and effort to get the word out to the public, and the public has responded -- as you were probably at

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that meeting on July 13th and heard the public -- so we have been considering everything.

It would not be in the best interest of our taxpayers to negotiate the price publicly for obvious reasons. If we are to acquire this property, and it would take place through the courts, through a legal process, we want to get the best deal.

I hope our Town Attorney is okay with me mentioning if we purchase this for the price that was mentioned in the articles in the daily paper, that would work out to about \$90,000 per acre, and that would be approximately \$30,000 per building lot. I think that's 1970s prices on the land. That's a phenomenal price when you think of the value of that land.

I'm not going get into all the different specifics, which has led us to believe -- I think some of these were mentioned at the hearing -- that led us to believe that if this transaction takes place, the new builders will build homes on that acreage. That was stated in -- and what was stated is that if you look at the website of the company, that's what they do. They build homes on golf courses.

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the residents of the Town, and we'll be hearing from two residents momentarily on this subject as well, and, but, there is an importance to preserving open space in this Town, and from the prospective of protecting our communities from flooding, any open space in an area that does not have a lot of open space acts as a swale to absorb floodwaters, and one only has to drive here today, or worse, walk here -- to understand the importance of how real flooding can be from one end of the Town to the other.

So there are numerous environmental benefits to this, but I hope that answers your question. But if you want to get deeper into the specifics of the dollars and the cents, as I said, it would not be advantageous to the public and the taxpayers to negotiate a price publically, but I do suggest you speak to Frank. He is available to you or anyone else who would like to call -- Frank Scalera, Town Attorney -- would like to call and discuss this at length. He will tell you the information.

And that's what we've been doing. But we have put this out to the public in numerous ways

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on numerous different occasions. I speak to residents all the time, and I've only heard one message from them.

I will make one last statement. The Town did reach out to the buyer and asked if they would support our changing the zoning of that property from residential to park, and they said no. So that's -- your expression just underscores the point that that was a real eye opener for us, okay?

But thank you very much, Arthur. We always appreciate you.

I'm going to call the next speaker, and that is the President of the Nassau Shores Civic Association, John Guerreiro.

John, would you please step forward and state your presence?

MR. GUERREIRO: Good morning.

John Guerreiro, 61 Peconic Drive,

Massapequa.

Mr. Supervisor, Members of the Town
Board, it's nice to be back before you again today.

My name is John Guerreiro, and I am the President of the Nassau Shores Civic Association.

I'm here to speak today about the

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pending Resolution concerning the Town's potential takeover of the Peninsula Golf Course, located in Massapequa, right in the heart of Nassau Shores.

This issue has been the subject of much information lately, and, unfortunately, it's also been the subject of a lot of misinformation and disinformation. This has been furthered by residents giving too much credibility to some bad sources; this could be people not in the know, this could be people with an agenda, or reading too much of Long Island's own journalistic version of The Profit.

Let there be no mistake about the position of the Nassau Shores Civic Association.

We remain adamant that the Peninsula property always remains a golf course, and we fully and completely support the Town's efforts to make this possible. We will never support development of any kind on that property regardless of who is trying to do it.

We've heard a lot lately about restrictive covenants and how the current one with Nassau County should allay any fears about the future development of the golf course.

Well, the current ownership has

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referred to this covenant, the proposed buyers have referred to it, throughout the West Shore, they love to mention it every time they get a chance; however, these entities never mention one simple fact -- there is nothing preventing Nassau County from rescinding that covenant, and when you're a County facing constant financial distress, the fear is that at some point, money talks. That creates quite a "what if" and that "what if" can never become a "what now." There's way too much at stake.

First, there's a simple matter of quality and affordable golf for all of our residents. There are very few non-country club places where the public can play golf in the Town of Oyster Bay. One of the finest options is the Town's own golf course right here in Syosset.

Now, this beautifully maintained course always shows just how capable the Town will be in operating Peninsula, and the fact that Peninsula is a 9-hole course will be a perfect complement to the 18-hole course in Syosset.

This is important, now, because not everyone is physically capable of playing 18-holes, not everyone has time to play 18-holes. I believe

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a 9-hole alternative will bring out even more residents of Oyster Bay and introduce them to the wonderful world of golf, or if I'm playing, the wonderful world of really bad golf.

(Whereupon, there was laughter among the assemblage present.)

MR. GUERREIRO: Now, second, there is a very important matter of preserving open spaces for our residents. All you see on Long Island is development.

I'm very proud of Oyster Bay's commitment to its parks and open spaces. It separates us. It makes us special. It improves our quality of life. It's the reason people want to move here, and the reason people don't want to leave here.

From Burns Park in Massapequa up to
Theodore Roosevelt Park right down the road, to
Tobay Beach up to Centre Island, Oyster Bay
preserves its open land. It's an example of local
government at its very best. That is to be
admired. That is to be desired.

Adding the Peninsula property will only enhance the beauty and charm of this Town, and it will benefit all of the residents of Oyster Bay

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with a new offering that was not previously available.

Mr. Supervisor, Members of the Town
Board, you have the complete support of the Nassau
Shores Civic Association and the community that it
represents as you seek to preserve the Peninsula
Golf Course in perpetuity.

I also believe you have much wider support as you continue to preserve and enhance open spaces for the benefit of all of our residents.

Mr. Supervisor, one of your very own predecessors, the great Lew Yevoli, spoke right here, last week, in favor of the Town taking over that property. And as most people know, Mr. Yevoli is a member of the opposing political party. And here's the thing, we live in an age where we can't get Republicans and Democrats to agree on anything, yet, everybody agrees this property is worth maintaining and preserving. That must be one special piece of property.

Once again, thank you for your kind indulgence. Please reach out to me if there's anything I can do, or if there's anything the Civic Association can do to assist you in this worthy

McKENNA: So on the Peninsula Golf Course, correct me if I'm wrong, but the main 6 7 concern is that if this buyer takes over the golf 8 course, that there is a worry or a belief that 9 they're going to build homes on the property; is that correct? 10 11 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: There are a 12 number of concerns. There are lists of concerns that are involved in this discussion. 13 14 MR. McKENNA: But that's a big one, 15 right? COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: That's one of the 16 17 concerns. 18 MR. McKENNA: That's a big one. 19 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: That's one of 20 them. 2.1 MR. McKENNA: It's my understanding, 22 from reading media, that the buyer has promised to 23 not -- they're not going to build homes there, that 24 that's been stated by the buyer. They've stated 25 that in media, and, plus, you have Nassau County --

25 1 the legal promise by Nassau County, I forget the 2 verbiage, that it's protected land, and I just 3 heard the gentleman say that there's a concern that 4 Nassau County is going to go ahead and violate a 5 legal agreement --COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: They just have to 6 7 waive it. It wouldn't be violating anything. It's 8 waivable by the County. 9 MR. McKENNA: Waive it. Okay. It's 10 waivable. Now --11 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: Do you believe 12 everything you read in the media, Kevin? 13 MR. McKENNA: No. 14 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: There you go. 15 MR. McKENNA: No. 16 Now, right now, there's an election 17 coming up, right, in a week and a half --18 November 2nd. COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: We've heard. 19 20 MR. McKENNA: You didn't know that? 2.1 You're running. If Bruce Blakeman wins 22 the election, which I hope to be the case, I've 23 changed my mind recently, then you have a County 24 Executive that, I'm sure, would enforce and protect the land. 25

26 1 So, now, I'm going to get to the 2 financials. 3 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: Kevin, just to 4 address that. 5 We don't know who's going to be County Executive ten years from now, twenty years from 6 7 now. The best way to preserve the land forever is 8 for the Town to acquire it. It becomes almost 9 impossible for it to ever be developed if the Town 10 acquires it. 11 MR. McKENNA: Do you not believe the 12 developer when the developer says -- the developer 13 has said -- this is not the media -- the developer 14 -- the developer has said that we have no 15 intentions of building on that land. 16 Do you not believe them? 17 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: The best way to 18 guarantee that it stays parkland forever is for the 19 Town to acquire it. 20 COUNCILWOMAN JOHNSON: Kevin, this 2.1 isn't a -- please continue. 22 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Yeah, please just 23 continue, Kevin. 24 MR. McKENNA: All right. 25 So, now, we get to the financial aspect

of it, right.

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The public does not have -- Newsday's not even here. There's nobody here from the media except yours truly, who's live-streaming this right now to a lot of people. Excuse me (coughing).

The public does not really understand,

I don't think I even understand or Arthur

understands. I don't think these guys (indicating)

even though they say what they say, they don't

understand the full financial ramifications to the

taxpayers --

AUDIENCE SPEAKER: Actually, we do.

MR. McKENNA: Now, you have a budget that, I think, is being voted on today. I'd like to know if in that budget you have -- how much money has been put towards this purchase if it does happen?

And if the Town does take it over, how much more -- how much more resources -- how much more resources and payroll -- how many more people are going to need to be hired to run this golf course?

So what's the projected cost going forward if the Town takes this over?

And my biggest issue, and I've heard

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from others, that with the roads crumbling, with parks deteriorating in certain areas on the North Shore, whatever this money is that's going to be put towards this purchase, don't you think that that money should go towards the roads and the parks and to the people all over the Town?

I -- listen, I understand the residents' concerns about not wanting to have development in their backyard. I wish that -- I wish that we had -- I wish that we had these civic leaders here representing the civics in Syosset when, despite an outcry, an Amazon warehouse was approved right in people's backyards. I wish that they represented the civic in Syosset because -and even if they did represent the civic in Syosset, as good as they speak and fight for their community, with the money exchanged and the donations that went back on Amazon, I think every resident could have yelled and screamed in the Town of Oyster Bay, and that Amazon warehouse would have gotten approved because Laura Curran took a \$25,000 donation from the owners of the property.

So I understand it not having it built there, but the fact is that the buyer said they're not going to build homes there, and I think that

29 the Town is just trying to put fear, and I think 1 2 the Civic is trying to put fear in order to get the 3 Town to buy -- to buy the property when that money, whatever it is -- we don't even understand how much 4 5 money is going to be needed over the next few years if it's purchased. 6 7 Is it in the budget? How much is it? 8 9 And that money should go towards roads and to fixing up deteriorating parks that are 10 11 neglected on the North Shore. 12 And, perfect timing -- thank you very 13 much. 14 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you. 15 MR. McKENNA: And by the way, 16 congratulations on your endorsement in Newsday. That was the most interesting endorsement that I 17 18 have ever seen, ever, in any newspaper. 19 Thank you very much. 20 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: I'd just like to 2.1 point out, before we call the next speaker up, that 22 much of the comments that were made, in my view, 23 are far from factual. We have committed \$25 million per year 24

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to road repaving projects. In addition to the road

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repaving, we've been doing an enormous amount of rebuilding. Many of the roads throughout this Town that used to flood no longer flood because of the financial commitment we've made to rebuilding that infrastructure.

We continue to enhance our parks, we've committed a significant amount to rebuild bathrooms, to rebuild buildings, to rebuild parks.

We saved the beach at Tobay Beach, which would have cost \$7 million dollars for half a million dollars we saved this Summer and rebuilt our beach.

So that -- and now, at this point, I would like to call up the Vice President of the Nassau Shores Civic Association, Michael Dellanno.

Mr. Dellanno, would you kindly start off by giving us your full name and address for the record?

MR. DELLANNO: Sure.

Thank you, Mr. Supervisor.

I'm Michael Dellanno, 23 Great Water Avenue, Massapequa, New York.

So thank you, again, for listening to us today. We hear a lot of fiction. We hear a lot of misinformation from Mr. McKenna.

Clearly, he doesn't understand some of

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the things we've gone through, reviewed from the financial impact, the residential impact, but let's boil it down to brass tacks.

AUDIENCE SPEAKER: Too bad you didn't share that with the public.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Please continue, Michael.

MR. DELLANNO: When you look at the Nassau Shores Civic Association's 3,300 residents, 1,600 homes, 10,000 people, this thing sits in the heart of our residential neighborhood.

When you ask about believing the developer, if the developer was so on board to never developing it, why wouldn't they agree to have it zoned parks? Oops, that takes away their right to build. It's a farce, okay.

We looked at the numbers. If you look at the green fees, it's well over a million dollars a year. Their payroll is about \$600,000 a year, give or take. If you add County employees, you know, we're definitely going to have an uplift there, but it's never going to break the million. The lease on the restaurant is a wash with the tax bill.

Back in 1981, when something similar

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happened with our bay front park, we offered to float a bond because at that point you couldn't monetize a park. This essentially pays for itself, so there is no tax burden to the County. If you wanted to float a bond at today's rates, in ten years it would be paid for. It would cost you zero because the green fees would cover it.

So, I wanted to just make sure that our voices are heard today, and I assure you our voices extend well beyond Nassau Shores, the Massapequa community, into Plainview. Everyone I speak to says to John's point -- nine holes is about all the time I have with two kids to go play a round a golf -- and a really bad round of golf at that -- but I don't have time to spend doing 18 holes. I mean, I wish I did.

But we wanted to make sure that this

Board understood that we fully support the takeover

of this course, not only to make sure it stays

green space, but if you take a look at some of the

things that really need improvements -- like some

of the fencing that's collapsed along Sunset Road.

It's been six years.

When are they going to fix that?

They're not. They had to go to trial

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33 to get some fencing put up so that golf balls stop 1 2 hitting residential homes. I believe it's well 3 within the power of the Town to be able to rectify 4 some of these immediate things. 5 You know, At least they will make sure that the grass is maintained because right now -- I 6 7 know Mr. McKenna drove down Cedar Drive and said 8 why didn't the Town cut the grass -- well, guess 9 what, that's the responsibility of the golf course, 10 and they didn't do it. It's not the Town's 11 responsibility. 12 So I'm hoping that we can clean this up 13 a little bit, make sure it stays parkland forever, 14 or open space forever, and we fully support 15 anything and everything necessary to make sure that 16 that happens, and we really appreciate your consideration of that. 17 18 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Michael, just a 19 couple of questions. 20 First of all, thank you for being here 2.1 today. 22 Do you represent the Nassau Shores

34 1 representing all of the members of the Civic 2 Association with your comments today? 3 MR. DELLANNO: I absolutely am. 4 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And as you were 5 out in Nassau Shores and beyond, are you hearing from the vast majority, if not all of the 6 7 residents, that they would like to see this 8 permanently stay a golf course, and they would like 9 to see the Town upkeep it to the standard that 10 you've seen in our Woodbury golf course? 11 MR. DELLANNO: Absolutely. I think the 12 common thread from everybody was "Don't Queens my 13 Nassau Shores." 14 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: One of the things 15 that's interesting that we haven't heard in today's 16 discussion is golf revenue. 17 MR. effort into promoting our Town golf course.

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There are so many people who want to golf that we can't find a tee time for everyone who wants to golf, and, as you've said, we've heard from the public about the desire for a 9-hole golf course as well.

But the revenue from golf, as I speak to Commissioner Pinto, and we all speak to our Parks Department team, they constantly speak to how the revenue of golf has greatly increased and continues to increase.

So from a financial perspective, you mentioned a wash on taxes. No implications to the taxpayers because there's revenues -- multiple revenues there.

MR. DELLANNO: Yeah. Well, that and if you take a look at what our community demographic is, we are an aging community. We have a lot of new people coming in and have a lot of older people, and, you know, I listened to what Mr. Yevoli talked about how when you get up in years, playing 18-holes is just tough to do.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: I think his quote was "Buy real estate because they're not making any more."

MR. DELLANNO: Yeah, yeah. Absolutely.

36 1 And we want green space in our neighborhood. If we 2 wanted a concrete jungle, go west.
