2 1 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Good morning, 2 ladies and gentlemen, and welcome to the Town of 3 Oyster Bay Town Board meeting of October 30, 2018. Welcome to Town Hall. 4 5 To lead us in prayer we welcome our friend and the new rabbi of the Woodbury Jewish 6 7 Center, Rabbi Jason Fruithandler. 8 Rabbi, as well you know and teach us 9 all, it's important that we all stand together in 10 solidarity and remember the victims of the 11 senseless tragedy, which took place at the Tree of 12 Life synagogue in Pittsburgh. We must come 13 together. 14 We must embrace our community. We must 15 denounce hate, hate of all types. We must show 16 love for one another. Love must win over hate. We 17 must embrace unity, compassion, patience, and 18 recognize that we all have differences. Of course, 19 we're human beings. But we have so much more in 20 common, especially as residents of this great town. 21 We have so much to protect by coming together and 22 working together as one. 23 The idea of hate is just wrong. Ιt 24 takes our nation, out Town, our community in the 25 wrong direction. And we've had terrible losses.

3 1 And we have to work in their memory to come 2 together. 3 We also should specifically remember 4 these eleven victims, their families and their 5 loved ones and pray for them all. Rabbi Hazzan Jeffery Meyers, the rabbi 6 7 of the Tree of Life synagogue previously served at 8 Congregation Bethel in Massapequa, which is now a 9 combined congregation. But it only underscores how close to 10 11 home this has hit for us. And please remember them 12 all in your prayers, but remember them in our 13 actions, too. We must come together as one 14 community in this Town. 15 Rabbi Fruithandler, the podium is 16 yours. 17 Would you all please rise? 18 (Whereupon, a prayer was recited by Rabbi Jason Fruithandler.) 19 20 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you so 21 much, Rabbi. 22 And now to lead us in the Pledge of 23 Allegiance, please welcome two distinguished 24 veterans from AMVETS North Shore Veterans Memorial 25 Post 21 in Oyster Bay.

5	Gentleman, it's all yours.
6	(Whereupon, the Pledge of Allegiance
7	was recited by Richard Dejesu and Bob Shelby.)
8	SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you.
9	You all may be seated.
10	And, gentleman, if you'd just stay up
11	here in the front. I just want we want to take
12	this opportunity to thank you, Richard, and you,
13	Bob.
14	We can't thank you enough for your
15	dedicated service to our nation in defense of
16	American freedom. You represent all of our
17	veterans who have given up themselves selflessly to
18	protect us, protect our nation, our community, our
19	freedoms.
20	You are our home Town heros and we
21	thank you and we thank all of the other veterans
22	and those currently serving in the military, all
23	our heros. Thank you for protecting us and
24	protecting all we hold so dear.
25	We'd like to let anyone here in the

5 1 room, those listening at home on the internet, if 2 you're a local veteran, please consider joining 3 AMVETS Post 21 here in Oyster Bay. It's truly a 4 great organization, and without a doubt, lead by an 5 incredible group of people. Thank you. Let's give them a big hand. 6 7 (Applause.) 8 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Ladies and 9 gentlemen, this is a bittersweet day. It's a good 10 day that we're bringing forth an incredible budget, 11 one of the best. This budget, last year's Town 12 budget the best in decades. We're very, very proud 13 of, but so bitter because of the loss to this 14 entire Town family. 15 Over the weekend we lost a member of 16 our family, Mary Diglio, long-time assistant to Councilman Anthony Macagnone. She'll long be 17 18 remembered for the care she gave to others, her 19 tremendous faith, her incredible bravery. That's all I can say. 4 Thank you very much, Supervisor. 5 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you, Tony. Again, our condolences go out to you, 6 7 to her family, to Vinny, and as I mentioned 8 earlier, the Town Board office. Those who work in 9 the Town Board office are very committed, 10 incredible people, and this a big, big loss for all 11 of us. 12 Mary epitomized all the good that a human being could have, could extol, and she'll be 13 14 tremendously missed. 15 Thank you, Councilman, again, our condolences. 16 17 Let's all please rise for a moment of 18 silence in memory of Mary Diglio. 19 (Whereupon, a moment of silence was 20 observed.) 21 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Good bless you, 22 Mary. Thank you. 23 To continue on in our recognition of 24 our heros, our veterans, and quite frankly our 25 recognition of a better way to treat one another,

1	it's important to point out that our nation has
2	been deeply divided in the past several years and
3	quite frankly it's reached a boiling point.
4	We ask everyone to recommit themselves
5	to finding unity and common purpose so that we may
6	heal the wounds that divide our communities across

2	A century ago 4.7 million American sons
3	and daughters put on a uniform to serve our nation
4	and serve the world in what was the first major
5	global conflict. Men and women from the Town of
6	Oyster Bay served selflessly and honorably in World
7	War I. Including in World War I, my grandmother,
8	Jessie, one of the first women inducted into the
9	Unites States Navy in America's history. But she
10	was just one of so many other willing to take on
11	any sacrifice it meant to protect America, protect
12	this nation. She wasn't even born here, just like
13	so many others and yet the motivation is that
14	America comes first, their town, their community
15	comes first, their family.
16	There were 375,000 casualties in World
17	War I, including over 116,000 deaths. On the 11th
18	hour of the 11th day of the 11th month in 1918 an
19	armistice in the fighting was declared.
20	The Town of Oyster Bay proudly issued a
21	commemorative proclamation for the U.S. World War I
22	Centennial commission, to recognize that this
23	Veterans Day, Sunday, November 11, 2018, as a day
24	of World War I Centennial Armistice Remembrance in
25	the Town Of Oyster Bay.

10 1 And we thank our colleagues on the Town 2 Board for signing that Resolution and committing to 3 our veterans and reminding all Americans that we 4 take freedom very seriously. 5 So we call upon the citizens and institutions of our community to join in the 6 7 remembrance of Armistice Day on -- at 11:00 a.m. 8 local time on November 11, 2018. 9 We also take this opportunity to 10 remember the sacrifices made by all American 11 veterans and all in the name of freedom. 12 Thank you. 13 For our first presentation today we 14 welcome Olivia Riegler, an 11th grade student at 15 Plainview-Old Bethpage High School. Olivia is a 16 member of Girl Scout Troop 3251 and is currently 17 working towards earning her Gold Award, which is 18 the most prestigious Girl Scout achievement -- the 19 highest award in Scouting. 20 The Gold Award is achieved by creating 21 a project that reaches beyond the Girl Scout 22 organization and provides a sustainable, lasting 23 benefit to the larger community. 24 Olivia's project centers on building 25 awareness to a debilitating condition known as

1 Complex Regional Pain Syndrome. 2 This cause is very important to Olivia 3 because her aunt suffers from the condition. 4 Extremely painfully chronic neurological pain 5 syndrome that affects one or more extremities. It's very rare. It's a debilitating nerve disorder 6 7 and, at this time, there's no identifiable cure as 8 of yet. 9 This horrific disease was first 10 diagnosed during the Civil War. Yet most 11 individuals and quite frankly many doctors are not 12 familiar with the condition. It is Olivia's goal to make it a household name. 13 14 Another individual with us today 15 advocating on behalf of his daughter has also made 16 it his mission to build awareness. Richard Hans 17 and his wife Patricia of Syosset have made this 18 illness a priority since their daughter Kristin was 19 first diagnosed. 20 Kristin is a three-sport varsity 21 athlete at Syosset High School. She worked for --22 she's a member of our family here, as a Tobay 23 lifeguard, and then she went onto Cornell 24 University and Columbia University. She now lives 25 in Manhattan and she's a financial writer.

2	daunting conditions every single day, showing
3	amazing strength.
4	At Olivia and Richard's request, the
5	Town is proud to support this crucial awareness
6	initiative by proclaiming Monday, this Monday,
7	November 5, 2018, as Color the World Orange Day to
8	help spread awareness. The color orange was
9	originally selected by a group of young teens to
10	raise awareness to this condition.
11	Both Olivia and Richard ask everyone to
12	please wear orange on Monday, November 5, 2018,
13	this Monday, and post a picture on social media of
14	yourself, you and your friends, your group all
15	wearing orange.
16	We also join with the CRPS RSD
17	community in recognizing the fifth annual Color the
18	World Orange Day to spread awareness of this poorly
19	understood pain disorder.
20	Olivia and Richard, if you please come
21	forward to receive your proclamations.
22	I'd like to ask Plainview resident,
23	Councilwoman Rebecca Alesia, to help us in thanking
24	you for your efforts and all you're doing on behalf
25	of CRPS RSD awareness.

13 1 Thank you. 2 If you'd like to come forward and if 3 the Town Board would all join us down front please, all of our elected officials. 4 5 (Whereupon, Town citations were 6 presented.) 7 COUNCILWOMAN ALESIA: Supervisor, 8 ladies and gentlemen, we're going to hear now from 9 our Girl Scout Gold, from Olivia. 10 And just so that you know, it is an 11 extreme -- listen, not to make this like a gender 12 war or anything, but I've gone to plenty of Eagle 13 Scout ceremonies. We all know it's very difficult 14 to become an Eagle Scout. 15 Tim Zike, I'm looking at you. 16 But becoming a Gold Award from the Girl 17 Scouts is really, really difficult. It is a much 18 smaller percentage of woman that do accomplish it. 19 So we are truly lucky to have one here today, our 20 own unicorn. 21 We ask you to please come forward and 22 say a few words. We are honored to have you and 23 congratulations again and to your parents as well. 24 (Applause.) 25 MS. RIEGLER: Hello. My name is Olivia

1	Riegler and I'm an 11th grader at Plainview-Old
2	Bethpage High School. I'm in my eleventh year of
3	being a Girl Scout in Troop 3251. This year, I'm
4	aiming to achieve the Gold Award, the highest Girl
5	Scout award.
6	The Gold Award is achieved by
7	developing a project that researches beyond my Girl
8	Scout organization and provides a sustainable,
9	lasting benefit to the larger community. It's
10	required a minimum of 80 hours of work and planning
11	and actively completing the project.
12	My Gold Award project is to spread
13	awareness about CRPS, Complex Regional Pain
14	Syndrome. Spreading awareness is important to me
15	because my aunt has this disease, was misdiagnosed
16	for ten years, and received the wrong treatment
17	because her doctor didn't know about CRPS.
18	CRPS is a nerve disorder characterized
19	by chronic severe burning pain, changes in the bone
20	density and skin color, sweating, tissue swelling,
21	and extreme sensitivity to the touch. The level of
22	pain is measured as one of the most severe on
23	McGill pain scale. They call this disease the
24	Suicide Disease because CRPS pain is 24 hours a
25	day, 7 days a week, and there is no cure.

15 It was first diagnosed during the Civil 1 2 War, yet most doctors and individuals are not familiar with this condition. It is my goal to 3 4 make it is a household name. Your participation 5 helps support this project. Thank you so much for today's 6 7 proclamation and your support. 8 (Applause.) 9 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you. 10 Thank you, Olivia Riegler. 11 That's -- you know, as the councilwoman 12 said, it's very difficult to earn the Gold Award. 13 That's part of what makes it so incredibly special. 14 You're a true leader, not only among the youth in 15 -- of our community but among all adults and young 16 people. 17 Please continue your good work. It's 18 so important and your leadership is greatly 19 appreciated. 20 Again, ladies and gentleman, Olivia 21 Riegler. 22 (Applause.) 23 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And Richard, we thank you and your family. 24 25 Did you also want to say something?

16 1 MR. HANS: I just wanted to thank the 2 Board of the Town of Oyster Bay for recognizing 3 Color the World Orange. 4 It's an initiative that, as the 5 Supervisor said, will be celebrated on Monday and is a worldwide initiative that includes things like 6 7 Times Square, Niagara Falls literally everywhere 8 around the world will have a building or a bridge 9 lit up in orange on Monday. 10 So I just wanted to thank you on behalf 11 of Olivia, her family, and my family and my 12 daughter Kristin who couldn't be here today. 13 Thank you very much for the recognition 14 of doing this. 15 Thank you. 16 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: God bless you. 17 (Applause.) 18 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you to 19 Richard and Patricia Hans, and, obviously, Kristin. 20 It sounds like she's doing fabulous. 21 MR. HANS: Yeah, she's hanging in 22 there. 23 Thank you. 24 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: God bless. God 25 bless her and God bless all of you. Thank you.

17 Before we move forward with the 1 2 business of the day, we would all like to thank 3 State Senator Carl Marcellino for his success in 4 securing very significant funds for the Town of 5 Oyster Bay and our residents. Recently, Senator Marcellino secured a 6 7 \$500,000 State grant for improvements to the 8 Downtown area in Downtown Oyster Bay. 22	consider a local law entitled a local law amending
23	Chapter 180 plumbing of the Town code of the Town
24	of Oyster Bay.
25	MS. FAUGHNAN: Good morning,

3 Supervisor, members of the Town Board. 1 2 Elizabeth Faughnan, Deputy Town 3 Attorney, Town Attorney's office. 4 I believe all of you have in front of 5 you a copy of the proposed local law with respect to today's proposed changes. 6 7 And just -- I'm going to start out by 8 saying my understanding is that you're going to 9 reserve decision on this proposed local law, that 10 you're going to keep the record open for 30 days 11 for public comment, and during that time, we will 12 revise the proposed local law to reflect the 13 deleted portions, as well as the new amended 14 portions so that you can see specifically in the 15 law what the exact changes are. 16 So now that I've got all the 17 housekeeping out of the way, basically, the changes 18 today come about as a result of review of the 19 existing code, with input from the Planning 20 Advisory Board, as well as licensed master plumbers 21 in the Town of Oyster Bay to update the code and 22 bring it into a more contemporary code. 23 One of the most blatant changes, I 24 quess, is in the code as it exists, now a plumbing 25 permit expires when a building permit expires. But

4 1 as we call know, there are times when someone can 2 come in for a plumbing permit without needing a 3 building permit, so then there is no expiration 4 date. 5 So, by making these changes, it will make the code much more clear, much more 6 7 contemporary and up to date and in line with the 8 other municipal codes on Long Island and in the 9 County of Nassau. 10 The change with respect to the plumbing 11 permit is it will be a one-year term, which then 12 can be renewed. What the code will also do -- the 13 14 proposed changes will do -- will strengthen the 15 Plumbing Advisory Board's ability to enforce 16 provisions against those unlicensed plumbers who 17 come into the Town of Oyster Bay and perform work. 18 And also the code will require that if someone 19 wants to advertise for work in the Town of Oyster 20 Bay, that they have to have -- if they do their 21 advertising, they have to have their plumbing 22 license -- plumbing license number included in the 23 advertising. 24 Also that they can't lend their license 25 out to other plumbers. Only their own employees

5 that work for them full time can work under that 1 2 plumbing license in order to protect the safety and 3 the welfare of the residents of the Town of Oyster 4 Bay. 5 Are there any -- yes? COUNCILWOMAN ALESIA: I was just 6 7 wondering if you've sort of shopped this around --8 for lack of a better word -- to the community of 9 plumbers within the Town and what the reaction has 10 been? 11 MS. FAUGHNAN: I know that we have a 12 representative from Plumbers Local Union 200 who is 13 going to -- who intents to speak today and comment 14 with respect to this and I believe they are in favor of it. 15 16 And, the idea, again, is to protect --17 protect the residents and make sure that the 18 plumbers that do come on are licenses, do you have 19 the knowledge and the ability to perform work for 20 our residents and to protect the residents against 21 those that say they're a plumber and say they'll do 22 a wonderful job and, in fact, are not licensed and 23 don't have a clue. 24 COUNCILWOMAN ALESIA: Forgive me only 25 because I was just consulting with my colleague on

6 1 another resolution at the beginning of your 2 presentation. 3 What are the penalties for someone that's found to be in violation? 4 5 MS. FAUGHNAN: I don't know those off the top of my head. 6 7 COUNCILWOMAN ALESIA: I'm being told \$3,000 by both sides. 8 9 MS. FAUGHNAN: There you go. 10 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Honestly, I 11 think it should be more severe, that the license be 12 revoked. Because we are talking about the safety 13 of our residents -- the health and safety. Nothing 14 more can control it than plumbing. If something's 15 wrong with the plumbing, people get terribly sick. 16 Like an office building or something, I think the 17 license should be revoked and they have to reapply. 18 I do not think that a monetary fine --19 these people, what they're doing now, they are 20 lending out their license, subbing out to a sub to 21 a sub, and \$3,000 is the amount -- they are saving 22 that a day by not hiring somebody professionally 23 trained. So I think we should go to the extreme 24 and just cut them right out completely --25 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Well,

3	instances that I know, specifically.
4	In terms of prosecuting, we also will
5	take calls from people who will say we have a
6	plumber who is operating illegally. We need to
7	catch them in the act. So we will send out an
8	inspector. Sometimes we're successful. Sometimes
9	the person has already moved on.
10	We have recently also in terms of
11	advertising, we found an advertisement of a person
12	indicating that they were a licensed Town of Oyster
13	Bay plumber. We served him a Summons. He came to
14	court and we received \$1,600 for him as well. So
15	we are prosecuting. We're doing both. The \$3,000
16	will go a lot further by increasing the fine.
17	COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Honestly, it
18	should be \$30,000. Make it really severe. \$3,000
19	is nothing to these guys that are misclassifying
20	workers, stealing from our system, probably paying
21	cash to these people. It should be a severer
22	fine suspension and \$3,000. Make them really
23	hurt. Make it an example for other people on Long
24	Island that when they come here, if you've got the
25	license, great, we want you.

10 1 COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: Right. 2 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: If you don't, go 3 elsewhere. Okay. 4 COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: 5 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: Commissioner, currently, does the Board have the discretion to 6 7 suspend or revoke the license? 8 COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: Yes. Not every municipality, school district 3 does that. 4 COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: Right. 5 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Any other questions or comments? 6 7 Thank you, Councilman. 8 Thank you, Commissioner. 9 COUNCILWOMAN JOHNSON: Real quick, how many licensed plumbers are there in the Town that 10 11 have their license with us? 12 COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: I believe it's 13 close to a 1,000 -- Tim -- yup, 1,000. 14 COUNCILWOMAN JOHNSON: Thank you. 15 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you very 16 much. 17 Counselor, want to ask you to come up 18 to wrap it up. 19 MS. FAUGHNAN: I was going to say any 20 other questions from the Board Members or from you, 21 Supervisor? 22 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: No. 23 Thank you. 24 MS. FAUGHNAN: Then as I stated earlier 25 we will prepare -- we will obviously coordinate

16 with Commissioner Maccarone and with Councilman 1 2 Macagnone, Councilman Imbroto and all of your 3 comments and then prepare a new, revised, proposed local law. 4 5 It will obviously, as I stated earlier, include the deleted sections, as well as the new 6 7 amended sections so that it is blatantly obvious as 8 to what provisions are being changed. 9 So that is the end of my presentation 10 and it is my understanding that, again, you will be 11 closing the hearing, reserving decision, but 12 leaving the hearing open for public comment for 30 13 days. 14 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: That's correct. 15 Thank you, Supervisor. MS. FAUGHNAN: 16 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you, 17 Counselor. 18 I want to stress on behalf of all of 19 Town Members -- Town Board Members how important it 20 is to us to protect the safety of our residents, to 21 ensure that they are getting the construction 22 services that they pay for, to make sure that 23 everyone knows if they are going to do work in the 24 Town of Oyster Bay, they are going be licensed and 25 we are going to get -- ensure that our residents

17 get the top quality services that they deserve. 1 2 Thank you. 3 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Well said, 4 Supervisor. 5 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you, 6 Councilman. 7 We have a speaker and that speaker on this hearing is Art Gipson from Plumber's Local 8 9 Union 200. 10 MR. GIPSON: Good morning, 11 Mr. Supervisor, Board Members. 12 Art Gipson, business agent, Plumber's 13 Local Union 200. I cover Nassau County. My union 14 covers all of Long Island. I am in favor of Bill 703-2018, 15 16 absolutely. The model of the plumber has always 17 been to protect the health of the nation. Ιt 18 wasn't vaccines that saved the world. It was the 19 plumber. They purified our water and that is a 20 fact. 21 The sharing of licenses has been going 22 on forever. I've been a battling this for many 23 I had a moment with the Town of Hempstead, years. 24 the largest town in the country, they passed the 25 law. The Town of North Hempstead followed suit.

	18
1	We're here today I'm here speaking
2	in favor of it, hoping that this gets passed in
3	this Town as well. The City of Long Beach, the
4	City of Glen Cove are working on it as well. As
5	well as I have Babylon working on it at this time.
6	This is an underground business that
7	goes on every single day. And it's for big money
8	and it's cash. Don't fool yourself. I know of
9	many instances there's one individual who holds
10	over 250 plumbers licenses throughout the State of
11	New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Connecticut,
12	Florida, and Arizona; has no employees; covers no
13	Workmen's Comp; and he's wealthier than every
14	person in this room put together. That's the kind
15	of money that we're talking about.
16	A typical Home Depot, you cover
17	somebody's license on that, you're getting \$50,000
18	at least cash to cover a license and it goes on
19	every day. This is not an union issue or a
20	nonunion issue
21	COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Thank you.
22	MR. GIPSON: It's a public safety
23	issue.
24	It has nothing to do with it. Plumbers
25	on both sides of the aisle agree with this. It

19 1 prevents the --2 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Legitimate, 3 legitimate plumbers. 4 MR. GIPSON: Legitimate, yeah, we are 5 always speaking on the terms of legitimate. And in today's world it's harder and 6 7 harder every day. 8 One of my largest contractors -- it's 9 \$40,000 a month before he turns the light on just 10 for Workmen's Comp. He has a hard time competing 11 with the guy who pulls up and takes four or five 12 quys a day. You just can't compete. 13 If we want to remain the middle class 14 on Long Island, we have to enforce these types of 15 laws. 16 What I do in my home can directly 17 affect what happens in your home through the water. 18 If I do something that's so adverse it can back up 19 into the system and find its way -- it can happen. 20 We do try to protect everything with backflow but 21 people go around those as well. 22 A licensed plumber protects the health 23 of the nation. Again, it is not an union issue, 24 it's not a nonunion issue; it's a safety issue and 25 it's a good cause. This is something we should all

20 1 agree upon. 2 As far as the penalties, revocation, 3 that was not something that was in there, I 4 believe. The fines, listen, \$3,000 to a plumber 5 who's making \$300,000 a year sharing his license is nothing, but if you put him out of the ability to 6 7 do it. And you also can keep the out of state 8 workers from coming in because that's what happens 9 a lot. You know a guy, that knows a guy, I get a 10 job over here in Oyster Bay. I don't have a 11 license. I'm from Connecticut. That happens every 12 day. 13 And, as an agent, it breaks my heart 14 when I look in and I see all out-of-state plates. 15 We weren't even asked to bid the job because he a 16 hook with a guy whose covering so this is a good 17 thing. 18 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Excuse me, Art. 19 MR. GIPSON: Yes. 20 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: And a lot of 21 states don't have the stringent code that New York 22 has, I know that. 23 MR. GIPSON: No, they don't. But I'll 24 tell you what, Connecticut has one leg up on us. 25 They have what's called journeymen licensing. So

21 1 to see the Town of Oyster Bay adopt something like 2 this would be beautiful. You would need a license 3 whether you're doing plumbing, painting or whatever 4 other trade it is from the Town of Oyster Bay and, 5 if not, you get a fine. So we had one of our contractors go to 6 7 Connecticut recently to do some plumbing, they are 8 licensed in the state, but they didn't have their 9 journeymen license. They got \$1,500 fines in one 10 day for five men. So think about it. It keeps 11 people out. Local jobs for local people. 12 Thank you. 13 COUNCILWOMAN JOHNSON: Real quick, 14 Art --15 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Just a couple of 16 questions. 17 COUNCILWOMAN JOHNSON: What are the 18 penalties that maybe Town of Hempstead --19 MR. GIPSON: The laws that you're 20 looking to adopt are directly from them. They are 21 the same. So it's a -- you know, it's a start. 22 COUNCILWOMAN JOHNSON: Do they have 23 revocation, license revocation? 24 MR. GIPSON: Yes, they do. They have 25 fines and they have revocation. There has never

22 been that in place before, so now there's some 1 2 teeth behind it. 3 I had a situation a few years ago where 4 it was actually a Town of Oyster Bay licensed, 5 master plumber with no employees, no Workmen's 6 Comp., got a 6 and a half million dollar plumbing 7 job down in Woodmere. That's huge. That's bigger 8 than the Canon building that we built on the South 9 Service road. That was a 4 million dollar plumbing 10 job. And this one-man band, he brought in a 11 company from out of state and did the entire job. 12 And there was nothing I could do. I was at this 13 Town and I was at the Town of Hempstead. It was 14 reciprocal from here to the Town of Hempstead and 15 worked its way down. And there was nothing I could 16 do because there was no meat -- there was no bite 17 behind it, so this will give us the bite. We will 18 be out there trying to help to police this. We're 19 your soldiers. 20 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you so 21 much. 22 Any other questions for Art? 23 (No verbal response given.) 24 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you, Art. 25 MR. GIPSON: Thank you.

23 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: You continue to 1 2 make a difference here and our local communities 3 and our towns and Albany statewide and we 4 appreciate it very much. 5 Thank you, Supervisor. MR. GIPSON: SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Just as an 6 7 overview we are trying to catch up so that our 8 rules, our laws in terms of plumbing are stringent 9 and we are protecting jobs, jobs, jobs. 10 It's very important to protect our 11 economy. But as the Councilman noted before 12 there's a safety issue. Many people realize that 13 there are poisonous gases in the pipes in our own 14 homes and we hear the expression a trap. Thev 15 dropped their wedding ring or engagement ring down 16 the drain and it's in the trap. 17 Really what a trap is, is water inside 18 the curved pipe under the sinks or in other places under sinks in the home and even in the commode to 19 20 trap water so the gases can't get back into the 21 house. They are poisonous gases. 22 A leaky pipe or a pipe that's not 23 fitted properly, not installed properly will 24 continue to leak and do damage to the structure, 25 can cause mold, and, in many cases, it's behind a

24 wall. People won't know for years that that mold 1 2 is growing there. So there are many reasons why 3 legislation like this protects our residents, 4 protects our consumers. 5 But from a safety standpoint, it's exceptionally important that we get this done 6 7 right. So I thank all of you and the public can 8 certainly comment on this. We will leave the rolls 9 open for 30 days and then we will come back and vote on this. 10 11 Thank you very much, everyone. 12 Thank you, Tony. 13 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Thank you, 14 Supervisor. 15 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: All right then. 16 We will now proceed with our regular action calendar. 17 18 MR. ALTADONNA: Do you want to make a 19 motion to keep it --20 Because we have here, there's 21 affidavits of posting and publications. Obviously, the first phase of the Smith 1 2 Street project has been complete, but we want to 3 just get a -- just a very, general brief overview 4 so that we could brief everyone on what the status 5 is and when we expect some of the completion dates. COMMISSIONER LENZ: Certainly. 6 7 I'm My name is Richard Lenz. 8 Commissioner of the Department of Public Works and 9 Highway. 10 We wanted to go -- originally, I just 11 want to make sure everybody -- all the Council 12 people remember this -- is, we wanted to go into 13 Phase One first, but because of National Grid doing 14 some natural gas work, we had to go into Phase 15 Three. So that's complete. Phase Three is 16 complete. 17 We are going to go into now Phase One 18 and Two at the same time. Bids were received last 19 week. We have a low bidder and we are proposing to 20 put that up for the Town Board approval at the next 21 Town Board meeting. We then will start in like a 22 week or two after that, having the Supervisor sign 23 the specifications. 24 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: So, can you give 25 us a general idea --

30 understands? We'd like to be doing our paving work 1 2 throughout and get it done as quickly as possible, 3 obviously. COMMISSIONER LENZ: Yeah. 4 5 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: But if we do paving during --6 7 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Asphalt plants 8 close down come Thanksgiving roughly. 9 COMMISSIONER LENZ: Thank you, Councilman. 10 11 That's exactly what happens. What 12 happens is because of the temperatures and because 13 of not the not being able to put the asphalt down 14 due to, like you're saying, frost and things like 15 that, they shut down. Usually around Thanksgiving, 16 they shut down for all of Thanksgiving, all of 17 December, a lot of January, and they start opening 18 up sometimes February -- sometimes February/March. We've even had it where they've had to open up in 19 20 April, it's been so bad. You know what I mean? 21 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: So they're 22 weather dependent as well? 23 COMMISSIONER LENZ: This job is weather 24 dependent, yes. 25 But we will start as soon as we

1 possibly can. As I said, we have the contractor 2 already selected. It's just we have to submit --3 we were reviewing the bids and then we have to 4 submit to the Councilmen. 5 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you, Commissioner. We really appreciate that. And as 6 7 you know we've had this conversation many times, 8 our residents are very dependent upon getting these 9 roads down, so please do everything in your 10 efforts, in your purview, to get these roads 11 repaved and completed as soon as possible. 12 COMMISSIONER LENZ: We definitely will. 13 Thank you. 14 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Okay. 15 Our next speaker is Arthur Adelman. 16 Good morning, Mr. Adelman. 17 How are you? 18 MR. 17	the rights of the telephone companies? I'd just
18	like to know if we can get an update on the case
19	that we are spending all this money on.
20	My second Resolution I was looking at
21	was with regard to number 704, the termination of a
22	lease and the settlement of other litigation that
23	was begun last June with a company called Empire
24	Rental Land Rental. It seems that I would
25	assume that because the way I read the agreement,

1 that they owed rental money and electrical. 2 We were getting the bills for electric 3 and utilities and then passing it onto them. There 4 seems to have been nonpayment. We've agreed to 5 make a settlement and the settlement calls for a payout of approximately \$3,000 a month by this 6 7 company that hasn't been paying. 8 So, are we getting any type of personal 9 guarantee from the principal of the company? 10 Because that's what happens in commercial business. 11 You can't pay and you took up space, the landlords 12 always come back to the principal to guarantee 13 payment of the time you were there. Not -- even if 14 you had an extended lease, they let you out, but 15 while you were there, you should be, you know, give 16 a personal guarantee because that's what happened 17 to me, so I'm just curious about that. 18 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you. Thank 19 you. 20 If you kindly take your seat we'll ask 21 a representative of the Town Attorney's office to 22 come up and give us a brief overview. 23 MR. ROZEA: Thank you, Supervisor, 24 Members of the Board. 25 Deputy Town Attorney, Matt Rozea.

1 I'll take the questions in the inverse 2 order, the issue with Empire first and then we'll 3 deal with the legal fees for the action brought by 4 Crown Castle relative to telecommunications. 5 In the case of Empire, we commenced in-house holdover proceeding to evict the Empire 6 7 Corporation from Town-owned property. That 8 proceeding moved forward in the Nassau County 9 District Court. 10 As the Memorandum Docket indicates, 11 we've reached terms with Empire so that they will 12 leave by December 31st. They will pay us what is 13 due and owing to the Town in the amount of \$24,000 14 and change. 15 I hesitate to use the word "guarantee." 16 It's not something that I've contemplated in the 17 context of this litigation, but Empire has 18 forwarded a check in the amount of \$12,000 and 19 change representing half of the amount owed to the 20 Town. It's sitting in my file, holding it 21 effectively in escrow, and if the Board adopts the 22 Resolution today authorizing the termination 23 agreement, I will forward it over to the Town's 24 Comptroller's office to be deposited. I think that 25 takes care of the Empire issue.

ADELMAN: No. No. The agreement is they're out, they move. 6 7 The agreement states that Empire will 8 continue paying until everything is paid up at a 9 rate of approximately \$3,0000a month. 10 My contention is they haven't been 11 paying in the past. What makes you think they're 12 going to pay in the future? I would like to see --13 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: Well, they already 14 made a good faith payment in the amount of half the 15 settlement. 16 MR. ADELMAN: We have a fiduciary 17 obligation to the people, we should get a guarantee 18 from the principal of the company that that money 19 will be paid. 20 Whoever it is -- like I had my 21 business, I took up space. When I had to move out, 22 I owed my landlord rent. They terminated the rest 23 of my lease, but they said you were here for six 24 months you owe us \$30,000. And I said, okay, I'll 25 pay. I'll pay you \$5,000 a month. They said,

1 okay, but you have to sign right here to personally 2 guarantee it and I did. All right. Under advice 3 of counsel otherwise they would have sued me right 4 away and I would have lost. 5 This is the same thing. It's a corporation, but they -- you need to get the 6 7 principal to sign personally for any type of 8 agreement. If you're letting them pay out and 9 they've proven by past performance they don't pay their obligations --10 11 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: But they made a 12 good faith payment in the amount of half the settlement already. 13 14 That's the settlement. MR. ADELMAN: 15 I don't know what they really owed 16 between electric and power and water. 17 What did they really owe? 18 MR. ROZEA: The amount owed as called 19 for in the agreement is what was actually owed to 20 the Town. We didn't cut pennies here. And they've 21 come forward -- Councilman Imbroto is absolutely 22 correct. 23 They've come forward with 50 percent of 24 amount owed. That is more than a good faith 25 showing. In any real estate transaction, a good
