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MR. GRAY: Good morning.

Garrett Gray, Weber Law Group,
290 Broadhollow Road, Melville, New York, for the
applicant.

Let me just thank the Board for squeezing us in. I know Mr. Sporn is most appreciative during this time.

We are attorneys for Joel and Randy Sporn, also for Duffy Co., LLC. At the time this application was filed, Joel and Randy Sporn were the contract vendees. That transaction has since closed and they assigned the contract to an LLC, Duffy Co., LLC. So, Duffy Co. is the owner of the property.

I will hand the Clerk a copy of the executed assignment for clarity (handing). These are also additional things.

Duffy Co. is the owner of a certain property located at 299 Duffy Avenue in Hicksville, more specifically identified on the Nassau County Tax Map as Section 11, Block H, Lot 52.

The property is a total of 1.43 acres and contains a 15,200 square foot GFA building of commercial space which part of it is presently occupied by a tenant JB Health which shall remain

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in possession of a portion of the subject property.

The property is zoned LI, Light

Industrial District, a public garage. That term is

defined in the Town code as a special permit use in

5 the LI, Light Industrial District.

This property is located on the south side of Duffy Avenue approximately 327.28 feet east of Henrietta Street.

Importantly, the property is surrounded on all sides by industrial properties also zoned LI, light industrial. To the immediate north of the property is Nassau Candy, a candy manufacturing company. To the immediate east of the property is First Student Bus which is a school bus depot. To the south of the property is Franco Landscaping and to the west of the property is Royale, a textile mill. Also in the immediate areas are a number of auto repair facilities, body shops, a Verizon garage and the like.

This petition requests a special permit to allow for the conversion of 10,230 square feet of commercial space and to an ancillary or auxiliary service center for petitioner's Westbury Jeep Chrysler Dodge Ram Truck Automobile Dealership which is located at 100 Jericho Turnpike, Jericho,

New York.

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The petitioners presently own and operate Westbury Jeep, and in connection therewith, they also own and operate a service center for Westbury Jeep located at 111 Bond Street in Westbury, New York.

Because petitioners' service center is extremely busy, petitioner, in order to minimize customer waiting times, decided to open an additional service center location at this property.

At the present time, it is anticipated that this will not be a destination for customers to directly bring their cars. Rather customers will bring their cars to the other service center located at 111 Bond Street, and there will be employees that will transport those vehicles to 299 Duffy for service. That's not to say some time down the road, if there's so much business, that customers have to come directly, but right now, it's not planned for that.

If anyone has any questions, Mr. Sporn is here. He is extremely familiar with this business and the car industry as a whole and can answer any specific questions you have.

6 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: What kind of 1 2 volume do you see right now? 3 MR. SPORN: Good morning. 4 At this location, we expect about 25 5 trucks at any point in time working on about ten vehicles. It's strictly truck vehicles, not cars. 6 7 Not semi trucks. It's the vehicles that we sell which 8 9 would be Ram 1500, and 2500 and 3500 pickup trucks, 10 which is basically the average truck, the pickup 11 truck you see on the road. 12 We sell vans which are called ProMaster 13 vans which is similar to the Ford transit vans, 14 Nissan vans, Mercedes vans, regular commercial 15 vans. These are not big trucks. We don't have a 16 facility to work it. We don't sell those or 17 service those. 18 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Are there any 19 other questions? 20 COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: With regards to 2.1 the traffic flow within this shopping center, are 22 you able speak to that? 23 MR. SPORN: Sure. 24 COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: There are curb 25 cuts over on Joludow -- Joludow Drive.

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1	MR. SPORN: Where? I'm sorry. Repeat
2	that. Curb cuts where?
3	COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: Are we on?
4	(Whereupon, an inaudible discussion was
5	held.)
6	MR. SPORN: There are two curb cuts on
7	Duffy.
8	COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: Forgive me. I'm
9	looking at the wrong site plans. Forgive me. I
10	apologize.
11	COUNCILMAN MUSCARELLA: He's looking at
12	a different hearing.

15	COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: Which is the
16	facility on Bond Street?
17	MR. SPORN: Bond Street is 111 Bond
18	Street. On the other side of Bond Street is State
19	Street. We have two buildings that are
20	side-by-side. We've had them for twenty years.
21	COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: Who uses that
22	facility?
23	MR. SPORN: Westbury Jeep Chrysler
24	Dodge. It's the service department facility.
25	COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: And you're saying

8 people are going to bring their vehicles there 1 2 first? 3 MR. SPORN: Absolutely. 4 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: Okay. Because I 5 go to that facility and there is an overwhelming amount of traffic at that facility. Sometimes it 6 7 takes me a half hour just to drive through and get 8 out. 9 MR. SPORN: That's why we're expanding. 10 We just don't have the physical space. We have 45 service bays at that facility. We just can't -- we 11 12 can't serve the public properly and run our 13 business at that facility. 14 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: I definitely agree 15 with that. 16 MR. SPORN: So, we bought this property 17 to remove a whole bunch of vehicles that we just 18 are backlogged with. 19 We also bought another property. 20 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: Is there going to 2.1 be an expansion to another facility as well? 22 MR. SPORN: We also bought another 23 property in the Town of Hempstead on Merrick 24 Avenue. We bought the old Bertucci's Restaurant

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which is under construction. It should be ready

9 some time in February, late February, and we're 1 2 removing our Alfa Romeo service cars from that 3 facility. 4 So, by removing Ram pickup trucks and 5 Ram vans as far as the vehicles are physically going to be serviced there and removing Alfa Romeo 6 7 vehicles, we should free up enough space so that 8 State Street and Bond Street Westbury Jeep service 9 facility will operate more efficiently. 10 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: 11 So, right now everyone's going to go to 12 Bond Street, then you're going to bring the 13 vehicles to the other -- to Duffy? 14 MR. SPORN: Yes. 15 For this project, yes. All the vehicles --16 17 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: If we're going to 18 create the same situation over at Bond Street on 19 Duffy, that it could potentially be a big issue. 20 MR. SPORN: From a business person's 2.1 standpoint, yes. I hope we are that busy where we 22 could do that much business. 23 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: Cars line up 24 before opening for 45 minutes before the place 25 opens and line up all along Bond Street and the

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side streets over there.

MR. SPORN: We're trying to alleviate as much of that as possible by expanding to two more locations.

MR. GRAY: This also is very over parked. There are 25 spaces that are required. 47 are provided. So, there is a lot of area for cars to remain here.

COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: Okay. Thank you.

MR. GRAY: Finally, I would just point out that all the criteria set forth in 246-9.4 for special permit are met. If anybody has any other questions, that concludes our presentation.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Just a quick question as it relates to Councilman Imbroto's question.

Will anything be changed on the site in terms of the flow of traffic to alleviate a little of this backup?

If you get -- if this is approved and you have more space, you spoke to removing vehicles, but will you also redesign the way that vehicles queue up?

MR. GRAY: On the Bond Street property?

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Yes.

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MR. SPORN: Unfortunately, we're unable to. There is only so much land, so much property there. It will free up because we're removing all the Alfa Romeo customers that are coming to the facility.

COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: And the Bond

Street facility, that's not in the Town of Oyster

Bay, is it?

MR. SPORN: The Bond Street is in the Town of North Hempstead.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: I apologize. I meant in this application. As it applies to this application in the Town of Oyster Bay.

MR. SPORN: No.

This application, the vehicles that are going to be serviced at this location are going to be brought by employees who are bringing customer vehicles to this location, and when they are repaired, when they're finished, when they're serviced, we bring them back to the Bond Street location which, again, is the Town of North Hempstead.

COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: That sounds great.

What I'm concerned about is you said

for now, unless it becomes an issue at Bond Street

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where they're backed up so much that it's not feasible to bring them there, and then they'll have to bring them directly to Duffy.

Well, I'm telling you right now, that's already the situation. So, unless you're going to alleviate the traffic over there, how are you going to prevent the same thing from happening at Duffy now that everyone's going to have to bring their cars directly to Duffy?

MR. SPORN: The building is not designed or set up -- there's no physical space for customers to come to that location. We don't have any --

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: There's no waiting room, no desk to check-in, right?

MR. SPORN: There's no waiting room.

If you visit the facility, look at the site plan. It's basically a shop and a Parts

Department. I have three bathrooms there and an employee break room. The only office space is room for two desks for the two service advisors who are going to handle the vehicles that are there under the direction of all the technicians that are working there. There's no waiting room. There's no cashier. None of that is -- is not only set up

13 or planned for, there's just no room for it. 1 2 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Any other 3 questions from any of the Board members? 4 (No response.) 5 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you. MR. GRAY: Thank you. 6 7 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Excuse me, would 8 you be adverse to putting in covenants and 9 restrictions that it will never have a counter for 10 people to check in on and everything else, that it 11 would remain, as the applicant said, just a place 12 for the employees? 13 MR. GRAY: We actually would be adverse 14 to that only because right now the plan is for 15 only, as he said, employees to bring cars. 16 A few years down the road, we don't 17 know if this is going to turn into a facility -- if 18 it had to be that way, the site plan would have to be revised. 19 20 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: You would have to 2.1 come back to the Board. 22 MR. GRAY: Anyway. 23 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: We'll get 24 confirmation from the Commissioner that they would 25 have to come back to Board for that.

2	That alleviates my concerns.

16 Zoning Map, the property is located within the LI, 1 2 Light Industrial, zone. 3 There are no open code compliance 4 cases; however, there is a variance Town Board 5 resolution on file. 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2 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Will the Town 1 2 Clerk please call the next hearing? 3 MR. ALTADONNA: Hearing P-13-19 to 4 consider the application of Massapequa Plaza 5 Associates, Owner and Massapequa FBBC, LLC, d/b/a Fit Body Boot Camp, Tenant, for a Special Use 6 7 Permit to allow the operation of fitness facility 8 for the premises located at 5117-5167 Merrick Road, 9 Massapequa, New York. 10 MR. BAKER: Thank you. 11 Good morning, Mr. Supervisor, Members 12 of the Board. 13 My name is Daniel Baker of Certilman, 14 Balin, Adler & Hyman, 90 Merrick Avenue, East 15 Meadow, New York 11554. 16 I'm appearing today on behalf of the 17 petitioners Massapequa Plaza Associates, LP which 18 is the owner of the subject premises and Massapequa 19 FBBC, LLC which does business as Fit Body Boot Camp 20 which is the tenant of a portion of the subject 2.1 premises. 22 We're here today seeking a Special Use 23 Permit and related site plan approval for Fit Body

I'm joined by representatives of both

Boot Camp which is a personal training center.

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petitioners, if there are any questions for them after my presentation or during the presentation.

The subject premises is a strip shopping center located at 5117 through 5167 Merrick Road in, Massapequa. It's also known as on the Nassau County Land and Tax Map as Section 53, Block 172, Lot 15. It's located at the northeast corner of Merrick Road and Joludow Drive and is located in the Neighborhood Business Zoning District.

It is an irregularly shaped parcel of approximately 165,000 square feet or 3.8 acres, with approximately 537 feet of frontage on Merrick Road. It's improved with approximately 48,000 square foot one-story strip shopping center building which includes nine separate tenants. Eight of those nine are currently filled. This is the only vacancy at the center.

The tenant roster includes a pharmacy, a hardware store, a meat and food market, a wine store, a pizzeria Italian restaurant, Mexican restaurant, a jewelry store and an Urgent Care center.

The premises is surrounded on the east, west and north by residences and to the south

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across Merrick Road by John Burns Park.

The center was built in the '50s and has enjoyed a good place in the community and has continued to showcase good uses, some of which have been there for quite some time now.

I've been happy to represent the owners of the property for a long while and it's, you know, I guess, a good thing that I'm not here that often to see because it means the tenants are good and staying in place and so forth.

So, today we are seeking a Special Use Permit for the proposed use which I said is Fit Body Boot Camp. Fit Body Boot Camp would be located in 3,004 square foot open designed space to be used as a personal fitness center.

There are more than 800 Fit Body franchises located throughout the world, and they specialize in what is a thirty-minute workout in a small group setting.

The typical class is no more than ten to fifteen clients per session. Typical hours of operation run in two groupings; one in the morning; one in the early evening. So, the prime session would be 5:00 a.m. to 8:00 a.m. with three classes in that three-hour period. So, there would be one

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at 5:30, one at 6:30, one at 7:30.

The second grouping of classes is also 5:00 to 8:00, but that's 5:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m.

That would also work the same way. You would have three sessions. One at 5:30, one at 6:30, one at 7:30 with a small intermission in between the different sessions.

The early morning ones would typically have ten to fifteen clients with one instructor or coach, and the second grouping in the evening would have probably somewhere between eight and twelve clients per session. Again, with one coach. There is also one administrative assistant who works during the day. Beyond that, there are no other employees or anybody else visiting. So it's a fairly low, intense use for this sized space.

The sessions go Monday through Friday.

There is a possibility that Saturday morning

sessions would be added and that would be at 7:30

and 8:30 and nothing beyond that and no Sunday

sessions at all.

The space itself is basically one open room with the only other areas being bathrooms and a little bit of storage. The equipment is very limited. It's utilized for mats, resistance bands,

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dumbbells and things like that. There is no heavy equipment, no machinery, no treadmills, elliptical, bikes or anything like that.

There is a sound system which is limited to one speaker to play music. I will point out that the owner and the tenant, both who are here, at some point in the beginning when they were signing the lease, hooked the speaker up and went into the two adjoining tenancies. One is Sal's Meat Market, the other is the hardware store and blasted it as loud as they could. They couldn't hear anything in either one of the other spaces. It's not going to be any impact on the other tenants, much less any of the residences that are behind the property.

I will point out that while this is not necessarily triggering anymore intensity in terms of parking; i.e., a variance, we will be going to the Zoning Board next week and that's really more a cleanup related to the parking.

In the course of doing the site plan component of this application, a new site plan was laid out and it was found that the existing layout, which over time has changed, meaning the striping and resurfacing of the parking area has actually

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led to there being more parking.

So, while the requirement isn't more intense at this point, there's actually more parking available. As a result, we're going to the Zoning Board strictly to get a new site plan approved because the way in which the Zoning Board approved variances, I think it was about ten years ago or eight years ago, they specifically cite the site plan.

Since there have been changes to it, we are going back to them just to just ask that they approve this new site plan which, as I pointed out, is a better parking scenario. In fact, I think there are eight more spaces available.

So, with that, I would suggest that this is consistent use with the area and other uses along Merrick Road. It will not have any adverse impact on the health, safety or welfare of area residents. It will provide a positive use and a desirable service. I think it fits within the criteria of Special Use Permit.

If there are any questions from the Board, we'd be happy to take them.

COUNCILWOMAN JOHNSON: How long has the space been vacant for?

8 MR. BAKER: It's about a year and a 1 2 half now. 3 COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: Counselor, this 4 is what I wanted to actually ask you --5 MR. BAKER: In the last hearing, yes. COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: -- on Joludow 6 7 Drive. I apologize for mixing up the applications. 8 MR. BAKER: It's okay. 9 COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: They were called 10 out of order. I also have a lot of cough medicine 11 in me, so forgive me. 12 My question was regarding to the traffic flow as it exits out onto Joludow Drive 13 14 over there. I know there is no traffic signal over 15 there, and it's a very difficult left turn. I know 16 a lot of people try to attempt that turn. I don't 17 know if you have a traffic consultant here from --18 what is it, Massapequa Plaza Associates, have they 19 done any traffic analyze of the impact of that 20 intersection. 2.1 COUNCILWOMAN JOHNSON: To that end have 22 there been accidents? How many accidents in the 23 recent years at that spot? 2.4 MR. BAKER: I'm going to ask one of the 25 principals, James Ross, to speak to that.

9 1 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Mr. Ross, could 2 you step up to the podium and start of by giving us 3 your full name and your address? 4 MR. ROSS: James B. Ross, 500 East 77th 5 Street, New York, New York. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you, sir. 6 7 MR. ROSS: The principal entrance into 8 the property is at a traffic signal on Merrick 9 The nonprimary access into the property is 10 the one large curb cut on Joludow Drive. 11 To the best of my knowledge, there have 12 been no accidents there that -- and I've owned the 13 property since 1985. It would be impossible to 14 signalize that because it's 300 feet from another 15 traffic light. 16 COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: I agree with you 17 on that. 18 I was just going to inquire about the 19 traffic flow itself. 20 Now, I know you said you're going to go 2.1 to the Zoning Board for site plan approval which 22 would include the striping, et cetera, you claim 23 you may have some additional parking.

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MR. ROSS: There is no change in the

10 COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: I'm wondering if 1 2 there's any --3 MR. BAKER: As far as the Zoning Board 4 goes, it's not technically a site plan approval as 5 it would be before this Board. We are just giving them what has been a restriping. 6 7 If you do notice on the site plan that 8 we provided, there are arrows showing the flow 9 going from the south to the north along Joludow 10 Drive. I guess, as you go back to the property, it 11 really should be only a one way going that way and 12 then you've got the curb cut at the northern end of 13 the property. 14 Other than that, is there --15 COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: But it doesn't 16 really work that way in practice. That's what I'm 17 trying to say. 18 MR. ROSS: There is signage concerning 19 parking. 20 COUNCILWOMAN JOHNSON: When was the 2.1 last time a traffic study was done and how long has 22 your facility been there for? 23 How many years have you been in that 24 building.

MR. BAKER: The building's been there

11 since the '50s. 1 2 COUNCILWOMAN JOHNSON: Shopping 3 center --4 MR. BAKER: It's been there since the '50s. 5 COUNCILWOMAN JOHNSON: So, when was the 6 7 last time a traffic study was done? MR. ROSS: I believe it was done --8 9 MR. BAKER: 2011 for Gino's. MR. ROSS: I believe one of the 10 11 tenants, Gino's, in connection with a parking 12 variance, they did one. I wasn't a party to that. 13 The traffic -- parking lot was laid out 14 by a traffic engineer Mark Palatto who is not here 15 today. To the best of my knowledge, there have 16 17 been no -- other than some little fender benders in 18 the parking lot because people don't know how to drive, we've really had no problems with -- there 19 20 have been no problems that have been addressed 2.1 concerning traffic. 22 All of the deliveries go through a 23 second curb cut further north on Joludow Drive for 24 a driveway in the rear of the property. 25 MR. BAKER: Because that has been our

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thought process through this application, and because of the way this use is set up, we don't believe there is any intensification of traffic flow or anything else. And that's mainly because of the hours of operation here.

So, you've got a tenancy that's going to be operating for the most part at different times than the other tenancies here, which is different than the prior use which was a dance studio which would have been more during the day because it was for children and after school.

COUNCILWOMAN JOHNSON: After school, Saturdays.

But the answer is, to your knowledge --

MR. BAKER: To our knowledge --

COUNCILWOMAN JOHNSON: Do you know when the last traffic study was?

MR. BAKER: It might have been in 2011.

I wasn't a party to that application because the tenant brought the application and used different counsel.

MR. ROSS: There was a traffic study and a parking study done in 1986/1987 when the shopping center was expanded for what was then Genovese drugstores, which is now Rite Aid.

COUNCILWOMAN JOHNSON: So thirty-

2 something years ago?

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MR. ROSS: Yes. Since I've owned the property, that was the only traffic study I commissioned. It was never necessary subsequent to that.

is and I haven't been able to make it -- get it out. In the flow itself -- by the way, I frequent this shopping center a great deal because I live on Block Boulevard. I congratulate you -- by the way, on an excellent run facility.

The only question I have --

MR. ROSS: Thank you.

COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: -- is about the flow itself and the way -- the safest way to make a left turn onto Merrick Road is at your traffic light which exits the shopping center over on the eastern portion of the property on Merrick Road.

But those who attempt to make the left from Joludow Drive are really taking quit a bit of a risk, and I'm just wondering if in terms of striping, in terms of traffic flow, trying -- being that you're going to be restriping this lot, that you would consider trying to encourage your patrons

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to exit from the traffic light as opposed to exiting on Joludow Drive and maybe being able to queue more vehicles over at the traffic light because what happens is they're lining up to get out and everybody who's coming out of the first travel lane here, closest to Merrick Road, is usually waiting very patiently to try to get into that traffic -- to try to get the green when it's time make left.

MR. ROSS: At the traffic light?

COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: Yes.

It seems to bunch up over there and that's what I'm saying and this is an opportunity for us to ask you to take a look at it.

I know the application itself has very little impact upon your overall operation, but what I'm asking you to do is, look at the overall operation and the traffic flow while we have this chance and you're going to be restriping and possibly talk about increasing the queue at the traffic light being able to stripe --

MR. ROSS: It's already been restriped.

MR. BAKER: It's already been

restriped. So it's not going to be restriped.

It's been restriped years ago.

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COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: Well, then it looks like it's the same pattern that's it been and also, to consider a no left turn on Joludow Drive, left going on to Merrick Road. Perhaps we, as a Board, can consider that. MR. ROSS: That's something that is beyond my control. MR. BAKER: I think he means here. COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: My point is just trying to get the flow to come to this traffic light as opposed to getting out on Joludow Drive. MR. BAKER: I think we certainly can do this, after this meeting, we can speak to the engineers and ask them to try to identify ways to do that, whether through signage or whatever might help to alleviate that concern. COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: This isn't going

to hold up your application. You still have to go before the Zoning Board.

MR. ROSS: What we have done is added a number of customer parking only to prevent people from selling used cars and boats in the shopping center.

COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: I've seen that.

MR. ROSS: We've addressed that very

16 1 aggressively. 2 COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: Thank you. 3 COUNCILMAN HAND: Could we have a 4 reopen complaint for noise and parking condition in 5 August? Could you speak to that just a little. 6 7 MR. BAKER: Yes, I can. 8 Of course, in the context of these 9 applications, those complaints are made aware to 10 us. 11 As far as I understand, there were a 12 number of different things that have been addressed 13 including some of the tenant's storage of outdoor 14 products. 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other questions on this application?

COUNCILMAN HAND: No, sir.

3 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: I live in the neighborhood.

I'm in and out of that parking lot all the time. We do appreciate any efforts that can be made to make it safer.

Councilman Labriola hit it right on the nail -- hit the nail on the head when he said that there's quite a bit of queueing up which makes it difficult if you limit the amount of cars going out on the west side.

MR. ROSS: The only thing that I can think of is perhaps having a left-hand turn signal as part of the traffic light opposite John J. Burns Park.

I'm there at least once a month, more if something requires my attention, and all different hours, and I understand what you're saying. Sometimes when that John Burns Park has something going on, it probably does, that would be great if the Town could or the County could address that.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: That's a County issue, those lights, of course, you know that.

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MR. BAKER: In any event, we will speak to the engineers and see if anything is available. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: That seems to be the biggest, if not the only problem, there is the bunching up of cars on the east side at queue. COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: I'm not a traffic engineer, but if you just made this one way -- this particular travel lane closest to Merrick Road, if you made it a westbound one way, they would have to at least come out behind the queue at the traffic light. MR. ROSS: That would only require some striping. COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: That's what I'm saying.

MR. ROSS: If that's what the Town wants, we have no problem doing it.

COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: Again, I'm not a traffic engineer, but I think you should consult with them.

I think that would definitely enhance the ability for people to queue up properly rather than bunching out into the travel lane for the green light; especially, if they're coming from John J. Burns.

19 Maybe just a one-way striping on that 1 2 particular lane, that one travel lane north of 3 Merrick Road. But, again, I would say consult with 4 the traffic engineers and our Planning Department. 5 MR. BAKER: And we will. 2 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Please call the 1 2 next hearing. 3 MR. ALTADONNA: Hydrant rentals: Τо 4 consider the hydrant rental for New York American 5 Water for 2019. MS. FAUGHNAN: Good morning, 6 7 Supervisor, Members of the Town Board. 8 Elizabeth Faughnan, Deputy Town 9 Attorney, Town Attorney's Office. 10 So, as you may recall, there are 11 certain areas of the Town of Oyster Bay that do not 12 have an actual fire district with elected 13 commissioners that handle fire fighting in that 14 geographic area. In areas such as Glen Head-Glen 15 Wood, in areas as Oyster Bay Hamlet, East Norwich 16 Hamlet, the Unincorporated area of Town of Oyster 17 Bay we refer to as East Norwich. 18 The Town of Oyster Bay actually serves 19 as -- for lack of a better term -- commissioners 20 and the Town of Oyster Bay has what's called the 2.1 fire protection area where the resident, the Town 22 has an actual tax line for fire protection 23 services. 24 The Town contracts with the local

independent not-for-profit fire company to provide

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fire fighting services. In the same token, the Town also has a contract with the water provider for the water provider to maintain fire hydrants that are needed for fire protection services for the residents.

So, with that very long preamble, I come to you today requesting Town Board authority for the Town to pay New York American Water who owns and maintains the fire hydrants in the Glen Wood-Glen Head fire protection area or district.

There are 224 hydrants in that area, and the amount that we are requesting, amount not to exceed is \$256,504.64 which works out to \$1,145.11 per hydrant. This request is being made for the year 2019.

As you may all recall, there were a lot of issues and there still are ongoing issues with New York American Water, both on the North Shore and on the South Shore.

That being said, the Town is obligated to pay for the rental of the hydrants so that they are there for our residents and for the firemen, God forbid there should be a fire or the need to access them.

The Public Service Commission actually

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sets the rates for the hydrant rentals. The Town of Oyster Bay does not set them. We do not negotiate them with New York American Water.

New York American Water actually makes an application to New York State Public Service Commission in Albany and says this is what the cost is that's involved in maintaining those hydrants. The Public Service Commission actually approves the rate.

The Public Service Commission has also approved various surcharges. The Town Attorney's office is working with New York American Water to review every single one of those public service orders to determine if they actually apply to the Town of Oyster Bay.

So, we are requesting authority, we are requesting the Town to approve a Resolution authorizing payment of the \$256,000 and change, in order to meet our obligation to New York American Water.

That is not to say that we will actually spend all of that. We are looking -- like I said, at each and every public order to determine if each and every surcharge is applicable to the Town.

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There have been surcharges set, then there have been issues with information that

New York American Water provided to the Public Service Commission. The Public Service Commission ordered there be reductions in surcharges. There's been a lot of back and forth, and the Town

Attorney's office is working with the Comptroller's Office to determine what, in fact, it is we are obligated to pay by order of the Public Service Commissioner.

Any questions?

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Are there any questions?

Just to reiterate two points, first of all, if this is for a Water District, then we both know the answer but to make -- bring clarity for our residents, if this is for the Water District, why are you specifically bringing this before the Oyster Bay Town Board.

MS. FAUGHNAN: Because there is no elected -- there is no fire district with independently elected commissioners, separate taxing district.

So, the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay actually stands in that role as for lack

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of a better term commissioners of that fire protection area.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And this is mandated in New York State Law?

MS. FAUGHNAN: Not only is it mandated in New York State Law that you serve as commissioners in that fire protection area, but the rates have been mandated by New York Public Service Commission.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: My second question is, will the Town of Oyster Bay residents at large be responsible for any of these costs?

MS. FAUGHNAN: These costs are all part of a separate taxing line on the tax bill to the residents of that fire protection area.

Just as in Oyster Bay, you will see later on in the calendar today, we are requesting permission to advertise a hearing for the 2020 hydrant rental for Oyster Bay hamlet.

That -- when and if that is approved, that cost would be handled by the residents of the Oyster Bay fire protection area.

In this instance with the hearing today and with the Resolution later on in the calendar, the costs will be borne by the residents of the

2	district and solely those residents.

However, a large portion of this charge, American Water has dictated, comes from taxes paid by American Water. The taxes they pay benefit all Town residents and the bulk of the taxes they pay provide police protection for all County residents.

I would like to see this group take the initiative to either contribute or void the taxes due for American Water for their fire hydrants and the pipes that go underground that they say cause the hydrants to be \$800 each plus \$200 a year in surcharges for over \$1,000 each, but to -- the Town should give up their tax income that benefits all residents and that all -- only a small group ends up paying for. It's just not the way it's supposed to be. So, that's a thought.

While I'm on the topic of water, we're all aware that New York American Water is attempting to sell their company to a foreign entity.

I know the groups on the South Shore and the North Shore are looking for a legislative body to take a lead in appearing at the Public

9 Service Commission hearings, and being that both 1 2 you, Supervisor, and Councilman Labriola come out 3 of the Assembly, and you might have a lot of 4 relationships there, I'm hoping you can push forth 5 some type of policy and take a lead to advise Public Service Commission not to allow the sale to 6 7 go through. 8 Thank you. 9 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you, 10 Arthur. 11 Please rest assured, I'll be travelling 12 to Albany next month. 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I'm here to speak on three Resolutions before the Board.

The first one is No. 825 regarding the reappointment of Rabbi Rang to the Ethics Board.

I have no objections to that; however, I would like to remind the Board that there's still one position open, and I have been previously -- I have previously met with the Review Committee that recommends to you people for the Ethics Board and I'd like you all to know I'm still available to serve, if requested.

My next item is Resolution 829 and 850. Both are regarding what seems to be the desire for the Town to arm certain individuals in the Department of -- I think, it's Public Safety.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: It's specifically bay constables and those employees in the Department of Public Safety who are active and/or retired police officers.

MR. ADELMAN: Number one, Resolution 829 regards to the purchasing of -- or the getting written of a Use of Force Policy, it seems that there's one available online even on the Village website under Resolution 850 that's not copyrighted or trademarked in any way.

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So, I don't understand why the expenditure of \$7,500 to a law firm to supply us with Use of Force Policy is necessary. I think that expenditure is a little high considering there's already one in the back-up documentation for Resolution 850.

is six pages. The one we're going to adopt today is 13 pages. I'm being told that before we implement it, there's going to be some changes done to it, and the firm that we hired had the expertise that our staff does not have.

MR. ADELMAN: Well, I agree that you need a policy from a firm that does this on a day-to-day basis because they've done it for -- according to the notes six or seven municipalities here on Long Island or in Nassau County, including the County, Village of Great Neck Estates, et cetera.

I don't understand what or how ours would differ from any other municipality's policy. How it would be individualized to thus cost us \$7,500. It just to me seems like additional funds.

COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: Arthur, \$7,500 is

a small price to pay to make sure we get it right.

I'll tell you that.

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MR. ADELMAN: As a layman, I just felt it's a lot of money.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: There is no problem with you discussing this with our Town Attorney so that some of your concerns may be allayed. I know that you're not an attorney, and he is.

So, please feel free to speak with the Town attorney and he can go over step-by-step all the pros and cons, all the specifics, how these policies differ throughout the State, what is important and what not only meets legal muster, but makes it stronger and better than perhaps in any other municipality.

MR. ADELMAN: The latter part of my question was in regard to Resolution 850 and that's, I guess, the beginning of the implementation of a new agenda for the bay constables and other personnel within the Town or Town employees -- I don't know -- do bay constables currently carry weapons or guns.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: After you ask your questions, I'm going to bring up our Commissioner, but I'm also going to bring up our

42 1 Town Attorney, so they can address the issues that 2 you're bringing up. Because I understand, you're 3 curious. 4 MR. ADELMAN: I'm curious, and I'm just 5 concerned with all -- with the type of society we live in that is so litigiousness, are we putting 6 7 out another place where we can -- the people, the 8 community, can end up hurting ourselves rather than 9 really protecting ourselves. 10 Bay constables, hopefully, are on the 11 water and are safe in their job that they do. 12 there is gunfire on the water, I would think that 13 Nassau Police or Coast Guard would be the first 14 responders and we would not have to rely on bay 15 constables. 16 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Arthur, where do 17 you live? 18 MR. ADELMAN: Sea Cliff. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Sea Cliff. 19 20 Where is the Coast Guard station 2.1 closest to Sea Cliff? 22 MR. ADELMAN: The only one I know of is 23 the one in Long Beach. 24 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: How long would it 25 take a boat to get from Long Beach to Sea Cliff?

43 1 MR. ADELMAN: Right. I fully 2 understand that, but I'm curious, are they have bay 3 constables in the Town of North Hempstead as well? 4 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: There are bay 5 constables -- when you're done with your question -- how about this, why don't you finish your 6 7 question and take a seat like everyone else and 8 we'll go through --9 MR. ADELMAN: My question really is if 10 they are not currently armed, what is the necessity 11 to arm these folks now? That's -- it just seems 12 like a lot of money and we're putting the 13 potential, you know, for some reason someone 14 complains about someone getting shot, God forbid, 15 but I just don't understand the necessity. 16 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: Those are the 17 exact reasons why we need a proper policy and why 18 it's so important to get it right. 19 MR. ADELMAN: Thank you. 20 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: And why we hired 2.1 an outside law firm. 22 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: So, if you'd 23 kindly take your seat, I'll bring up --24 MR. ADELMAN: Okay. Before I leave, I

44 1 you next year. Bye, Jim. 2 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And to you and 3 yours, Arthur. COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Before you 4 5 leave, thank you for everything over the years. really appreciate you bringing up a lot of your 6 7 questions. 8 Thank you for being involved in your 9 local government. MR. ADELMAN: Ethics. I'm there. 10 11 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Our Town 12 Attorney, Joe Nocella, would you please approach 13 the podium? 14 MR. NOCELLA: Just for the record, 15 Joseph Nocella, Town Attorney. 16 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Mr. Nocella, we 17 are aware that we have armed bay constables which 18 is set out in New York State Law that they are 19 peace officers, and this is not us, this is Albany 20 speaking, and has given them the peace officer 2.1 status. 22 We are aware that in the Town of 23 Hempstead, the Town of Brookhaven, the Town of 24 Islip, the Town of Smithtown, the Town of Babylon, 25 the Town of Huntington, the Town of Riverhead, the

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Town of Southampton, the Town of East Hampton, the Town of Shelter Island, the Town of Southold, the Cities of Glen Cove and Long Beach and many of the Villages -- all of the Villages that have bay constables, have bay constables who are armed to protect themselves and to protect the public.

Is this the facts?

MR. NOCELLA: That's exactly correct.

We are almost, one could argue, late to the table on this issue.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: I'm aware of Town of Oyster Bay and North Hempstead as being the only municipalities or at least the only major municipality, the only municipalities that have a bay constables unit where they are not protected.

MR. NOCELLA: Again, that's correct.

Every other municipality with bay constables have armed their bay constables with the exception of Oyster Bay and North Hempstead.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: We are aware every time, unfortunately, way too often, when we turn on the television or watching the news, we see horrific acts of terror. It happened just again in Texas -- I'm sorry, in Florida; Pensacola, Florida.

COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: And Hawaii.

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SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And Hawaii and the year before in Texas.

Unfortunately, this continues to go on throughout society in countries all across the globe.

Can you speak to the legal reasons why this is here today?

MR. NOCELLA: Certainly.

Supervisor, as you noted and I realize you noted it because you don't want a lengthy exposition on something that would just be repetitious.

The State of New York determines who a peace officer is, and they determined that bay constables are peace officers, which entitles them to bear arms in the course of their duties. It doesn't mandate it. That ultimately is up to us.

And as you also noted, except for North Hempstead, we're the only ones who don't do it.

Another example of peace officers by
the way, just to explain the distinction, is fire
marshals. As a general rule, public safety
officers are not peace officers. They have not
been afforded that status by the State of New York
and that is also why in your response to one of the

47 citizens' questions, you're correct in saying that 1 2 those who are retired police officers, would be the 3 only ones of our public safety officers who would 4 carry fire arms. They're not peace officers, 5 they're public safety officers, but if they're retired policemen, then they are entitled to carry 6 7 fire arms. 8 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Is as the case 9 throughout the State of New York. 10 MR. NOCELLA: Throughout the country. 11 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And that's State 12 law -- that's Federal and State law that allows for 13 this? 14 MR. NOCELLA: That's exactly correct, 15 yes. 16 Now, there are other justifications for 17 the adoption of the policy and that includes the 18 fact that, just by way of example, during the duck 19 hunting season, there are people out on the bay. 20 This is an example that we've commonly discussed in 21 the past. 22 People out on the bay who are armed, 23 and they are enjoying what some might regard as

and they are enjoying what some might regard as recreation and the bay constables have an obligation to provide a type of safety and law

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enforcement for those who are duck hunting and those who are enjoying pleasure on the bay in other forms, but as they approach someone who is armed, because, again, for hunting purposes, they themselves are unarmed. It's a perilous situation.

It's one, you could argue, mandates that they have the ability to protect themselves and, perhaps most importantly, protect other people out on the bay.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Are there any other questions for Mr. Nocella?

COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: Do we currently have any policy in effect regarding use of force?

MR. NOCELLA: Although we don't have a very specific policy as that, which is currently contemplated, all of our constables are trained by either Nassau County or Suffolk County Police forces and they are -- in their training are taught the use of force and its limitations as they pertain currently in State of New York and in both counties.

COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: What kind of training is contemplated by the policy under our consideration right now?

MR. NOCELLA: The policy that's being

49 contemplated would require the exact training that 1 2 they currently have. 3 Ironically --SUPERVISOR SALADINO: The exact 4 5 training that Nassau and Suffolk Police Officers 6 have. 7 MR. NOCELLA: Actually, the answer to 8 the question is both. 9 It's the same training that Nassau and Suffolk have and which our people have already 10 11 undertaken and have undergone. 12 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: Is that through 13 the police academy? 14 MR. NOCELLA: That's through the police 15 academy. 16 All I was going to say was that, based 17 upon your question, I'd rephrase it and put in a 18 different form, time wise. They're already 19 trained. The policy requires that they be trained. 20 The policy that you're contemplating adopting 2.1 requires that they be trained, but they already 22 are. 23 COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: Mr. Nocella? 24 MR. NOCELLA: Yes, sir. 25 COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: With regards to

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adopting this policy, and in your opinion, in your legal opinion, does this provide the taxpayers a greater defense in the use of force?

MR. NOCELLA: That is an absolute.

As a matter of fact, I'd be happy to speak to Mr. Adelman. He and I speak with some frequency because he currently comes before this body and oftentimes it's best I address his questions privately. And by "privately," I don't mean confidentially but by one-on-one.

Apropos to the point you just made,

Councilman, and the question that he raised, the

reason why we hired experts in this field was to

tailor the policy to the Town of Oyster Bay so that

we have, in the event that there is ever an issue

over what our bay constables have done or our

retired police officers who may also be employed as

public safety officers, so that what they may have

done, if it ever becomes questioned or criticized,

it will demonstrate the degree to which the Town of

Oyster Bay was attentive and diligent in making

sure that there were clear standards set forth.

COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: Would the cost of litigation arise having no policy or an improper policy far outweigh the cost of drafting and

51 implementing this policy? 1 2 MR. NOCELLA: Absolutely. 3 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Joe Nocella, 4 currently, under State law is it legal for any 5 boater, I guess, over the age of 18 to have a loaded shotqun on their vessel in the water? 6 7 MR. NOCELLA: Yes. 8 Unless they lost that right -- unless 9 they lost that right, yes. It's legal for them to 10 possess that. 11 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: So, currently, 12 our bay constables are approaching, perhaps 13 boarding, checking the game bag, if you will, 14 hunters and fishermen on boats, on vessels, where 15 the operator may indeed have a loaded shotgun? 16 MR. NOCELLA: That's right. 17 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Or knife or a 18 chain or a flare qun. 19 MR. NOCELLA: Yes. 20 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Any number of 2.1 weapons? 22 MR. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Commissioner 6 7 McCaffrey, in the beginning of this portion of the 8 Town Board meeting, I listed and I read aloud the 9 list of townships that currently armed bay 10 constables. 11 Are the vast majority of bay constables 12 armed in virtually every town on Long Island? 13 COMMISSIONER McCAFFREY: Long Island as 14 well as Upstate and Connecticut. 15 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: To my knowledge, 16 only two municipalities that have bay constables are unarmed at this time? 17 18 COMMISSIONER McCAFFREY: That's 19 correct; Oyster Bay and North Hempstead. 20 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Could you speak 2.1 -- could you please tell us about the training that 22 our bay constables undergo as it relates to 23 carrying weapons? 24 COMMISSIONER McCAFFREY: Sure. 25 New York State Division of Criminal

53 1 Justice Services sets out what training is required 2 for a peace officer, whether it be here on Long 3 Island, Upstate, anywhere in the State of New York, 4 they set forth standards of both police and peace 5 officers, what training they have to have as far as firearms, use of force, de-escalation techniques. 6 7 It's all set forth by New York State. 8 Our bay constables have all been to 9 training at the Nassau or Suffolk Police or 10 Sheriffs Academy to become certified by the State's 11 training I just spelled out. 12 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Would they have 13 to undergo this training on an annual basis? 14 COMMISSIONER McCAFFREY: Yes. They'd 15 have to go for annual training. Again, same requirements set forth by 16 the State of New York. 17 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: You've undergone 18 19 this training as a police officer? 20 COMMISSIONER McCAFFREY: Yes, I have. 2.1 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Can you briefly 22 describe to us what is meant by de-escalation 23 training? 24 COMMISSIONER McCAFFREY: What

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de-escalation is, is basically trying to calm a

situation down. You know, as fast as a police officer or peace officer has to escalate a situation, they also have to be trained to de-escalate it. That's just as important. You know, how we can back down.

Perhaps someone is being violent, is there a way to contain them, is there a way to take a step back and maybe request additional resources.

Maybe they're handling with an emotionally disturbed person. You know, get more help there if we can.

So, like I said, it's just as important to de-escalate a situation. Part of that training would also involve the use of batons, pepper spray, tasers, all, again, de-escalation techniques for less than deadly physical force which would be the highest use of force to be used. Hopefully, it can be avoided by those de-escalation tools and training.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Have you heard of a situation on Long Island in recent years where perhaps through a mistake or a heightened situation a resident was injured or killed that was not involved in a deadly situation?

COMMISSIONER McCAFFREY: I'm not aware

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of any on the water as far as de-escalation.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: On the water, I'm asking about.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: You've come to us requesting this policy.

Can you tell us why?

COMMISSIONER McCAFFREY: Well, I've tasked the bay constables as with their New York State Peace Officer power. Their job is changing unfortunately. We find them responding to more violent instances. They've been involved in arrests. We ask them to make DWI arrests. We're asking them to -- they've responded to domestic violence incidents out on the water. It's much the same job as a police officer, but they're on the water.

One of the disadvantages they have is help is a lot longer off than it is, you know, as a police officer. Police officers, typically, when they call for help, hopefully other officers will be around, they'll be there in a few minutes.

That's not always the case out on the water. Help could be a long way off.

56 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Because of the 1 2 speed of vessels it takes much, much more than 3 distance to --4 COMMISSIONER McCAFFREY: Sure, yes. 5 The geographic area they have to get 6 to. 7 COUNCILWOMAN JOHNSON: How many Nassau 8 County Police boats are there presently on the 9 North and South Shores of the Town? 10 COMMISSIONER McCAFFREY: I wouldn't 11 know the exact numbers, but I can tell you that 12 there aren't as many as they'd like to be out 13 there. 14 My understanding is in the Wintertime, 15 there's one boat on the North Shore and one both on the South Shore. 16 17 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: I can tell you in 18 my research, I've reached out to members of the 19 Nassau County Police Force who tell us there are 20 not enough. I've been told that there's one vessel 2.1 on the North Shore and one vessel on the South 22 Shore is what -- the information I received. 23 We have quite a distance from one end 24 to the other and a vessel that maybe can do 30 25 miles an hour. It would take quite some time in

57 1 the event of a dangerous situation. 2 COMMISSIONER McCAFFREY: Right. 3 If that police boat is in Long Beach, 4 it would take a while to get to Massapequa. 5 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Does anyone have any other questions? 6 7 COUNCILMAN MACAGNONE: Or in Great Neck 8 to get to Oyster Bay. 9 COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: Commissioner, if 10 I may, in light of the seriousness of the nature of 11 this vote we are about to take, I want to just ask 12 you a couple more questions with regards to the 13 public safety -- not public safety officers, I 14 mean, the public safety in general. 15 Now, currently, some of your officers 16 are retired police department or active duty, some 17 of them part time and they currently carry their 18 weapon with them? 19 COMMISSIONER McCAFFREY: Right. 20 We do currently employ some active 2.1 police officers who are working off duty as well as 22 retired law enforcement. 23 COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: So, this policy 24 then, this is a policy they are accustomed to 25 because of their prior training with the police

department that they are assigned to?

COMMISSIONER McCAFFREY: Yes, that's

3 correct.

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Only public safety officers that would be permitted to carry a firearm under the proposed policy would be those that are both Nassau County or Suffolk County pistol permit holders with a full carry unrestricted permit, and in addition to that, they'd have to be New York State armed guards which is, again, more regulations for the State as far as annual training and firearms training and de-escalation techniques that we discussed.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: So, this is not for public safety officers; this is only carved out specifically for bay constables and those public safety officers who are retired or active duty law enforcement agents?

COMMISSIONER McCAFFREY: That's correct. That's spelled out right in the policy. Yes.

COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: But, this policy that we're undertaking would apply to them.

Do you believe they are exactly the same as the policies that they are accustomed to with their police departments?

59 COMMISSIONER McCAFFREY: Yes. 1 Like I said, the policies, again, 2 3 dictated from New York State Division of Criminal 4 Justice. They're the ones that set forth here's 5 the required training they have to take annually 6 and initially. 7 COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: Thank you. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: There are no 8 9 other questions. In light of the world we live in today, particularly with active shooters, where we read about it multiple times a year where these situations have taken place, I think that we, as Council members, Board members, elected officials and also the public will feel better over the fact that we have implemented this policy and that our public safety officers and bay constables are adequately trained and that, God willing, we will never have to use deadly force.

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COMMISSIONER LENZ: My name is Richard Lenz, Commissioner of the Department of Public Works.

I'd like to say hello to everybody. I know it's been a long day. This will go pretty fast, I hope.

I just want to make sure that everybody understands that this is a planning document.

That's what the purpose of this is for. It's for the Local Solid Waste Management Plan and what it is, is a ten-year plan that we are required to do by the New York State DEC.

The document is for the management of solid waste that is generated within the Town for the purpose of a ten-year period of time, so this will be from 2019 to 2028. It's for -- to economically and soundly make sure that we're taking care of the MSW within our boundaries.

We want to reduce solid waste and increase the use of recycling. I have here with us the Deputy Commissioner -- not everybody is getting up and talking, but I just want to introduce everybody - we have the Deputy Commissioner Dan Pearl from Sanitation.

We have Matt Russo from Engineering

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that is going to be doing our presentation, our quick presentation.

We also have John Tassone, Deputy

Commissioner of Engineering and also Cashin

Associates who will be taking notes for the purpose of this meeting. It's Ellen Feldman and Frank

Cashin.

Matt, do you want to come up?

MR. RUSSO: Good afternoon, everyone.

I'll just give a brief summary of the intent and the process in developing the Local Solid Waste Management Plan and then a ief summary the Town's current and future Solid Waste Management Operations.

There is a full hard copy of the Local Solid Waste Management Plan, as well as a Summary documents, both here at the front table and atthe back. The document is also available on the Town's website and at the office of the Town Clerk.

A Local Solid Waste Management Plan is required to be prepared by a regional or local governmental agency or authority under New York State Environmental Conservation Law Section 27-0107 and as defined by the DEC through Parts 360 and 366 of the New York Codes of Rules and

Regulations.

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As stated by the DEC, a Local Solid
Waste Management Plan is an instrument intended to
evaluate the current solid waste management
practices, evaluate the options and alternatives
available for future solid waste management and to
set forth the implementation steps for a ten-year
planning period along with establishing projections
of reduction in waste disposal over the ten-year
plan.

The goal of the Solid Waste Management
Plan is to reduce the amount of solid waste
destined for disposal by preventing its generation
and increasing reuse, recycling, composting and
other organic materials recycling methods.

The Local Solid Waste Management Plan is required to:

Characterize the solid waste stream to be managed in the planning period;

Assess existing and alternate proposed solid waste management programs and facilities;

Address the comments and views expressed by concerned governmental, environmental, commercial and industrial interests and the public on the waste reduction, recycling, reuse and

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69 1 disposal alternatives; 2 Identify the parties with 3 responsibility to implement each element of the 4 plan and steps which must be undertaken by each; 5 Set forth a timetable for implementing the plan; 6 7 Describe the potential and issues that 8 would be involved with participation of neighboring 9 jurisdictions in the municipality's plan; 10 Include and utilize data and analysis 11 of the municipality's current practices for future 12 projections and planning. 13 The Town of Oyster Bay has prepared the 14 draft Local Solid Waste Management Plan for the 15 Town of Oyster Bay Solid Waste Disposal District 16 which has been reviewed by the New York State DEC 17 Division of Materials Management and deemed to 18 adequately address all required elements. 19 In accordance with the requirements of 20 the DEC, the Town must solicit public comment on

the draft Local Solid Waste Management Plan.

At the Town Board meeting of November 19, 2019, this Board passed Resolution No. 704-2019 which set today as the public meeting to solicit comments. This meeting was advertised in

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Newsday on Thursday, November 21, 2019, providing the necessary 15-day prior notice, as well as posting on the Town website.

Today begins a 45-day period for comments to be submitted to the Town. Comments can be made at this meeting or in writing to the Department of Public Works through January 24, 2020. All comments that are received will become part of a formal record that will be submitted to DEC.

Upon closure of the public comment period, the Local Solid Waste Management Plan will be revised as necessary in response to those comments and submitted to DEC for final approval.

Once the DEC approves of the Plan, the Town must formally adopt the Plan by Resolution. This plan shall serve as a planning tool for the Town through the year 2028 and must be updated every two years based upon changes to the collection and disposal programs for solid waste and recyclables.

Currently, Municipal Solid Waste or MSW is delivered to the Old Bethpage Solid Waste

Disposal Complex by Town collection vehicles or private carters. Then disposed of by Winter

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Brothers Recycling, LLC by long-haul trucking or combined trucking and rail transport to landfills that have been approved by the Town.

The Winters contract is currently in its second five-year term which is due to expire May 31, 2021. A third five-year extension is possible through mutual agreement between the Town and Winters.

The Town is currently preparing an RFP for MSW transfer, transport and disposal through a General Municipal Law Section 120-w process which allows the Town to select a vendor based upon factors such as qualifications and innovation in their proposal, and not solely cost.

It is anticipated that the RFP will request proposals for the construction and operation of a new MSW and recyclables handling facility at the Old Bethpage Solid Waste Disposal Complex which could allow for waste reduction processing and the handling of recyclables from neighboring municipalities for potential revenue generation.

Commingled recyclables are delivered to the Old Bethpage Complex by Town collection vehicles which are then transported for recycling

through an intermunicipal agreement with the Town of Hempstead Sanitary District 1, with Omni Recycling of Westbury as the operator. This contract expires December 31, 2020, with provisions for two additional two-year terms by mutual agreement.

Glass for recycling is delivered to the Old Bethpage Complex by Town collection vehicles from drop-off facilities that have been placed throughout the Town. The collected glass is then transported for recycling by E.W.G. Glass Recovery & Recycling Corp. This contract runs through April 30, 2020.

Yard waste is delivered to the Old

Bethpage Complex by Town collection vehicles or

private carters. The waste is then transported for

recycling by Trinity Transportation Corporation or

Long Island Compost. Their contracts expire

December 31, 2019.

The Town has received bids for a new contract which are currently under review. The Town had also solicited bids for the recycling of food waste in addition to yard waste, in order to develop a full organics recycling program which would accelerate an implementation goal that is

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detailed in the Plan. Unfortunately, no bids were received at this time.

The Town also maintains contracts for the recycling or disposal of materials including white metals, electronic waste, used motor oils, tires and hazardous wastes which are further detailed in the Plan.

The Town continually monitors the Sanitation and recycling commodities markets to determine if the valuation of certain items may result in either lower costs or increased revenue to the Town. All Town Sanitation and recycling contracts contain provisions for early termination in the event that new recycling or disposal opportunities become available.

The Plan further details the implementation schedule over the course of the ten-year planning period for expanded or new initiatives to further reduce the quantity of our waste streams and to expand or modify our current recycling programs.

So, at this time, we would invite any comments from the public on the Plan and provide a reminder that comments can be submitted in writing to the Town of Oyster Bay, Department of Public
