18	full schedule today, but we also have a busy
19	evening and I do before we get into our regular
20	Action Calendar our hearings, rather, I would
21	like to speak to one issue that we have coming up
22	tonight.
23	We have a very special Board Hearing
24	which will take place at 7:00 p.m. at Hicksville
25	High School, and this is for the hearing for the

3 1 Seritage property, and also for the public comment 2 on the environmental impact statement. 3 So, we will be meeting, all in the 4 public are welcome. If anyone is unable to make 5 it, does not want to make it to attend the public function or has other concerns, they can take part 6 7 online, they can send their questions in. We will 8 be monitoring the questions and choosing some of 9 those online to ask so that they can be heard 10 publicly. They will be part of the record. We 11 will leave the record open for quite some time. 12 How many days are we leaving the record 13 open for this evening? It's over 30, I know that. 14 DEPUTY COMMISSIONER McCAFFREY: Until 15 May 1st. 16 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Until May 1st. 17 So, people can write, they can e-mail, they phone 18 us in that time so the comments become part of the 19 record on this, if they have any reason why they 20 are unable to attend or choose not to attend this 21 evening. 22 So, having said that, would you please 23 continue to poll the Board? 24 MR. LaMARCA: Call the first hearing. 25 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Oh, we got

4 everybody? 1 2 MR. LaMARCA: Yes. 3 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Great. 4 Thank you. 5 Would you please call the first 6 hearing? 7 MR. LaMARCA: The first hearing is to consider the hydrant rental for Plainview Fire 8 9 Protection District and Plainview Water District for the year 2020. 10 11 MS. FAUGHNAN: Good morning, 12 Supervisor, Members of the Town Board. 13 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Good morning. 14 MS. FAUGHNAN: Elizabeth Faughnan, 15 Deputy Town Attorney, Office of the Town Attorney. 16 So, I come to you every year with a 17 similar hearing and that is just to remind you all 18 that in the Hamlet of Plainview there is no Fire 19 District. There are no elected fire commissioners. 20 There's no Fire District that sets a separate 21 taxing line. 22 In areas that do have a Fire District, 23 the Fire District actually rents the hydrants from 24 the local Water District because, as we all know, 25 Water Districts don't need fire hydrants to provide

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1	water service to homes. Fire hydrants are there to
2	serve the public and to be available in case there
3	is a fire to access to put out the fire.
4	So, having said all of that, under the
5	New York State Town Law where there is no separate
6	Fire District, the Town Board Members sit as
7	commissioners, per se, of that Fire Protection
8	District.
9	So that very long introduction explains
10	why I'm bringing this hydrant rental hearing to
11	you.
12	In the Hamlet of Plainview, you are,
13	for lack of a better term, the Fire Commissioners
14	that are charged under the State Law with renting
15	the hydrants so that the Plainview Fire Department
16	can access them if there is a fire.
17	There are 1,145 hydrants in Plainview
18	that we would be renting. The proposed contract
19	amount is \$114,500 for the year. So, we are in
20	discussions with the Plainview Water District to
21	see we would obviously like that to be lower for
22	our residents and we are working with them on that.
23	But the maximum amount I'm asking you
24	to approve today is an amount not to exceed
25	\$114,500 for the rental of those 1,145 hydrants for

6 the Calendar Year 2020. 1 2 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Are there any 3 questions? 4 (No verbal response.) 5 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Okay. Just to reiterate what you said and 6 7 what we've said at hearings of this type over and 8 over, we're hearing this issue today before our 9 Town Board --10 MS. FAUGHNAN: Yes --11 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: -- because New 12 York State, many, many decades ago -- I believe the 1930s --13 14 MS. FAUGHNAN: Correct. 15 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: -- set in law 16 certain procedures including who presides, who 17 represents the public when it comes to expenditures 18 in fire departments without Districts and without 19 Commissioners. 20 MS. FAUGHNAN: Correct, Supervisor. 21 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: So, we are that 22 -- based on the mandate of State law --23 MS. FAUGHNAN: Yes. 24 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: -- and, 25 therefore, they cannot have this fire protection

7 resources without us voting on this expenditure. 1 2 MS. FAUGHNAN: Absolutely correct, 3 Supervisor. 4 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Okay. 5 No other questions? (No verbal response.) 6 7 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you. 8 MS. 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1	SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Would you please
2	call the next public hearing?
3	MR. LaMARCA: This hearing is to
4	consider the 2020 Fire Protection Agreements.
5	SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Counselor?
6	MS. FAUGHNAN: Good morning,
7	Supervisor, Members of the Town Board.
8	Elizabeth Faughnan, Deputy Town
9	Attorney, Office of the Town Attorney.
10	Again, every year I come to you for
11	Fire Protection contracts. These are contracts the
12	Town of Oyster Bay has in the various areas
13	throughout the Town that do not have their own Fire
14	District. Instead, fire protection is provided by
15	a private not-for-profit company.
16	For instance, in Oyster Bay Hamlet is
17	provided by Atlantic Steamer and by Oyster Bay
18	Company No. 1, which are not the subject of today's
19	hearing because last year you approved a two-year
20	agreement, so they are not among the contracts that
21	I'm going to present today.
22	I should also point out that the Hamlet
23	of East Norwich is protected by the East Norwich
24	Volunteer Fire Company. You are also not
25	considering that contract today, because we are

3 1 because that fire company protects the Town of 2 Oyster Bay residents, as well as residents of 3 several Villages, and we are working with the 4 Villages and with the fire company itself to 5 determine what percentage the Town of Oyster Bay residents should pay of that annual budget. 6 7 So, I'm not presenting that contract to 8 you today. That will come at a later date when 9 those percentages are set. 10 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Counselor, just 11 to bring clarity --12 MS. FAUGHNAN: Sure. 13 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: -- would you 14 please read the list of fire communities --15 MS. FAUGHNAN: Yes. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: -- where this 16 17 issue is providing protection that we're 18 specifically dealing with on this hearing? 19 MS. FAUGHNAN: These communities are --20 and they're called Fire Protection Districts -- so 21 there are residents in a -- they are residents of 22 the Town of Oyster Bay in the Bayville Fire 23 Protection District, in the Glenwood/Glen Head Fire Protection District. There are residents of the 24 25 Town of Oyster Bay that are not in the Incorporated

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1	Village of Farmingdale. We refer to it as the
2	Northeast Farmingdale Fire Protection District.
3	Residents of Plainview. Residents of Greenvale.
4	And then there are also two other contracts for
5	certain property in Bayville and also the Wantagh
6	Fire District covers Tobay Beach. So, there is
7	also annually a contract with the Wantagh Fire
8	District to provide fire and emergency services at
9	Tobay Beach.
10	Now, the amounts are different for each
11	company, obviously, because each one has different
12	budgets and different needs, but more importantly,
13	as I mentioned briefly with East Norwich, the Town
14	has different percentage proportionate shares of
15	the budget.
16	For instance, the Greenvale Fire
17	Protection District is less than one percent of the
18	entire area protected by the two Roslyn fire
19	companies, Rescue Hook and Ladder which is commonly
20	referred to as Roslyn Rescue and Roslyn Highlands
21	Hook and Ladder. So, they protect an area that is
22	less than one percent of it is in the Town of
23	Oyster Bay in Greenvale. So, that's why the
24	numbers may seem disproportionate between the
25	companies.

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1	The Plainview fire company is 100
2	percent within the Unincorporated Town of Oyster
3	Bay, so we pay that entire we pay that entire
4	budget. The Incorporated Village of Farmingdale
5	Fire Department, 90 percent of what they protect is
6	in the Incorporated Village of Farmingdale, less
7	than 10 percent is the Town of Oyster Bay's
8	responsibility.
9	46 percent of the Glenwood Hook and
10	Ladder's protection area is Town of Oyster Bay
11	residents. So, that's why the numbers may seem
12	varied.
13	And just for purposes of the record, I
14	know you all have the amounts in front of you, I'm
15	just going to read them out loud so they are in the
16	record.
17	And we are proposing a contract with
18	the Bayville Fire Company for \$33,462.
19	With Glenwood Hook and Ladder Engine
20	and Hose for \$773,720.
21	With the Incorporated Village of
22	Farmingdale, because the Farmingdale Fire
23	Department is actually a Village. It's actually a
24	branch of the Village. So, the contract is with
25	the Incorporated Village of Farmingdale for the

6 Northeast Farmingdale protection area for 1 2 \$111,449.62. 3 The Plainview Volunteer Fire Department, \$5,088,467. 4 5 Roslyn Highland's Hook and Ladder Engine and Hose, \$16,033. 6 7 Rescue Hook and Ladder Company No. 1, 8 what we call Roslyn Rescue, \$16,405. 9 Then an additional contract with the Bayville Fire Company for certain territory in 10 11 Bayville for \$7,415. 12 And lastly, the Wantagh Fire District 13 for \$7,180. 14 Now, I will also point out that as a 15 municipality and sitting as Commissioners of the 16 Fire Protection Districts, it is also an oppor- -it is also mandated under State Law that if the 17 18 fire companies have Length of Service Award 19 Programs commonly referred to as LOSAP then the 20 municipality serve as the sponsors of those 21 programs. 22 So, in addition to the contract 23 amounts, they would also be the Town's 24 responsibility the contribution for the Plainview 25 LOSAP program for 2020 would be an amount not to

1exceed \$175,000 and the amount for the Glenwood2Hook and Ladder Engine and Hose, the Town's3contribution would be an amount not to exceed4\$225,000.5Those numbers may be less. It depends6on what the 2019 credits are or the service points7that the firemen have earned that would then8dictate what the contribution would be and, again,9this is a State program under State Law, and in10order to institute it, there were referenda in each11one of these fire protection areas. So, the voters12of the areas all voted to create and to have a13LOSAP, a Length of Service Award Program, for their14firemen and firewomen.15SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Are there any16questions?17(No verbal response.)18SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Would anyone like19 thank you, Counselor.20MS. The attorney for the applicant is here 16 today, Dan Baker. He'll get up in a moment to 17 discuss what is going on, the status of it because 18 this Board asked him to go back and speak to some 19 of the residents and members and bring them 20 together. 21 So, for purposes of this application, 22 I'm asking -- and it's on the consent as well by 23 Mr. Baker -- that the hearing be adjourned further 24 until September 30th for further comments and 25 further discussions by Mr. Baker and Harbour Green

3 Shore Club. 1 2 All right. So make a motion for that -- first let's hear from Dan Baker and then that 3 4 will be the motion suggested. 5 Thank you. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Good morning, 6 7 Counselor. 8 Would you kindly state your presence? 9 MR. BAKER: Thank you. 10 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: Safety first. 11 MR. BAKER: Yes, of course. 12 Good morning. 13 Daniel Baker, Certilman Balin, 14 90 Merrick Avenue, East Meadow, New York 11554, on 15 behalf of the applicant, Harbour Green Shore Club. 16 Thank you, Mr. Scalera, for leading me 17 into that. 18 So, since our hearing on February 11th, 19 my clients have had several conversations with 20 neighbors that were either present at the hearing 21 or wrote in or made contact with the Town, and it 22 would seem that they've had some positive 23 discussion and understanding from both sides as to 24 everybody's concerns. 25 And the way they left it off was to try

1 to figure out what would be amenable to everybody 2 and probably the best way to do that is to move 3 through the Summer season. 4 I think my clients recognize that there 5 are certain concerns for people that live on the other side of the canal and close to the club and 6 7 other areas, so they want to be mindful of that and 8 try to set up a program that would work for 9 everybody. 10 And that's the idea of keeping the 11 record open until September 30th so that we get 12 through the season and everyone can have some 13 dialogue from now until then and then we can report 14 back to the Board and, hopefully, we will have, you 15 know, a situation that is acceptable to everybody. 16 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: So, you, the 17 applicant, is coming here to ask for an extension 18 to what date? MR. BAKER: September 30th. 19 20 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Even if that 21 means a tailoring of those live music events at the 22 beach club? 23 MR.
