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SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Good morning, ladies and gentlemen and thank you and welcome to the Town of Oyster Bay Town Board Meeting for Tuesday, May 19, 2020.

We meet this morning with some of the Oyster Bay Town Board meeting -- members here in person and some are on the telephone to help and ensure proper social distancing measures.

While Governor Cuomo has not yet reopened our region, New York State continues to make great progress in battling COVID-19. We remain hopeful that Long Island will soon follow with other regions into Phase I of reopening and we are lobbying very strong in order to reopen some of the essential services, things we feel are essential services as quickly as possible, as well as other lobbying efforts with Albany right know as it relates to COVID-19.

This Town of Oyster Bay Town Board believes it's critical that we get more industries open and that we get people back to work in a safe way, but that we get them back to work.

Residential and outdoor construction should be classified essential. With proper PPE and safety protocols, construction projects should

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move forward just as they are in neighboring states. Small business should be allowed with reopen with safety protocols in place. After all, Target, Wal-Mart are open to sell shoes, clothing and more, why shouldn't small businesses be able to sell the same products at the curbside in a safe manner?

So we ask and we continue to lobby and we continue with letters and our voices and our leadership to push for small businesses in the construction industry which are the heartbeat of our local economy to get back to work in a safe way that protects the safety of the public and the employees but protects our economy that we all know has to get up and running again.

It make sense as COVID-19
hospitalizations and new transmissions and the rate of these positive tests are in a great decline in Nassau County, and after the meeting, those who would like to stay, we have information to update you on where we are as it relates to COVID statistics.

This past week the Governor authorized us to reopen tennis courts, batting cages. It's a small step, but we're going do continue to reopen

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our facilities in the appropriate way. We also began parking sticker sales for our beaches.

Beaches will be open with lifeguards beginning this coming weekend. We will have restricted access to residents only. Obviously, the social distancing rules all are in effect. We ask people to please have face coverings with them, especially between their car and their spot on the beach. Then once they're safe on the beach, we know that we will be able to handle this, monitor it, and supervisor it but we also thank our residents because they've been very, very cooperative.

For our residents' enjoyment, we plan drive-in movies and concerts this Summer that provide our residents with free entertainment in a safe manner.

The Town of Oyster Bay is well known for providing these great services. Our residents expect them and, quite frankly, we all, all of us here in Town of Oyster Bay government, including our Town Board members here and on the phone, our elected individuals and our Departments realize it's so critically important that you get back to some resemblance of normality, even though it's the

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new normal, it's important as the weather gets better for people to safely enjoy the outdoor resources of our Town.

In anticipation of the Governor's reopening of businesses over the coming weeks, we're also working with restaurant owners, we're working with our Village Mayors to create greater outdoor dining options and close streets on the weekend evenings to boost dining opportunities outside in a safe way.

Currently, it is legal for the restaurants to provide takeout service. Now, we're looking for more ways to build on that for safe dining, and we will -- are considering waiving fees for the permits that are necessary to eat outdoors and so forth so that we are not making it a further financial impact on these businesses that are struggling.

We must get back to normal as quickly but as safely as possible. Now, I ask everyone to please rise and I ask my longtime colleague and friend, Councilman Steve Labriola, to lead us in the Pledge of Allegiance.

(Whereupon, the Pledge of Allegiance was recited.)

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SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Now, I would like to take a moment to remember all of those who have lost their lives to this terrible disease, remember our first responders in the military, our first responders in fire departments, EMS services, all of our frontline workers in healthcare, including our doctors and nurses and P.A.s and so forth, all of our hospital employees, and but I want to take a moment to talk about and remember a fine leader in this Town, someone who we recently lost and my heart goes out and our condolences go out to the family of Ann Ocker. Ann Ocker was a Town Clerk in this Town beginning on January 1st of 1973. became a Town Councilwoman on the 1st of January of 1988, and retired in 1999, making fifteen years as Town Clerk, seven years of Town Councilwoman and she passed early this morning at the age of 101 years old. God Bless Ann Ocker for her long life. God Bless her for her leadership and all she has done over the many years.

Quite frankly, Ann Ocker was one of the Matriarchs of the Town of Oyster Bay and I remember her very well from my youth. She was always kind, endearing. She spoke to everyone with that motherly smile, but she was a true government

leader who understood government, fought for the 1 2 best of the best of the Town of Oyster Bay for our 3 residents and showed that women do an amazing job 4 in Town government. She and people like Isabel 5 Dodd broke through that glass ceiling, and we are so happy for that, and our condolences go out to 6 7 her entire family including Kevin Ocker, a 8 long-time friend, her husband, Ed Ocker was a Town 9 Councilman as well, and please, Ann Ocker, thank 10 you for all you have done for our Town and rest in 11 peace. 12 (Whereupon, a moment of silence 13 observed.) 14 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Now, I would like 15 to ask our Town Clerk to please call the roll as we 16 mentioned earlier that some of our counsel members 17 are here in person wearing face coverings and 18 situated at a safe distance, both face coverings 19 and at least six feet apart and other members of 20 the Board are here by telephone. 2.1 Town Clerk Rich LaMarca, would you 22 please call the roll. 23 MR. LaMARCA: Supervisor Saladino? SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Present. 24 25 MR. LaMARCA: Councilwoman Johnson?

8 COUNCILWOMAN JOHNSON: Present. 1 2 MR. LaMARCA: Councilman Imbroto? 3 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: Councilman Imbroto 4 is present via telephone. 5 MR. LaMARCA: Councilman Hand? COUNCILMAN HAND: Present. 6 7 MR. LaMARCA: Councilman Labriola? COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: Present. 8 9 MR. LaMARCA: Councilwoman Maier? COUNCILWOMAN MAIER: Present. 10 11 MR. LaMARCA: Councilwoman Walsh? 12 COUNCILWOMAN WALSH: Present. 13 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: There are no 14 hearings as part of this Town Board Meeting, but 15 the Town is beginning through the Building 16 Department to begin hearings for the ZBA which will be conducted via Zoom and meet all the criteria by 17 18 our attorneys for the open meeting laws as does 19 this meeting in the process we have in place. 20 So, with the Board polled and everyone 2.1 here, we have our forum. We have all our elected 22 officials present. We also have Jeff Pravato, our 23 Receiver of Taxes, and, as you know, Rich LaMarca, 2.4 our Town Clerk, along with all of our Town Board 25 members.

9 So let us please proceed with the 1 2 business of the day. 3 MR. LaMARCA: Supervisor, we have some Resolutions to add to the calendar, so I'm going to 4 5 ask for a motion to suspend the rules and add 6 Resolution Nos. 275 through 279-2020. 7 COUNCILWOMAN JOHNSON: So moved. 8 MR. LaMARCA: Motion made by 9 Councilwoman Johnson. COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: Second. 10 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: Second. 11 12 MR. LaMARCA: Seconded by Councilman Labriola. 13 14 On the vote: 15 Supervisor Saladino. 16 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: This is a vote to 17 suspend the rules to add walk-on items to this --18 three. 19 MR. authorizing the amendment of the 2020 Fee Schedule, Rules and Regulations of the Town of Oyster Bay Beaches, beach parking, launching ramps and the Joseph J. Saladino Memorial Marina at Tobay to waive certain requirements for senior citizens and disabled individuals for the 2020 beach season.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: So what that specifically means is we are assuring through Resolution and a Town vote to ensure that all beach fees will be waived for senior citizens and those with disabilities and we are voting today on that Resolution.

MR. LaMARCA: Correct.

So may I have a motion to resuspend the rules and add walk-on Resolution Nos. 280-2020 and 281-2020.

On the motion?

This way there is no confusion as to who 2 is speaking. 3 We appreciate that. 4 COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: Supervisor, could 5 you just for the sake of our residents add some 6 clarification to Resolution 281 and, you know, the 7 conflicting information that has been out there and 8 as a result of the pandemic, the changes that we 9 instituted today? 10 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: 11 On 281, that is our garbage pails. 12 As it relates to garbage pails you're 13 referring, right? COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: No. 14 Senior --15 senior beach pass. 16 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Oh, I'm sorry. 17 COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: Our Town 18 attorney --19 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Basically, what 20 we have done is ensure that senior citizens and 2.1 those who are disabled will be able to use Tobay 22 Beach for free. We have already set a rule for 23 this year due to the COVID pandemic and realizing 2.4 that we have to ensure that our residents are 25 social distancing on the beach and throughout our

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facilities. We have to limit the amount of cars in the parking lot, but for seniors, we want to make sure that we are committed to our senior citizens and those with disabilities and this will -- this vote we are taking will ensure that they will not be charged a fee to attend the beach.

We've also strengthened and changed the process by which we give the resident their -- I was going to use the word sticker but it's a -- it's more of a hanger now. So it can be given while the windows are rolled up.

Beach stickers are on sale for all our residents. Everyone can show their ID while keeping their windows rolled up. That protects the resident in the car and it also protects our -- our workers with that window closed. So I hope that brings the clarification you were looking for.

Anything else you would like to add.

COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: Yeah, I wanted to add and I know the Town Clerk is here. We've talked about this and I know -- Rich, feel free to jump in -- I know that seniors who do want to still get their senior ID can still appear, or through the mail, appear at the Town Clerk Rich LaMarca's office and have that which is a one-time --

15 one-time fee which would -- for the rest of their 1 2 lives. 3 MR. LaMARCA: Correct. 4 COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: They would still 5 be able to come to the beach with that and then get their sticker or day pass -- however the Supervisor 6 7 has explained it. 8 Is that correct. 9 MR. LaMARCA: That's correct. Wе 10 instituted a contact less procedure whereby 11 residents can mail in the documents required for 12 the senior beach ID card. We ask them to also send 13 a head shot, a photo of themselves that we match up 14 to their driver's license and we affix that on their senior beach ID card and mail it back to 15 16 them. 17 So nobody has to come to the office 18 anymore. We can do it all via mail and e-mail. 19 COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: So for those who 20 choose not to and to show up at the booth itself 2.1 there'll be a special lane just for senior --22 MR. LaMARCA: Dedicated for them to 23 come through. 24 COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: And it will be

contactless as the Supervisor said, but they will

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also have to demonstrate residency, correct?

MR. LaMARCA: Absolutely.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: They will be holding ID against the glass so there is no passing of this ID. There's no open window. Our employees are wearing face coverings and it's a safer environment for all of them.

I would like to expand on that speed

pass lane if you would, much like Disney does, there is a lane set up to get people into the beach quickly. Our employees have been trained as to a new process to speed up the entrance into the beach parking lot. We've strengthened security there.

We've strengthened so many procedures. So it's all about getting our residents -- residents only -- at our beaches, making sure that those with the pass get in more quickly and efficiently, making sure there is no contact and making sure that seniors and those with disabilities continue to utilize our beach for free.

COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: Thank you,

17 1 (No response.) 2 MR. LaMARCA: We do have 3 correspondence. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: I know that. 4 5 MR. LaMARCA: Board members who --SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Before we get to 6 7 the correspondence, I know there was some 8 correspondence on one issue in particular, so I 9 just want to make sure we get the facts out 10 immediately before we begin with letters. 11 There is a Resolution, and it's 12 Resolution 265-2020, authorizing an award of a bid 13 proposal for glass recycling and the glass 14 recycling program in the Town of Oyster Bay. We've 15 described this in the past at great length. 16 Glass is no longer an item that 17 recyclers or the market wants to accept. Glass 18 It has very little value, unfortunately, 19 because of the transportation cost to get the glass 20 from where we collect it and our transfer station 2.1 here in this Town to where that glass is then 22 ground and made into other products. Glass weighs 23 ten times what aluminum or cardboard weighs, at 24 least ten times, and the transportation cost 25 between fuel and the other issues associated with

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transportation have made glass almost valueless.

Oyster Bay because of our commitment to the environment and our commitment to the residents and best practices, so we went out and established a means by which to collect glass at multiple locations. I believe it's a dozen locations throughout the Town. The top spot that seems to be the most poplar is at 150 Miller Place on the north or westbound service road of the Long Island Expressway at the Town's Department of Public Works facility.

So our plan is a three-stage plan. One is to beginning accepting residents' glass.

Secondly, is to expand upon these location where residents can pick up glass, and thirdly, as those who have been following our Town Board meetings know we've already passed Resolutions to explore a much more holistic approach to the collection of solid waste, including glass and many more recyclables.

In the Town of Oyster Bay, you can rest assured that your glass is actually recycled. I say that because some municipalities continue to collect glass and they're recycling and then they

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throw it out. Other municipalities are collecting glass with their municipality solid waste with no way to recycle it.

We came up with an approach that we think is creative, is helpful, is certainly the best practice economically under the current situation and environmentally our commitment continues in the Town of Oyster Bay to continue to recycle your glass with even better, more news and better news coming since we are in the process of putting out our fees to look at state-of-the-art, cutting-edge technologies that would better for recycling and our solid waste efforts.

Three companies responded to the bid.

The names of the companies are EWG Glass Recycling,

Omni Recycling of Westbury and Winter Brothers, who

happens to be the company that we also do our solid

waste removal with.

Winter Brothers was the lowest cost of the three and, therefore, are the ones who have won this bid and we expect to pay \$72.85 a ton for the cost of recycling glass in the Town of Oyster Bay.

So that really delineates and provides transparency on this issue on Resolution 265.

Before we get to reading the letters,

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is there anyone who has questions on this Resolution.

(No response.)

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: All right.

Then I'll ask the Town Clerk to please read the letters that we currently have from our residents.

MR. LaMARCA: We received an e-mail from Arthur Adelman of Sea Cliff on Resolution 265-2020.

Mr. Adelman states, "Please make a motion to table today's Resolution 265-2020 from the documents offered by the Town, residents and elected officials are precluded from reviewing any and all bids made by alternative qualified vendors.

"As dictated by Town Law, such bids must be disclosed prior to entering of contract, especially one issued nunc pro tunc.

"It is my belief the vendor approved and granted that a contract at discussion is the same as the one which backed out of a previous obligation favorable to the Town back in 2017.

"Why would we believe Winter Brothers Hauling will honor today's agreement through its term as they reneged on a previous agreement.

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2.1 "In anticipation of a negative response to this request and the approval of Resolution 265-2020, my protest should be memorialized." SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Your words and opinion are memorialized because this is now permanent part of the record, Mr. Adelman. So we have run this through our departments, including and especially our Legal Department, but I'm going to ask Matt Rozea to please join us to shed more light. You know what? Let's read all the letters first. I apologize. Let's read the letters first. There are two other letters. MR. LaMARCA: I have one more on --SUPERVISOR SALADINO: This issue. MR. LaMARCA: -- Resolution 265 and that is from Kevin McKenna of 3 Edna Drive in Syosset, who states, "Due to the fact that complete backup on Resolution 265 was not posted on this prior to this meeting and the competitive bids with financial information made known to the public, the Board must table and adjourn the vote on this Resolution until the public has had an opportunity to review to adhere to Town's stated process and

the Open Meetings Law.

2.2 "One document marked 265 does not have 1 2 anything to do with this bid. It's an error. 3 addition, the fact that the public cannot 4 participate either in person or via telephone like 5 the Board members do, violates transparency in the Open Meetings Laws." 6 7 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Can we have one 8 more last correspondence on this? 9 MR. LaMARCA: I don't have any others. 10 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Okay. So there 11 are two letters -- two e-mails rather from the 12 residents. 13 So I'm going to ask Frank Scalera from 14 the Town's Attorneys office to please step forward. 15 MR. SCALERA: Just to answer --16 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Could you stand 17 closer to this microphone? 18 MR. SCALERA: -- to answer the question 19 about the bidding process --20 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Just one moment. 2.1 Can the Town Board members listening on 22 the telephone all hear Mr. Scalera. 23 COUNCILMAN HAND: Councilman Hand. 24 I can't hear him. 25 MR. SCALERA: Okay. I'll talk a little

23 1 louder. 2 COUNCILMAN IMBROTO: Councilman Imbroto. 3 4 Yes, I can hear. 5 MR. SCALERA: Okay. I'll speak a 6 little louder. 7 Very simply, this was a public bid, a 8 public sealed bid. The bidding process, as you 9 know, we amended to keep it -- keep it current with 10 the COVID crisis. So public bids are opened in 11 this room and the names of the bidders and the 12 amount they are bidding is read out loud, done by 13 the Department of General Services and is live 14 streamed. 15 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: It's all public. 16 MR. SCALERA: So it was available to 17 the public. There were three bids and the 18 Commissioner of the Department which proposed the 19 recommended bid to be awarded reviewed the three 20 bids and submitted the lowest responsible bid. So 2.1 it was covered both -- it was covered both 22 separately by the public bid opening. 23 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Okay. 24 Did, in your opinion, have you reviewed 25 this entire process as it relates to this

24 Resolution --1 2 MR. SCALERA: I reviewed the process. 3 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: -- of all our bids? 4 5 MR. SCALERA: I reviewed the process and we followed New York State Law. The fact --6 7 the fact that the backup doesn't list all three is 8 of no moment. The fact is that it was opened 9 before the public. Reviewed and the lowest 10 responsible bidder was the one that's set forth in 11 that Resolution, period. Nothing more. 12 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: I was inform --13 just so we are transparent on this -- the wrong 14 Resolution was originally posted with the correct 15 backup. That was corrected. And the information 16 -- the correct information went up and I see Rich 17 LaMarca is also nodding. 18 So the correct information went up 19 before this meeting, correct. 20 MR. LaMARCA: Yes. 2.1 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And, in your 22 opinion, do we meet every criteria, every rule and 23 law as it applies to bidding and the public Open 24 Meetings Law? 25 MR. SCALERA: We followed both New York

25 1 State Town Law and our own Town Code, our own 2 internal procedures, so everything was done properly and legally. 3 4 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Okav. 5 So, we did have three bidders. mentioned all three names EWG Glass Recycling, Omni 6 7 Recycling of Westbury and Winter Brothers. 8 MR. SCALERA: Correct. 9 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Which was the lowest bid? 10 11 MR. SCALERA: The Winter Brothers was 12 the lowest bid and pursuant to the department head 13 that submitted it, which was General Service, as 14 well as DPW Public Works Commissioner also reviewed this because it's a function that comes out of 15 Sanitation. He also reviews it -- reviewed it and 16 17 also recommended Winter Brothers as the lowest 18 responsible bidder. 19 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: What about the 20 Inspector General? 2.1 MR. SCALERA: And the Inspector General 22 also did his -- the procedure we put in place to 23 check both the contract, the notice requirements 24 and the awarded contract. 25 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Have you spoken

26 with our Inspector General on this Resolution? 1 2 MR. SCALERA: No, I have not spoken to 3 him. 4 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: But I know your 5 office has? MR. SCALERA: My -- correct, and my 6 7 office has and, yes --8 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: I just want to 9 get the question answered. 10 Has the Inspector General found that 11 this meets all criteria? 12 MR. SCALERA: Correct, because as you 13 know, it's part of the new procedure -- the 14 additional procedures put in, the Town Attorney's 15 office, two Deputy Town Attorneys review, sign off 16 by way of --17 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Independently of 18 each other. 19 MR. SCALERA: Independently of each, 20 and then it goes to the Inspector General, and then 21 he finally signs off and gives the okay so the 22 procedure -- our docket procedure can move forward 23 with putting on the Town Board calendar for your 24 decision. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: So in addition to 25

2.7 Department of Public Works that puts this out and 1 2 reviews it, we also have the Department of General 3 Services --MR. MR. LaMARCA: And The last piece of correspondence that we received is on Resolution 270 from Kevin McKenna, 3 Edna Drive, Syosset, New York.

"I do not see in the backup that shows the other bidders on this Resolution.

"In addition, the proposal by Nassau/Suffolk does not break out any explanation as to how they arrived at the amount of \$60,000.

"There should be a labor rate,
estimated number of hours and quantity of manpower.

I would like to say that if this is simply for
contract management and inspection of other
company's physical labor, this is excessive,
especially not being broken out and compared to

other bids.

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"How can the Town Board have any benchmarks to make an intelligent decision on whether this be awarded in the best interest of the taxpayers?

"I request this Resolution be tabled until the public has been provided all this information.

"How could this be approved by Inspector General Brian, no one?"

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: In answer to those questions, Mr. McKenna, is a regular -- at our Town Board meetings and regular -- on these letters and that's fine. We always appreciate the public's participation.

What Mr. McKenna has -- may not realize is this amount covers the Town for two years, not one. So it would cover the Town for \$30,000 a year for inspections, design, any changes as they open up the tower and also the Littauer Estates that we are preserving. This is open space. One of the last farms in Nassau County the Town owns to preserve open space and to preserve the environmental history of our Town and to the agricultural history of our Town.
