SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Good morning, ladies and gentlemen and welcome to the Oyster Bay Town Board Meeting of June 2, 2020.

We are meeting in Oyster Bay Town Hall
North as we normally do with all of our Board
members and elected officials here practicing
social distance protocols in place.

Before we proceed, we would like to take this opportunity to assure residents just how easy it is to participate in our meeting in light of the emergency restrictions and conditions that have been set forth by New York State and to ensure that meetings like this one are accessed online with ample opportunity for the public to participate.

In our case, for years residents have been able to view live streaming of our Town Board meetings at OysterBayTown.com. The proceedings are then recorded and later transcribed.

The public has the opportunity to be heard on matters brought before the Town Board and during public comment for a period of 10 days following this meeting.

In other words, we are keeping the records open and if you would like to be heard on

any issue, you can e-mail or write us, and we will continue to keep the rolls open for ten days so that anything you present to the Town Board will become a permanent part of the record.

With respect to today's hearing, the public will have until the end of business day on June 12th to submit comments to the subject of any hearing by mailing or delivering comments to the office of our Oyster Bay Town Attorney at 54 Audry Avenue, Oyster Bay, New York 11771.

Any comments received will become, again, part of the public record and it is important that you know we want to hear from you.

So, just to reemphasize, yes, we are hosting today's meeting virtually. We are all here but statements, comments, input from the public relative to our meeting and our hearings are always welcome, respected and part of the record and considered before any decisions are rendered and the process that we are embracing meets and exceeds all of New York State's requirements.

Before we get started, I am going to ask everyone to rise.

If Michele, Councilwoman Johnson, would you kindly lead us in the Pledge of Allegiance?

(Whereupon, the Pledge of Allegiance was recited.)

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: I would like to ask for a moment of silence in recognition and in honor of all those who have passed of COVID, for all our emergency responders, our healthcare heros, all working for us; also, in mindfulness of all those we have lost over the years defending the rights of this great country.

(Whereupon, a moment of silence was observed.)

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you.

I would just ask you to all remain standing for a moment of prayer.

Lord, we ask you to give us the strength, the patience and for foresight to understand the issues before us, to help our communities in every way, to keep people safe in the Town of Oyster Bay and throughout our great nation of the United States of America.

We have been the world's leaders all along and we will continue to be that, but, please, Lord, please allow us to come out of this without strife, a better understanding of each other's needs and wants, and the commitment to work with

one another in America to bring about safety and peace.

God bless this great nation and each and every one of us, and to that we say, Amen.

I want to take a couple of minutes before we get started to speak about some of the issues going on in the Town of Oyster Bay that the public has been asking about.

We've got great news we received last week, New York State greenlighted the Long Island's Phase 1 for reopening. This allowed construction and manufacturing to restart. It also has allowed retail stores to open for curb-side or in-person pickup.

This Town Board believes it's critical that we get more industries open and back to work. We all believe that the public can do this safely with assistance and we are here to help our businesses get back up and running and we have continued to lobby and demand from New York State that we get back to business to protect our economy while still protecting the health and safety of our residents. Safety protocols have been put in place in every aspect of Town government.

My Town Board colleagues and elected

officials here on the Town Board and all of the

Town of Oyster Bay have the pleasure of welcoming

some of our local merchants back and letting them

know how much they were missed and how much we're

committed to seeing everyone get back to work in a

very product way.

We celebrated the reopening of small businesses and gathered with our retailers to remind residents of the benefits of shopping in your hometown. It is critical for everyone to get back out and shop locally. Let's protect the store owners, the businesses, the jobs, the downtowns and all we hold so dear.

Yes, shopping on the internet is convenient, but don't forget the protection of others. Just as we've had a tremendous passion to thank our health care heros, our emergency responders, all involved in protecting us, we have to have the same passion to support our businesses and that's what we continue to do.

PAUSE New York has severely disrupted businesses negatively impacted the livelihood of thousands of employers and employees.

Unemployment has now reached 16 percent on Long Island and we cannot allow it to go any

higher. We support the return of small businesses and urge you to support the local mom and pop shops, your local neighborhood stores. Let's help them get back to good health.

Shopping at these neighborhood merchants keeps the local dollars in the local economy. Please support these merchants and buy locally. So, this begins with our restaurants. They should have the ability to start serving food outdoors by Phase 2, instead of Phase 3, as Albany has asked. Phase 3 is far too far away.

Connecticut has already allowed outdoor dining to return in their state and we should immediately follow suit. Collectively, this Town Board is already looking forward to safe ways to speed up Phase 2, Phase 3 and Phase 4 reopenings.

And I thank our residents and I thank our Town Board for joining us yesterday in one of our villages where we were joined by the Supervisor and the Town Board of Hempstead Town, as well as our wonderful elected officials in this great town.

We met with all of the mayors across our towns and the business leaders and the heads of the Chambers of Commerce to demand from Albany to reopen outdoor dining as part of Phase 2 which

should begin a week from tomorrow.

We are not saying you can go out and start doing that. You run the risk of being cited by the County and the State. What we are saying is we will continue to be your voice to lobby and to demand that Albany allow these reopenings as part of Phase 2.

So, we pray for everyone out there and we thank everyone for the cooperation and the patience that they have shown in a very, very difficult situation. And we certainly pray for peace and lawfulness in our communities across Long Island and across these United States.

COUNCILWOMAN WALSH: Present. 4 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: All are present. 5 So thank you, everyone. 6 7 Town Clerk, would you please call the 8 first hearing? 9 MR. LaMARCA: Today's hearing is to consider a local law entitled a Local Law to amend 10 11 Chapter 246, Zoning Section 246-5.5.5 and Section 12 2465.2 of the code of the Town of Oyster Bay. 13 MR. SCALERA: Good morning, Supervisor, 14 Town Board. Frank Scalera, Chief Deputy Town 15 16 Attorney. 17 As the Clerk just mentioned, this is a 18 local law to amend Chapter 246 in the Zoning Code 19 regarding apartments over stores. 20 The amendment here basically -- the 2.1 intent of it is to assist downtowns across Oyster 22 Bay, but at the same time balancing that assistance 23 with transparency and input by both the local 24 residents or local interested parties, as well as 25 this Town Board.

So, with that, the particular code 246-5.5.5 that addresses apartment over stores, it indicates in the code and in the corresponding schedule of use which is the chart that corresponds to this particular code, it indicates that it's an As-of-Right principal use. It's As-of-Right.

What this change does is it eliminates it as As-of-Right, but -- but it continues to allow it by Special Use Permit which, getting back to my initial premise, is for the purposes of interested parties, residents and this Town Board and others who are interested to put input in the entire process.

So with that, it's also consistent with the entire Town Comprehensive Zoning Code which basically allows residents on top of the stores; however, it allows it only with Special Use permit. It doesn't allow it As-of-Right.

So, consistently with the code for the last 50 years, it didn't allow it except for resident office which you know, this Board knows, if you don't know, resident offices you own the house and you put an office so you're an actual occupant in your own house with your office which is kind of a hybrid.

So, getting back to this, it's about continuing to focus on downtowns and the storefronts, but at the same time, balancing it with transparency, openness and further input which never harms us by having input from interested parties.

Now, for housekeeping purposes, Public

Notice of this hearing was given in connection with

this entire action Board calendar today. We did

the Public Notice which was published. You also

know that the Public Notice was for today,

June 2nd. You also know that the Public Notice

also allows that the record for this particular

hearing on this change stays open until June 12th.

So, anybody interested, watching or hearing, can put input in and it will be part of this record up to June 12th. The Supervisor will mention where you can give input.

I just want to add, the Public Notice that you can give additional input with the Town Attorney's office, but I can assure you on the record that the Town Clerk's office, the Public Information office, the Supervisor's office and Department of Planning and Development will all accept any e-mails or any input and will

incorporate it into the record. The Supervisor will talk more about that.

So, Public Notice given, opportunity to be heard. Second housekeeping SEQUA. This is a routine administrative action. So it's Type 2. It doesn't require any further review on the SEQUA. So that housekeeping done.

So, that being said, the changes here, the proposed amendment is straightforward. It'll delete that portion in the code but, again, based upon other provisions of the Town code and the Building code and the Zoning code, anybody in downtowns looking to do apartments over stores and/or office, apartment over stores will still be permitted.

And if you need any questions on that process on how it's done under Special Use, we have Leslie Maccarone, Commissioner of Planning and Development, for that purpose.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: We'll bring her up in just a moment. And the Board may have questions for you, but I have a couple of questions just to set the record straight so people fully understand what we are doing.

We are not doing this to discourage or

stop apartments over stores but we are doing this, in fact, to continue our downtown revitalization process to create a better system so the public can be heard, can come out to every hearing so that it will more closely match the model that we've been working on for the last years now -- three years for our downtowns.

Is that correct?

MR. SCALERA: That's correct.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Not only are we encouraging this downtown revitalization model through this legislation, but this is not one and done. We'll be doing many other bills to continue to create a process to better revitalize our downtowns.

Correct?

MR. SCALERA: Correct.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And in terms of our hearing to the -- to the -- all of the State mandates as it relates to open meetings, as well as our own Town Code that we've been following all along, do we meet or do we exceed the mandates as far as the way we are doing this today?

MR. SCALERA: In the way we're doing it, we're exceeding the minimal requirements by the

2.1

State. So we're exceeding in allowing for more input, transparency as it relates to these applications and as well as presenting these applications.

result is that we're providing for a system to better -- to have more input from the public because now each of these designs will have to be accompanied by -- that fall into the criteria of course -- will have to be accompanied by our public hearing so we can listen to the business community. We can listen to the Chamber of Commerce. We can listen to the residents of that community. We can listen to anyone who is interested for or against, provide a better template that keeps moving us into the revitalization that we've been promising in our downtowns.

MR. SCALERA: That is correct.

It allows -- definitely allows input from interested parties. Look, we've always -- we always are looking to improve and you know, folks out there who have lived in this community their whole lives or even if they lived here less than their whole lives are always some of the best indicators of what is good and what is not good and

15 what is -- what can be done well in the communities 1 2 in which they live and this allows -- this allows 3 for that. 4 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: It actually 5 encourage it -- it encourages better participation from the public, the residents, the Chambers of 6 7 Commerce, business owners, people who live nearby, for all of this. 8 9 MR. SCALERA: Right. 10 So, any concerns that anybody may have 11 in this change as to the process of what happens, 12 Commissioner Maccarone can address the actual 13 operations from the Building Department and what 14 has to be done, but it's no different than what 15 this Town has been doing under your administration 16 for the last several years. 17 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: It's a 18 continuation of downtown revitalization --MR. SCALERA: Correct. 19 20 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: -- process. 2.1 Before we bring Commissioner Maccarone 22 up, would any of the Board members like to ask any 23 questions of Frank Scalera? 24 (No verbal response given.) 25 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Very well.

16 1 MR. SCALERA: Thank you. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Commissioner 2 3 Maccarone, would you please step up? 4 How are you today? 5 COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: Good morning, Supervisor, Town Board members, Town Clerk. 6 7 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Could you please 8 state your presence? 9 COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: I'm Elizabeth 10 Maccarone, Commissioner of Planning and 11 Development. 12 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: So, we're holding 13 this hearing today to provide better transparency 14 and to provide a continuation of our Downtown 15 Revitalization Plan. 16 Can you add more detail to that, 17 please? 18 COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: Yes. 19 As Deputy Chief Town Attorney Frank 20 Scalera indicated, we are eliminating it from the 2.1 District use regulations; however, there is a 22 provision in our code that allows for these types 23 of uses to still go before the Town Board for a 2.4 Special Use Permit. So, this will allow us to have 25 more oversight.

2.1

This type of development, whether it's apartments over stores in a downtown or in any of the other broader commercial zones, it's not a one-size-fits-all application. And there are times when we need to have oversight of applications that come in with the apartments, whether it's over the stores or the offices, and the density, as well as the proximity of the location to adjoining residential zones, because, obviously, where a commercial property ends and a residential property begins, we have seen applicants or developers come in to try to come in under the current Zoning Code to allow for high-density applications.

So, right now, it's a permitted use.

So, if they provided all the parking and the setbacks, there would be no oversight by this Board, the Planning Advisory Board or the Zoning Board of Appeals.

So, by doing this, we are opening it up for more public participation, Chamber participation, Civics, Town Board and so forth.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Can you just speak to the fact that this is a continuation of our Downtown Revitalization Plan that we've been talking about; we presented it to the public; we

advertised this; we worked with the public in so many ways at different public forums?

COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: Yes.

My other Deputy, James McCaffrey, he has been very instrumental in studying all surrounding properties and townships and so forth throughout the Hicksville Revitalization Plan. And one of the things that we want to focus in on is the parking requirements.

Currently, the code only requires one parking space for every apartment, but it doesn't break it down based upon studios, one bedrooms, two bedrooms, and what we've been seeing, you know, successful other downtowns, they're having a problem now with parking, and they enacted moratoriums to study those effects.

So, we don't want to be in a position where we create a sense of a lot of apartments without the proper parking. So we're going to be looking at that as well as part of the whole, you know, specific Downtown Revitalization Plans, to make sure that we do capture the right amount of parking for these types of uses.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: As Commissioner of Department of Planning and Development, in

essence our Building Department, what would you say
to someone who had the misconception that our
intention was to stop residential units over
businesses in our downtown?

COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: No. That's clearly not the case.

We do want to see them in the traditional downtown areas. We are from different parts of the community from the North Shore to the South Shore, and we know where those typical downtown communities take place.

So, for example, whether it's here in Oyster Bay or Downtown Broadway, we are still going to allow them through our Special Use Permit, but we want to see that type of development in our downtowns to support the businesses or be able to walk to the train station for transportation to and from places of work.

So, we definitely want to see it and we are committed to helping the applicants get through the process. A lot of times people hear the words "Special Use Permit" and they think that it's going to take several months.

One of the things when you look at the individual downtowns; for example, here in Oyster

2.1

Bay, as part of the Special Use Permit process, there is also a parallel path called the Site Plan Review Process.

That's typically when we look at landscaping, lighting, parking and so forth, buffer zones. Here in -- let's take specifically Downtown Oyster Bay, the buildings occupy the entire lot.

So, the Site Plan Process more or less gets pushed to the side because we will look at elevations and height, but we are not dealing with parking and setbacks and landscaping.

So, all those reviews that go back and forth, ultimately do not happen because your just dealing with the building at hand, so we are able to speed up that process.

So, you know -- again, people always say, how long does it take to get before the Town Board. When I meet with developers and their engineers, it's very simple. When an application is submitted, we always have comments. That's the process.

We go back and forth, but if we send out a comment letter and it takes two months for that letter to be addressed and resubmitted, well, that's two months added to the time.

And if we asked for ten items and they resubmit only resubmit five of the ten items, and we have to send another letter, and it takes another two months for that letter to come back, it adds to the time.

So, we've taken great strides over the past few years to really work with -- it's not only the developer, it's the engineer and the attorney and sometimes the applicant on the application that we go back and forth and that everybody understands what their roles are. So, when we do send out a comment letter and they submit, we try to get everyone to understand, don't submit in piecemeal, and it has been working, but it's time consuming and it's a lot of going back and forth, but it does work and we're able to process the applications a lot quicker.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: One of the conversations we've had in terms of changing and improving the Town of Oyster Bay is to cut that time down. We created same-day permits for a very long list of applications. Very quick permits, very quick followup and we're very impressed with that and I just want to continue to get the message across.

This continues our desire to build cool 1 2 downtowns where young people will want to live, 3 where it's close to railroad stations and we may --4 the community, after meeting with them, may want, 5 say, the same theme on the facade, the fronts of the building. This would be one of the ways to 6 7 enable a theme in the downtown and the 8 construction. 9 COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: Yes, 10 absolutely. That's absolutely correct. 11 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: But most 12 importantly, it will guarantee there will be more 13 public participation because now we have a venue, 14 that hearing, to better listen to the public's 15 wants and how they would like to see the downtowns 16 developed. 17 COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: Yes, that's 18 correct. 19 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Are there any 20 questions from anyone on the Board? Would anyone 2.1 like to ask any questions? 22 COUNCILMAN HAND: Commissioner, in 23 addition to the parking, we also -- I'm sorry. 24 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Go ahead, please.

COUNCILMAN HAND: In addition to the

parking, we also have the concern of Sanitation in a commercial zone.

How you can handle that?

COMMISSIONER MACCARONE:

I think all of you are familiar or remember the one application that was before the Town Board here in Oyster Bay and the issues of the Dumpster location. Those are all items that would come under the review as well as the purview of the Town Board hearing and any issues that the community may be having with this specific property.

isn't it fair to say that this particular change gives our Town Board more local control over these types of developments where we can invite the public to share their opinion rather than having these developers come in and do this by right?

COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: Absolutely,

COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: Would you also say that in terms of what vision Long Island has been doing in terms of smart growth and Downtown Revitalization, this particular amendment to our local code, doesn't that -- doesn't this really

2.4 1 help us in term of trying to achieve those goals of 2 smart growth? 3 COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: Yes. 4 absolutely, and it gives you, as the Board, the 5 opportunity to hear each of these applications. You're out in the public, you're meeting with the 6 7 constituents, you know what the people want, don't 8 want, how we can try to achieve a certain project 9 with the best concepts in mind. 10 COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: Thank you. 11 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Are there any 12 other questions? 13 (No verbal response.) 14 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you, 15 Commissioner. 16 COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: Thank you. 17 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Mr. Scalera, if 18 you'd like to wrap up on the hearing, to close. 19 MR. SCALERA: At this time, we've 20 presented everything we needed to present for the 2.1 hearing. We're going to keep the record open on 22 the hearing as we mentioned earlier, June 12th. 23 Supervisor, I know you want to mention 24 what particular website people can put in. 25 think --

25 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Publiccomment@ 1 2 oysterbay-ny.gov. I'll say that again. 3 Publiccomment, one word, 4 @oysterbay-ny.com. That is one of the ways to get 5 information. You can send your letter or e-mail to my office, to any of our Town Board members. 6 7 can send your correspondence to their office. 8 COUNCILWOMAN JOHNSON: Dot gov. 9 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: I'm sorry, did I 10 say dot --11 MR. LAMARCA: Dot gov. 12 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you very, 13 very much. I'm smiling under the mask. 14 That again is publiccomment@ 15 oysterbay-ny.gov, G-O-V, not dot com. 16 Thank you, Commissioner. 17 MR. SCALERA: So at this point the 18 hearing --19 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Force of habit. 20 MR. SCALERA: The hearing is complete 2.1 at this point in time but, obviously, the record 22 remaining open until June 12th, and I don't know if 23 there are any other papers or affidavits, 24 publication or correspondence, I'll leave that to 25 the Town Clerk.

26 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And that doesn't 1 2 necessarily mean that we're forced to vote on it on 3 June 12th, but this is at least the minimum time 4 that we want to give the public to comment on this 5 to ensure that everyone is heard. MR. SCALERA: Right. 6 7 So, the record remains open until June 8 12th and, of course, decision reserved because we 9 can -- we'll do that at a future date. 10 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: 11 Town Clerk, any correspondence? 12 MR. LaMARCA: Yes. 13 We have affidavits of postings and 14 publication. We have a letter from Executive 15 16 Director Meredith Maus from the Oyster Bay Main Street Association which has been distributed to 17 18 the Town Board and will become part of the official 19 record. 20 There is no other correspondence. 2.1 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you. 22 May I have a motion, please? 23 COUNCILWOMAN JOHNSON: Supervisor, I 24 make a motion that this public hearing be closed 25 and public comment period be open until June 12th

To date, we have paid down 15 the total capital debt of our Town by a net of 207 16 million dollars net less capital debt in this Town. Bonds reach a call date which allow us 17 18 through the legal process to refinance that bond at 19 a lower interest rate. We have gotten increases in 20 our outlook and our bond rating. 2.1 So, when a bond reaches that call date 22 and we have -- we're given the opportunity to 23 refinance and save money, we, of course, want to 24 take advantage of that.

So, we are refinancing some

2.1

\$58,240,000. We will be refinancing that in the month of August.

We expect -- we don't know what the bond rating -- I'm sorry, what the interest rates will be specifically in August. We do know that we have a financial audit coming out, being made public later on this month. We expect it will show a \$29 million surplus in the Town of Oyster Bay's operating budget.

To put that in perspective, at one point there was a deficit in that operating bulge as high as \$44 million. We have balanced the operating budget and now we have a \$29 million surplus which will increase our bond rating and bring down the cost of interest on the bonds.

We are aiming for saving \$4 million over the next eight years by refinancing and we're giving permission to go forward out to the market, if you will, to refinance this bond for the savings and that is, personally, very, very important to us. We are continuing to operate in a very financially prudent way to protect our taxpayers, to continue on without a tax increase and continue to show the public we're very serious about bringing this Town to the best financial shape it

has ever been in and we're getting there through this process.

So, thank you for the opportunity to speak about that. We also have a Resolution -- by the way, that was Resolution 294.

In the case of Resolution 297, we have been working diligently with our Board members in this administration on the remediation of the Grumman Navy Plume.

It's something that's been important for me for many, many years, but something that every single elected official in this Town has embraced and I really appreciate their work.

In order to better protect the community, we are in the process of working out an access agreement with a company, King Kullen, everyone knows of them in Bethpage, to access a part of the property to run a pipe through to keep it from being run through residential neighborhoods.

One of today's Resolutions, 297, authorizes a survey. The total cost of the survey is \$87,000. It's more than just a survey, but this reflects the cost of the professional services that have to take place before we can get this easement

and Grumman will reimburse the Town of Oyster Bay. 1 2 Of that \$87,000, they will reimburse us \$72,000 and 3 that is almost an 83 percent, 82.7 percent 4 reimbursement rate. Even better than what the 5 Federal government is doing for us on reimbursements of COVID costs. 6 7 So, we are happy to continue to get 8 these jobs done and protect our taxpayers at the 9 same time. 10 Are there any questions or comments 11 before we move on? 12 (No verbal response.) 13 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Seeing that no 14 one has indicated that they would like to ask a 15 question or comment, I will ask the Town Clerk, is 16 there any correspondence? 17 MR. location and I know that our Deputy Commissioner had agreed that that is something that we could look at.

So, although this policy doesn't specifically or explicitly permit offsite training, it doesn't also prohibit it. So, I would like us to think about that as we go forward that -- and to act upon that, that suggestion where there, you know, we could consider the possibility, a demonstration program at little to no cost to the Town and I have suggested using possibly some land at the Littauer Estate where we have a very secure, very serene area and do what can to see whether or not there is a possibility that some of these dogs can be rehabilitated and adoptable.
