SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Good morning, ladies and gentlemen and welcome to the Town of Oyster Bay's August 18, 2020 Town Board meeting.

My colleagues and I on the Town Board, as well as our Receiver of Taxes and Town Clerk, welcome you as we celebrate accomplished women in the Town of Oyster Bay and recognize the important milestones in women's history, including the fact that today is the 100th anniversary of the passage of the 19th Amendment giving women the right to vote.

(Clapping.)

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Leading us in prayer today, those of you who have not been to Board meetings don't yet know that when I came on Board in 2017, one of first changes we made was to include prayer to start every Board meeting and now --

(Clapping.)

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you. Thank you.

That's important to say that that came with the blessing of all of my colleagues, the elected officials in the Town, so I thank them as well.

So, leading us in prayer today is a rather amazing woman, Pastor Deborah Valentine, a minister with the Assembly of God who serves as the New York District Women's Representative for Long Island.

Reverend Valentine is a long-time resident of Long Island actively supports the community through a plethora of outreach including food pantries, visitations at hospitals, nursing homes, providing good counsel to all in her flock. We greatly appreciate her.

Reverend, the floor is yours.

(Whereupon, a prayer was recited by Pastor Deborah Valentine.)

(Whereupon, the Pledge of Allegiance was then recited, followed by a moment of silence.)

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: We're also taking the time today to recognize, along with health care heros, the essential workers in Town of Oyster Bay. Women and men in our town workforce who responded recently -- who have been responding throughout COVID. I've said this many times. We did not miss even one day of Sanitation pickup, of Highway work, of all the work as we kept our services up and running while adhering to the Guidelines for

safety. But our brave women and men came to work everyday throughout COVID and continue to keep the Town running and to continue to provide you, the people we work for, these essential services.

And they did it again --

(Clapping.)

employees here in the room but so many of employees hopefully have their computer tuned to Oysterbaytown.com where they're listening in on our Town Board meeting. We thank you, each and every one of you, for what you did throughout COVID, in some cases putting yourself on the line for our residents while we did do everything possible and continue to protect their safety.

It happened again on August 4th, when a tropical storm slammed the Town of Oyster Bay.

Nearly two weeks ago, 800 trees, full trees, fell in our town and thousands of branches. There was the same -- virtually, the same volume of trees and branches that fell during this storm, this tropical storm as fell during Superstorm Sandy. So it really puts in perspective the enormous job our Highway workers and employees had and they arose to the occasion.

To assist our residents, we informed them that living -- that those living on Town of Oyster Bay roadways could cut their trees and limbs and drag them to the curb, leave them curbside and we will pick them up. There is no need to pay someone to haul them away because we will continue to provide this service to rescue our residents.

In some cases, it was horrific the amount of trees that fell. Thank goodness no one was injured or seriously injured in the Town of Oyster Bay among our residents or workforce. We approximately two weeks away from the final clearing of all debris that's dragged to the curb.

So, we want to continue to get that message across to our residents. We commend our dedicated employees for their efforts in cleaning up the debris throughout the Town.

We commend all those on the telephone, all of those working in Administration and Communications for their work. And in the storm's aftermath, this Town Board opened charging stations and cooling centers for people without power. We also issued generator safety guidance to prevent senseless deaths to related to carbon monoxide poisoning from running generators accidently,

running generators improperly, running them indoors or in partially enclosed area such as garages or quite frankly, just too close to a home.

And, again, we are very happy that there were no deaths related to carbon monoxide poisoning and we'd like to thank Public Safety, among others, for their assistance.

Due to power and WiFi outages, we also joined with our Tax Receiver Jeffrey Pravato in urging New York State to extend last Monday's property tax payment deadline.

Last week I met with the Chairman of the Public Service Commission and we called for a greatly improved communication and performance.

We also stated that all future rate hikes should be put on hold until we determine how the over \$100 million spent since Superstorm Sandy to revitalize the system, how that was spent and analyze what the effect is and has been.

But moving on to a very positive topic and that's the celebration of women in the Town of Oyster Bay. Today we proudly celebrate Women of Distinction, women's equality and the 100th anniversary of women's suffrage.

(Clapping.)

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: In fact, we commemorate the centennial of the fight for women's rights being heard and ratified by our 19th Amendment in the United States.

Women have been involved in ensuring equal rights. They've paved the way for all other women, including the Rosie the Riveters that followed during World War II, following in their footsteps, being inspired by their work and they've made such a difference in the lives of others and that's why we're honoring just some of the many incredible women in the Town of Oyster Bay.

I, for one, am very proud. People will say Supervisor, you're a man. Why are you so connected to this issue?

Well, in my Sicilian family, with one or two strong-minded people, we have a story and I'll keep it brief, but I am so proud of my grandmother. The year was 1917, my grandmother, her sisters and some of the neighbors, the women in the neighborhood in Brooklyn got jobs working at the Brooklyn Navy Yards where they were placed, because of their skills, they were placed in the office of the commanding officer.

At the Brooklyn Navy Yards, they did

the clerical work, they did the ordering, they ran the office, they did the ordering of the parts and supplies needed to build the ships to win Wold War I.

During this time, my grandmother was processing paychecks on a typewriter. I have a photo of that old typewriter. You can imagine the old fan up in the corner, that metal fan was the only way they could keep cool. While processing paper -- these paper checks, she noticed that men who had just come there recently were getting paid more than she and the other women in the commanding officer's office, even though they had been there for quite some time and these men were new.

So during this Suffrage Movement, she clearly was part of that movement and she had the -- I'll use the Sicilian word -- the chutzpah to confront the commanding officer and why are these men getting so much more than we are. We've been here for two years now and they're new. The commanding officer calmly told her Jesse, that's because they enlisted. So grandma said, "Well, we want to be enlisted too."

And he laughed. He laughed at my
Sicilian grandmother. Big mistake. So what she
did is she organized the women in that office and

followed the role of incredible people like
Elizabeth Stanton and Susan B. Anthony because
that's what the timing was. That was the
motivation and the inspiration.

She organized the women in a work slowdown and the commanding officer was not going to meet his date to get those ships done that Washington needed done in order win World War I.

It was at this time in 1917 that the United States Congress finally got wise enough to realize that a place for women is not only in the home, not only in the business area, but in the Armed Forces.

(Clapping.)

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: The United States Congress acted to now grant the ability for women to serve in the Armed Forces because of my grandmother's leadership and that Sicilian chutzpah, my grandmother, I'm so proud to tell you, was the first woman in the New York Metropolitan area to be inducted into the United States Navy.

(Clapping.)

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: I'm so proud of my Grandma Jesse and that has sent the message and provided the motivation for both the women and the

men in our family to excel. And that's exactly what's going on with the women we are honoring today. They have set a message. They've done incredible things and in doing so -- in their variety of fields -- and in doing so, have set the bar for all other women to follow, men and women, for all of society to follow, in their chosen fields and in their work with the community. We are so proud of them.

So, this is really an inspirational day for me, for our colleagues on the Board, for all of our employees and all of the Town of Oyster Bay family. That fight for women's rights and women's suffrage began right here in New York State. A Women's Rights Convention took place in Seneca Falls and was organized by two amazing and influential leaders. Those names should sound very familiar to all of us, Elizabeth Cady Stanton and Susan B. Anthony. And that's why today we take this opportunity to honor two individuals with awards named in the honor of Susan B. Anthony and Elizabeth Cady Stanton, as they too are influential leaders making a tremendous difference.

Elizabeth Cady Stanton was certainly a leading figure of the early women's rights

movement. While many women involved in the movement at the time primarily focused on the right to vote, Stanton was a true trailblazer and her concerns covered the gamut of issues that were very problem and disrespectful to women then and throughout time.

These included women's parental and custody rights, property rights, employment and income rights, the issue of divorce and the economic health to the family to name but a few. She covered it all. The same could be said about our first honoree.

Juliana Terian. Let's start off giving her a hand.

(Clapping.)

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Juliana Terian is a leader in the Tristate region and in her industry. She is the president and CEO of the Long Island based Rallye Motor Corporation, an automobile group which includes several local dealerships. This 600-employee company has consistently ranked among the top dealerships in the Tri-State Region, as well as in our nation, and that takes a lot to achieve at this level.

Juliana took on the reigns as President

and CEO in 2002. As anyone can imagine, this is no easy feat. She navigated through what many would consider to be a nontraditional role. She overcame obstacles. The obstacles that any man would have Juliana took on these obstacles and succeeded over and over and over and, quite frankly, it's one of many reasons that we're so proud of Juliana.

But she also found balance. She worked tirelessly to overcome whatever was in her path. She took the legacy left behind by her husband and she built on that legacy tremendously, putting her own stamp on it and paving her own way. She set out on a mission and she has been directing this company to new heights and new successes, setting an example, a fine example, and showing women everywhere what it means to achieve, that if you believe, you can achieve. That's a very important example for young women, for women of all ages, but for all of us, for all of us. It's an amazing example.

An architect by training, she's put her background to good use when it comes to designing new facilities, including one dealership that was made completely environmentally friendly. In fact, she makes environmental initiatives a priority in

planning facilities and encourages designers and architects to always look for sustainable ways to protect Mother Nature, perhaps the strongest of all women.

As she continued to grow the business, she supported her hundreds of employees but introducing new, innovative and very helpful training programs. She also strengthened opportunities for women in the company. Her focus on promoting women in the workplace is quite frankly inspirational to us all. Juliana has truly set an example for all women.

Juliana Terian, the Town of Oyster Bay is pleased to honor you with the Elizabeth Cady Stanton Leadership Award.

Would you please step forward? (Clapping.)

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: I will ask my colleagues to please step forward and we can do this together?

(Whereupon, the presentation of the Women of Distinction Elizabeth Cady Stanton
Leadership Award was bestowed upon Juliana Terian at this time.)

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Well-deserved and

you already have made us tremendously proud. We know you will continue to do that.

Our next honoree is the recipient of our very prestigious Susan B. Anthony Leadership Award.

Just like our last honoree, this woman has enriched the lives of so many and has inspired women to advance, to lead and to make a difference for others in the business world, as well as in government mas well as in volunteer service. And that person I'm very proud to call my friend, that person is someone special to all of us in the Town of Oyster Bay and that role model for so many reasons is Bernadette Castro.

(Clapping.)

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Not a lot of you are as life experienced as I am. It's a nice way of saying it's old, but some of you may be familiar with the furniture enterprise Castro Convertibles, but you may not know that Bernadette Castro's involvement in the company started long before she became its chairwoman and CEO.

Bernadette actually became very involved with the family business at only four years old, amazing. When she famously -- it's

true -- I remember the commercials. When she famously became the most televised child in America, at that time, after appearing on the brand's iconic television commercials. So easy, even a child can open the Castro Convertible, and then she never looked back.

She remained involved ever since, improving the brand and ultimately taking the reigns of the company following her father's passing and eventually relaunching the legendary brand.

While her involvement in the business world is something to be recognized, honored and a tremendous achievement on its own, she did not stop there. She continued on as a trailblazer.

Bernadette served as Commissioner of
the New York State Office of Parks, Recreation and
Historic Preservation, a cabinet post she held with
the Governor for twelve years. Both then
Assemblyman Steve Labriola and then myself as a
State Assemblymen, we were both very lucky to serve
with you and assist the State.

Under her tenue, the State preserved one million acres of land. I have to applaud that on its own.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Those million acres are still preserved today. Her vast preservation efforts help protect drinking water and secured thousands of acres of forest space for the many species of fauna, flora and just making a tremendous difference.

She also secured the U.S. Open for the Bethpage State Park. This was the first time the U.S. Open had ever been held at a public golf course anywhere in America. Think about that.

With these --

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Yes, absolutely, with exclusive golf clubs around -- courses around America, Bernadette Castro was able to convince them to come to a public course on Long Island, thank you, in the Town of Oyster Bay, thank you, a little partial.

Because of your drive because you knew you had a product, a great product and because you made that course and our State Parks Department the best that it had ever been. That's a real big deal.

Her great work earned her an

appointment as Vice Chair of the Advisory Counsel on Historic Preservation by the United States

President George W. Bush.

Her efforts were also recognized by the National Recreation of Parks Association which designated the New York State Parks system naming it the best parks system in the United States because of you, Bernadette Castro.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: We would be here all day if we listed all of the accolades, but I want to specifically -- I think Steve Labriola and I and our whole Board and quite frankly, all of Long Island, wants to thank you for bringing the Air Show to Long Island. We love the Air Show at Jones Beach, also one of the hallmarks of your work.

Bernadette's passion for protecting the environment extends to her community and charity work as well, including working with great organizations such as Tomorrow's Hope, the Interfaith Nutrition Network and the New York Landmark's Conservancy, just to name but a few.

Bernadette Castro, it's truly an honor, not only is it an honor to recognize you for all of

the great accomplishments you achieved, but just as important to thank you. It was honor for Steve and I to serve with you in New York State, and it's an honor just as it is have to Juliana here, it is a tremendous honor to have Bernadette Castro here as well.

(Whereupon, the presentation of the Women of Distinction Susan B. Anthony Leadership Award was bestowed upon Bernadette Castro at this time.)

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And thank you to Angela Susan Anton for joining us. Thank you for

all of your leadership in the communications field and as a business owner and one hopes two things, A, that you continue on to get the news out and B, you give a little coverage to this event.

Thank you for being with us.

Ladies and gentlemen, we now move on to our Women of Distinction program to honor all of those, and for those who don't know, the Town of Oyster Bay has been running an annual Women of Distinction program which is typically celebrated with a special event in the Springtime.

Due to COVID-19, we were forced to modify this program this year, but we were not going to miss out in the very important program in honoring special women in our town.

5 COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: 1 Here. 2 MR. LaMARCA: Councilwoman Maier? 3 COUNCILWOMAN MAIER: Present. 4 MR. LaMARCA: Councilwoman Walsh, I 5 think we are trying to get on the phone as well. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: 6 Thank you. 7 While we are waiting for the councilmen 8 to join us --9 COUNCILWOMAN JOHNSON: Supervisor, 10 before -- while we're waiting for Councilmen, I 11 just want to say great job our Parks Department did 12 with Summer camp. 13 We had over 1,100 kids come through, 14 yes, 1,100 kids and 250 counselors and really not a 15 bump in the road. They did an amazing job keeping 16 everybody separate, apart, distance as needed to 17 be. The kids really finally got to get out and bet 18 kids and have a good time and help the parents out 19 getting them out of the house. I couldn't be 20 prouder with our Commissioner Joe Pinto and our 2.1 staff did an amazing job and they got the pool to 22 open, too. People said it couldn't be done, but 23 they did. 24 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: It's been an 25 amazing number of months and we thank all of our

So seniors all 8 got to graduate in-person at a drive-in graduation. 9 Then we offered up equipment the Town has for 10 graduation ceremonies that took place in other 11 locations where they needed equipment. MR. PRAVATO: Answering 15,000 phone calls and 2,500 e-mails, collecting almost three-quarters of a billion dollars.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you.

They did a phenomenal job in terms of all of their responsibilities. And remember, the Town collects the property taxes for all different municipalities, for Nassau County and for the school district, for water districts, for all of the different -- for libraries -- for all of the different entities and then, by law, distributes that money out. So it's a huge responsibility, not easy to do under COVID-19 conditions. Much like all our other departments, they really did a phenomenal job. We've been pleased with the outcome. Very, very low number. I believe the

lowest number of COVID incidences of any municipality on Long Island. We're very, very proud of the job that the staff had been doing.

And as if COVID-19 wasn't a big enough issue to deal with, we got that tropical storm.

This tropical storm took down virtually as many trees as came down in Superstorm Sandy, so it's been an enormous task to go and clean up.

clear the roads, to clear the wires so that the power could be restored to get that issue out of the way. Then we made a commitment to our residents, any wood, tree limbs, whatever it is that is related to the storm that came down, the residents cut them, dragged them to the curb and the Town continues to pick up all of that debris free of charge as a special service to our residents.

Good afternoon, Supervisor Saladino, Honorable Members of the Board.

My name is Kevin O'Brien, O'Brien Law P.C., 462 Sagamore Avenue, East Williston.

Before I begin my presentation, I just want to commend the Town on the Women of Distinction. I have had a long history with the Town of Oyster Bay and I remember a number of years ago I nominated one of the women -- I believe she worked in the Zoning Board of Appeals at the time who were one of the Women of Distinction. And I just think it's a great thing to recognize on an annual basis. Keep it up. It's terrific.

MR. LaMARCA: Thank you.

MR. O'BRIEN: Now, on my presentation,

I am here -- I'm joined with my team today. I have

Christopher Tartaglia. Christopher Tartaglia is

from High Point Engineering. He's a licensed

professional engineer. They are the design

professionals who have prepared the plans which are

before the Board and have ushered a lot of these

plans through DPW, as well as through Planning and

through Environmental.

I also have Andrew Villari. He is with Stonefield Engineering, also licensed professional engineer, traffic engineer who prepared traffic impact analysis and responded to some of the comments from Environmental and he's here to answer any questions the Board may have regarding traffic, as well as just give a brief presentation that will outline this report.

This is an application involving. As was noted. Bolla Operating Long Island Corp. which is the petitioner and they are the lessee of the property and Ates Azra Realty Corp. which is the property owner who has consented to the application before the Board.

The property is located at 630 Main

Street in the Unincorporated Hamlet of Farmingdale.

It's located at the corner of Main Street and

Lambert and by Motor Parkway. So, it's an

interesting and unusual intersection over there.

The property has got a frontage of approximately 100 feet on Main Street and approximately 150 feet on Lambert for a total of just shy of 15,000 square feet. It's also known as Section 48, Block 512, Lot 72 on the Nassau County

2.1

Land and Tax map. It is currently located in the neighborhood, NB, Neighborhood Business District.

The nature of the application before the Board is to rezone the property from NB Zoning District to a G, General Business District. You need a special permit to continue to operate the premises as a gasoline service station while substituting the repair-oriented use to a food mart type of use.

The plan that is before the Board currently. Let me just give you a brief history of this particular location. It's been operating as a gasoline service station for almost 70 years back. In about 1941, there was an application that went to the Zoning Board of Appeals. They have jurisdiction over gasoline service stations at the time. That application was granted.

Ultimately, I think there was a

Certificate of Occupancy Number 52-6873 was issued

August 27, 1953, to operate as a gasoline service

station. The property has continued to operate as

a gasoline service station from that time to this

date. There have been a number of different

changes in the industry as well as changes in some

of the requirements for operation of a service

station.

2.1

As it's currently improved, it is -
I'll describe it -- it's currently existing -- what

we refer to as a two-bay repair oriented service

station. There are three -- well, there are two

pump islands. One pump island has two multiproduct

dispensers. Third pump island has one and there's

a canopy which goes over one of the -- I'm sorry,

goes over the pump island with two of the

dispensers and that's the one that essentially runs

parallel to Main Street.

There are two curb cuts on Main Street and there are two curb cuts on Lambert. There's really no landscaping that exists at the site at this particular time. It's currently operating — it had a metamorphosis of different operators, but it had been taken over a couple of years ago while the application has been pending by Bolla Operating Long Island Corp. and is running as a Mobile service station at the moment.

There -- at the beginning of the application, there may be references in some of the application paperwork regarding the removal and replacement of underground gasoline storage tanks.

The Board may be familiar with the fact that in

2.1

Nassau County, there was a requirement that, you know, way back in the day, you have steel underground gasoline tanks with single wall fiberglass underground gasoline storage tanks and then the County came up with requirements that it must be double wall fiberglass underground gasoline storage tanks.

During the pendency of this application from when we first submitted it to the Town of Oyster Bay to the time we are now, the tanks were sort of tapping on the expiration date of the County requirements, so with the appropriate permits, we had to go to -- it used to be the Nassau County Fire Marshal's office, now the Health Department and obtain the appropriate approvals from them to remove and replace the underground gasoline storage tanks with the new tanks.

So, we currently have two 15,000 underground gasoline storage tanks, one compartmentalized with 8,000 gallons of premium and with 7,000 gallons of diesel. Environmentally, there had been a spill number in the past. That had all been addressed and now there is no further action from the State DOT. So all the underground systems, you know, are compliant with all the Local

2.1

and State rules and regulations.

So, why are we here and what are we proposing.

Bolla has taken over -- well, has a lease on the premises, and the Board, you know, I would suspect would be familiar with Bolla Operating Corp. inasmuch as there are 14 locations throughout the Town of Oyster Bay operating as Bolla Marts, and I've got to be honor with you, I mean I've had a number of different clients, I can't say enough about this particular client.

nothing short of spectacular; their landscaping, their operation, their maintenance. I mean. It's embarrassing, I have to say the restrooms are better than the restrooms in my house. If you go into any restroom in any Bolla, it's either granite or marble from top to bottom. They are cleaned on a regular -- it's like their signature. I mean, they're absolutely phenomenal.

So they're coming in and what they would like to do is raise and rebuild this location, remove the existing two-bay single-story building, replace it with a Bolla Mart building, a single-story 1,800 square feet. We've already

2.1

removed the tanks. We would be replacing the pump islands with four pump islands. One multiproduct dispenser island with a canopy over the islands as you see. There would be a -- the trash -- there will be a trash enclosure, new fencing and landscaping. So the whole place from top to bottom to underground would be replaced.

So while we're here before the Board, well, the correct Zoning district for gasoline service stations is the G District in the Town of Oyster Bay and we are in the end B, so we can continue operating as a nonconforming use, but when you make a change like this, the appropriate thing to do is change the zone and the other reason to change zone is just to make these improvements to this particular location.

We're not desirous of any other uses that might be located in the G District. Now, it's an interesting area when you take a look at that particular pocket of Farmingdale. It has a mixture — it has almost every zone that the Town has. You have contiguous ones. We have R1-7 which is a Residential Zoning District with single-family homes on 7,000 square feet. We've got NB. We've got G. We've got light industrial. We used to

2.1

2.0

have -- if my recollection is correct, across the way from us, is the old Liberty Plant, which is now a Stop & Shop. We've got -- the Town has a beautiful park, a fantastic park right down the block from us. You've got commercial places, you've got residential and you have pharmacies and restaurants and the like. So that's kind of the mixture and we're close to the train tracks right down the block from 109.

So what we're proposing is to eliminate the repair oriented use to move towards the Bolla Mart with the four pump islands, a canopy over it. If you see, we've coordinated with Planning and with Environmental. It's been, quite frankly, a long road to get here because we had to go through the Nassau County -- since we're on a County roadway, pursuant to 239F of the General Municipal Law, we had to coordinate with the County Department of Public Works, so that's quite a feat unto itself.

So there's been quite a metamorphosis from the beginning to the end. Like if you take a look at the curb cuts we have over here presently -- what we're proposing, I should say. We had two on each roadway. Now, we're going to have one

2.1

distanced away from the corner where there was no landscaping -- I mean, besides the restrooms, I think one of Bolla's other trademarks are or is the landscaping. They are incredible. But as good as we think we are, you know, sometimes we need the input from others. We've had input from Environmental as to different types of varieties that they would like to see. We do seasonal landscaping and change it out as different seasons progress. So we've got incredible landscaping. And we have, you know, all new fencing. So from top to bottom, this would be a brand-new location. I've probably spoken enough.

So, I do have any engineers here with me, Chris Tartaglia. If there are questions of a technical nature and we'll briefly have Andrew Villari, who is a licensed PE, prepared a report and I was just thinking perhaps -- I think he's appeared before this Board before as a traffic engineer and perhaps he can just give a brief outline and summary of his report to see what, if any, impact that there might be on surrounding -- on the traffic on the intersections and the like.

Andrew, if you wouldn't mind, just perhaps if you want to give me your reports, and if

2.1

you could perhaps just state some of your conclusions that are in these reports and the basis for those conclusions, that would be terrific.

MR. VILLARI: Good afternoon.

For the record, my name is Andrew Villari, V-I-L-A-R-I. I'm the Project Manager at Stonefield Engineering and Design.

I have provided testimony in front of this Board previously as an expert witness in the field of traffic and transportation engineering.

So, my office has prepared a traffic study, and like Mr. O'Brien mentioned, we've gone through the Town's Environmental Review. It's dated March 14, 2020.

The application is in front of this

Board for change of zone, but what comes with it is
a significant improvement. We bring a legacy gas
station, is what I'll call it, up to current
standards, up to modern amenities.

So, there is an addition of a convenience store. That's very common. You see that at a lot of gas stations nowadays. It's a modest building, only 1,800 square feet. So, when I view this application, I see that convenience store offering as an additional amenity for the

2.1

existing customer base here. We're not really proposing anything that's significantly new.

There are gas pumps on the property right now. There is a modest increase from six fueling positions today to eight in the future. But, like I said, this is just an additional amenity that's very common throughout the Bolla brand.

We've done a number of studies at Bolla markets throughout Oyster Bay, throughout Nassau County. Actually, what we find is the minority of people coming to this site are going for the convenience store only. There is almost 85 percent of the traffic that goes in and out of the Bolla market is going to use a component of the gas. There's only a minority that would be going just for the convenience store. So the net increase in traffic in this case will be modest because you may be going to the convenience store, but you're already going there for gas anyway not. You're an additional vehicle that's added to the site. You're not an additional vehicle that's added to the public roadway network.

Also with gas stations and convenience stores, you have the concept of pass-by traffic.

2.1

2.4

These stations are conveniently located where people go to them on their way to work, on their way to school. You may be a resident that lives in this area maybe southwest of the site. You pass by on the way to 109 in the morning and you stop and get gas and you keep going the same way you would normally go. With or without the station here, you'd be going through that intersection, so it's not a significant increase in traffic volume.

Another one of the benefits of this application is consolidation of access points. We did go through Nassau County 239F process. The access points on Main Street have been consolidated where there'll be additional signage and striping that helps motorists figure out where they need to go. There is also a consolidation of access points on the side street Lambert as well.

The amount of parking that we're providing onsite is commensurate with other Bolla stations throughout the Town of Oyster Bay. We've done significant studies to prove that the amount of parking that we're providing onsite would be sufficient albeit after this Board we'll be in front of the Zoning Board for a parking variance.

So, with that, we come to the

25 1 conclusion of the study. It's a dense study. The 2 conclusion of the study is that there would not be 3 a significant adverse impact on the traffic 4 operations in the area for the couple of reasons 5 that I mentioned previously. That concludes my presentation. 6 I'd be 7 happy to answer any questions. 8 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Councilman, you 9 start off, please. 10 COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: Yeah, sure. 11 Not having the study right in front of 12 me, how many trips are generated currently as it 13 currently operates? 14 MR. VILLARI: So what we did to 15 establish to project how much current traffic is --16 COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: During peak. 17 MR. VILLARI: During peak, of course. 18 To account for how much traffic this 19 site currently generates, we look at what the 20 industry standard ITE manual say, Institute Traffic 2.1 Engineers, how much traffic that would generate for 22 six fueling positions and then also a service 23 station with two bays. 24 Today in the morning and evening in 25 peak hours, there is -- this is on Page 3, by the

2.6 1 way, there's somewhere between 60 and 80 trips per 2 hour during the commuting peaks. 3 COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: So then after 4 development, you're expecting an increase of about 5 38, you're saying there? MR. VILLARI: That's correct. 6 7 COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: Give or take. 8 That's the morning. 9 In the evening, it's significantly 10 less? 11 MR. VILLARI: That's correct, and 12 again, that's a total increase and a component of 13 that traffic is pass-by and it's recognized 14 throughout the industry that the majority of 15 traffic that goes to sites like these are already 16 on the roadway. They're comprised of pass-by traffic. 17 18 COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: In your study, 19 your proposed hours of operation for this -- for 20 the new development would be what? What are the 2.1 hours of operation that you're anticipating? 22 MR. VILLARI: I'm not sure I'm the best 23 person to answer that question for you. MR. O'BRIEN: I certainly can. 2.4 25 Can I answer it from here?

27 1 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: So long as the 2 stenographer can hear you and the public can hear 3 you. 4 MR. O'BRIEN: Sure. 5 We would like the ability to operate 24 hours, and just to see how the demand is at this 6 7 particular location. 8 If the demand doesn't warrant it, you 9 know, we would certainly reduce, but the desire 10 would be to operate 24 hours. 11 COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: Well, just -- I'm 12 sorry, Supervisor, I know you want to ask a 13 question. 14 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: No, go ahead. 15 COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: If there are 14 16 stations in the Town of Oyster Bay, how many of 17 those are operating 24 hours? 18 MR. O'BRIEN: I believe most of them 19 are, if not all. 20 COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: Most, if not all? 2.1 MR. O'BRIEN: Yes. 22 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Councilwoman, did 23 you have a question? 24 COUNCILWOMAN MAIER: Is it currently 24 25 hours as it is?

MR. O'BRIEN: I believe it is. I was there as a matter of fact even last night. But once again, I think depending upon business is, you know, what they do sometimes certain times of the year might be more busy, certain seasons may be more busy, but right now, it's operating 24 hours.

COUNCILWOMAN MAIER: I'm very familiar how they do their setups. I have one that's not too far from me that just opened within the last month. That one is much larger than the proposed one here. I think they have a lot more service stations, more pumps.

This one they're proposing four or six?

MR. O'BRIEN: Four pump islands with

one multiproduct dispenser per island, but what

that will translate into from traffic requirements,

is because they'll say you can fuel a motor vehicle

on each side of the pump island, so they'll call

that two fuelling positions.

So, if you've got four pumps, they say it's eight fuelling positions, because you can gas up a car on each side and some of the other ones that you may see throughout the Town of Oyster Bay, throughout the Island will have as many as six pumps or eight pumps which could be, you know,

2.1

twelve fuelling positions or sixteen fuelling positions. Here, we don't have it. Here, we have --

how much time you think the average person spends here, knowing if you do put the market in, I do think they do a great job. It's a beautiful presentation; although, I've not been in the restrooms, so I don't know if they have marble in there. I know the one near where I live, they have self-serve. They have prepared sandwiches. It's beautifully done. I would imagine that someone that just goes to pump their gas would spend a lot more time there in the convenience store.

Have you taken a look at that?

MR. VILLARI: Yes. This is on the smaller end of the Bolla buildings. It's only 1,800 square feet.

There wouldn't be any additional food operators in this space because sometimes you're mentioning there could be a frozen yogurt. That's not envisioned for this.

COUNCILWOMAN MAIER: Okay.

Thank you.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Councilman Hand?

30 1 COUNCILMAN HAND: Mr. Villari, in your 2 professional opinion, could you please give us the 3 nature of the accidents that occurred that show 36 4 on Page 5 of your report, 36 motor vehicle 5 accidents at Main and Motor and then you have four more at Motor and Lambert. 6 7 Can you shed some color on that? 8 MR. VILLARI: Absolutely. 9 You're talking about the accident 10 analysis that my office has conducted. It's on Page 6, I believe you're 11 12 looking at, right? 13 COUNCILMAN HAND: Page 5, yeah, Page 5 14 and 6, correct. 15 MR. VILLARI: Got it. 16 Right so we conducted accident analysis 17 to see what the existing trends are at the 18 intersection next to us, and what we look for is, 19 are there severe accidents that occur, what manner 20 do they occur in and how frequent are they 2.1 occurring in. 22 So we look at a period of three years, 23 right? So this may seem like there's a significant 24 number of collisions, but it happens over three 25 years. So if you look at it that way, it's about

an accident a month. Also in the context of things, there's about 20,000 vehicles that go through that intersection on a daily basis. So over three years, that's -- I've equated it to almost 23 million vehicles that go through that corridor, and as you can see, there is a really small number of accidents that do occur. And it's an inopportune thing that does occur, and that's why sometimes they're called accidents, you can't control everything. But also what I look at here is what is the most common type of collision, right? So we're at a signalized intersection and the most common type of accident is a rear-end. That's very common throughout the industry. You know, people react to the yellow light differently. Me, differently than any one of you Members of the Board.

What we see here is a very standard intersection across Long Island where you have millions of vehicles that go through there and unfortunately, yes, accidents do occur.

COUNCILMAN HAND: Thank you.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Any other

questions from any of the Board members?

COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: I have just one

Street, so if you turn in off of Main Street, you have actually have to make another turn to get into the pump and get parallel with where you are. As you can see on the exhibit, the pumps would actually be reoriented where they're perpendicular with Main Street.

So right when you turn into the property all you have to do is pull straight forward into the pumps. And that's part of what I was calling before a modern design that could accommodate those larger vehicles like you mentioned.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: So all the curb cuts are both ingress and egress; there's not an ingress only or egress only that would stop someone from being able come in from one curb cut and exit from another?

MR. VILLARI: So the driveways on Main Street one would be ingress only and one will be egress only.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: When you took that into consideration, did you consider turning radiuses and the ability for someone who is trying to negotiate a trailer --

hours is permitted.

Again, this is a Neighborhood Business Zone. Across the street, we do have GB and across on Motor Avenue, as you know, we have the light industrial zone, as well as where Stop & Shop is, but this property does abut the two, you know, residential zones, the R1-7 zone, so if the Board were to look favorable upon this you should definitely look at the hours of operation and because it's not listed on the specific Section of code where we do list the roads, you would have to also grant them that 24-hour use, and to my knowledge, we don't have the 24-hour or previous Boards have never deviated from that.

In fact, two years ago I believe or a year and a half ago, we had one on Merrick Road where this Board heard the application and it was deemed to limit the hours of operations because it

2.1

abuts residential properties.

But I will say this, the Bolla operations, as counselor had indicated, they are a topnotch facility. This is a good improvement to the site. We never had problems with landscaping lighting, any type of garbage disposal issues. They do run a very clean operation.

So when you have the opportunity to upgrade this facility, we do look towards that. We have our park, we have Stop & Shop, that whole area. This is an opportunity to upgrade the area, but, again, if you were to look to grant the change of zones, you could also limit future uses as part of a Covenant and Restriction as Councilman Labriola had indicated. You know, maybe you want to look at some other Covenants on the property. So if per se in ten, fifteen years the property does change from gas station to another type of use, because it's abutting the residential zones, you want to also look to the future as well.

COUNCILMAN LABRIOLA: Commissioner, I would agree with you the Bolla operation is apparently impressive enough to keep all the residents from objecting to this and they see it as an improvement, there's no doubt, based on the fact

2.1

what the applicant's attorney has presented to us on the record.

But I do notice that back in 2004, I think it's 2004, from my recollection, that there was a similar application made and withdrawn to change this zone. I don't know -- there is no backup tell me why that happened.

COMMISSIONER MACCARONE: No, there was never a hearing. I guess there was an application that was submitted, but at the time, the Board chose to not entertain the application.

Mr. Supervisor, after you were appointed or elected, I'm not sure which one, you and John Bishop made a statement on the record and you told the public that you were going to publish a link on the Town's website giving the residents access by putting in the name of their road and being able to determine what their road was rated. You had promised the public that over two years ago and I still do not see that on the website and I would appreciate maybe that Resolution 425 maybe you can publish that on the website and start -- and start that process.

Resolution 430, tree removal, especially in light of I just came from the Nassau County Hearing yesterday where PSE&G was on the hot seat in Nassau County.

I pointed out at that hearing yesterday that it's unfortunate that PSE&G has to depend upon Nassau County and the towns and I'd like to know if you can, somebody can tell us what's the responsibilities -- somebody told me last night that -- that it's totally Nassau -- it's totally PSE&G's responsibility to trim the trees, that all the liability is on PSE&G to make sure that trees

don't fall on their wires, and I'm wondering if
that's true or not.

Resolution 432, the Hampton Inn location, 120 Jericho Turnpike.

A couple of things on that, in case you're not aware of it, the Jericho opposition to this homeless shelter, justifiably so, in a lot reasons, they have hired their own attorney. They hired a very capable attorney named Amy Marion who I happen to have met, and I'm wondering why the Town -- I understand it's the Town's obligation to enforce Zoning, but I'm wondering why the taxpayers have to pay for an outside law firm on a basic land use Zoning issue.

I would think that most of -- a lot of what the Town does has to do with land and Zoning issues. We have ten very astute and capable attorneys, two of them are sitting right over there by the door, and I put in a recommendation to promote Mr. Frank Scalera to Town Attorney since he's obviously been doing the job as Deputy Town Attorney, but with the capabilities that we have, how could we not have a Town Attorney to handle a normal Zoning issue? Why do we have to spend taxpayer money and go outside to a Garden City law

firm for a Zoning issue? It just doesn't make any sense to me. If we don't have an attorney on staff that is capable of handling a land and Zoning issue, well, then we should get one. Why are wasting money on outside attorneys?

The other point I want to make on this is that I'm really surprised at the position that you've injected yourself into because there are other Zoning issues in the immediate area of the Hampton Inn that you have not treated the same way that you are publicly treating this homeless shelter.

For instance, over a year and a half ago, the Milleridge Inn was cited with 18 criminal charges and code violations that are still tied up in court; yet you didn't seek any stop operate restaurant order for the Milleridge Inn, and they had a lot more serious violations. Some were criminal charges between Milleridge Ventures and KIMCO Development.

Why didn't you issue a stop restaurant order on the Milleridge Inn? Why are you so focused on this particular location? Is it because -- is it because the owner of the Jeep dealership next door, I believe, is the one who you're going

to vote on today to rent car space on 150 Miller Place, which I'm going get to in a second? Is it because -- are you stopping the homeless shelter because you want to be able to give the Jeep dealership next door the opportunity to possibly take over that land? Are you trying to aid them? Is it really about helping the Jericho residents or is it about helping the Jeep dealership next door that wants that land?

150 Miller Place, I read the backup and this is

There is a very clear and specific purpose for the Zoning codes and the Building codes; namely, the preservation and protection of the health, safety and welfare of the residents and, more particularly, the individuals who will be using the property.

I think that we can all agree that it would be derelict, if not reckless and improper, if we turned a blind eye to the fact that this intended population of 80 families at this property and there's been no oversight whatsoever with respect to the Building and Safety codes. We have no idea whether or not there was proper electrical, whether there was proper fire egress, whether the lighting was proper, whether there were push bars on the exits, so in the unfortunate event of a fire, that the inhabitants of the premises could get out of the property uninhibited. These are all the types of things and many other issues that we look at that, the Commissioner of Planning and Development and her team look at, when an applicant comes forward through the proper channels and in the proper way to build and construct within the Town of Oyster Bay.

So we went to court and we explained to the Judge that this was a property owner who did not do you what any other ordinary reasonable property owner/business owner or operator of property would do, which is come and consult with the Town and seek the necessary approvals, both on the Building and Safety front and the Zoning front.

So, as it stands now, the Temporary
Restraining Order is in place. By way of that
Temporary Restraining Order, we were able to access
the property with our Code inspectors, our Building
inspectors, our Multiple Residents inspectors, our

property.

These are exactly the types of reasons that we have the Building and Zoning code because, again, you can't allow people to occupy a building that is uninspected and not up to State code.

Just as a further point, I mention that the defendant in the action, the landowner went to the Appellate Division Second Department seeking to have stay, that TRO, vacated and The Court declined to vacate that TRO recognizing the propriety of the TRO and the express need of the TRO to preserve the health, safety and welfare of the Town, its residents and the intended inhabitants of that facility.
