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Town Board meetings, I'm very proud to say when we took over in 2017, we added a very important component to begin each Town Board meeting, and that is to begin our meetings with prayer, and we ask religious leaders from every walk of life to join us to bring a more ecumenical spirit to the Town of Oyster Bay.

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SUPERVISOR SALADINO: So, folks, before beginning our meeting, we have some announcements to make that relate to the important initiatives that the Town of Oyster Bay is currently involved with.

The Town's fifth annual DVD collection drive is underway for the entire month of November. It's a unique program that supports our servicemen and women, and also brightens the lives of children affected by cancer at local hospitals and medical centers.

This year's collection sites include the main lobby here at Town Hall North and Town Hall South in Massapequa.

We all thank everyone in advance for supporting this great program, which will serve as an important reminder to our troops that they're greatly appreciated and also to our local hospitalized children that they are always in our hearts. So clear out those DVDs at the house, and please consider donating them to these very worthy causes.

Also joining us this morning is Keith Scott, who we congratulate on his new role with Family and Children's Association. Keith is now

overseeing all grant funding initiatives.

The Family and Children's Association is a not-for-profit organization that is dedicated to providing help and hope to Long Island's most vulnerable children, family, seniors, and communities. They reach more than 30,000 Long Islanders every year through a comprehensive array of services across 50 programs.

Keith, congratulations. We always appreciate when you're here. We appreciate all the important educational services you've provided, not only with the Town of Oyster Bay, but with the many organizations -- the -- not many, but the very important organizations that you have worked with, and, again, it's an honor to have you here, and, I believe, you would like to address us.

MR. SCOTT: Good morning.

Thank you so much, Supervisor.

Thank you, Town Board.

It's been a pleasure working with everyone over the past four years. I've worked with many of you individually as well on different campaigns to really support the Town and support Nassau County as a whole.

I just want to take a couple of moments

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to really introduce Family and Children's

Association even though I know some of you have

worked with them for a number of years.

Family and Children's Association, or FCA, is one of the oldest non-profits here on Long Island. We've been around for nearly 140 years serving vulnerable families. We have services -- a wide array of services serving over 30,000 Long Islanders a year from mental health services, from addiction services, we have a huge seniors network to serve our vulnerable seniors.

As many of you know, Nassau County has the largest -- one of the largest aging populations in the country as far as seniors, so we're trying to assist with efforts to really make sure seniors are able to age in place and stay in the town that they love.

As we know, prices keep going up and up and up. It's difficult for many, so we're trying to advert that and provide free services to seniors as much as possible.

In addition to that, we've seen the aftermath of the pandemic, and we're starting to see even more of that. We're really trying to address certain gaps in our system from mental

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health to addiction and others. We know adolescents and others are struggling at an all-time high due to just the wide array of effects all of us are experiencing, so we're trying to address that, trying to make sure that individuals with children who are struggling have the free support they need from our services and just to really be there for the Town.

So I just ask if there's anything

Family and Children's Association can do for the

Town, we are here, and thank you for your support

over the years, and I look forward to continuing

our really helpful relationship.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Well, please count on the fact that this relationship will continue. Your organization provides very valuable services, and we will always partner with you in an effort to help our residents of this Town.

We have a Town Citation for you, too, to wish you an enormous congratulations on your new and expanding role and your leadership in helping our residents and all of Long Island.

COSCHIGNANO: Good morning, 10 Supervisor, and Members of the Town Board. 11 On behalf of Dream Car Restorations, 12 LLC and 45 South Service Road CW NF, LLC, 13 Elisabetta Coschignano with the law firm Sahn, 14 Ward, Braff, Koblenz, 333 Earle Ovington Boulevard, 15 Uniondale, New York 11553. 16 So with me today are Chris Mazzilli and 17 Dave Bloom, principals of Dream Car Restorations; 18 Philip Wachtler, principal of 45 South Service; 19 Mark Pilotta, Key Civil Engineering, to present our 20 site plan; and Wayne Muller from R&M Engineering to 2.1 present a traffic impact study to you this morning. 22 Prior to beginning my formal 23 presentation, our team we would like to express our 24 thanks to the Town Board, its staff, the Department 25 of Planning and Development and their staff, and

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all the Town departments related in one way or another for the level of attention they consistently provide to all the applicants.

The subject premises is a 6.74-acre site located just south of the Long Island Expressway with an address of 45 South Service Road, Plainview, New York, also known as Section 13, Block 88, Lots 31 and 45 and 29 -- 129.

The premises has approximately 500 feet of frontage on South Service Road and is located in the Town's Light Industry Zone.

Applicant Dream Car makes this application as lessee, with the consent and joined by the owners of the subject parcel.

If the Board will indulge me a little bit of background about Dream Car and what they do and what they've done.

So they are a very unique -- and I would describe it as a boutique auto restoration and repair operation -- Chris Mazzilli and Dave Bloom have been in this business -- in many businesses -- but in this one particularly together for seven years and have entertained clientele from all over the United States and beyond, I believe.

The clients of Dream Cars have special,

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particular vehicles, most of which are antique, that they own or are looking to own to restore to immaculate condition. Many of these clients spend anywhere from \$100,000 to \$300,000 just to restore these vehicles to their classic condition.

We do have some slides, if we can bring those up, that will show examples of the vehicles that they've restored.

(Whereupon, a visual presentation was shown on the video system in the Board Room.)

MS. COSCHIGNANO: So these are the types of vehicles that they restore in their operation -- many Corvettes.

Another very special aspect of Dream

Cars is that they are nationally known. If you are
a car enthusiast and watch the History Channel, you
would have seen an episode -- a six-episode
docuseries -- entitled, "The Lost Corvettes."

What led to this show is a series of events as follows:

In 1989, VH1 held a sweepstakes -remember VH1 -- they held a sweepstakes to give
away 36 Corvettes -- one model from each year since
the classic vehicles debuted -- and although Chris
Mazzilli entered the sweepstakes like two million

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other participants, he didn't win.

So another Long Islander did win that sweepstakes and all 36 vehicles. The owner, at that point -- at some point, sold them to a German-American artist by the name of Peter Max.

Peter Max was going to use them as canvases for a series of paintings, but the project was abandoned, and they ended up being stored and/or abandoned, I would say, in a garage for many years until a group of investors purchased what was now known as the Peter Max collection. Thereafter, they were identified as the barn find because they were really in such poor condition.

Dream Cars was called in to assess them and restore them to their original condition. As an example of the spectrum of restoration on these 36 vehicles, they take between -- some of them took between 40 to 50 hours of labor to restore, and some took upwards of about 4,000 hours to restore, but if you ask Chris Mazzilli, he will tell you that the labor was one of love.

So once the cars were restored, rather than sell them off one by one, Chris thought these vehicles deserved a bigger spotlight, and there came the docuseries, "The Lost Corvettes," and a

sweepstakes to give away all 36 vehicles to 36 1 2 different winners was born, and all proceeds went 3 to charity to benefit the United States Veterans 4 throughout the National Guard and Stand for the 5 Troops organizations; both charitable foundations to benefit Veterans and the education of the 6 7 National Guard. 8 Can we show the clip. 9 This is a very short one-minute clip of that docuseries. 10 11 (Whereupon, a visual presentation was 12 shown on the video system in the Board Room.) 13 MS. COSCHIGNANO: So that's the --14 those are the types of cars that they restore, you 15 know, very interesting, and thank you for that 16 short little background, and just if you stay 17 tuned, there will be another docuseries coming out, 18 and the title of that one is, I believe, Robert 19 Downey Dream Cars. 20 MR. MAZZILLI: Yeah, Downey's Dream 2.1 Cars. 22 MS. COSCHIGNANO: Robert Downey, Jr.'s 23 Dream Cars, so those are next. They just finished 24 filming that in California. 25 MR. MAZZILLI: And here.

MS. COSCHIGNANO: Oh, and here, too? 1 2 MR. MAZZILLI: Yeah. 3 MS. COSCHIGNANO: Okay. 4 So as you can see, Dream Cars is 5 definitely a business, which the Town can be proud of. 6 7 As an aside, you know, we'll be keeping 8 our eye out on the Discovery Channel, right, for 9 that next series. MR. MAZZILLI: Yes. 10 11 MS. COSCHIGNANO: Okay. 12 So this could show you the type and 13 quality of operation they maintain. It's not your 14 typical auto repair body shop. 15 There are times when they're working on 16 cars for, maybe, a year or so or more. There are 17 parts that they have to retrieve, and it's not a --18 you're going in, getting your car fixed, and in a 19 few days you're getting it back. Not at all like 20 that. 2.1 So with respect to the zoning 22 requirements, the proposed project is to operate a 23 vehicle restoration repair facility on the 24 premises, which requires a Special Use Permit from

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The premises is, as stated previously, in the Town's Light Industry District. The applicant is lessee and will lease 8,287 square feet of the building. The entire building contains approximately 96,000 square feet of gross floor area.

It should be noted that this application does not contemplate any changes to the building's exterior or enlargement of the building. The building remains the same.

The applicant is -- the current space is vacant. The applicant is proposing six bays, which require 24 parking spots and an additional five parking spaces according to Code.

The current Site Plan provides for 343 parking spaces for the entire site including any spaces for the short-term storage of these vehicles.

We do not require any variances for parking, and Wayne Muller of R&M Engineering will discuss parking and traffic, and as you'll see, there's absolutely no impact on the traffic on the surrounding roadways from this use.

So their operation -- what do they do -- they do all body work, which includes

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dismantling, stripping the vehicle, sanding, fiberglass work, restoration of all parts capable of saving, and metal work as necessary.

As I said, many parts take many months to come in, and those vehicles awaiting those parts are stored off-site in two other locations that are accessible to my clients, so there is no long-term storage of any vehicles on this site. Only vehicles being worked on will be there.

The hours of operation for Dream Car are Monday through Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and Saturday from 7:30 a.m. to 12:00 p.m.

As the Board is aware, we are located in the "LI," and all adjacent properties are business or commercial.

Further, all work is contained inside the premises, other than test driving vehicles, which will occur off premises.

The Light Industry District's purpose, pursuant to Chapter 246, Section 5.1.2.8 is to provide the opportunity and encouragement for the development of manufacturing, assembly, warehousing, research and development, and other compatible types of uses that are established in the industrial areas.

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Further, Chapter 246, Section 5.2, which lists the Non-Resident Use District
Regulations permits the operation of a motor vehicle repair auto body facility with a Special Use Permit.

The applicant filed the instant application with the Town Board and Department of Plan and Development concurrently; Site Plan review was completed; the Town's Planning Department referred this matter, by memo, to the Town Board on September 26, 2022; the project was found to be compliant with the requirement of Chapter 246 regarding Site Plan review; all reviewing departments issued memos with no modifications, and the project was classified as Type II by the Town's Department of Environmental Resources.

239-F is not required as the proposed project poses no work in the County right-of-way and no affect on County facilities, and we do have correspondence from the DPW at the County regarding that.

So, in satisfaction of the requirements of Section 246.9 of the Code, the proposed use conforms with all bulk zoning requirements, the physical characteristics of the site are not

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changing, and it's not located in any Aquifer

Protection Overlay District. The proposed use does

not create any hazard to life.

I would note here that waste oil and waste antifreeze are stored in steel drums, and they are picked up weekly by a private carting service, removed off-site, and disposed according to regulations. Petroleum and antifreeze are not kept on-site and ordered as needed.

The use is compatible with water resources, and if granted, it does not discourage any other development or permitted industrial uses, nor is it objectionable due to noise, traffic or vibration to any other uses currently in the building.

All trash will be deposited in the appropriate containers and picked up by private carter.

We will also comply with all performance standards as set forth in 246.10 of the Code.

As to the traffic requirements of the Code related to flow and access and off-street parking, I would call up our engineer; however, based upon his report, which I will hand in to the

13 Board, these Code provisions are also satisfied. 1 2 So, that's it. 3 Finally, we believe this use will not 4 overburden any existing uses at the site, nor any of the adjoining uses, and will not adversely 5 affect the safety, health, welfare, comfort and 6 7 convenience or order in the Town. 8 So, at this point, unless the Board has 9 any questions, I'll call up Mark Pilotta, our site 10 engineer. 11 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Are there any 12 questions as of yet? 13 (Whereupon, there was no response from 14 the Board.) 15 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Please proceed, 16 Counselor. 17 MS. COSCHIGNANO: Thank you. 18 MR. PILOTTA: Good morning. 19 Mark Pilotta, Key Civil Engineering. 20 Offices at 664 Blue Point Road, Holtsville, 2.1 New York. 22 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: May I stop you 23 for just a moment? 24 I see you have a diagram for us. 25 MR. PILOTTA: Yes.

14 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: We want to make 1 2 sure that's placed in a way for those who are 3 specifically here for this hearing so they can see 4 it. 5 With a show of hands, would you kindly indicate anyone who is here for this hearing. 6 7 Okay. Would you please proceed? 8 MR. PILOTTA: Sure. 9 Again, Mark Pilotta, Key Civil 10 Engineering, civil engineer for the applicant. 11 As previously stated, the site is not 12 changing. The building 15 will remain as is. 16 Currently, it is on the service road of 17 the LIE and has parking along its sides -- on its 18 east and west sides -- and to its south. 19 The subject applicant is located on the 20 west side of the building and has a storage area at 2.1 the southwest corner of the site. 22 Other than that, it's pretty 23 straightforward. There's no changes to its current 2.4 condition.

If there are any questions, I'd be

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15 1 happy to answer them. 2 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Any questions 3 from any of the Board? 4 (Whereupon, there was no response from 5 the Board.) SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you. 6 7 MS. COSCHIGNANO: At this time, Wayne 8 Muller from R&M Engineering to discuss traffic. 9 MR. MULLER: Good morning, 10 Mr. Supervisor, Members of the Board. 11 Wayne Muller with the firm of Robinson 12 and Muller Engineering. Our offices are at 50 Elm 13 Street, Huntington, New York. 14 For the record, I'd like to submit 15 copies of an analysis that we prepared dated November 14, 2022. I've provided enough copies for 16 17 each of the Board members. 18 (Whereupon, documentation was presented 19 to Town Clerk LaMarca who presented it to the Board 20 for perusal.) 2.1 MR. MULLER: And just to briefly 22 summarize the results contained therein: As part 23 of our analysis, we performed a pretty detailed 24 observation of the existing parking conditions on 25 the site, existing and future parking conditions on

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the site, as well as existing and future traffic conditions on the site.

As Ms. Coschignano has indicated, it's proposed to occupy 8,287 square feet of the existing approximately 96,000 square foot building with the proposed use Dream Cars.

As indicated in my report, we performed observations of the existing parking generated by the existing tenants on the site, and, essentially, what we found was that in its current condition, the site, from a parking perspective, is 33 percent occupied.

There are three tenants that have been previously approved on the property. We estimated the parking generated by those tenants as well as Dream Cars and found that the site would contain a maximum of 199 vehicles of the 343 parking spaces that are available. That translates to a 58 percent occupancy with 42 percent of the spaces vacant.

So based on our observations at the site, projections of future parking conditions with and without the subject development, we believe that there is plenty of parking provided on the property to satisfy the anticipated demand.

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As indicated in my report, we also performed traffic volume observations at the most impacted intersections -- that would be the site driveways with both Executive Drive and the South Service Road -- and we, basically, adjusted those volumes in accordance with current New York State DOT procedures, and performed the before and after analysis of full occupancy of the building with the tenants that I indicated that currently are approved but not there, and then with and without the traffic generated by the project, and we found that there would be no significant impact to traffic conditions in and around the subject property as a result of the approval of this project by the Town Board this morning.

As indicated by Mr. Pilotta, there essentially will be no changes to the building and/or the access to the facility. Everything will remain as it currently exists; however, there will be a renovation to the space in question in order to accommodate the activity that will be generated by the applicant.

So that's, basically, my analysis. We believe that there's adequate parking provided on the property to satisfy the demand generated by the

18 use, and that there will be no impact to traffic 1 2 conditions in and around the subject property. 3 I'll be happy to answer any questions. 4 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Are there any 5 questions of the Board? (Whereupon, there was no response from 6 7 the Board.) 8 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you very 9 much. 10 MR. MULLER: Thank you. 11 MS. LaMARCA: The attorney for the 20 applicant has filed the Affidavit of Service and 2.1 Disclosure. 22 Communications are as follows: 23 We have memos from the Department of 24 Planning and Development, including a review of the 25 required off-street parking.

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2.2 The Nassau County Land and Tax Map indicates the property as Section 13, Block 88, Lot 31. According to the Town of Oyster Bay Zoning Maps, the property is located within a "LI" Light Industry Zone. There are no variances or open prior Code Enforcement Bureau cases; however, there are Town Board Resolutions on file. We have Affidavits of Posting and Publication. There is no further correspondence. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you very much. I'd like to take this opportunity to

My client is 4 happy to oblige, to provide that opportunity so the 5 Town Board members could get out there, so we have 6 no objection to the adjournment, and because of the 7 date certain, I just want to confirm that we don't 8 have to repost or re-notice the hearing for next 9 month. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Counselor? 10 11 MR. SCALERA: He does not have to 12 repost. 13 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Counsel has 14 advised us that that's not necessary. 15 MR. BROWN: Great. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: But we will be 16 17 doing our due diligence to alert the public should 18 anyone want to be heard. 19 MR. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And would you

2 call the third hearing of the day, please?

MR. LaMARCA: The last hearing for today is to consider a Local Law entitled, "A Local Law to Amend Chapter 233 - Traffic of the Code of the Town of Oyster Bay."

MR. SCALERA: Sorry about that, Supervisor.

Frank Scalera, Town Attorney.

This is a Local Law to amend the traffic, Chapter 233, which is our Traffic Code.

As you know, all of you folks have been here for several years, that every once in a while, for housekeeping measures, any changes that are proposed and studied on the roadways -- whatever signage -- whether it be stop signs or traffic -- parking/no parking traffic types of signs -- have to make it to the Board to amend the existing Traffic Code, so these few sections in here, it's pretty self-explanatory, indicates the area, the hamlet area of the Town -- whether it be Syosset, Massapequa, Hicksville -- and shows the proposed change to the Traffic Code, and then this gets adopted and incorporated into the existing Code, which is online.

3 That's, basically, the genesis of this 1 2 whole Local Law. You'll be seeing these types of 3 Local Laws once, twice, three times a year to 4 constantly update the Code because it has to be 5 done by Town Board hearing pursuant to Local Law. That's, basically, it. I wish I had 6 7 more, not the most exciting stuff here. 8 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Okay. 9 I believe we have speakers as they 10 relate to this hearing. 11 Are they related to this hearing or to 12 another Resolution. 13 It doesn't say on there specifically. 14 (Whereupon, a side bar conversation 15 between Supervisor Saladino and Town Clerk LaMarca 16 took place.) 17 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Does the hearing 18 include the Greenvale issue or is that a different 19 Resolution? 20 MR. SCALERA: No. No, it does. 2.1 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: It does. 22 thought. Okay. Great. 23 So we're going to listen to a number of 2.4 residents who have come to be heard on this 25 hearing, and we're going to begin with

4 1 Ophelia Lynne. 2 MS. LYNNE: Hi. Good morning. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Good morning. 3 4 How are you. 5 MS. LYNNE: I'm nervous. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Don't be nervous. 6 7 This is an important part of the process, and we're 8 all residents, and we understand everyone's 9 concerns, so, please, speak freely, and don't worry 10 about anything. Just let us know how you feel. 11 MS. LYNNE: Well, I recently moved 12 here. 13 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Would you move 14 the microphone down a little closer to you please, 15 so we can hear you? 16 Thank you. 17 Good. 18 MS. LYNNE: I recently moved here and 19 about three years ago, the traffic on Marion Street 20 was -- there were a lot of cars going through. It 2.1 was used as a cut-through, and since posting the 22 new signs, no right on Marion between certain 23 timeframes, I have noticed a significant decrease 2.4 in traffic. 25 I walk my dog throughout the

5 neighborhood on both Marion and Addison Street, so 1 2 it's important to me that both of these areas 3 remain low traffic, and it has been working. 4 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: So are you for 5 these changes or opposed to them? MS. LYNNE: For. 6 7 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: You're for. 8 Okay. 9 Thank you very much. 10 MS. LYNNE: Thank you. 11 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Appreciate it. 12 Our next speaker will be Sara Urban. 13 MS. FAUGHNAN: She stepped into the ladies' room. 14 15 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Okay. We will recall her. 16 17 Our next speaker is Joseph Gaffney. 18 MR. GAFFNEY: Good morning, Supervisor, 19 Members of the Board. 20 My name is Joe Gaffney. I live at 2.1 15A Marion Street. 22 I just want to clarify. When you asked 23 her if she was for or against, I'm not sure she 24 understood what that meant. I don't know what it 25 means. I believe she is against taking the signs

6 1 down. 2 AUDIENCE MEMBER: That is correct. 3 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: You agree with 4 that, ma'am? 5 AUDIENCE MEMBER: That is correct. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: 6 Okay. 7 MR. GAFFNEY: I have lived on this 8 street for 26 years. Traffic has gotten noticeably 9 worse over that time. I would say in the last two 10 weeks, it has gotten better. 11 The initial signs, I don't think did 12 anything. When I come out of my driveway, I can 13 see the cars just keep coming around the corner 14 from Cedar -- usually without stopping or even 15 slowing down a whole lot -- I'm four houses up from 16 there. 17 The police have been there several 18 mornings in the last two weeks, and since then, it 19 has been noticeably less traffic as enforcement is, 20 I think, the key to this. 2.1 I know a lot of people in what we call 22 the back roads are complaining about that traffic 23 is going to go down that way. I measured it. 24 I'm coming in from Cedar to make a right to go down

Marion to Northern or to go left, which you might

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have to now, it's an extra half a mile to go around.

I don't think too many people in the morning are going to drive an extra half a mile and have to go through six additional stop signs in that half mile as a cut-through. It's just not realistic. I just don't see it. I don't see cars. I can see Cedar from my house. I don't see cars coming and making the left there, so I don't really think it's going to divert traffic.

But if there's a concern of that, I would encourage the Board to do a traffic study.

Count the cars. See how many are making a left and then going down to Addison, and then you can make an informed decision rather than just a lot of people just saying there's just a lot of traffic.

I just don't think there is.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Therefore, you're against removal.

MR. GAFFNEY: So I am against taking the signs down. Give it the six months, which is now four months, I guess. It's been there for two months, so let's see what the results are. That would be my position.

Thank you.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you.

Our next speaker will be Richard

Lazarow.

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MR. LAZAROW: Thank you, Supervisor,

5 Councilmen, Councilwomen.

Actually, it's a two part -- and I
don't know if I should be able to handle both parts
-- I live on the corner -- my name is Richard
Lazarow. I live on the corner of Roscoe Court and
Addison Lane.

One of the problems we've had with this cut-through is, as he mentioned, there are six stop signs, and a lot of people never even slow down for them, and I think we do need additional police presence to, maybe, stop the -- slow down these people. I know these people come down there, and sometimes I'm surprised there aren't more accidents.

The other problem with Addison Lane is the corner of Addison and Northern Boulevard.

There is two houses, and I have -- years ago, in 2019, I had some correspondence with Councilwoman Walsh about the two houses on Addison Lane -- 2 Addison Lane -- that are illegal rooming houses.

And because of that, there's a

9 1 tremendous amount of cars. They don't let them 2 park in that lot. There's a tremendous amount of 3 cars that park on the street restricting that and 4 making it more difficult and more prone to 5 accidents as people can't go past. I've talked to the Building Department. 6 7 The Building Department says they can't do anything 8 about it unless they're allowed in the building, 9 and, obviously, the landlord wouldn't let them in 10 to the two houses. I don't understand why they 11 can't be -- they can't enforce the rules. It is a 12 single-family residences. 13 Why are they rooming houses? 14 COUNCILWOMAN WALSH: Just to clarify 15 though, this is somewhat separate from --16 MR. LAZAROW: It's, kind of, separate from that, but --17 18 COUNCILWOMAN WALSH: Right. We --19 MR. LAZAROW: -- it's a combination. 20 COUNCILWOMAN WALSH: -- can address 2.1 that separately, but I just want to say on the 22 record that that totally, kind of, is unrelated to 23 the traffic. 24 MR. LAZAROW: Yes. Unfortunately, it 25 is --

10 Okay --1 COUNCILWOMAN WALSH: 2 MR. LAZAROW: -- on both items. 3 COUNCILWOMAN WALSH: -- I understand 4 that. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Mr. Lazarow? 5 MR. LAZAROW: 6 Yes. 7 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: I'm going to 8 point out Jim McCaffrey. 9 Jim, would you kindly raise your hand. 10 (Whereupon, Mr. McCaffrey, raised his 11 hand to be recognized.) 12 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And what I'd like 13 to ask is if you would meet with him right now and 14 let's revisit this through the Building Department. 15 We do have limitations by law of what we can and can't do. We can't break the door down 16 17 and charge into the residence without permission, 18 but we can address this through the courts, and if 19 you would kindly meet with Mr. McCaffrey, we can 20 connect you with the Building Department and 2.1 revisit our investigation and discuss further 22 options. 23 MR. LAZAROW: Okay. Thank you for that. 2.4 As far as the signs, my feeling at this 25 point is that we should investigate further and,

11 1 maybe, do a traffic survey to see what is happening 2 on Addison now. 3 It is a major problem, and it's going 4 to get worse as Glen Cove builds up like they're 5 doing because that Glen Cove/Northern Boulevard intersection is impossible. 6 7 Thank you. 8 COUNCILWOMAN WALSH: Thank you. 9 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you, sir. 10 Our next speaker is Mita Patel. 11 Good morning, Mrs. Patel. 12 How are you today. 13 MS. PATEL: Good. 14 How about you all. 15 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Would you kindly 16 begin by giving your full name and your address for 17 the record? MS. PATEL: Mita Patel, 9 Cedar Street. 18 19 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Greenvale. 20 MS. PATEL: Yeah. I have been living 2.1 there for last six years, and with the COVID 22 situation, people using more cars, it has got 23 worst, so I think the signs should be kept up 24 there, and you can monitor Addison and Marion and 25 then decide.

12 1 One way of doing it also is if you put 2 some cameras around that time and you charge the 3 people, then if it goes digging into their pockets, 4 they'll stop coming there to make the right turns. 5 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: We'll check with our legal counsel to see, first of all, whether or 6 7 not we have the ability to do that by law, and 8 we'll certainly continue to investigate this 9 situation. 10 MS. PATEL: Okay. 11 Thank you. 12 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you for 13 coming to speak here today. 14 Our next speaker is Lee Stempel. 15 MR. STEMPEL: My name is Lee Stempel. I reside at 11A Marion Street. 16 Good morning, Council. 17 18 Good morning, Supervisor. 19 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Good morning. 20 MR. STEMPEL: I moved into the area 2.1 about three or four years ago and was really 22 surprised to see the extent of traffic on Marion 23 Street during the rush hour periods when it's being 2.4 used as a significant cut-through. 25 I was -- it's difficult sometimes when

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you pull out of your driveway during those hours because people are trying to make time travelling through the neighborhood. People who walk in that area, and I take daily walks through that area, can see this traffic and the use of that residential area in a manner for which it was not intended.

I am supporting the signage. I think that it's a good idea to keep the signage the way it is. I think that the -- I've intentionally gone down to that area to see what the traffic patterns have been during the relevant periods, and I think that together with vigorous police enforcement that the signage will work and is increasingly working now.

I have also, on my walk, take a walk down to Addison and the areas beyond to see the extent to which traffic has been impacted in the area, and I simply don't see significant increases in traffic on Addison, and I would, as I said, keep the signage in place.

In fact, I would increase the signage so that it's drawn to the attention of motorists.

I would put LED lights on the perimeter of that signage to draw the attention of the public to the new signs, and, remember, these are people who are

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cutting through for the purposes of not being there, and so they're really not looking at the signs. They're using this area as a vehicle for getting wherever they're going, thinking about where they're going, trying to make time, and anything that we can do to draw attention to the fact that people, actually, live there and are impacted by this would be helpful.

So as I said, I would leave the signs there, and, frankly, I would ask the Council to use its relationships to encourage the Nassau County Police to vigorously enforce those signs to deliver the message so that we don't have the problem to begin with, so that the folks on Addison don't have this problem of the cut-through because people -- there's a public recognition of -- or the people, I'm sorry, that the people on Marion Street or the people on Addison Street don't have a problem at all, ultimately, because there will be a public recognition of those who use this cut-through on a regular basis, that's this is unacceptable and that this is not the traffic pattern that is intended to save them two or three minutes on their trip home.

Again, I think that if you leave the signs there, direct the police to vigorously

15 enforce the signage, you will see a decline in the 1 2 traffic on both streets eventually, particularly, 3 you know, obviously, on Marion Street, but also on 4 the others, and I would strongly encourage that 5 signage be, actually, increased and attention be placed on this concern. 6 7 I appreciate your help listening to me 8 today, and I look forward to your decision. 9 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you, 10 Mr. Stempel. 11 Thank you for coming in today. 12 Our next speaker will be Brian 13 Hasbrouck. 14 As is the case with everyone else, 15 would you please begin by giving us your full name and address for the record. 16 17 MR. HASBROUCK: Sure. 18 Brian Hasbrouck, 24 Addison Lane. 19 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you, sir. 20 MR. HASBROUCK: So two things. 2.1 Obviously, there's a lot more traffic 22 on Addison. I mean, the people on Marion can say 23 what they want, but there's only two ways to go 24 when you get to the top of those streets -- left or 25 right. If you don't make a right, because there's

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a sign, obviously, you're going to make a left and you're going to go down Addison. So that traffic is going to be there, okay.

I think I spoke last time about it's a narrow street, it's got twists and turns, blind spots, and not to bore you with this -- the history -- but ten years ago when the same group from Marion went to Town of North Hempstead to try to get signs put in or, maybe, even dead-end those roads or make them one-way, when John Fabio was making his point, Councilman Dwyer realized the opposition was a lot greater than he thought and told him so.

But to his credit, he said, all right, let's look at some other possibilities, and he asked Mr. Fabio what about a no right turn -- like there is now -- no right turn on Marion between 7:00 and 10:00, 3:00 and 6:00. Mr. Fabio said that's not a good alternative because Addison is not prepared for that traffic. It's a lot thinner, there's blind spots, and the intersection on 25A and Addison is dangerous -- always has been.

So my question is, what's changed in ten years that now Addison is acceptable.

Nothing.

17 You didn't widen the road. It's still 1 2 twists and turns and the intersection is still 3 dangerous. 4 So listening to these people and how 5 according to them they don't think traffic on Addison is more, it's not true. I work from home. 6 7 I look out my window 4:30 every day. There's 40 8 percent more traffic there. 9 So we gave the petition last time, 10 there's just by sheer numbers there's twice as many 11 people against it than for it, and, you know, I 12 think, in my opinion, you guys were misled, and I 13 look forward to you taking the signs down. 14 That's it. 15 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: You would like 16 the signs removed? 17 MR. HASBROUCK: Yes. 18 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Okay. 19 Thank you, sir. 20 Our next speaker is Teresa Prudente. 2.1 Good morning. 22 MS. PRUDENTE: Hi. I'm Teresa 23 Prudente. I live on 27 Addison Lane on the corner 24 of Addison and Osborne. 25 I agree with everything Brian and

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Lazarow -- however you pronounce his last name -said because I've been living there over thirty
years, and it's gotten so much worse. There's been
so many accidents that -- I know everything is
hearsay, but my husband -- the last one that
happened -- and the young man that passed away on
the motorcycle, everybody was standing outside
complaining, and they proceeded to say they don't
even know how these signs went up. They said go
talk to the one who really reinforced this because
they don't even know how this was approved.

Like I said, I've been there for over thirty years. It's narrow. You could not even get two cars down the block at the same time as you can on Marion. You have to move -- just in general -- because there's so many people, it used to be a snow emergency route. The signs went down with that, so now since that, people park there at night, and like he was saying, I know what the guy was saying as far as living on Roscoe and Addison. It does have a lot to do with this problem.

Cars are parked there, flat tires, so if you're trying to make a left turn onto Addison

Lane and then someone's trying to make a right turn, you have to watch out you're not getting head

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on, so I don't know how this was approved because it's even dangerous for people on Addison Lane that go down, that live on that block to make the left turn, and we know the block.

So I just hope something can be done, and like Brian said, we have more than half that were signed. We had no idea that this was even going on. I didn't realize you're supposed to look in the paper.

And that's it, so I just hope, like I said, I've lived there for thirty years, I have two grandchildren, you know, and cars don't even stop at the stop sign. They barrel around Osborne and Addison Lane. So I know they're saying they don't get the traffic -- they're not on Addison Lane. You can't even walk my dog on Addison Lane. He runs in the backyard, so I know what they are saying, but, truthfully, if somebody can come and take a look, I think they would agree.

COUNCILWOMAN WALSH: Was the accident on Addison or was it on Northern Boulevard?

I was under the assumption it was on Northern.

MS. PRUDENTE: It was on Northern Boulevard, but my husband also, which was many

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years ago, see -- a boy died in his hands, okay, in his arms because a woman was making a left turn, and it's a blind spot.

If you're at the corner of Addison Lane and Northern, not even if the shrubs are cut down, you could not see. You have to inch out to make a left turn. We know it. We live on the block.

Then we even had Cordero who passed away, which was Glen Cove Road.

Glen Cove Road is a nightmare. So everything is being passed on, and, yes, I do feel bad for the people on Marion -- who lives here six years, who lives here three years -- we've lived here for thirty years. I know people have lived there longer. I feel bad they're going through, but they should have done their research when they were moving into the neighborhood, you know.

And now here it is, we have to suffer by half the houses, which the block is double the size width-wise compared to Addison Lane, and you can't even get two cars down on a regular day so let alone when you have buses coming down the block. That's a disaster.

On Northern Boulevard and Roscoe, when the bus is there and you have people making a right

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2.1 turn or a left into that development, it's all backed up, and then you have people parked on Addison Lane, and I did try to call also about Addison Lane, and they told me nothing can be done, you know, with the people there, but thank you. Thank you. MS. PRUDENTE: Okay. Bye-bye. SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you. And just so it's clear to everyone, you're here to ask for the removal of the signs.

MR. PRUDENTE: Good morning.

Robert Prudente.

MS. PRUDENTE:

I'm Robert Prudente, 27 Addison Lane,

Yes.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Okay.

Greenvale, New York. I'm Teresa's husband.

COUNCILWOMAN WALSH:

To reiterate what my wife just talked about, thirty years ago -- everybody has to understand -- on Northern Boulevard, Addison Lane is the crest of a hill. It goes down to Marion, it goes down to C.W. Post, so when the people are doing 55 miles an hour, okay, and you try to make a left on Addison -- I picked up this boy, and he died in my hands. This was 28 years ago, because you can't see.

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I have three kids that drive. The oldest 30, the youngest 25. They do not come in from Northern Boulevard unless they're coming in on Marion because you can't see what's coming over the hill.

So now you've taken two streets, Cedar and the other one, I forgot the name of it, but now you've taken two streets and filtered them to Addison.

Why both.

Why not just do one.

We're taking all their traffic now from a certain time in the morning and then a certain time in the afternoon. So to me, it's -- you've funneled everything into a small opening, and, like they're saying, at the closest point to Northern Boulevard, Addison Lane only one car can get by the other, and the people on Northern coming in are coming in at 55 miles an hour. Nobody slows down to 20 to come into Addison Lane. And all the cars are being parked there, so it's even less.

I just -- I've been there for thirty years, and I see a big difference in the traffic down my block now, and people aren't thinking how this was resolved, and I don't think it was

23 resolved with the neighborhood getting together. 1 I 2 think they did what they wanted on their block with 3 no regard for the other blocks. 4 So, maybe, what we should do, instead 5 of letting them make the no right turn on Addison on those same times and let them go down to Pine 6 7 Ridge and have to go around the block, you know. To send it all to one street isn't fair. It's not 8 9 right. I'm in favor of taking them down. 10 11 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you, sir. 12 Thank you for coming in today. 13 MR. PRUDENTE: Thank you for your time. 14 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: You're very 15 welcome. I'm just writing notes to your comments. 16 Our next speaker is John Fabio. 17 Good morning, Mr. Fabio. 18 How are you today. 19 MR. FABIO: Good morning. 20 If you would be kind enough to pass 21 these to the Board members. 22 (Whereupon, documentation was presented 23 to Town Clerk LaMarca who presented it to the Board 24 for perusal.) 25 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Would you kindly

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begin by giving your full name and address for the record?

MR. FABIO: John Fabio, I live at 11 Marion Street in Greenvale.

And I'm here to oppose the removal of the no right-turn signs.

Just by way of further introduction, I have spent the past 53 years of distinguished public service: 33 years in the New York City Board of Education as a teacher, a crisis counselor, a drug education specialist and supervisor; I've served on the Long Island Power Authority as a Trustee for ten years; I've served on the Board of Directors of the Education Assistance Corporation, a large social service organization; I've served on the Town of North Hempstead Town Board, the Zoning and Appeals Board and was also Deputy Commissioner of Administrative Services; I've served as Vice President of Operations for the Nassau County Off-Track Betting Corporation; I'm a member of the Nassau County Heroin Prevention Task Force; I'm a member of the Precinct Community Council for the 18th Legislative District; and I've been President of the Greenvale Civic Association for the past 23 years; and a

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resident of Greenvale for the past 49 years, and I can tell you we have witnessed tremendous change in our community during that period of time.

As an educator, I always impressed upon my students to consider the facts and the evidence before formulating any kind of decision or opinion, and I would encourage this Board to do likewise.

Let's look at the facts, let's look at the evidence and not let's hear supposition, innuendo and false claims that are being made.

So what are the facts? What are the evidence.

The first fact, in 2013, there was a traffic study conducted -- sponsored by the Town of North Hempstead, conducted by consultant AKRF, and their task was to analyze the cut-through traffic, to understand the nature, the amount, and the extent of the cut-through traffic.

I believe this Board has had a copy of that traffic study, which would indicate significant traffic that had come down Cedar Street, Helen Street, and Marion Street to the tune of 119 cars during the study period. That's an average of about one car every minute coming down those streets. Documented, observed, counted in

the traffic study.

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Second, on May 3rd, the then Deputy
Highway Commissioner, Mr. John Bishop; traffic
engineer, Mr. Ken Bishop; Mr. Colin Bell from your
office, we met on-site to examine the cut-through
traffic problem. They saw, they observed, they
concluded that one of the appropriate measures to
try to mitigate this traffic would be the no
right-turn signs for which they made a
recommendation for which this Board then approved.

While they were there, we got into a car and we drove the alternate route. We drove from Cedar, on Marion, to Osborne, to Addison Lane, down to Northern Boulevard. After that trip, the gentlemen that were there concluded that it would not be a viable alternative route for any traffic cutting through.

Why not?

Well, if you were coming out of Cedar

Street and making -- not the right turn, that would

be prohibited -- you were going to make that left

turn, you would have to go to the corner of Helen

and Marion. Stop sign number one. You would make

the right-turn on Osborne, there would be a stop

sign at the corner of Marion and Osborne -- you see

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on the map. The third stop sign would be at the corner of Addison Lane and Osborne Lane. The fourth would be at Carmen Road and Addison Lane. The fifth would be at the corner of Hewlett Road and Addison Lane. The sixth would be at Roscoe Court and Addison Lane. And the seventh would be at Addison Lane and Northern Boulevard.

These drivers would then face making a dangerous exit turn onto Northern Boulevard, so I absolutely agree with the previous speakers that say Addison Lane is not an appropriate route for a cut-through driver.

What would they be saving?

The goal is to eliminate being delayed on Glen Cove Road going through that intersection, so why would they now divert to an alternative route that would take twice as long to get to the same destination.

So it absolutely makes no sense for anybody to use Addison Lane as an alternative to staying on Glen Cove Road.

COUNCILWOMAN WALSH: John, can I interrupt you for one second?

MR. FABIO: Sure.

COUNCILWOMAN WALSH: I think what

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happened when we spoke -- the reason why this came up after all these years is because he's the president of the civic there, so he called me.

But talking to some people that do wait at that light in the morning and they, actually -- I'm sorry -- I did have some friends who, actually, wait at that light in the morning, and they texted me, and they said why do we have to wait so long here.

I think what happened is your block comes up as making a right with Waze -- with the Waze where yours might not because it might take longer. I'm not saying people don't come up that way, but your block comes up with Waze, and I think that's why in the last few years you've noticed more activity than when this came up ten years ago.

MR. FABIO: Oh, absolutely.

COUNCILWOMAN WALSH: So maybe we can get your block off Waze, or get the whole area there, but, I think, you know, I've talked to people about this.

MR. FABIO: So what else has happened in the interim, Glen Cove has 1,111 new apartments, condos, et cetera, that whole redevelopment of Glen Cove.

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So guess where all of that traffic is now flowing.

There's only two ways to get south.

It's either on Glen Cove Road or it's 107.

So all of the new residents -- 1,111 condos and apartments have since been built since that initial traffic study was done -- so all of that traffic is coming through Greenvale, all of the service, the repair, the support services that feed Glen Cove and all these apartments are now coming through Greenvale, so we have now seen an exponential increase in the amount of traffic since that initial survey was done in 2013, so it didn't get any better, but it got a hell of a lot worse.

Let me make one or two other points.

Mr. Colin Bell from your office, I believe, was

tasked with making some site visits to see

firsthand the nature of the problem.

Mr. Bell has reported and indicated that, yes, there was a significant cut-through problem, and, more importantly, he did not observe any additional traffic being diverted over to Addison Lane.

Fourth point. I have been working with Chief of Patrol, Kevin Canavan, from the Nassau

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County P.D., Inspector Mark Vitale of the Sixth Precinct, we have gotten stepped up enforcement of these no right-turn signs, so from October 26th to November 10th, 75 violations were issued just in that short period of time for people going through the no right-turn signs. Once again, a documented evidence and fact of what's happening at this particular area.

So I can tell you since the stepped up enforcement, there has been somewhat of a reduction in the cut-through traffic, but as was indicated, to try to change driver behavior that has been going on for years may take a significant amount of time.

The message will get there with the stepped up enforcement so no cars will be coming in to Cedar, Helen, or Marion, and, in fact, anyone considering Addison Lane would also not be a factor.

But you can't do it in the short period of time that the signs have been up. It will take -- and we had asked, initially, for a six-month study period. Put up the signs, and let's see what happens.

You know, when the traffic study was

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done, there were a number of mediation efforts that were proposed, you know, dead-end Marion Street, stop cars from entering Cedar, Helen from Glen Cove Road, put in a traffic circle at Helen and Cedar, do speed bumps to slow down the traffic, do pinch points, move out the curb lines so that only one car at a time could go through.

Most of these recommendations were not workable, were impractical, and, frankly, I don't know of any town that has approved speed bumps on their local streets, so --

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: I don't believe they're allowed by State Code, which supercedes us.

MR. FABIO: They are in incorporated villages --

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: For specific uses, okay.

MR. FABIO: -- and they are in New York City, interestingly enough, there are.

However, so what were we left with in terms of how to mitigate this traffic.

What we were left with was the least restrictive, most conservative, least impactful of putting up the no right-turn signs of all of the options that were presented, so that's the

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direction that we chose to go with.

So, now, let's look at the heart of this matter, all right. Since the signs have been up from August the 10th, there have been 69 enforceable days -- that's Monday through Friday -- and keep in mind we're talking about six hours out of the entire day that the restrictions are imposed -- 7:00 to 10:00 in the morning and 3:00 to 6:00 in the afternoon -- so if you want to calculate that, that's only 30 hours of the entire week that the restrictions are in place.

Not a significant amount of time and, obviously, during the off periods, people can still make those turns, so it doesn't make any sense at this point to remove them given the fact that only 69 enforceable days have been in place.

So we asked, initially, for a six-month study period, and it was our hope that during that time that the Town could use its resources -traffic safety, traffic engineering -- to then
assess and document, (a) are the signs effective in what we're trying to achieve, and (b) was there any impact on the surrounding streets. That still remains our position. Keep the signs up for the six-month study period, as we indicated from the

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very beginning, and let's see what the results are.

Again, you would have, I believe, at that point, documentation -- evidence -- clear indication of how to make a decision.

What are we basing our decision on.

The facts, the evidence, or people's belief that things are happening that are not happening.

The previous speaker put words in my mouth that were never uttered, so, you know, we have to look at some credibility issues.

be assured, and I want everyone to be assured,
we're going to look at everything. We're not going
to make a speedy decision. Our plan is to leave
the rolls open, which means that we will collect
further comment. We're not rushing anything
through, and we certainly won't be deciding on this
today, so I don't want you to feel as though the
issue is being railroaded in any way, but you've
made your point very, very clear.

We give everyone -- we try to give everyone the same amount of time, and you've made your point very clear. You oppose the removal of the signs, and we will continue to take a look at

34 1 this. 2 Mr. Fabio, you've been an elected 3 official, right. 4 MR. FABIO: Yes, I have. 5 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: So you have studied government policy and its consequences as 6 7 well as its unintended consequences over some time, 8 not only with North Hempstead, but in the other 9 roles you've had, correct? 10 MR. FABIO: Yes, I have. 11 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: So you have told 12 us that you believe that the situation has worsened 13 and will worsen as more and more people populate 14 the new Glen Cove development. 15 MR. FABIO: Right. 16 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Can you 17 understand, can you imagine how we all feel as 18 elected officials when the New York State budget 19 came out this year, we were informed that, most 20 likely, our State Governor had put legislation --2.1 not stand-alone legislation that gets debated 22 openly -- but something that some have referred to 23 as hidden in the State budget, whether that is 24 correct or not, that was the opinion of some -- to

legalize apartments throughout the State and take

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away the ability for Towns to have zoning.

That means, take away the ability for the public to be heard because if we don't have zoning powers, there is no structure like this to hold a hearing and listen to you as to whether or not you want your neighborhood to be filled with apartments and accessory buildings, some of them the size of a Levittown home, in the backyard with only a four-foot setback from the property line on all sides.

That would greatly increase the amount of cars; wouldn't you agree?

MR. FABIO: Oh, absolutely.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: And that would create the kind of situation that you're coming to us to speak about -- frustrated -- throughout Towns in New York State with no ability for the public to be heard, what your feelings are, what your experiences are, and how the unintended consequences might greatly change your quality of life.

So think of how frustrated we were to learn of this, and we join together with elected officials and community leaders throughout Long Island to push back on this and to make it heard,

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and then they pulled it back, but there's nothing to guarantee us that this issue won't come up again this current year -- this coming year in 2023 -- with the next session of the New York State Assembly and Senate.

So we have great concerns about not only this issue you're experiencing, but what could possibly happen throughout the entire Town and every community on Long Island and throughout

New York State, especially in communities where there's higher density.

What will we be facing in the coming months and years now if the ability for zoning control is removed.

Think about where we're headed and what could happen. This situation could be magnified by many times everywhere with no ability to come and be heard.

And I'm not being political when I say we've all spent at least a couple of months listening to commercials where a claim is the removal or the loss of democracy. It makes me boil when I hear that because isn't the ability to come before Boards like this in municipalities throughout our State part of democracy.

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everyone has brought forth. We do not intend to rush a decision, and we will not be deciding on this today, but we're going to continue to look at this, perform our due diligence and research, and take everyone's thoughts into consideration on a situation that I've been hearing about since the day I walked through the door in 2017 to become your Town Supervisor.

So we know that this is a complicated situation, we're very sensitive to it, and we thank you for coming here and providing the information that you provided.

MR. FABIO: Just to pick up on your comments, I certainly agree that that policy was very ill-advised by the Governor putting it forth, and, obviously, the pushback was so tremendous that it quickly came off the table.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: We don't know if that --

MR. FABIO: I'm hopeful that there has been a change in dynamics in Albany. Many of --

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: How so?

MR. FABIO: -- some incumbents were defeated and new people, new blood is coming in to

Albany.

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Hopefully, our representation from Long
Island will protect us from some of these
ill-gotten ideas as to how -- the goal was to help
affordable housing, increase affordable housing.

They just went about it -- they're going about it --

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Do you believe,

sir, that was the goal or the excuse?

MR. FABIO: -- in the wrong way.

That's not the way to achieve -- if that was the objective, it's not the way to achieve it at the expense of altering the entire character of our lovely communities.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: It's going to change if that, indeed, is passed.

MR. FABIO: I certainly agree with you. It's a foolhardy policy.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: So my point is we're very sensitive to the information you all brought before us, and we understand how changes in the law affect our residents, affect our quality of life, and I'm very proud that the work and the responsibility of this Town Board and this Town is to go through these issues very carefully and take into consideration the consequences when you make a

change in the law.

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MR. FABIO: I would just conclude by summarizing the fact that we have demonstrated, by fact and evidence, that there is a problem on the impacted streets. We also have not heard any evidence to the contrary that Addison Lane is being adversely impacted by these restrictive turn signs, so until and if that occurs, we would maintain that the signs remain, that a study period be conducted to verify the results and the impact.

That's what we would ask of this Board.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you,

Mr. Fabio.

Thank you for joining us today.

Earlier, I had called up Sara Urban,

and she was not in the room at time.

Is Sara Urban with us now.

MS. URBAN: Good morning.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Good morning.

How are you.

MS. URBAN: Thank you so much.

My name is Sara Urban. I live on

18 Marion Street for the past 33 and a half years.

Ever since I moved, we have always and

always and always struggled with the traffic. In

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fact, when my puppy was four months old, she got hit by a truck, left on the floor, dragged close to a block, and since it was early in the morning, and I heard her crying, I had to rush outside, you know, almost naked, half naked and spent \$5,000 just for that accident.

I experienced the death of my neighbor on Osborne, Mrs. Cordero. When they wanted to close Osborne from Glen Cove Road, not a single family on Marion opposed that, and we still are mourning that death.

I want my neighbors to look in my face and say that if I get killed twice a day by a car walking my dog, and I do go through Addison Lane every single day twice, I have never seen increase of traffic, and I don't know when Mr. Fabio, which I am absolutely thankful of him for all his services, if he have association meeting, I don't see anybody coming from all these streets to that association, which is very important.

In fact, this morning, I had three months ago had appointment with doctor, and I had to cancel it to come here. That's how important this is. Not only these people cut through, they're not even, I think, ethically or sane, you

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know, because the way they come through, you know, and they rush, and they have sometimes music so loud, and every single time something happens on Northern -- flood or anything -- all Glen Cove Road, all the traffic is going through our street and not Addison Lane, so I am absolutely asking you please and please and please keep this sign.

The right sign has to be done and continued because we are being affected.

In fact, just two months ago, my school tax went up \$3,600 a year. Just the school tax.

We are taxpayers, we are very, very good citizens, and we are ask you please help us to keep our street a little safer.

I have never seen my daughter telling me every second when I'm on Addison Lane, Mommy, car, car, car, car, but on Marion, every minute. Sometimes the cars are so quiet that it passes me so fast and my dog, you know, even scares my dog.

I would not walk if I didn't have the dog. The dog is like a member of my family, and, you know, dog lovers if they know, this is very important to us. Otherwise, I would have never walked through this thing.

And since I live on Marion, 18, I'm

42 very close to Cedar, and I see these police 1 2 officers, and I do go and I thank them. I thank 3 them very much, and since Mr. Fabio gave you all 4 the information, which is extremely vital, I really 5 want you to review this and consider the fact that there is no way Addison Lane, especially near 6 7 Northern Boulevard, is so narrow that cars cannot, 8 you know, go up and down, up and down. It's not 9 true. I see it every day, and I see the result on Marion also. 10 11 I'm so thankful of you. 12 Thank you and God bless you. 13 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: God bless you, 14 too. 15 MS. URBAN: Thank you so much. 16 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you. 17 That's all the slips I have for people 18 requesting to speak. 19 (Whereupon, a member of the assemblage 20 present raised their hand to be recognized.) 2.1 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Sir, in the back, 22 would you like to come up to speak? 23 AUDIENCE MEMBER: Yes, I would, sir. 24 SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Please come up, 25 sir.

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SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Kindly begin by giving us your full name and address for the record.

MR. CONKLIN: My name is Michael Conklin. I live at 23 Marion Street.

I've been an area resident since 1981, that's 41 years. I've been cutting through in the neighborhood since then, and I'm a resident. I've been 17 years on Marion.

A short history, and I want to thank the last speaker for a moment because she's the only one that brought up the point of when this really started many moons ago.

A raised curb median was placed on Glen Cove Road at Osborne Lane some years ago. This prevented traffic from accessing Osborne and then Addison. In effect, a shared cut-through, many years ago, was now only a problem for Marion Street, Cedar and Helen. That's where it started.

There was never an issue on Roscoe,

Heritage, Wildwood, Carmen, Hewlett or Pine Ridge.

All of those streets, the only -- you can't cut

through them. They're all areas where you would be

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lost if you got there, and they're still the same way. Nothing has changed on those streets.

I do believe, as stated, that some cars are using Addison. I agree with that. I think some are. The cut-through issue is not new. It's been around for years, but recently it has been exacerbated by an increase in north/south traffic on Glen Cove Road.

Previous discussions and studies acknowledged a marked increase in traffic during peak hours. Suggestions to curtail these were dead-ending, speed bumps, pinch points, lowering of the speed limit and signage restricting traffic.

It should be of note, Addison Lane currently has more stop signs, a curve, and pinch points all of which impede those in a rush. Marion Street is a straight run and a wider street, no question.

The placement of the restrictive turn signs has helped, enforcement by the Nassau County P.D. has increased. Please let this play out.

Once everyone gets the message, all the streets affected will be better off.

I'm in favor of keeping the signs. I want to thank you, the Board. I really appreciate

what you're doing. Your actions are greatly appreciated, and on top of that, I want to thank the Nassau County P.D. for their enforcement efforts.

Thank you very much.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you, sir.

(Whereupon, a member of the assemblage

present raised their hand to be recognized.)

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Yes, please, come

up.

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MR. ADELMAN: Arthur Adelman,
12 110 Dubois Avenue, Sea Cliff.

I, too, have lived in this area for well over 40 years and utilized the cut-through forever, and I think the issue we have here is not solely an Oyster Bay issue because of the -- it's not so unique, but the character of the Greenvale area being an unincorporated area in both the Town of Oyster Bay and the Town of North Hempstead, and the roads we're talking about being, I think they're State -- 25A is a State road and Glen Cove Road is, maybe, a County road.

The biggest issue and the cause of all of these cut-throughs is the southbound traffic pattern of where Glen Cove meets Northern.

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Somebody -- some genius came around and restructured the lanes there into five lanes within about 50 feet of the intersection, and they made two lanes for right turns and kept only a small -- maybe five car length portion for the left turn.

What is happening is you cannot cross the double yellow part to make a left turn if you can't reach the cutout. You can't go where it's painted yellow, you can get a ticket, so the people wanting to make left turns can, literally, back up the southbound traffic.

There is definitely a need for the Town of Oyster Bay to get together with North Hempstead, County and State and restructure the intersection on a whole. There is no reason why either Town or the County or whoever the properties lie on the eastbound, southeast, northeast portion of Glen Cove Road why there couldn't be some contemplation of condemnation of the property to widen Glen Cove Road at that intersection.

The last point I want to make, I don't understood why nobody seems to be utilizing, which I use, the cut-through to Walnut where there's a traffic signal at the intersection of Walnut and Northern Boulevard. It's the safest place to

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the Town.

47 1 proceed eastbound. 2 Walnut, of course, comes off of --3 what's it called -- Chestnut, maybe, yeah, Chestnut 4 to Walnut is all in the Town of North Hempstead, I 5 guess, and that's just west of the PC Richards. I agree that the left turn for Madison 6 7 onto Northern is a treacherous one. I'm questioning whether the Board,
Supervisor, the Clerk, whoever makes the decision,
feels that Newsday is the best periodical to
currently utilize for these services considering
I'm finding some fault in their follow-through
against approval of proof sheets that the Clerk's

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Office signs off on and their actual publishing of said legal notices.

I think -- I'm not a proponent of The Herald, but I feel that they deliver their weekly paper to basically every household in the Town, and I find them very informative. That was referring to Resolution 856.

My question about Resolution 855, the appraisal of the property on Herzog Place, we're looking to appraise property. I'm curious why we're doing that.

Are we about to try to possibly condemn the property and take it over to utilize it as commuter parking?

I think the reason why we're looking for an appraisal, why we would be looking to take income-producing properties off the tax rolls if that's what we're doing?

Lastly, my question regards the costs associated with Resolution 845 and 846, replacement turfs at two area parks. We're utilizing the engineering services of a company to pay them up to \$42,000 and \$46,000, respectively, to do the engineering studies on the replacement of turf.

I would not think that the hours needed

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to go into by an engineering firm would be this much, though. I hope the Parks Department, if that's who oversees this project, will not -- I think we should hold off -- well, I guess, they're needed to offer the bid or RFP to see who's going to supply the replacement turf, but it just seems that to spend a total of over \$85,000 just for the engineering services to look into the replacement of turf is a lot of money.

I'm curious of how long the turf that's down there now has been there. Has it been the life-span five years, ten years, twenty years?

Because it seems we're spending a lot of money in the budget. There's a lot of money being spent now, last year, planning for next year already for the synthetic installation of turf throughout the Town, and that's why I found it amazing that we spent \$150,000 on a lawn mower, but that's what they need for the golf course I'm sure.

Anyway, that's it. I'd like to make sure that the engineering expenses on Resolutions 845 and 846 are carefully watched. I'm curious about the appraisal -- need for the appraisal -- SUPERVISOR SALADINO: 846 has been
