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SUPERVISOR SALADINO: October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month. And this is the time we remind our residents to get their screenings, the fact that far too many residents face the overwhelming shock of a breast cancer diagnosis. They are flooded with new information, worried about loved ones at times as some of the treatments are very unaffordable. It reaches life's toughest decisions for people affected.

During the month of October, we rededicate ourselves to supporting patients and their families and raising awareness about the life saving importance of early screenings, working for detection.

We honor all of those who have lost their lives to this terrible disease. We celebrate the courageous survivors and their strength and the advocates fighting to beat this disease and to help everyone.

And as we've said over and over and

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we'll continue to say it, nothing is more important than getting those screenings. Something that should be the case all year round, but we utilize the month of October to especially remind our loved ones to get those screenings.

So please turn to your loved one and remind them, drive them, whatever it takes. Those screenings are critical and save lives.

So we'll ask that everyone continue in that effort.

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SUPERVISOR SALADINO: One of the things that we're moving forward with today's business is to welcome the "Take Me Out to the Ball Game Foundation", an incredible Massapequa-based organization that seeks to improve the quality of life for children in need through interactive family activities and by providing the tools they need to thrive at home, at school, at all times.

The organization's founder and president is with us today, Richard Genovese, who created "Take Me Out to the Ball Game Foundation" -- Does everybody get peanuts and crackerjack at this event?

MR. GENOVESE: Absolutely. Absolutely.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: We kid because we love you, but we really, really appreciate you and your organization from the bottom of our hearts.

In 2007, they first partnered with the "YES Community Counseling Center" in

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Massapequa with Vision to create and fund events for children affected by alcohol and drug abuse helping them, especially as they struggle. Perhaps it's a parent, a loved one, a family member.

"Take Me Out to the Ball Game" sponsors events for these kids and includes visits to Adventureland, fishing trips, various sporting events and an annual holiday party.

Recently, with the help and generosity and support of friends and family, "Take Me Out to the Ball Game" began partnering with other nonprofits to aid even more vulnerable families through food pantries working with houses of worship. So their outreach is a testament to their love for others and the template for all successful organizations to follow. So we commend you for that very much.

Now it is our great pleasure for our Town Board to present this Citation, to "Take Me Out to the Ball Game" Foundation

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and a very, very good friend, Rich Genovese. Councilwoman Laura Maier, if you would assist with this presentation and if everyone would join us at the front rail as we honor Richard Genovese and the very important work of the "Take Me Out to the Ball Game" Foundation.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: We started the day talking about our veterans and what they do for us on the global scale. But when it comes to the to the hometown scale, you do so, so much that we will "root, root, root for the home team", as you help us.

Rich, would you like to say anything about the organization and a website, perhaps, how people can get involved?

MR. GENOVESE: Sure. We started back in 2007, my wife and I wanted to make a difference in kids and families. That has blossomed now into seven food pantries that we stocked 3 or 4 times a year. It's

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escalated post Covid, obviously.

We do a Christmas party for 100 kids, Santa Claus, toys, winter clothing. We give out socks, jackets, coats and what people don't have.

The first year we had five turkeys in my truck and now we have a truckload with over 300 turkeys we deliver. It's one of the guys I went to high school with from Massapequa. We grew up together. So we all came back together and we're just trying to make a little difference day by day. Joe's been a great supporter of everything that we've done. And Esther, thank you very much.

This is very, very overwhelming. Thank you very much.

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SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Folks. October is also Domestic Violence Awareness Month. And for our next presentation, we welcome The Safe Center, Long Island, Debbie Lyons and Alexis Reice. Thank you very much for being with us.

The Town is very proud to support The Safe Center, as we have been for years, to help spread awareness about domestic abuse and, most importantly, the services available by stellar organizations like The Safe Center to those affected.

So, Debbie, we appreciate what you're doing and you have information for us and we have something for you, too. So please proceed.

MS. LYONS: Great. Thank you and good morning.

As you stated, my name is Debbie Lyons. I'm the Associate Executive Director at the Safe Center. I would like to thank Town of Oyster Bay Supervisor, Joseph Saladino, Town Board members, and

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Esther Alter of the Public Information Office, for inviting me to speak here today.

The Safe Center is Long Island's leading provider of services to victims and survivors of interpersonal violence, including domestic and intimate partner violence, sexual assault, human trafficking and child abuse. We're the only agency in New York and one of only a few in the country that addresses all of these issues and provides comprehensive services for victims and survivors in one setting.

The Safe Center was created with a mission to protect, assist and empower victims of family violence and sexual assault, while challenging and changing social systems that tolerate and perpetuate abuse. Our services are designed to create a one stop shop for victims and survivors of interpersonal violence.

Some of our services include a 24/7

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hotline; advocacy and case management, including hospital and court accompaniment; legal advocacy and representation; counseling services; housing, including the only safe home for those fleeing domestic violence in Nassau County; and community education.

It is important to us that victims and survivors know that our services are inclusive and affirming. Agencies like The Safe Center often are viewed as women's centers. While the majority of interpersonal violence victims and survivors are female, we are also available to men the LGBTQIA community, the elderly, the disabled. Ultimately, anyone who is in need of help is welcomed by our team.

October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month. Domestic and intimate partner violence is a pattern of abusive behavior in any intimate relationship that is used by one partner to gain or maintain power and control over another

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intimate partner. When you hear domestic violence, we often think of black eyes and physical assaults. However, domestic and intimate partner violence can take many forms, including physical, sexual, emotional, financial, psychological or other patterns of coercive behavior that influence another person with an intimate partner relationship. We're here today recognizing domestic Violence Awareness Month because intimate partner violence is common and it's occurring at alarming rates in our own community.

According to the National Coalition Against Domestic Violence Statistics, 1 in 4 women and 1 in 7 men will have been victims of severe physical violence by an intimate partner in their lifetime.

The annual cost of domestic violence to the US economy is more than \$8.3 billion. This cost includes medical care, mental health services and lost productivity, such as time away from work.

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One in 15 children are exposed to domestic and intimate partner violence each year, and 90% of these children are eyewitnesses to this violence. Studies have shown that when there is domestic violence in the home, the risk of child abuse increases. At our own Nassau County Child Advocacy Center, House of the Safe Center, we have seen the increase in child sex abuse cases that also have a history of exposure to domestic violence.

In 2022, The Safe Center received 2,551 calls for domestic and intimate partner violence to our 24/7 hotline. Nassau County PD reports that 2,423 arrests were made in 2022 for domestic violence and 4,850 children were present at those scenes.

These statistics help paint the picture of how prevalent and serious this issue is, but there is also a lot of hope and resiliency. Each person will have a different path to healing, and The Safe Center's client centered model allows us

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the flexibility to customize our services to best meet their needs. It is an honor to work with a survivor as they begin to realize they are not defined by the worst moments of their life, but instead have a bright future ahead in which they can have a positive impact on those around them.

A member of our staff shared the story of a mother of three who had left a domestic violence relationship after 13 years. She had not been allowed to work while with her abuser and focus her attention on raising her children. When she spoke with our vocational specialists, she had never written a resume and didn't think she could because she had never worked before. Our skilled staff worked with her to highlight the many skills she had, such as conflict management and budget planning after years of running her household and raising children.

This step of having a written resume

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gave value to the skills she possessed and was a huge part of her healing journey. Here it was that someone saw her as skilled rather than putting her down and holding her back. That confidence, along with the support, was a huge turning point for her to move forward and find stable employment to support herself and her children. This ultimately allowed her to leave abusive situations. She told our staff that they gave her the hope that she hadn't had for a long time.

It's stories like this one and many others like it that inspire us to continue doing this work and advocate to make change, to keep our community and our home safer.

Thank you for your time and recognition of Domestic Violence Awareness Month. We are thrilled to hear that survivors will be acknowledged as the Town of Oyster Bay building will be illuminated purple from October 1st through the 15th.

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Thank you to the Town of Oyster Bay's Town Board and all the residents that continue to support The Safe Center and the work to promote healthy and safe homes.

We also have some purple ribbons and some information here, if anyone's interested.

Thank you.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Thank you so much for your work. It is so important for us to recognize and help people who are suffering from domestic violence or need the education to avoid being a victim of domestic violence and of course, the services you provide.

We're happy to help out in so many ways. The illumination of the Building for Domestic Violence Awareness Month is one of just so many different ways that we partner with you. And we're proud and privileged to partner with an organization that, quite frankly, does God's work.

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RECEIVER OF TAXES: Supervisor, may

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Certainly.

RECEIVER OF TAXES: I don't know if it was your organization or another one, but about 20 years ago, my wife and I, we had redone our kitchen and we had furniture we wanted to donate. Someone told us to reach out. I don't know if it was yours or another organization. Delivering it to a woman's house who had just escaped from domestic violence, had nothing. We gave her a table chair, a microwave, a toaster. And the thanks -she was like, no one's ever done that for me before.

MS. LYONS: It's life changing.

RECEIVER OF TAXES: Life changing. You know, something that was minuscule to us, giving away furniture and other goods, meant the world to her.

What you and your organization does goes beyond any kind of thanks that we can give here. But it's just the thanks

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that you get from the people that you help, it's got to be just heartwarming and, it's a loss of words of what to actually say. But it's just amazing what your group does. So I want to thank you, personally.

MS. LYONS: Thank you for keeping it and making an impact in your own way, too.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Yeah. And once again, Jeff Pravato, what a great idea to suggest to the community to reach out. You're going to need a new building for all the furniture.

But to help out in so many ways, like getting people started when they have to flee to a safe spot. So we thank you very much. We appreciate that very, very much. And I'm going to ask our Town Clerk, Rich LaMarca, to assist us in the presentation of this Proclamation to not only thank you for your efforts, but to announce that October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month and the

You walk right up to the kiosk and pay by credit card or debit card. The fees on that do not go to the Town, it goes to the providers.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: On that note, when it comes to the Town and its coffers, we'll be talking a little bit about our proposed budget for 2024. But one of the pieces financially is that you've worked very hard to get more money for our taxpayers through interest by putting money in high interest rate varying accounts. So this is a real positive. Nobody wants higher interest rates when you're borrowing, but when you're investing, to see those high interest rates and how much your office has brought our taxpayers through

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: No one has indicated that they would like to be heard on any of the matters on today's Regular Action Calendar or Resolutions, but I will ask if anyone would like to be heard on our regular Action Calendar, the Resolutions we're about to vote on.

response.)

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Please let the record reflect that no one has indicated

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that they would like to be heard and we do not have any slips filled out from anyone stating they would like to be heard.

So with that, I would like to call on the vote.

TOWN CLERK: Supervisor Saladino? SUPERVISOR SALADINO: I want to indicate something very, very important that we're very proud of and on behalf of the entire Town Board. One of the many resolutions we're about to vote on today is to accept the Proposed Budget For 2024 so that it may be considered at public budget hearings, one in the morning, one in the evening, scheduled for this October 17th. This doesn't mean that we are voting to pass the budget. It is part of the many step process to alert the public to what our budget represents. And that's why we take this vote today to accept it for the purposes of setting the hearing date.

Despite the nation experiencing such

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economic devastation, the highest inflation rate in decades, here in the Town of Oyster Bay. This is the sixth consecutive Tax Freeze Budget proposed by our administration. The budget continues to sustain the \$1.3 million property tax cut approved by the Town Board back in 2018.

So when you take each year of savings and total it, it means that \$9.3 million are back in the pockets of taxpayers rather than the coffers of government, \$9.3 million less collected by our taxpayers with all the addition of all these years of this savings, the first tax cut and then freezing each and every year.

By the way, as we're saving money, we've been building up the surplus in our town to take away the need as best as possible, and we continue to prove it, the need to raise taxes. We are entirely against that. We hear the taxpayers of our town and we are responding to them.

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So this tax freeze is once again possible to spending restraints, to efficiencies, debt reduction initiative. We mentioned earlier the money coming in now because of wise investment, investing in the short term from our Receiver's Office. When interest rates were lowered during the past years before the big inflation and the interest rates going up nationally, we were reissuing our debt at much lower interest rates, saving, in fact, tens of millions of dollars that repeat that savings year after year.

So this proposed budget set for 2024 continues to pay down the Town debt while enhancing the delivery of quality Town services. And when we say quality, we mean ever improving and we're very, very proud of that.

Since my beginning here with with some of the board members in 2017 and then our new board members coming on board, we've had quite a few successes.

We successfully reduced the Town's

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overall debt, the net debt by \$187

Million lower, while also eliminating the \$44 Million multi year budget deficit on the operating side of the budget which existed. And that's a big deal due to the fiscally conservative budget practices and all that we've done with our financial strategies. We've produced six consecutive budget surpluses and now we have the highest reserve fund ever, which totals over \$88 Million while cutting

So on the capital budget, the big road paving, the big purchase of trucks, the protecting of our facilities and upgrades, we have reduced the Town's total capital debt by a net of \$187 Million, while getting a third of the roads paved, resurfacing our fields, protecting our facilities.

taxes.

And as we said, we went from a \$44 Million deficit before this Board came to support and help the Town of Oyster Bay, and now we have over an \$88 million

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budget surplus.

What does that do? It allows Wall
Street to say, you're doing a great job
and we'll keep increasing your Wall
Street credit rating. As the credit
rating goes up and up and up, it reduces
the cost of borrowing money for the
projects that we have created in our
town. So that credit rating now went from
A+ to AA-. You don't think you could do
better than A+, well, we have. And we're
working toward the AAA perfect bond
rating. We continue to do that while
cutting taxes.

So we really appreciate the collaborative effort from the experts on this Town Board, our Director of Finance, all of the people involved in this town. And when I see our former town supervisor, Angelo Delligati with that ear to ear grin, we know we're doing a good job. He's got a great smile, by the way. We know we're doing a great job.

We're just very, very proud of this.

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And now, as one of our votes, we will be setting our dates for the budget hearing, where the public can come in and learn about the budget and we're proud of that we continue to improve services, cut taxes, cut our debt significantly, and take a huge swing in the financial strength of this town.

It is important to point out something that we're also proud of. The Town was in tough shape. Anybody who had a television or read a paper knew the Town was in tough shape seven, eight, nine years ago. And the New York State Comptroller put the Town of Oyster Bay on the Fiscal Stress List. That Fiscal Stress List has three layers of stress: 1, being the worst, which the Town was on. Then we corrected a lot of the financial issues and we would downgrade it to a less stress point. And then we continue to the lowest stress point. The State Comptroller and their audit team took us off the Stress List all together.

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No more stress in the Town.

But something else just happened recently that we're very, very proud of this New York State auditors who look at every municipality and look at their finances and look at the independent professional audits that look at everything in our town has not only confirmed that, yes, we don't belong on the Stress List, there is a rating that they give from 0 to 100 with 100 being the most stressed, I think the highest we ever were, we got a rating of 91, which is a lot of stress. Well, the new number came out for the Town of Oyster Bay on that stress list. And I know you all want to know what that number is. The Town of Oyster Bay on the State Comptroller Tom DiNapoli Stress List is zero; zero. No fiscal stress at all. And to go from where we were to where we are today, I can't thank enough, all of you who worked so hard to protect our town and its finances. We have zero fiscal stress

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while we're spending the monies to improve this town in each and every way.

RECEIVER OF TAXES: Supervisor, I think you looked over -- I don't mean to interrupt.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: Please, go ahead, Jeff.

RECEIVER OF TAXES: Over the past years, this board has refinance debt that was higher interest rates to lower. We took advantage of the lower interest rates over the years when they were low. So you did right to finance those rates, those bonds, saving the taxpayers millions of dollars there also.

SUPERVISOR SALADINO: So that's what we're doing today. We not passing the budget but accepting it.

We will pass a budget, as has been our commitment in the month of October, which is more about transparency. But first, today, we'll be taking a vote right now, among the other items on our list, to set the hearing dates. And

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there's two hearings a morning and an evening hearing, both on October 17th. And for that and all of the items on today's Agenda, I vote aye.
