In about the year 100 in the Common Era, there was a great rabbi, Rabbi Akiva. He was quite ignorant boy, and at the age of 40 he decided he's going to start learning. And he was a shepherd boy, but at 40-years-old, he joined kindergarten. He learned that the alphabet. And he started to learn. And he became one of the greatest Jewish leaders. And the main teaching he taught and emphasized was the verse in the Torah, love your neighbor as yourself. And he always emphasized, love your neighbor as yourself.

He ended up leading 24,000 students, and they loved each other, but they were missing an important ingredient, which was respect. Because

they loved each other so much they thought that the way they see the world is the way their 24,000 colleagues should see the world. And so they try to impose their view on others out of a deep sense of love. And that love led to a great division. And because of that great division, they weren't protected. They were missing God's protection. And a plague wiped out all 24,000 students. That was a terrible plague that hit that community at that time.

Omer celebrates the end of that plague and Rabbi Akiva's commitment to start again. He found five new students and that saved all Jewish learning, was saved from Rabbi Akiva's commitment. Everyone will be, you know, see things different, and we
